The absurdity of asking settlers to go in on the interior pre-emption lands and spend a life time clearing a few acres by crude methods, must also have appealed to the ministers. Surely these travelling members of the cabinet must have realized that having lost several years in getting this country settled they now have an enlarged duty to perform in making amends.

Compare such a policy with the present method of sending settlers in with an axe and grub hook to clear their own land, and then giving such of them as vote right a summer job cutting crude trails to help them get a grub stake.

The one objection to the present administration adopting a progressive policy is that the people have no faith in their ability to carry it through. The public judging from past ex-

periences would fear that the administration would use public work of this kind to debauch the electors and for the personal aggrandizement of their favorites.

A commission on land settlement would be some assurance of good faith.

A writer to The Fort George Tribune suggests that road districts be formed so that property owners can appoint their own road superintendents and pay for the roads by a special tax.

BRITISH COLUMBIA MAY COMPETE FOR WEST INDIA TRADE

Opening of Panama Canal Offers New Field for Lumber of Sister Province

Ottawa, July 27.—E. S. S. Flood, Trade Commissioner for the Barbadoes, in his report to the Department of Trade and Commerce, states that the opening of the Panama Canal will enable shippers of lumber from British Columbia to compete for part of the trade with the West Indies. Interest, he says, has been expressed by dealers in the Barbadoes on the subject and inquiries have been made as to the characteristics of Douglas fir and Canadian pine and as to their suitability for the tropics as compared with the pine and spruce from eastern Canada and the pitch pine now imported from the United States.

The requirements of the British West Indies for lumber, shingles, shocks, staves and punch-ons, have an average value of about two and a quarter millions of dollars. These colonies, with the exception of Jamaica, give a preference to Canadian lumber.

A steamship service between British Columbia and these colonies would give an outlet for lumber and other products of Western Canada and would depend to a large extent upon the availability of return cargoes. The products of the West Indies that now reach the preference market of Canada and that could make the voyage to British Columbia without deterioration are sugar and molasses, cocoa nuts and copra, coffee, rice, ginger and spices, lime juice, molasses and green heart timber. An examination into the character of trade between the Eastern Provinces and the West Indies forces the conclusion that an identical trade could be created for the Western Provinces, and one that would in no way interfere with the trade now handled in the East.

The above statement of the quantities of the staple and minor products of the British West Indies available for export and subject to a preference in the Canadian market, will show the large supply that might be drawn on for return cargoes. The distance from British Columbia to the Panama Canal is roughly about 4,000 miles and from the Canal to the Indies, 4,000 miles.

G. A. Cook, Canadian government agent at Kansas City, accompanied by a party of Kansas City cattlemen, are en route to British Columbia for the purpose of selecting a territory in British Columbia for the raising of pure-bred cattle.

The opening of the Panama Canal to the world's commerce on August 15th was announced by Secretary Garrison. Probably the first vessel to pass through the great waterway will be the Cristobal, war department steamer now at Colon.

The amalgamation of the Bank of Nova Scotia and the Metropolitan Bank, two of the leading chartered banks of Canada, has been announced. As the result of the merger, the bank of Nova Scotia will take its place as the fourth largest bank in Canada, with a paid up capital of \$6,500,000 and a reserve of \$11,750,000. The total deposits will aggregate \$67,043,789, and total assets \$94,142,284. The net profits of the combined institutions in 1913 were \$1,392,662.

By direction of the Canadian Government, Inspector Beytes is in Halifax fitting up an expedition to visit the frozen North in search for a record of the two explorers Badford and Street, who entered the north some time in 1911, and were last heard of in January, 1912. It is feared that these men were killed by the Esquimaux.

Prince Alexander of Teck, the new Governor-General of Canada, made a most favorable impression at the Canadian dinner to celebrate Dominion Day, held at Connaught Rooms, London, on July 1st. The Prince showed a

knowledge of Canadian conditions and an interest in the progress of the Dominion which augur well for his success and popularity as a Governor-General of Canada.

A large meeting of women was held in the Technical College assembly room, Halifax, on Monday night of last week in the interests of a movement to reduce the cost of living. An address was given by Mrs. J. A. Wilson, of Ottawa convener of the Household Economic Committee of the National Council of Women of Canada. Several Halifax ladies took part in the discussion and steps were taken for the formation of a league to co-operate in the reduction of food prices.

Bared Girl's Heart

London, July 27.—A despatch from Pistoria, Italy, declares that Dr. Vannucci, chief surgeon of the hospital there, has accomplished a marvel of surgery. He operated on a girl named Maria Tondia to remove a needle accidentally run into her body to the heart, which in its action, came in contact with the point of the needle. The surgeon, holding the girl's heart in his hand, found that the pulsations, violent at first, gradually ceased. "It is all over," he exclaimed, but as a last hope, he started to massage the heart. Little by little its activity was stimulated, and the operation was successfully finished.
