London, August 14.—A despatch to the Central News says Russia has mobilized two million men in the German and Austrian frontiers, and a half million on the Turkish and Roumanian boundary, and has three million in reserve.

BELGIANS WON KEEN BATTLE NEAR EGHEZEE

(Special to THE NEWS)

Vancouver, August 14.—A London despatch from Brussels to the Reuters Agency says the battle near Eghezee, north of Namur, which took place yesterday at Noville Taviere on Tierlemont-Namur Railway line, was keenly contested. The Germans were mostly cavalry men. They were surprised by Belgians and sustained severe casualties. The Germans eventually fell back on Huy.

Three German airships flying over Diest, were brought down by Belgian artillery yesterday.

TWO CRUISERS COMING NORTH AFTER RAINBOW

San Francisco, August 14.—The German cruisers Leipzig and Nuremberg are both steaming north at the rate of twenty miles an hour. The Leipzig was sighted yesterday morning by the liner "Queen" a hundred and thirty miles north of the Golden Gate. The Nuremberg late yesterday afternoon was seen north of Point Reyes.

FIRST AUSTRIAN PRIZE HAS BEEN TOWED INTO PORT

London, August 14.—The Austrian steamship Izrada has been captured off Lands End by a British gun-boat and brought in. So far as is known this is the first Austrian prize captured by Britain since the declaration of war on the Dual Monarchy.

GOVERNMENT IS PREPARING MANY IMPORTANT BILLS

Ottawa, August 14.—The control of food prices will be asked of Parliament by the Government as soon as the session opens.

Hon. Crothers is having a bill drafted along the lines of the British act. He held there is no justification in present conditions for some advances which have been made in prices for food and other necessities.

Preparatory to the opening of Parliament, the Cabinet is sitting morning, afternoon and evening. While the legislation to be submitted to the House embraces only two or three bills, they are expected to cover a wide range of subjects.

Athens, August 14.—The German cruisers Goeben and Breslau entered the Dardanelles yesterday. It is supposed they will remain in the strait until the close of the war. If they remain over 24 hours they must remain indefinitely. If they elect to stay the Mediterranean will be practically safe to British shipping.

DAILY NEWS WAR SERVICE

Yesterday The Daily News received nearly 3,000 words in skeleton press despatches over the telegraph wires. It was practically all news of the war and constituted the biggest press service ever brought into the city in one day. The News published three editions of the paper and a bulletin sheet. By the effort of The News, Prince Rupert is receiving just as much reliable war news as the big cities in the south.

HEAVY LOSSES-- GERMAN GUNS SWEEP TRENCHES

(Special to THE NEWS)
Brussels, August 14.—According to Le Soir, the German casualties in the fight near Maelen totalled about 2,000, equally divided between killed and wounded. The Belgian casualties are not precisely known.

When a patrol of soldiers first signalled the approach of the German troops on Maelen, the Belgians manned the trenches and a hot fire greeted the German soldiers. German guns were brought to bear and swept the trenches with a deadly hail, the Belgians being obliged to fall back. Reinforcements were quickly brought up and the Germans were repulsed, suffering severely.

OFFICIAL NEWS GIVES FRANCE BEST BIG FIGHT

(Special to THE NEWS)

Paris, August 14.—An official report of the fighting between the French and Germans in the vicinity of Pont a Mousson has been issued. In the first phase of the attack two French battalions engaged German forces of greatly superior number. The two French battalions fell back but on being reinforced during the night assumed the offensive. They were well supported by the artillery. This counter attack caused the Germans to retire precipitately, leaving behind a large number of killed, wounded and prisoners.

The Germans abandoned a battery of artillery, three machine guns, and several wagon loads of ammunition.

The French troops followed up their advantage. The French battery surprised the twenty-first Baden Dragoons while the men were dismounted, and a few minutes later the regiment was destroyed.

NEWFOUNDLAND, TOO, IS SENDING TROOPS

(Special to THE NEWS)

St. John's, Nfld. August 14.—An immense public meeting was held here to endorse the suggestion of the Imperial Government that troops be sent to the war. The colony will enlist and equip 500 men to help the Mother Country. They will also increase the naval reserve from 600 to 1,000 men.

BULLETINS FROM RUSSIA

St. Petersburg, August 14.—Seventy-three German and twelve Austrian steamships were seized by Russia.

All pieces of German artillery seized have been successfully destroyed forever from accurate fire.

Liege forts are still intact.

A rumor from Brussels says that General Von Emmich, commander of the German army corps before Liege is dead.

GERMAN TROOPS OVER BORDER ARE STARVING

(Special to THE NEWS)

Brussels, August 14.—The German troops in Belgium and Luxemburg are said to be starving, and many of them are reported to have dropped unconscious owing to their privations. In the pockets of some of the officers raw potatoes were found, while soldiers are said to have dug up unripe turnips and beets to eat.

A party of French dragoons, while reconnoitering, came on a strong attachment of Uhlands whom they attacked and cut to pieces, killing fifty of them.

A party of six hundred German prisoners arrived today at Ath, province of Hainaut.

WOUNDED BRITISH SOLDIERS RETURN FROM BELGIUM

(Special to THE NEWS)

London, August 14.—A number of wounded British troops have arrived at Southampton from Belgium. The report did not say to which army they belonged.

More than one hundred German prisoners of war were taken from trawlers in the North Sea and landed today at Port George, Scotland, by British cruisers.

PRINCE'S RELIEF FUND NOW OVER FOUR MILLIONS

(Special to THE NEWS)

London, August 14.—The Prince of Wales relief fund for sufferers from the war totalled today nearly four and a half million dollars.

CANADIAN GOVERNMENT WILL REGULATE PRICES

Ottawa, August 14.—The Government will pass a special bill to regulate all food prices throughout the Dominion during the war. This will be done at the meeting of Parliament next week.

The criminal code will be amended also, giving the Government power to deal with all alien suspects.

ADMIRALTY SAYS TRADE ON NORTH SEA IS SAFE

London, August 14.—The North Sea is silent as far as any news of a naval engagement is concerned, but British supremacy has been demonstrated by the assurance that the Admiralty is able to give. British trade, it announces, is now safe on the high seas, within a week from the beginning of war against the second greatest sea power in the world.

Merchant shipping is resuming on the North Sea between British ports and Denmark and Scandinavia.

SMALLEST BRITISH CRUISER CHASES BIGGEST GERMAN SHIP

RUNNING FIGHT IN MID-OCEAN WHILE IN HEAVY SEAS
---RANGE TOO LONG FOR EFFECTIVE GUNNERY

(Special to THE NEWS)

Halifax, August 14.—For half an hour Thursday night H. M. S. Bristol, the smallest British warship in the North Atlantic, fought a long range duel with the Karlsruhe, the largest and fastest of the German cruisers which was trying to intercept British shipping in the North Atlantic. The Bristol intercepted the Karlsruhe when she was coaling at sea from the North German Lloyd steamer, Kron Prinz Wilhelm. The German cruiser intercepted by the Bristol and a half hour long-range running fight took place in the blackness of the semi-tropical night. The ships were racing through a heavy swell at a terrific clip. They exchanged broadsides without inflicting much

damage, the conditions being very unfavourable for accurate gunnery.

Although the Bristol's consort was fully one hundred miles astern, the German ship would not stand and fight. She altered her course gradually and drew away from the Bristol going at a superior speed.

In half an hour she was out of range of the British ship's six inch bowchaser. All through the night the chase lasted, but somewhere in the darkness the German doubled and made off to San Juan where she put in for coal several days ago.

Details were brought to Halifax by the Suffolk agship, with Craddock commanding the fourth cruiser squadron.

RIGHT-OF-WAY WORK ON PEACE RIVER LINE

War Developments Have Not Yet Had Any Effect on Proposed Extension

Vancouver, August 14.—Preliminary work on the proposed Peace River section of the Pacific Great Eastern Railway beyond Fort George has been started, announced Mr. J. W. Stewart, president of the P. G. E. He said that clearing of the right-of-way for the first fifteen miles is now proceeding but intimated that he was not prepared to make an announcement at the present time as to when it was likely that contracts for grading the new line would be let.

It is understood that arrangements for pressing actual construction operations on the route are being made and that work will be commenced at an early date.

Enquiry at the office of P. G. Welch, contractor for the P. G. E., elicited the information that the war developments have not as yet had any effect on the labor situation as far as the construction is concerned. It was suggested in view of the fact that a large number of Russians and other Slavonians are employed on railway construction along the route of the P. G. E. that the call to arms may have had the effect of depleting the force.

MILITARY INCENDIARY AT WORK IN ONTARIO

London, Ont., August 14.—An attempt was made last night to burn the store and building of the Canadian Ordnance Corps, near Wolsley barracks, and Private Allen who discovered the incendiary was shot through the left hand.

JAPANESE COMPANIES EXPECT TO BENEFIT

Increase in Travel Is Looked For by Nippon Lines—Will Benefit at Other's Expense

Victoria, August 14.—All Japanese lines expect to reap a rich harvest at the expense of the other transportation companies whose services have become more or less demoralized since the declaration of war by England against Germany.

Now that the services of other lines on the Pacific have been partially disrupted by the charter of vessels for naval service, representatives of the Japanese lines are looking for a big increase in passenger and also freight business.

In the passenger business the Japanese lines have practically a free hand, as the C. P. R. service has been completely upset by the charter of the Empress of Asia, Empress of Russia and Empress of Japan for Government service on the other side of the Pacific.

Much of the trans-Pacific passenger travel that was formerly handled by the Nippon Yusen Kaisha and the Osaka Shosen Kaisha was diverted to C. P. R. channels following the advent of the newer Empresses.

With the larger Empresses temporarily out of commission it is expected that this business, both European and Oriental, for a time at any rate, will revert back to the Japanese lines. Passenger travel by the Japanese lines has fallen off woefully of late. From now on the agents of the Japanese companies expect the bookings to materially increase.

There are evidences that the excitement of the last week is somewhat subsiding and that business will soon resume its usual trend. A few people about town have been getting very pessimistic about the immediate future but their fears are largely groundless. There is too much money tied up in Prince Rupert and vicinity to have it lay dead for any length of time. Let everybody cheer up, for optimism is half the battle anyway. While it is quite proper to exercise economy, all legitimate business has no need to fear the least about the future.

Everybody has become so much enrapt up in the war that it is difficult to realize that only about ten days have elapsed since the first signs of real war began to appear upon the horizon. In the meantime nobody thinks about Mexico or the hundred and one issues that were predominant before. It is against human nature to keep up this tensify for long.

A few big battles will take away most of the interest for the average man and then the fighting will be a test of resources more than tragic battlefields.

While Japan is reported to have decided to side in with the British there is nothing official to confirm this. By staying neutral Japan has much to win from a commercial as well as military point of view. With her commerce greatly increased and her armed forces and finances intact, she would at once rise to great prominence in world affairs. There is another side of it, however, which she may see. Japan is spoken of as a Yellow Race with insinuation that the stripe is moral as well as physical. Should Japan jump in now and go through this war side by side with the British they would come out a white race, particularly as far as the "Yellow Peril" is concerned. Japan has the chance of a life time. Will she act?

LADIES REPORT COLLECTIONS FOR CANADA HOSPITAL SHIP

ENERGETIC WORK BY LADIES REALIZED OVER DOUBLE THE AMOUNT ASKED FOR—STATEMENT OF RECEIPTS

A most generous response was made by the people of Prince Rupert and vicinity, to the appeal of the women of Prince Rupert for funds to assist in the equipment of the Hospital Ship being furnished by the women of Canada to be used in the present war. The statement set out below will show the different amounts received.

It was decided by the City Council that \$500 was a fair amount to be expected from Prince Rupert and district, as only \$10,000 had been asked from the Province of British Columbia, and as the amount collected was far in excess of \$500, it was thought best to open an emergency fund in the Bank of Montreal of the balance collected.

A telegram was sent yesterday to the Provincial President of the Imperial Order of the Daughters of the Empire advising that the sum of \$500 had been placed to their credit in the Bank of Montreal, Victoria, being the share of Prince Rupert and Skeena River Canneries.

GERMAN ARTILLERY ARE BOMBARDING FRENCH TOWNS

Paris, August 13.—Several French towns in the department of Moselle, on the German frontier, were shelled by German artillery. The German shells pushed their heavy artillery over the border and the French guns are being rushed to the front.

The French Government is today pouring more reinforcements into the frontiers of the Vosges, and the French army is being pushed to join the French army in Alsace.

Paris, August 13.—An official report of the fighting between French and Germans near the town of Mousson, north of Verdun, was issued today. It says the battle lasted for two days, Tuesday and Wednesday.

The Germans attacked two French battalions and forced them to fall back. On being ordered to fall back, the French made a counter attack and the Germans were routed, leaving many killed and prisoners, also captured artillery and ammunition.

The French followed up and captured the twenty-first Baden regiment destroying it with a battery.

PERT AUSTRIANS LOYAL TO BRITAIN

From Local Man Concerning His Fellow Countrymen

The following letter from an Austrian immigrant resident in Canada explains the popular position of all Austrians in this province.

The Editor of the Daily News, Prince Rupert, B. C.

Sir.—Owing to the hostilities that have arisen throughout Europe in which my country is involved, I would ask for space in your valuable columns in order to declare the position taken by our countrymen of whom I know are living in Canada.

While we are known as Austrians, we are a part of the great British nation, and left Austrians following to the political conditions there existing, particularly in regard to the privileges given to the individuals of the Habsburg Dynasty. The ordinary rank and file of Austria have no voice in the affairs of the country, but are treated more like slaves.

There are about 10,000 of our countrymen in British Columbia, many of whom are naturalized British subjects and the balance are willing to become so, and we feel that it is our duty to see the Dominion of Canada remain loyal to the Empire to which we have always intended to remain in time of trouble.

In this critical moment in the world's history, we are ready at any time should the authorities deem it advisable, to call upon us to take up arms and defend Canada against all her enemies, not only Austria, and sincerely trust that our people will be looked upon by Canada as a strong unit of defence.

Our motto is "Fight for Liberty and as soon as the Austrian Government is abolished the mis-lingering in our Mother Country will also cease.

We also contradict the Austrian Consul's (at Winnipeg) statement that 150,000 of our people in Canada are willing to fight Austria. We know our people's hearts and boldly assert that not one per cent of the Ukrainians would assist the coun-try of misery and slavery which is left. Trusting I have not used up too much of your valuable space, I am yours truly,

GREAT BATTLE NOW WAGING ALONG 180 MILES OF FRONTIER

FOUR THOUSAND BIG GUNS AND TWO MILLION MEN ENGAGED IN THE FIGHT — RIGHT FLANK OF GERMAN ARMY TURNED

London, August 13.—A news despatch from Paris states that a great battle on the Belgium frontier was begun Tuesday. Over 4,000 guns were in action and their boom was heard along the front 180 miles long.

Although the battle is the greatest the world has yet known the Belgium Continental censor is careful today to render impossible any clear view of the disposition of the two million men already engaged or moving rapidly to the conflict.

The most important known phase of the fighting is still the engagement on the right flank of the first German army, where the Belgians and allies are reported to have got in the rear of the Germans, turning their right flank.

Belgians Retaliate
Brussels, August 13.—The Belgian cavalry took the offensive today against the German cavalry division defeated in yesterday's battle of Halen. The Germans lost two thousand there.

BELGIAN LANCERS BORE BRUNT OF THE FIRST BIG BATTLE

GERMANS BROUGHT HEAVY ARTILLERY INTO PLAY — ALLIED FORCES HAVE CHECKED THE ADVANCE

(Special to THE NEWS)

Brussels, August 13.—The war office admitted today that the Belgian cavalry suffered a heavy loss in the fighting at Tielmont on Wednesday, but declared that the allied Franco-Belgian infantry had checked the advance of the German forces.

It is reported that heavy fighting is coming on today.

The Germans brought their artillery into play with deadly effect on the advancing forces of the Allies. The Belgian lancers,

the finest of the army, bore the brunt of the opening engagement at Tielmont. They fought with great valor, charging the Germans in the face of a heavy fire from machine guns.

The Government has restored communication with Liege by a roundabout route and states that not only were the besieged forts still holding out but Belgian troops to the west of the city have resumed the offensive. After a sharp struggle they drove the Germans back recapturing all the ground lost.

GERMANS CLAIM TOOK THOUSAND FRENCH PRISONERS

Berlin, August 13.—A wireless message from Nauen to Tuckerton, N. J., claims that the Germans took one hundred and twenty French officers and over eleven hundred soldiers prisoners in the fighting near Muehlhausen. They also took one thousand French prisoners at the fight near Longwy.

FIRST CONTINGENT TO COST CANADA 22 MILLIONS

(Special to THE NEWS)
Ottawa, August 13.—Canada will expend twenty-two million dollars on its first contingent of 22,500 men in aid of the Motherland. This is the estimate of the Department of Militia and includes everything. Each man will cost \$1,000 per year.

The wages and salaries of privates, officers, engineers, etc., will reach \$30,000 a day. Then the pay of the troops alone for a single year will reach \$10,450,000.

SERVIANS PRESS INTO AUSTRIA AND CAPTURE GUNS

Nish, August 13.—The Serbian war office announces today that the Serbian troops are steadily pressing their way into Austria and have occupied nine Bosnian towns. They report the defeat of the Austrian soldiers at Vihar, stating that the enemy abandoned their field equipment in their flight toward Eschamitche.

GERMANY'S SLOW CAMPAIGN SURPRISES MILITARY EXPERTS

Washington, August 14.—Some surprise is expressed by the U. S. military strategists at the comparatively slow beginning of the German campaign. The American war college, patterned largely upon the Great Britain war machine, known as the general staff, had understood that so perfectly had every detail of an offensive campaign against both France and Russia been worked out by the German Kriegspiel Placers that the first blows would fall like lightning strokes out of a clear sky, and that within 24 hours after the declaration of war or indeed after order of mobilization, the first German battalions would be many miles advanced across both eastern and western boundaries into the enemies' country. It was believed that the only manner in which the execution of these carefully laid plans could be deferred would be by the interposition to the advance of living walls of French and Russian legions; yet there has been no report of battles on any large scale.

After looking over all available data of operations to date, the strategists were unanimously of the opinion that the plans of campaign had not so far unfolded as to admit of a guess as to the real purposes of the great military leaders.

Nobles Coming Tomorrow

The Mystic Shriners are busy today arranging for the reception of the nobles who are expected here tomorrow, after having visited Dawson. Ceremonies will be held here afternoon and evening and quite a large class will cross the hot sands. Arrangements are also being made to have a banquet at the Central Hotel. The ceremonies will be held in St. Andrew's Hall.
