### WAR WITH AUSTRIA DECLARED AT MIDNIGHT

(Special to THE NEWS)  
London, August 13.—The For-  
eign Office announces that a  
state of war exists between Aus-  
tria-Hungary and Great Britain  
from midnight.

Official arrangements have  
been made for the Austro-Hun-  
garian ambassador and staff to  
leave the city tomorrow.

London, August 13.—The for-  
eign Office states that the diplo-  
matic relations between France  
and Austria are broken off. The  
French Government requested  
the British Government to com-  
municate with the Austro-Hun-  
garian Ambassador in London.  
The communication is an outline  
of the steps preceding the rup-  
ture with France. In communi-  
cating the declaration to the am-  
bassador, the British Government  
declared that the rupture with  
France having been brought  
about by themselves, the British  
are obliged to announce that a  
state of war exists between Great  
Britain and Hungary.

### BRITISH AND FRENCH CHASING GERMAN CRUISERS

London, August 13.—The Ad-  
miralty has sent out cruisers to  
ply the Atlantic to protect the  
trade routes. The French Gov-  
ernment has sent out warships to  
search for German cruisers that  
are known to be in the Atlantic.  
The enemy's ships will be  
hunted continually although it is  
possible that some time may  
elapse before they are run down,  
but they will be kept too busy to  
do much mischief.

## Lepsiz Boasting in San Francisco Shearwater in Victoria Today

### ALGERINE OFF 'FRISCO LOOKING FOR A FIGHT

(Special to THE NEWS)  
San Francisco, August 13.—  
The British sloop of war Algerine  
was spoken off Cape Mendocino  
at 5 p.m. yesterday by the Ameri-  
can Coaster Beaver which arriv-  
ed here from Portland today. The  
Algerine was cleared for action  
and not a sailor's head showed  
above the rails. The Algerine  
should be off Cape Flattery this  
afternoon.

The Algerine reported that she  
was without wireless and for ten  
days and a half she has been  
dodging up the coast from San  
Diego. Her Captain had no news  
of war. He was glad to hear that  
the Rainbow was safe, but had no  
information as to whereabouts of  
the sloop of war Shearwater.

### ROME REPORTS TWO GERMAN REGIMENTS WERE ANNIHILATED

(Special to THE NEWS)  
Brussels, August 13.—A des-  
patch says the German retire-  
ment reported yesterday is be-  
coming more marked today.

A Rome despatch says a mes-  
sage received there states that  
two German infantry regiments,  
the Eighth Baden and Fourth  
Prince William Baden, were an-  
nihilated during a fight with the  
French at Muelhausen.

An Austrian cavalry brigade is  
said to have been exterminated on  
the Austro-Russian frontier by  
Cossacks.

### KAISER WAS SHOT

(Special to THE NEWS)  
New York, August 13.—A wire-  
less message was picked up here  
last night to the effect that the  
Kaiser had been shot in the right  
thigh at Aix la Chapelle. The  
message said that the wound was  
not serious, but would require the  
Emperor to remain in bed for a  
week or ten days. It gave no  
further details.

### ATLANTIC CLEAR FOR MERCHANT SHIPS

(Special to THE NEWS)  
New York, August 13.—Five  
British warships in the Western  
Atlantic have maintained such an  
effective patrol that the ocean is  
now clear for shipping as far  
south as Trinidad.

### FRENCH WON STUBBORN FIGHT DROVE ENEMY OUT

(Special to THE NEWS)  
Paris, August 13.—Official re-  
ports tell of the driving back of  
the Germans who entered France  
in Meuse, and Meurthe at Mos-  
selle. At Manginnes, north east  
of Verdun, a sharp engagement  
took place in which, after a hot  
fight, the French captured six  
guns. The Germans were nearly  
victorious in the early stages but  
the French reserves were thrown  
forward and saved the day.

### FIGHTING ON FRONTIER ONLY SKIRMISHES AT BEST

(Special to THE NEWS)  
Paris, August 13.—The French  
Ministry of War explains the en-  
gagements on the Franco-Ger-  
man frontier as no more than out-  
post skirmishes at best. There  
is a denial of a report that the  
French lost 20,000 at Altkirch.  
The total effective French troops  
did not reach that number.

### RUSSIANS DEFEAT AUSTRIANS AND UHLANS

(Special to THE NEWS)  
Paris, August 13.—A St. Peters-  
burg despatch says the Aus-  
trians suffered a check at Dneiper  
River. Four regiments of Aus-  
trian infantry and eight regi-  
ments of Uhlans were routed. The  
approaching battle will probably  
be a decisive one.

### ADVANCING INTO THE HEART OF BELGIUM

(Special to THE NEWS)  
Brussels, August 13.—The Ger-  
man army has moved north of  
Liege and is advancing into the  
heart of Belgium. It is difficult  
to determine the objective point,  
as they screen the cavalry. There  
is an extraordinary force along  
the whole frontier of the allied  
forces.

### ATTEMPTED SURPRISE AND LEFT 150 DEAD

(Special to THE NEWS)  
Brussels, August 13.—A regi-  
ment of Dragoons coming in the  
direction of Liege attempted a  
surprise on the Belgians at Ain-  
offe, but were driven off, leaving  
153 dead and 102 prisoners.

### STRICT CENSOR ON PRESS—NO NEWS LEAKING THROUGH

### FRENCH STILL HOLD MUELHAUSEN DISTRICT

(Special to THE NEWS)  
Paris, August 13.—The War  
Department claims the French  
troops have not retired from  
Muelhausen District, but have  
victoriously resisted the entire  
German army corps. The French  
artillery is claimed to be far su-  
perior to that of the Germans.

### GOVERNMENT WILL MAN THE NIOBE

Ottawa, August 14.—The gov-  
ernment is putting the cruiser  
Niobe into commission. The boat  
is needed in the present emer-  
gency for protection as far as  
possible of the Atlantic Coast  
against raids of two small Ger-  
man cruisers which are some-  
where on the Atlantic Coast. One  
of these German boats recently  
conveyed President Huerta from  
Mexico to the West Indian Islands  
where he took passage to Europe.  
Since then the German cruisers  
have been unreported, though  
there is an unconfirmed rumor  
that they were recently seen in  
the vicinity of St. Pierre Mique-  
lon.

### GERMANY MAKES OVERTURES TO BELGIUM

London, August 13.—The Mail  
learns that after the fruitless as-  
sault by the Germans on the  
forts around Liege, the German  
Government again asked to be al-  
lowed to enter France through  
Belgium. The Belgian diplomats  
were approached through Hol-  
land, it being pointed out  
that Germany had no quarrel with  
Belgium and no desire to war with  
her and asked the Belgian Gov-  
ernment to reconsider its refusal  
to allow the German army to  
traverse Belgian soil. The Belgian  
Government refused to assent.

### MINISTER OF FINANCE TO ACCEPT GOLD

land in trust in order to facilitate  
business with Great Britain. It is

### BRITISH FORT FIRED ON JAPANESE

ing shots fired by the British fort  
at Hong Kong, the fort sent a shot  
through her amidships, seriously  
damaging the boat and killing one  
of the crew.

A prayer service for the success of British arms will give a chance to the sceptic to get in his work. He will tell the people how another Christian community in Germany will be praying for the very opposite and suggest a dilemma to the Deity.

But the thought of the world has greatly advanced since the days of the old sceptics and the modern breed are not original but repeat parrot-like the attacks of their predecessors. Modern thinkers are united on the value of subjective prayer. Even the value of auto suggestion is advocated by everybody and seems to be in accord with Christian thinking.

What about objective prayer? Will the sincere desires of one move the Deity or cause results in the minds of others? This of course depends on one's conception of Deity. The modern view is that human and divine personality are similar and that they are like wireless apparatuses that can convey messages when pitched to the same key. Prayer then is a "pitching of the keys" and there is no reason why one personality should not influence

another whether it be human or Divine.

The teaching of the Church is that only "The prayers of a righteous man availeth much." Only "clean hands" can hope to enter the "holy of holies." This, too, confirms modern thinking. It takes sincerity and earnestness to win anything and if human personality discharges a current, like the electric machine these are the forces that generate it.

It would appear therefore that modern thought confirms Christian teaching. When two parties intercede for the same thing it will be a question of the character of the intercessor and the justice of the cause. The broader question may be asked as to why it should be necessary to intercede at all since the Lord of all creation would be expected to do the right in any case. The reply is that this is one of the concomitants of freedom of personality. Freedom brings awful responsibilities and prevents even the Creator Himself in treating the world as a machine. The sceptic will therefore be compelled to hold his peace until he again breaks through the fortified arguments of modern Christianity.

## BURNS-NEFF BOUT WILL BE GOOD CONTEST

Both Men Have Many Admirers Who Expect Their Man to Win

## BIG RAILWAY TUNNEL THROUGH THE CASCADES

Seattle, August 12.—The Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul tunnel through the Cascade Mountains, which is 12,000 feet long and which will reduce the altitude of the crossing 443 feet, has been broken through by a blast and men from east and west clasped hands through the gap. The tunnel will save four miles in distance and will avoid the enormous snowfall of the summit. Trains will be in operation through the hole next January. The tunnel will cost \$2,000,000.

## CITY ALDERMEN MAKE PROTEST ON TROOPS COMING TO RUPERT

(Continued from Page 1)

he sent to Mayor Newton at Vancouver, and the D. O. C., Victoria: "At Special Meeting of Council held informally, was decided that Council consider unnecessary to send troops. If necessary men can be raised locally for protection of the city."

"Ald. McClymont, W. Montgomery J. Dybhavn, Basso-Bert, T. R. Maitland."

This telegram was forwarded yesterday afternoon.

**Council in Formal Session**  
At five o'clock yesterday afternoon when the Council was in formal session to pass on some other business, the question was again brought up.

Ald. Maitland said there was nothing from the Government or Militia Department in the communications and the resolution passed by the City Council the evening before the Mayor left for the south was not to order troops. He was in doubt as to who would have to pay the shot. It would be better to authorize someone to enlist volunteers here.

**Idea is Ridiculous**

Ald. Basso-Bert said the idea is ridiculous and unjust. He would not sanction any such move or the payment of their expense.

**Took Legal Advice**

Acting Mayor Morrissey said he took legal advice and was advised that when a nation is at war the only ones who have control over the militia is the governor-in-council at Ottawa.

Ald. Basso-Bert: "There is nothing at all from the government. It is all from Mayor Newton. I want it very clearly understood that we will not be responsible for any expense."

**Troops Not Anticipated**

Ald. McClymont believed the Mayor was acting on the resolution passed at the informal meeting of the City Council the evening before he left for the south. That motion was merely to draw the Government's attention to the defenceless condition of the city. The Mayor said in one of his telegrams that he is acting on that resolution. It was never for a moment anticipated that 400 troops would be sent up.

Ald. Montgomery to Acting Mayor: Did you get any legal advice on whether the city will be responsible for the expenses.

**City Taking Initiative**

Acting Mayor: Most decidedly; in war time the city will not have to pay.

Ald. Montgomery: You have nothing from the government authorizing you to engage those places. You have engaged them under the word of the mayor. The city is taking the initiative. The city will be held liable for damages. I question your jurisdiction in going so far.

At this point the communication from the Acting Mayor to the Premier Hotel re ordering them to make the hotel ready was read.

"That is what I will not endorse," said Ald. Basso-Bert.

**No Interference**

Ald. Dybhavn said the Council has no desire to interfere with the authorities but they have the right to express their opinion on whether troops should be sent. The information is very lax. The communication says the city will

have to provide shelter. He asked that the motion of the afternoon be put on record.

The motion was read and the Acting Mayor said he believed no attention would be paid to the telegram.

Ald. Montgomery said he thought the whole thing was caused by the Mayor and City Solicitor and that it was unnecessary and useless. If necessary every citizen is prepared to protect the city. A local man should be authorized to enlist men here and organize a corps for our own protection. The Council's motion is not antagonistic to the Government.

The motion was put and carried unanimously by the five aldermen.

"I veto the motion," said the Acting Mayor and the incident closed.

The telegram had been sent previous to the meeting.

## FROM THE EUROPEAN CENTERS

### SERBIAN ARMY NOW BOMBARDING AUSTRIAN TOWNS

(SPECIAL TO THE NEWS)

Nish, August 13.—Serbian artillery are bombarding Gorashada on the Drina and have captured the Bosnian town of Vardishta. The Austrian bombardment of Belgrade continues. Prince George, of Serbia, was hit on the head with a piece of shell while watching the bombardment. He will not die.

### BIG GUNS TO GUARD THE NARROWS AT VANCOUVER

(Special to THE NEWS)

Vancouver, August 13.—The Government boat Quadra arrived in Vancouver yesterday from Esquimalt with two big guns and thirty bluejackets of the Royal Navy. The guns, it is believed, will be mounted on Stanley Park shores overlooking the Narrows. The Quadra will return immediately for a further force of bluejackets.

### OTTAWA'S MUNIFICENT GIFT TO MOTHERLAND

(Special to The Daily News)

Ottawa, August 13.—Ottawa will send the Motherland a machine gun battery of four guns mounted on rapid motor trucks and equipped with steel shields. It will require thirty men to operate it and will cost \$100,000.

### PONTOON BRIDGE ACROSS MEUSE FOR SEIGE ARTILLERY

(Special to THE NEWS)

Amsterdam, August 13.—The second attempt of the German army to build a pontoon bridge at Heersal over the Meuse was successful, according to a despatch from Maastricht today. The bridge is intended for passage of siege artillery, several of which are being sent to Liege and others to Namur.

### GERMANS DARE NOT LEAVE LIEGE CITY

London, August 13.—The English officers at Namur report that all the twelve forts at Liege are still in the hands of the Belgian and the French forces. While the Germans have the town itself they are unable to set foot outside the same without drawing the fire of the gunners of the forts.

London, August 13.—It is announced that the British Atlantic commerce may soon be resumed. The warship patrols are effective in clearing the route of all dangerous craft.

### KAISER TALKS LIKE WM. SHAKESPEARE

Enemy Jumped on Him When He Was in State of Perfect Peace

Berlin, August 11.—A proclamation by Emperor William addressed to the German nation was published in the Official Gazette on the 7th. The text was as follows: "Since the formation of the German Empire it has been for 43 years the object of the efforts of myself and my ancestors to preserve the peace of the world and advance by peaceful means our vigorous development."

"Our adversaries, however, are jealous of the success of our work and there has been latent hostility to the east and to the west and beyond the sea."

"This has been borne by us till now, as we are aware of our responsibility and our power."

"Now, however, these adversaries wish to humiliate us, asking that we should look on with folded arms and watch our enemies preparing themselves for the coming attack."

"They will not suffer that we maintain our resolute fidelity to our ally, who is fighting for her position as a great power and with whose humiliation our power and honor would be equally lost."

"So the world must decide."

"In the midst of perfect peace the enemy surprises us. Therefore, to arms."

"Any dallying and temporizing would be to betray the Fatherland."

"To be or not to be is the question for the empire which our fathers founded. To be or not to be is the question for German power and German existence."

"We shall resist to the last"

### In the Letter Box

PRICES NOT RAISED

August 12th, 14.

To the Editor:

Sir.—At a meeting of the Prince Rupert Retail Merchants' Association held this evening, the Grievance Committee was authorized to send to the press a denial of the statement made in the editorial columns of The Empire of to-day's date, accusing the retailers of raising the price of food. The statement contained a very large amount of falsehood which The Empire had no justification in using. The statement that the retailers are inclined to raise prices on all food products has no foundation in fact. The price of flour, sugar and some cereals have advanced for the reason that the wholesalers have raised the price to the trade. Despite any statement to the contrary that may be made by The Empire, the retailers have been paying sixty cents per barrel more for flour this week than they were selling same for two weeks ago. With sugar and cereals the same conditions obtain—the advance in price to the wholesaler has forced a raise to the consumer. It might be as well to obtain some knowledge of the subject before making an attack on any body of businessmen. Trusting that the press will give this communication prominence, and assuring the public that the retail trade as a body is not responsible for any advance in prices that have occurred since war was announced, we remain,

### TO PLOUGH THROUGH ICE TO MEN'S RESCUE

Nome, Alaska, August 12.—The Russian government's ice-breaking boat Taimyr left Nome for Wrangel Island to take off the 21 men and one woman who took refuge there after the wrecking of the steamer Karluk in the ice north of Herald Island last January.

The United States revenue cutter Bear sailed for Wrangel Island via Point Barrow July 21. After she sailed news was received that the ice about Wrangel Island was unusually firm and the Russian government decided to send the powerful Taimyr, which can cut a way where the wooden Bear would be helpless.

The Taimyr did not know of the outbreak of the war until her arrival here.

The Stratford Assessment Commissioner has put the population of the town at 17,028, an increase of 603 since last fall.

### PRESIDENT ASKS AMERICANS TO KEEP COOL NOW

Washington, August 12.—The White House authorized this quotation from the President's remarks to the Washington correspondents on the war situation:—  
"It is extremely necessary; it is manifestly necessary in the present state of affairs on the other side of the water, that you should be extremely careful not to add in any way to the excitement. Of course the European world is in a highly excited state of mind, but the excitement ought not to spread to the United States. So far as we are concerned there is no cause for excitement. There is great inconvenience, for the time being, in the money market, and in our exchanges and, temporarily, in the handling of our crops, but America is absolutely prepared to meet the financial situation and to straighten everything out without any material difficulty. The only thing that can possibly prevent it is unreasonable apprehension and excitement."

"I want to have the pride of feeling that America, if nobody else, has her self-possession and stands ready, with calmness of thought and steadiness of purpose to help the rest of the world."

"And we can do it and reap a great permanent glory out of doing it, provided we all co-operate to see that nobody loses his head. I know, from my conferences with the secretary of the treasury, who is in very close touch with the financial situation throughout the United States that there is no cause for alarm. The bankers and business men of the country are co-operating with the government with a zeal, intelligence and spirit which make the outcome secure."
