AUSTRIANS GREATLY PLEASED FORMAL ANNOUNCEMENT OF WAR — PRICE OF FOOD JUMPING

VIENNA SEEMS EAGER FOR WAR —PRESS STRICTLY CENSORED

ATTEMPTS OF SIR EDWARD GREY TO LOCALIZE TROUBLE MAY SUCCEED—PRICES OF FOOD SOAR—FRANCE IS READY FOR WAR—RUSSIA WANTS PEACE

(Special to The Daily News)

Vienna, July 29.—With great feelings of relief the people of dual monarchy look forward to the war with Serbia. Even had certain knowledge that Russia would intervene they would know a cause why Austria should hesitate a moment or alter course in the slightest.

Vienna is absolutely without fear of the movement of troops the papers are naturally forbidden to print particulars. A censorship is established in the press and all means of communication. An immense but not a crowd with constantly increased numbers assembled yesterday before the War Office.

Well informed circles the city is held so far that Sir Edward Grey's proposal to localize conflict between Austria-Hungary and Serbia may succeed. Former declares herself in accord with Sir Edward's proposals with the exception of what he said relating to the suspension of military operations. There have been proceeded with too far to allow anything to be done in this direction.

Services from Belgrade say that Serbian capital is now located in the town where the Skupstina (national assembly) met yesterday. Servians between the ages of 18 and 60 years and able to bear arms have been called out. Mobilization is proceeding rapidly although the peasants will have to harvest the remainder of crops. It is reported that there is much discontent.

Sharp Fighting Reported
Sharp fighting is reported along the River Drina where Serbian volunteers attempted to cross the river which was resolutely opposed by the Austrian frontier troops. It is also reported that Servians fired on their own transports by mistake, killing and wounding a number of Serbian soldiers.

Russia Wants Peace
St. Petersburg, July 29.—The Russian Government has issued the following official communication:

"The numerous patriotic demonstrations of the last few days in St. Petersburg and other cities have convinced the Russian Government that the firm pacific policy of Russia finds a sympathetic echo among all classes of the population.

"The Government hopes that the expression of feeling of the people will not be hindered on any side against the powers with whom Russia is at peace, and with whom she wishes to remain at peace.

"While the Government gathers strength from this wave of popular feeling it expects the subjects to retain reticence and tranquility and rest confidently on the guardianship of the dignity and interests of Russia."

France Ready for War

Paris, July 29.—The French Government and people appear to be preparing quietly for the war. The Government is simply awaiting the decision of Russia. The army troop trains are ready, and representatives of the army are on duty at all telegraph posts.

It is believed here that when Austria has captured and occupies some Serbian territory it will be her policy not to proceed any further but to hold what they have taken until Serbia gives a competent guarantee that she will observe Austria's wishes.

Food Prices Going Up

Vienna, July 29.—An abnormal rise in the price of provisions has caused great indignation among the people.

Vegetables in many cases have trebled in price. The feeling ran so high that stall keepers in the markets were mobbed and assaulted. The authorities declare that the sudden increase in prices is totally unwarranted and a committee has been appointed to deal with the provisioning of the country.

Austrians Called From Canada

Winnipeg, July 29.—A partial mobilization in connection with the Austro-Serbian war has been issued to apply to Canada. The Austrian consul states that there are approximately 150,000 Austrians in Western Canada, and those concerned will be notified individually by letter that their corps is ordered to the front.

SERBIA'S REPLY TO ULTIMATUM

Practically All Conditions Laid Down by Austria Accepted

London, July 29.—Serbia's reply to the Austrian ultimatum is summarized as follows:

First—Serbia agrees to the publication in its official journal on the front page, of the formal declaration submitted by the Austrian Government, condemning the subversive propaganda and deploring its fatal consequences, regretting the participation of Serbian officers in this propaganda, repudiating any further interference with Austro-Hungarian interests and warning all Servians that rigorous proceedings will be taken in the future against any persons guilty of such machinations.

Second—Serbia agrees to communicate this decision to the army in the form of an order of the day.

Third—It promises to dissolve those societies which may be considered capable of conducting intrigues against Austria.

Fourth—Revision of the laws governing the press.

Fifth—Dismissal from the army and navy of officers and the removal also of civil officials whose participation in an anti-Austrian propaganda may be proved. The Serbian Government however, protests against Austrian officials taking part in the enquiry.

Sixth—The Serbian Government asks for an explanation as to just what part the Austrian officials are to be called upon to take in the enquiry into the Sarajevo plot and it is announced that Serbia can only admit such participation as would be in accordance with international law and good neighborly relations.

Seventh—To sum up, Serbia accepts all the conditions and demands of Austria and makes re-

AUSTRIA FORMALLY DECLARES WAR AGAINST THE SERBIANS

AUSTRIAN ARMY CORPS ALREADY MOVING TOWARDS SERBIA —DEMAND SATISFACTION FOR ASSASSINATION OF ARCHDUKE AND HIS WIFE

(Special to The Daily News)

Vienna, July 29.—Austria has formally declared war upon Serbia. The text of this declaration states: "The government of Serbia not having replied in a satisfactory manner to the note remitted by the Austro-Hungarian minister at Belgrade on July 23, the Imperial Royal Government finds itself compelled to proceed in a manner to safeguard its rights and its interests and to have recourse for this purpose to arms. Austria-Hungary considers itself therefore at this moment in a state of war against Serbia."

The Ultimatum

The Austro-Hungarian ultimatum to Serbia was couched in a tone of almost unprecedented severity and fastened on the Serbian government and people responsibility for the assassination of Archduke Francis Ferdinand and his wife at Sarajevo. It demanded satisfaction within forty-eight hours.

Moving of Troops

Berlin, July 29.—Reports from

the Austrian border state that the transport of the Eighth and Ninth Austrian army corps from Bohemia towards the Serbian frontier has begun.

Can Field Two Million Men

Vienna, July 29.—Austria has 390,000 soldiers upon whom to call to safeguard what her statesmen believe to be her own interests.

These figures have to do with the peace footing of the Austro-Hungarian army. In time of war the Emperor-King can call 2,000,000 men of all arms into the field, and this estimate takes no account of the Landwehr and Landsturm, corresponding to the British territorial force.

This reserve force includes all able-bodied men between the ages of 18 and 21 and between the ages of 32 and 42, the male population generally between the ages of 21 and 32 being required to give military service, two years in infantry, three in cavalry and artillery and four in the navy, besides service in the reserves, bringing the total number of years generally up to twelve.

CANADA'S BALANCE OF TRADE TURNING

Dominion Is Exporting More Produce and Importing Less

Ottawa, July 29.—During the twelve months ended April 30, Canada's exports to the United States totalled \$200,836,674, as against \$168,605,800 for the corresponding period in 1913.

Imports from the United States on the other hand, totalled \$402,985,425, as against \$422,213,343. A great factor undoubtedly in the increase in exports is found in cattle. Canada exported in the twelve months \$7,180,358 worth to the United States, as against \$2,232,542 to all countries in 1913.

Canada's total trade with all countries for the twelve months ending April 30 last was \$1,096,883,675, as against \$1,079,934,018 for 1913, or an increase of about \$17,000,000. Imports totalled \$621,822,564, as against \$678,587,617, or a decrease of fifty-six million dollars. Exports totalled \$475,061,111, as against \$401,346,404, or an increase of \$74,000,000.

CALLIES DEFEAT THE SONS OF ENGLAND

In one of the best games yet played in the Prince Rupert football league the Callies defeated the Sons of England by 5 goals to 3. In the first half the Callies had considerably more of the play and at half time the score stood 3 to 0 in favor of the Scots. However the S. of E. are a team that is never beaten till the whistle blows for time, and they at once proceeded to make up the ground they had lost, and were successful in notching 3 points. In the meantime the Callies, however, also got busy and adding two more goals, the result was as given above. The game was particularly noticeable for the clean manner in which both teams conducted the contest. The Callies team showed improved form, while the Sons of England had one or two new men on their team last night and demonstrated that with a little more practice together, have one of the strongest teams in the league. Mr. A. Holmberg made an efficient referee.

While no one can anticipate that with the opening of the Grand Trunk through traffic Prince Rupert will leap into the position of a great ocean port, we can anticipate a greatly increased activity in trade and commerce passing through the city, and we can do much to stimulate the growth of Prince Rupert's shipping trade.

One of the big prospects of the early history of Rupert's shipping will be the Alaska and Yukon trade. This trade is at our doors and it does not require the establishment of a string of ocean liners to bring it to Rupert. This trade is handled by coast steamers.

The geographical advantage of Prince Rupert over the other coast ports in being two days' closer to the northern trade centres, will undoubtedly be taken advantage of by the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company to get eastern Canada shipments and bonded United States shipments for the north. But Canadian merchants and Rupert business men should take advantage of the new opportunity as well.

The commencement of the Alaska Government railway will create a new and enlarging market on the Alaska coast for food products and other supplies. Canada and even British Columbia can furnish some of these. The Canadian West can supply to this north country meats, flour, cereals, oats, hay, a limited quantity of butter and eggs and other articles. It should all come through Rupert. There is a duty on some of these supplies going into Alaska, but the transportation advantages can overcome that in many instances.

One of the most promising products for shipment to the North so far as British Columbia is concerned is hay. The great Bulkley Valley is producing thousands of tons of the very best quality of timothy hay, and it can be made to produce a tremendous supply at a low figure. The country is particularly adapted for growing hay and the short haul to the market offers good profits. The north demands double compressed bales and a special and expensive machine is made for this purpose. Already a prominent business man of Rupert who realizes the possibilities of this northern trade, has opened negotiations with some of the big ranchers of the Bulkley Valley to go after this business.

The ranchers on the Bulkley are also going into the cattle business and within a few years there will be several big stock ranches in that country. This will enable the buyer to get meat to the north on a short haul. Besides those mentioned there are numerous openings for the live business man to get into the northern trade and incidentally it will all help Rupert.

GOVERNMENT GEOLOGIST
REPORTS ON SALT DEPOSITS

ONE GALLON OF BRINE YIELDS A POUND OF SALT — INVESTORS INTERESTED IN DEVELOPMENT OF THESE DEPOSITS

R. G. McConnell's report on the section along the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway between Prince Rupert and Aldermere anticipates rapid development of the mineral resources of this territory. The salt deposits at Kwinita, about forty-four miles east of Prince Rupert are described. A basin a mile long and a mile and a half long has been filled with sands, clays and gravels to a level equal to that of the highest tides which affect the Skeena River at this point. The surface is covered with from six to eight feet of silty clay, underlain by gravel, and it was in the latter that D. C. Whiteford found strong brine. Several test holes were put down, but no attempts made to ascertain the extent or thickness of the brine saturated gravels. The brine is considered to be imprisoned sea water, somewhat concentrated. Mr. McConnell considers the geological conditions favorable for the retention of the salt water and its partial evaporation. The analysis does not show much concentration, however, as this brine contains only 2,823 grams of sodium chloride per gallon, as against 2,435.74 grams of sodium chloride in sea water. It is probable, however, that more highly concentrated brine may be found with depth, and it is noted that in a borehole put down by Mr. Whiteford to a depth of a lit-

tle over 200 feet a hard band of partially or wholly rock salt was encountered. Mr. Whiteford claims a yield of a pound of salt to the gallon of brine from this deposit.

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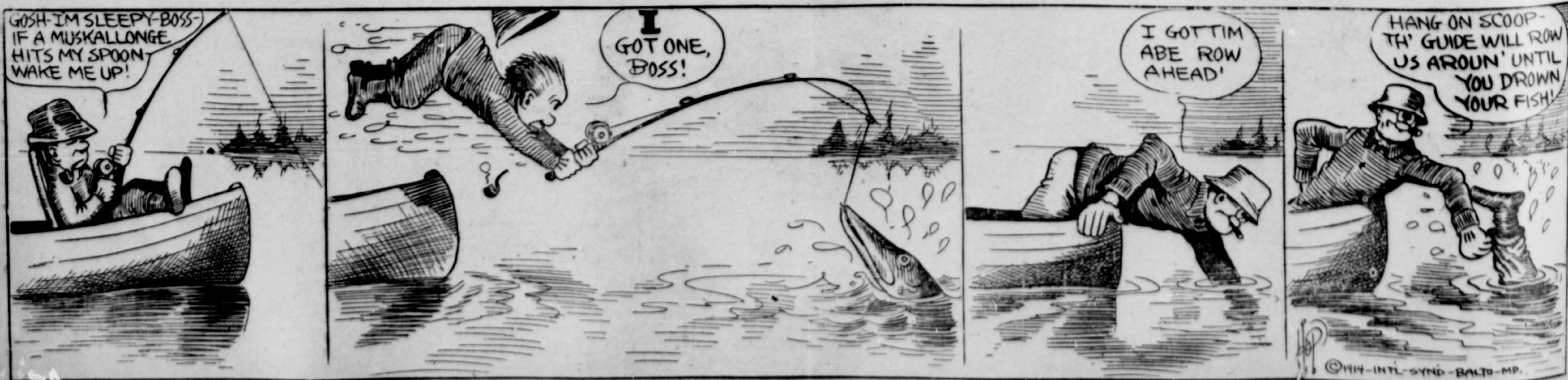

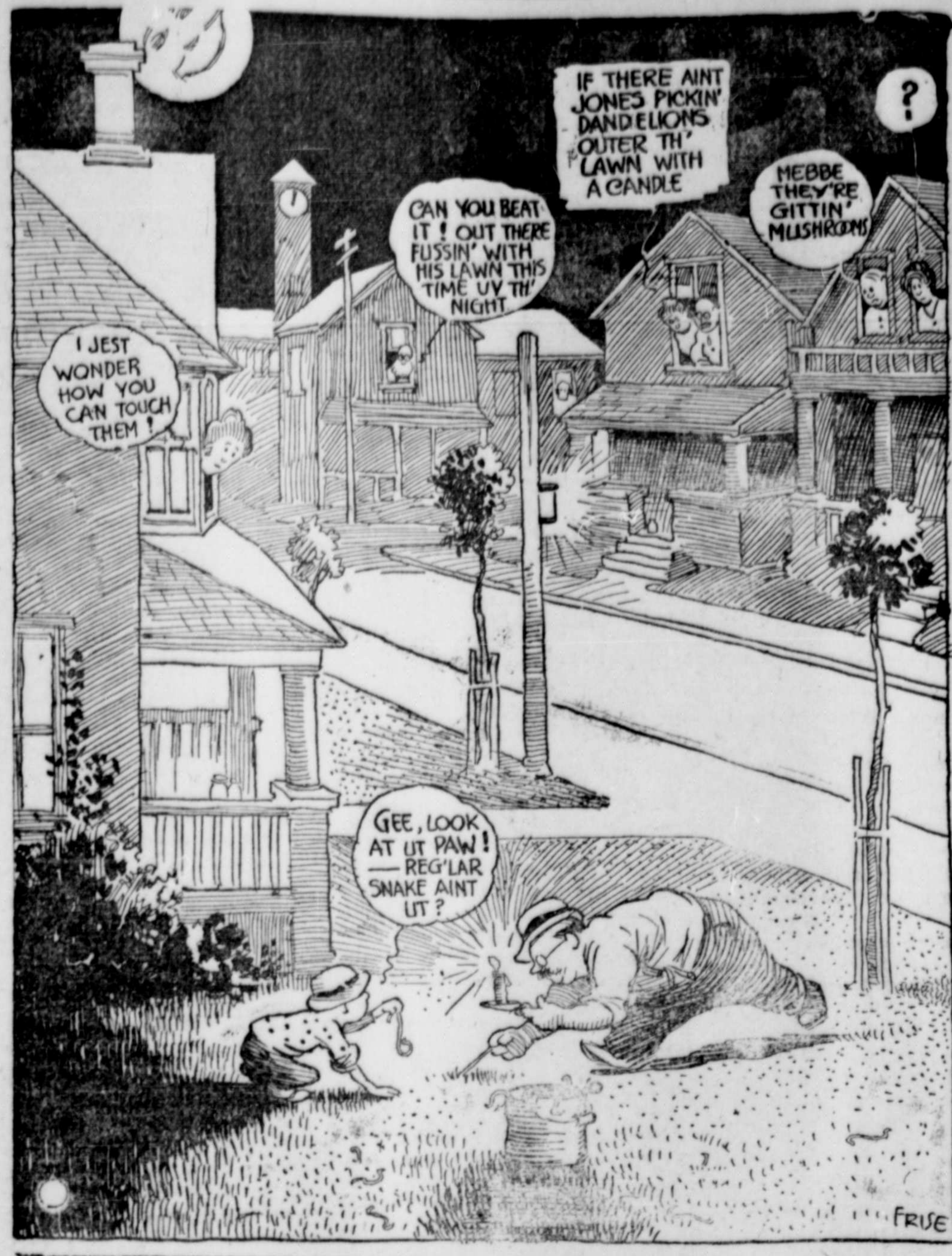

GENERAL NEWS IN BRIEF

Mrs. Charles C. Craven, twenty years old, wife of the train bandit, stated she was born in Toronto and then placed in a Hamilton convent before her removal to Charleston, W. Va.

A judicial enquiry has been ordered at Vienna into the death of Guide Melouing and four others. It is thought possible that tourists slew Melouing because he led them astray.

At a depth of about 4,000 feet a promising salt vein was discovered at Amherstburg, Ont., by drillers from the Solvay Process Company. The find is said to be most extensive.

Skyscraping office buildings with elevators running horizontally, piped pure air, and summer bungalows on the top of the buildings are new features predicted by C. A. Patterson at Duluth.

Madam Caillaux, who is on trial for murder, says she will divorce her husband when the trial is over, as an act of love. She says by remaining with him she would injure his political career.

Jack Sowden, a twelve-year-old boy scout, went in his canoe to the rescue of four people who were drowning at the bathing beach at the park landing on the Souris River and succeeded in saving them all.

While a big crowd of men, women and children of the throng

seeing the sights of the carnival at Roslyn, Wash., Thursday night filled the tent of Myrtle Wilson, billed as "The Strangest Woman Alive," she was bitten by a rattlesnake and died of the poisoning yesterday afternoon.

Lieutenant John C. Porte will not attempt to fly across the Atlantic until October 1st. This decision was reached today as a result of a conference between Glenn H. Curtiss, Lieut. Porte, Will Gasse, the personal representative of Rodman Wanamaker.

Twenty dollars and twenty-five cents was secured by two masked bandits who shot and killed Tom Elgin, a flagman, in an attempt to hold up the New York Limited passenger train of the Louisville & Nashville Railway at Gentilly, a small station three miles east of Hammondsport, N.Y.

Hon. Dr. Roche, Minister of the Interior, has undergone an operation at Rochester, Minnesota. It was not serious.

Vancouver Liberals are calling a big meeting for next Saturday to arrange for the reception to Sir Wilfrid Laurier in September. The old chief will be asked to open the Vancouver exhibition on October 3rd.

The body of Charles Lee, a farm hand, of Merlin, Ont., was found floating in the reservoir.

Fermin Desmoulin, the French engraver and philanthropist, died at Venice at the age of 61 years.

The Mines Department of the Dominion Government is investigating the occurrence of radium in Canadian rocks.

Thomas Morris, a fireman on the Hudson Bay terminal lighter No. 1, succumbed to the heat near Morrisburg, Ont.

Navier Plante was killed at Quebec, when he fell off a wharf and struck his head against a vessel moored there.

Ten men, three of them from Toronto, were arrested in Montreal on a charge of being implicated in a big wire-tapping game.

Mud plugging the gas mains on the Chatham, Wallaceburg and Lake Erie Railway line caused the traffic to be held up for several hours.

While Walter Green, of Hamilton, was mixing paint, the mixture suddenly exploded, badly

burning his face and hands. The cause is unknown.

The National Manufacturing Company's factory at Brockville was badly damaged by two fires within a few hours. The loss is covered by insurance.

\$100,000 was subscribed for the Irish volunteer fund at a largely attended meeting of the National League of America at New York.

Reports from Oxford County show that the products are rapidly increasing both in quantity and quality. An especially large output of cheese and butter and fruits is recorded.

The efforts of the International Opium Conference at The Hague to suppress the traffic in opium are being blocked by the action of Turkey which refuses to commit itself to any rules for the suppression of the traffic, and the other powers refuse to proceed without Turkey.

A cloudburst at Apohogin, N. B., did \$300,000 worth of damage.

The third lock at the Canadian Soo will be ready for business September 1st. It will accommodate the largest ships on the lakes.

The St. John Globe, which has been an ardent supporter of Premier Fleming and his Administration, calls on the Premier to resign.

Alonso B. Jones, foreman of the Massey-Harris woodworking department, was drowned at the upper pond, Brantford.

Felix E. Anderson, assistant to the president of the St. Louis Terminal Railroad Association, was shot in the left shoulder by a stranger.

Thirty thousand textile workers in the district of Forst, Prussia, were locked out by their employers as a result of the strike of 125 fullers.

Representatives of the striking Hydro-Electric Department employees, waited on the board Saturday morning and arranged a conference.

A comparison of Walkerville's assessment figures shows there has been a \$500,000 increase each year. Population has also grown 1,600 in the last four years.

New Orleans, La., July 27.—Four snakes, eighteen tarantulas, seventy rats, enough roaches to almost fill a barrel and bedbugs galore, formed part of the cargo of a freight vessel sailing tropical seas and which was fumigated here yesterday in connection with the fight against bubonic plague. Two of the snakes were boa constrictors more than five feet long. The others were of a harmless Central American variety.
