GERMANY PLEADS WITH ITALY TO STAND BY TRIPLE ALLIANCE

ITALIAN PEOPLE REFUSE TO MAKE ANY HOSTILE ACTS AGAINST FRANCE OR GREAT BRITAIN--ROME CHEERS FOR FRANCE

Rome, August 8.—The German government is using every effort to bring about a change in Italy's attitude in the present European situation. Direct appeals have been made to King Victor Emmanuel but in vain. Italy, having declared her neutrality, intends to maintain it. Italy's position as a member of the Triple Alliance, and as an ally of Germany under certain conditions, has been maintained in every phase. The census of opinion seems to indicate that the Italian people will never permit an act of hostility against France or Great Britain. Because Italy is neutral all manifestation against belligerents is rigorously repressed. Everywhere spontaneous outbursts of enthusiasm for France have occurred in Rome by frequent cries of 'Long live France,' 'Long live the Latin brothers.' The Marsellaise is being sung in the streets in front of the French Embassy here. The French Consulates in other cities of Italy are daily receiving offers from men who wish to join the French forces.

BELGIUM CITIES WILL HOLD PROUD PLACE IN HISTORY

WAR CORRESPONDENT BELIEVES GREAT BATTLES WILL BE FOUGHT ALONG MEUSE RIVER

London, August 8.—The Daily Mail correspondent names Liege, Namur, Huy and Zerning as the most likely to hold a proud place in the history of the present war, for they will hold back the head of the advancing German forces. "It was never expected that Liege would offer any serious resistance," says the correspondent, "yet they have already stemmed the German onslaught on two previous days, and only today have two forts fallen before the concentrated German army."

NEWSPAPER MEN WERE ARRESTED IN BERLIN AS SPYS

Old Ensaa, Netherlands, Aug. 8.—Employees of the Reuters Telegraph Company in Berlin, with other British subjects who were expelled from the German capital arrived here along with several newspaper correspondents. The train also conveyed the British Ambassador. A correspondent says the British declaration of war on Germany was followed by an attack on the embassy. A crowd besieged the buildings for hours and smashed all the windows. The same night two English and two American correspondents were arrested upon suspicion of being spies, but were released a few hours later.

KING GEORGE RESIGNS AS COLONEL IN PRUSSIAN ARMY

London, August 8.—King George has sent in his resignation as honorary colonel of the First Prussian Dragoons. Up to the present the Kaiser has not sent his resignation as honorary colonel of the Dragoon Guards to the King.

KITCHENER ACCEPTS 500 FRONTIERSMEN

London, August 8.—Lord Kitchener has accepted eight hundred Canadian Legion of Frontiersmen. They are to be furnished at once.

BELGIANS FEAR EPIDEMIC MORE THAN GERMAN GUNS

Brussels, August 8.—Many people of Liege have made their way out of the city fearing an epidemic more than the bombardment. German prisoners whom the newspaper correspondent questioned, acknowledged freely the courage and tenacity of the Belgian troops now opposing the German advance. The prisoners are being treated with consideration on their way to Brussels. They are supplied at stations with beer and bread. The excitement in Brussels since the arrival of the wounded has increased. There is much optimism concerning the military situation.

KING ALBERT PREDICTS BELGIUM WILL TRIUMPH

Brussels, August 8.—Before his departure to the front, King Albert addressed a communication to the Belgian army: "Without the least provocation on our part our proud neighbor has torn up treaties bearing its signature, broken in our territory because we refused to forfeit our honor, and an attack has been made. The world marvels at our loyal attitude. Brave soldiers, I salute you in the name of Belgium. You will triumph because your strength has been put in service for the right. Glory to you, soldiers, defenders of the liberty of the Empire, which has been menaced by the Fatherland."

Board of Trade Asks President to Take Question Up With the Company

At the regular monthly meeting of the Board of Trade last evening the laying up of the Grand Trunk steamers was discussed and some indignation was expressed by the members for this action by the company. The Board members expressed themselves as out of sympathy with the decision unless it is for very good cause, and the president was authorized to take up the question of maintaining the freight, passenger and mail service. The only other question discussed was the proposed business men's excursion back east. It was decided to have this called off indefinitely.

GRANBY CO. WANT INDIAN RESERVE

Agent C. C. Perry Now in Confer- ence with Kincolith Tribe

Indian Agent C. C. Perry left last evening on the steamer Venture for the Naas River. He goes to Kincolith to negotiate with the chiefs of that tribe for the release of the Indian reserve on Observatory Inlet around Granby Bay.

It is understood the Granby Consolidate Mining and Smelting Company want to purchase the property. There are large silica deposits on the reserve and the company want this for use as a flux in the copper smelter.

Many of the officers of both the C. P. R. and Grand Trunk Coast boats are leaving for England to join the British reservists.

GREAT BRITAIN IS SENDING TROOPS TO BELGIAN AND FRANCE

FIRST TROUP SHIPS LEFT BRITAIN LAST EVENING -- OVER TWENTY STEAMERS SEIZED FOR TRANSPORTS

(Special to The Daily News)
New York, August 8.—A London cable says the British Admiralty has seized 21 steamers to be used in transporting the troops to Belgium and France. Both these nations have sent urgent appeals to Britain to hurry reinforcements forward. The first transports will probably leave tonight. Others will follow tomorrow. Thus Britain will enter the Continental struggle almost immediately. The transports will be heavily convoyed by a division of the home fleet.

OFFICIAL GERMAN REPORT ADMITS DEFEAT AT LIEGE

(Special to The Daily News)
Berlin, August 8.—The official German account of the siege of Liege says that on Wednesday the German advance guard penetrated the entire Belgian frontier. A small detachment tried a coup de main with great boldness at Liege. Some cavalry entered Liege with the intention of seizing the commander of the forts. The latter only saved himself by flight. The account further says "Our attack on the fortress itself with its modern fortifications was unsuccessful. Our brave troops are before the fortress in contact. A hostile foreign press will characterize the enterprise, which cannot give the slightest influence on the army operation, as a defeat. However it is but a unique act in the history of the war and a sign of the heroic gallantry of our troops."

GERMAN TROOPS MEET DISASTER BEFORE CITY LIEGE

London, August 8.—An exchange Telegraph Company despatch from Brussels says the German troops before the Belgian stronghold of Liege acknowledge the loss of 25,000 men. The despatch further states that the statement is officially made that one hundred and twenty thousand German soldiers were hurled upon Liege yesterday in the third desperate attempt to take the forts and the city. Before the infantry in yesterday's attack got into action, fifty-seven German batteries stationed along the River Meuse shelled the forts. Under the cover of this artillery fire the German infantry dashed forward and captured the suburb Bressaux, only a short distance from Fort Fleuron. Desperate hand-to-hand fighting took place between the Belgians and the Germans in the effort to gain the fort. The latter were unsuccessful and had to retire.

BRITISH MEMBERS CHERED ITALIAN MINISTER AND WIFE

London, August 8.—A remarkable demonstration of friendliness occurred in front of the Italian embassy. The demonstration was organized by members of the House of Commons and others prominent in the political and social world. Thousands of passers-by joined in the cheering which continued until Ambassador Marquis di Nanceavilla and the Marchioness appeared on the balcony. The Ambassador said there were scenes of the wildest enthusiasm in Italy who had declared her neutrality and would adhere to it.

BRITISH AWAIT GERMAN SHIPS ITALIAN HARBORS

(Special to The Daily News)
Rome, August 8.—In pursuance of its proclamation of neutrality Italy has ordered all German warships from its ports. The British cruiser squadron, which has quarters at Malta, is reported to be waiting for the German cruisers in the harbor of Messina. Officers of the German warships, realizing that they are going to certain destruction, have made their wills and have left them in possession of the German consulate.

NOT YET GRANTED REQUESTED ARMISTICE

Brussels, August 8.—Lieut. General Leman, the Governor of Liege, has not yet replied to the request for a German armistice.

80,000 GERMANS IN ATTACK AT LIEGE

London, August 8.—It is officially announced that the Germans had eighty thousand men before Liege. This number has been augmented since the forts were manned.

KEEPING A GUARD ON WELLAND CANAL

Toronto, August 8.—The 44th Regiment and the 2nd Dragoons have been called out and put on guard over the Welland Canal. The canal is a great highway for the wheat crops to Montreal and will carry the bulk of this year's Western crop for British shipment. There are a large number of foreigners working in the canal district and the Ottawa government has decided to take no chances on any of the locks being dynamited.

GERMAN SPY ON TYNE BRIDGE WAS SHOT

New York, August 8.—The following is published under date of Newcastle-on-Tyne: "A German spy was challenged on the Tyne bridge. He refused to stop on the order of the sentry and started running from the bridge. He endeavored to escape in a boat and was shot."

The following timely article appeared in a recent issue of The Daily Colonist:—

"You may quote me as saying that in my judgment there is nothing in the present situation, nor in possible future developments, which justify any alarm being felt by the people of this Province, and particularly the business communities, as the permanency of their positions as citizens and property interests."

This statement was conveyed to The Colonist yesterday by Sir Richard McBride. The Premier continued: "We are passing through a testing period. Let us be calm, as we are courageous and confident. I take the view that it behooves everyone of us to be considerate of the position of his neighbor at this crisis. In a thousand ways embarrassments involving pecuniary relations may ensue for a time, but this only imposes upon us the obligation to devise a thousand ways for allaying these embarrassments."

"It would be as unpatriotic

as it would be foolish and unwarranted for each individual at this time to act the part of a self-seeking opportunist. Most of us are by necessity non-combatants; but we must see to it that we acquit ourselves like men in the peaceful paths of good-citizenship."

In some of the countries of the world the declaration of war cancels all financial obligations for the meantime. While perhaps this may be a little strong, it is quite right to protect the individual when the declaration of war has put it beyond his powers to meet his obligations. Under such conditions everybody is in the same boat and it behooves all good citizens to treat others as they themselves would be treated. This, of course, shouldn't furnish a pretext to anyone to forgo the obligations he can well meet. Nobody, at the same time need fear any serious results as public opinion, if not the courts themselves, would prevent any abuse of advantages furnished by the present conditions.

WILD ENTHUSIASM ON BOULEVARD PARIS

Paris, August 7.—The wildest enthusiasm was manifested on the boulevards when the first victory to the French arms was reported.

Bodies of men formed in regular companies in ranks of ten deep and paraded the streets waving the tri-color and other national emblems and cheering and singing the "Marseillaise" and the "Internationale" and throwing their hats in the air.

On the sidewalks were many weeping women and children. All the stores and cafes were deserted. The marching of the soldiers in the streets, with the English, Russian and French flags flying, the singing of patriotic songs and the shouting of "On to Berlin" was even less remarkable than the general demeanor and cold resolution of most of the people.

SEATTLE'S MAYOR GIVES RUPERT BOOST

The shorter distance from Eastern shipping points to Prince Rupert over the Canadian Pacific will make that city the supply point for the Alaska railway construction and not Seattle.

This is the pleasant prediction made by Mayor Gill at a political meeting at Bremerton. He believes steel and foodstuffs will go north through the Prince Rupert port.

"Seattle and Northwest cities will receive a jolt when Northern shipments begin," said the mayor. "As long as consignments can go over Prince Rupert line free of duty, that city will be the big one for Alaskan trade."

WOMEN DIGGING TRENCHES

Female Population of Serbia and Montenegro Aiding Men in Defence Work

London, August 7.—Women of Serbia and Montenegro are flocking to the colors to aid in resisting the invasion of Austria. Montenegro is preparing to aid Serbia and dispatches declare that women are throwing up entrenchments near Priboj, where an infantry and a mountain battery has been stationed.

With Austria moving every available body of troops towards the Serbian frontier, Serbia is making every preparation to resist the advance. Strong detachments have been sent to Valjevo and Uzhitza, both fortified towns on the Bosnian frontier. The Serbian women will fight shoulder to shoulder with the men in the ranks.

PARIS WILL BE DEFENDED BY GREAT AERIAL FLEET

France Has 5,000 Ships of the Air to Greet Arrival of Germans
Paris, August 7.—The present war will mark the first great aerial war in history. It will be, in a measure, also a contest between war dirigible and aeroplane. France has the greatest fleet of aeroplanes in the world. Rapid preparation have been made on both sides for such a conflict. In case of a siege of Paris or any other French forts the aeroplanes would do estimatable damage to the enemy.
It is estimated that the French aeroplane fleet will number more than 5,000. Germany has a big aeroplane fleet in addition to its incomparable dirigible equipment.

LATE WAR NEWS HAPPENINGS

FROM THE EUROPEAN CENTERS

GOVERNOR OF LEIGE GRANTS ARMISTICE TWENTY-FOUR HOURS

London, August 8.—A despatch to The Post says the Belgians have granted an armistice of 24 hours as requested by the Germans. The latter are collecting their wounded and burying the dead.

HAVE PLACED GUNS AT GLACE BAY STATION

Ottawa, August 8.—The Militia Department has taken steps to have several long range guns placed at Glace Bay to protect the wireless station.

CANADA PARLIAMENT WILL MEET AUGUST 18

Ottawa, August 8.—Official announcement has been made that the Canadian parliament will meet in an emergency session on August 18th and will probably continue in session during the continuance of the war. The parliament will be asked to vote a war fund of \$50,000,000 and to ratify the Cabinet's action in offering troops to Great Britain.

MANY EXTRA MEN FOR CANADA'S ARSENAL

Fifteen Thousand Weapons Ordered by Government From Ross Plant

Quebec, August 8.—It is known here that the Ross Rifle Company has received orders from the government to supply fifteen thousand rifles. Extra men are being taken on and the number will be increased to 1,000. Great activity is being shown in military circles here and Lieut. Commander Wood is in charge of the naval dispositions. Troops and guns have been despatched down the river and the north channel is obstructed while an examining station for incoming and outgoing ships has been established on the Island of Orleans.

War enthusiasm runs high here and both local English and French volunteer regiments have volunteered for active service.

Government steamers are taking down guns and stores while a great quantity of ammunition has been sent over the Canadian Pacific to Esquimalt.

On request of the French consul at Montreal, the French liner Caroline is detained here.

FRENCH ORGANIZING A FOREIGN LEGION

(Special to The Daily News) Paris, August 8.—The French war office is arranging to accept foreign volunteers, beginning August 21. They will be organized into a foreign legion.

IF SEAS ARE CLOSED FLOUR WILL GO DOWN

Toronto, August 8.—Millers have not advanced flour prices further and state that if the high-water of the seas is not kept open by the British navy supplies will pile up in Canada to such an extent that prices will drop and the bottom go out of the markets.

CANADA MAY HAVE SPECIAL WAR TAX

Ottawa, August 8.—When parliament meets and passes the war appropriation, it is possible that a special war tax will be imposed to provide the fund. This is believed to be a better system than issuing bonds.

HANDSOME SOUVENIR FOR PRES. CHAMBERLAIN

The Board of Trade have forwarded the bar of silver received from Harris Bros. to Birks in Vancouver and are to receive designs for a suitable gift to be made up for presentation to Pres. E. J. Chamberlain as a souvenir of the linking up of the Grand Trunk Pacific.

The bar of silver was donated by Messrs. Harris for the purpose. It is from the American Boy Scouts and the engraving on the souvenir will mention that fact.

INSURANCE RATES OUT DOWN TEN PER CENT

The recent kick made by the insurance agents and business men on the rate of fire insurance in the business sections of this city, has had some beneficial results. The last revised rate sheet received from the B. C. Mainland Fire Underwriters' Association shows an almost general reduction of from ten to fifteen per cent in the business blocks. This is not as much as the small hazard and good fire fighting equipment warrants, but it helps some and the local insurance agents deserve credit for securing it.

SIR JOHN FRENCH TAKES ACTIVE PART

London, August 8.—Field Marshal Sir John French, after a brief estrangement from the army as a result of the Ulster incident, has been appointed to take charge of the army in the field, as inspector-general.

LIEUTENANT PORTE GOES BACK TO ENGLAND

New York, August 8.—John C. Porte, British navy lieutenant, who was to have piloted the Wanamaker flying boat, America, on its attempted trans-Atlantic flight, has decided to return at once to England, as he is a reservist. He booked passage on the steamship Lusitania which sailed for England at midnight Thursday. Announcement of Lieut. Porte's withdrawal as the America's pilot was made after a meeting at the Aero Club of America.

BIG RAILWAY STRIKE TO BE ARBITRATED

Managers Agree to Arbitrate as Result of War

Washington, August 8.—Managers of the Western railways have accepted arbitration of the wage dispute with their engine-men and firemen. The railroad managers advised the president they would accept the plan proposed by the federal board of mediation, which already had been passed on favorably by the representatives of the engine-men and firemen. The plan provides that the question of wages shall be arbitrated under the Newlands act and that rules and regulations enforced prior to October, 1913, shall be restored. Immediately after the call of the railroad managers the federal board of mediation was notified of the favorable outcome.

CHET NEFF COMING TO MEET BURNS HERE

Expected to Take Prince George But Will Arrive Here Monday

Vancouver, August 8.—Chet Neff, the Seattle lightweight boxer, arrived in the city a few days ago, in tow of his manager, the amiable Dan Salt, and will leave today for Prince Rupert, where Neff will box Rough House Charley Burns of this city, on August 15th.

Dan says he is willing to match Neff with any of the lightweights around here and is particularly anxious to get on with Johnny O'Leary, Billy Williams or Sammy Good also look good to Dan and he would like to match Chet with either of them.

Neff got the decision over Burns at Prince Rupert before and expects to repeat it but the "Rough House" one has been alleging robbery ever since the last engagement and declares he will clean Neff sure this time, all of which promises excitement for the natives of the Grand Trunk terminus.

NOW HOLLAND IS AFTER GERMANY

The Hague, August 8.—The Dutch army is mobilizing rapidly in preparation for war with Germany.

London, August 8.—Holland, it is reported, has declared war on Germany.

WAR OFFICE DENIES BIG NAVAL FIGHT

London, August 8.—The persistent reports of an important encounter between the British and the German fleets in the North Sea have kept the British public in a state of excitement which was not allayed till the First Lord of the Admiralty made an official statement in Parliament. He said the stories of fighting and losses other than those of the British cruiser Amphion and the German mine-layer Koenigin Luise are unfounded.

AUSTRIAN REGIMENT WIPED OUT BY SERVIANS

Rome, August 8.—An unconfirmed despatch published by the Tribune says an Austrian regiment has been annihilated by the Servians east of Belgrade. The Austrians are in full retreat toward the Danube.

Rome, August 8.—A despatch from Pontebela, Servia, states that the Austrian regiment operating east of Belgrade was almost wiped out by the Servian forces.

The colonel of the invading force fell, mortally wounded. The Austrians, as many as are left of them, are in full retreat towards the Danube.
