GERMANS MADE NINETY MILLION WAR LEVY ON BRABANT--OVERSEAS ARMY IS OVER 100,000

ALL SHIP FISH BY RAIL SAYS RORVIK FISH COMPANY

REPRESENTATIVE SENT TO PRAIRIE TOWNS RETURNS AND
GIVES GLOWING REPORT -- BIG DEMAND IS
NOW ASSURED

hundreds of thousands of fish will be shipped from Prince Rupert to the prairie towns between here and Winnipeg as soon as the Grand Trunk Railway inaugurates a regular express freight service, according to B. B. Hangan, of the Rorvik Fish Company, who yesterday returned from an extensive business trip along the Grand Trunk line to the Manitoba capital.

There is no limit to the possibilities of Prince Rupert as a distributing centre," said Mr. Hangan. "On the one side you have an unlimited supply, and on the other hand you have a practically limitless demand. I have every point of any access along the Grand Trunk and it is not a town which will not receive from one thousand to three thousand pounds per week. And the centres of population, as Edmonton, Saskatoon, Regina, Winnipeg, will use proportionally as much more."

The Rorvik Fish Company has a strong organization in the prairie provinces and agencies in several intermediate towns. It can supply the fish at lower prices than those at present prevailing, and supply it fresh from the local company can be laid on the table, f.i. Montreal, in fifty hours, the article at present serving the fish eaters in the Atlantic capital is from ten days to weeks old.

The company will do business entirely different lines than the other operating companies," John Dybhavn, secretary-manager of the Rorvik Fish Co., said. "The export of fish from this town is limited to halibut and salmon. We intend to establish a fish and shell market at the lowest possible prices. We intend to utilize the different products. In short, I think the methods we propose to use will revolutionize the fish industry of the northern Pacific coast. We feel certain to be able to ship the year around. GREAT OVERSEAS ARMY NUMBERS OVER 100,000 MEN

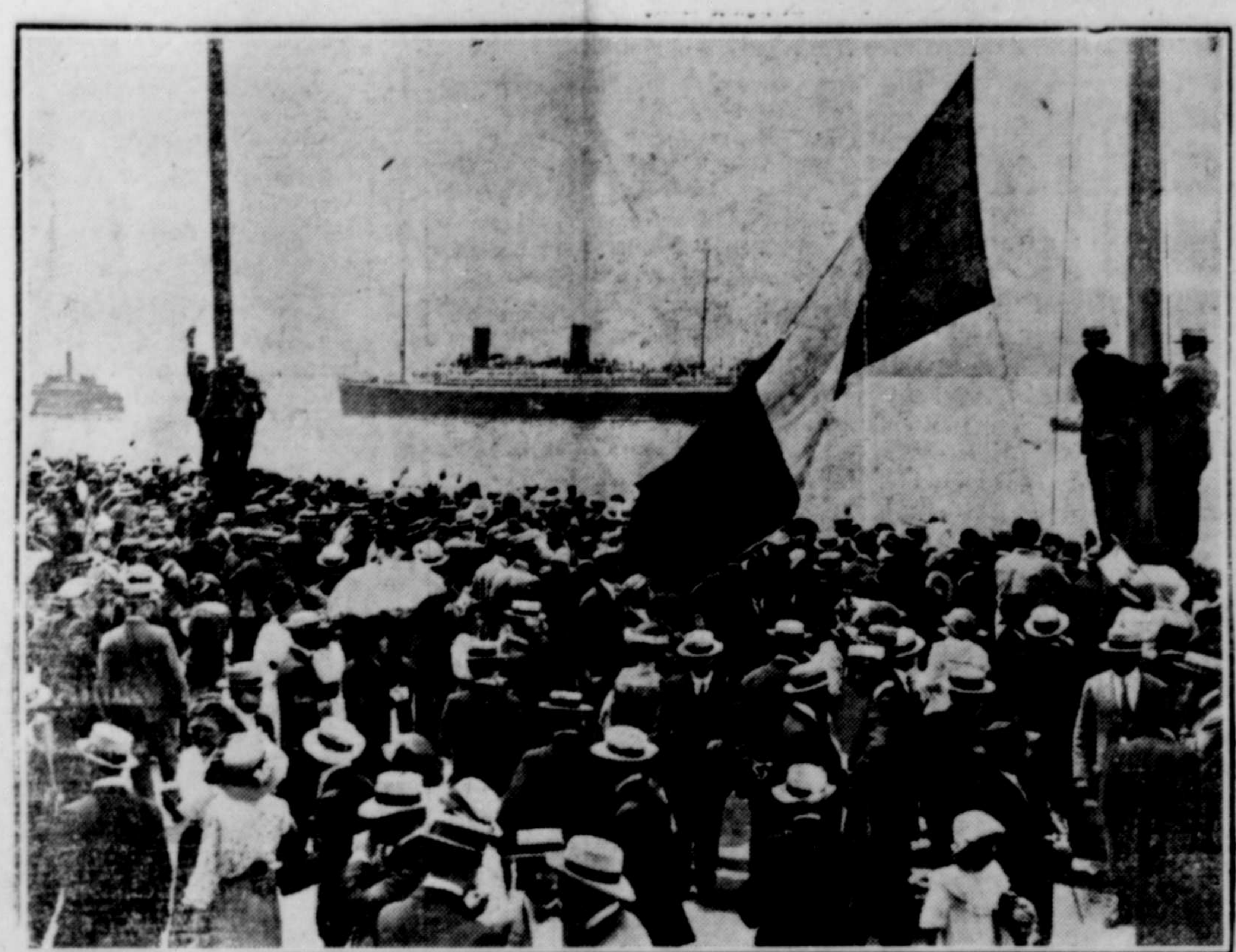

ADMIRAL SAMPSON SUNK

Seattle, August 26.—The Pacific Alaska Navigation Co. steamer Admiral Sampson, was sunk this morning at Point-No-Point, 20 miles from Seattle by the C. P. R. boat Princess Victoria. The latter is proceeding to Seattle with most of the passengers and crew of the Admiral Sampson. The Admiral Sampson was bound from Seattle to Alaska and had 56 passengers and a crew of 65. The loss of life is not yet known.

AUSTRIANS CLAIM VICTORY IN A THREE DAYS' FIGHT

Berlin, August 26.—By wireless to Sayville, N.Y.: Vienna reports are to the effect that after the three days' battle at Krasnik in Russian Poland, the Austrians repulsed the Russian forces and put them to flight along a seventy mile battle line. They are pursuing them towards Lublin. Krasnik is just over the border of Austria so that in accepting this as true the Austrians have not penetrated the Russian boundary very far.

CANADA WILL SEND SECOND CONTINGENT

Ottawa, August 26.—Yesterday it was decided that Canada should send a second expeditionary force to Europe. The first contingent is to sail within three weeks, and will probably be sent right to the front. The volunteers are now gathering at Valcartier.

ALLIES OPEN HOSTILITIES ON TSING TAU

(Special to THE NEWS)
Peking, August 26.—The main Japanese army is now landing near Tsing Tau, while the Japanese and British fleets are co-operating outside the port. British torpedo boats and gunboats mobilized before Tsing Tau yesterday for the purpose of unmasking the German batteries. After a few hours of firing the British retired in the direction of Wei Hai Wei. They suffered a loss of eleven killed and some boats slightly damaged. Three thousand Russian troops have left Vladivostok. Tsing Tau Germans have destroyed the bridges and railroads on the boundaries of their leased territory, also several native villages which were levelled by fire from the forts.

RUSSIAN ARMY NOW OVERRUNNING EAST PRUSSIA

London, August 26.—The Russian Embassy has received news from the general of the staff at St. Petersburg announcing fresh victories against both the German and Austrian forces. The messages declare that the Russian troops now occupy the whole of the eastern and southern half of eastern Prussia.

RUSSIANS HAVE ENEMY CORNERED EASTERN PRUSSIA

London, August 26.—A despatch from St. Petersburg says the principal Russian losses in Prussia have been the result of a determination of the rank and file of the Russian army to get at the enemy. Although the mounted guards in the center have suffered heavily, the infantry advances have been satisfactory. The enemy is virtually cornered now in Eastern Prussia.

BELGIANS DROVE ENEMY OUT OF MALINES

(Special to THE NEWS)
London, August 26.—An Antwerp despatch, says, that early this morning a force of 2,000 Germans, bombarded Malines. Two hundred houses were partly destroyed, and a church tower damaged. The Belgians made the enemy a counter attack, driving the Germans back as far as Vilverde on the south. The losses on both sides were considerable.

ALLIED ARMIES TAKE OFFENSIVE IN LORRAINE

(Special to THE NEWS)
London, August 26.—The French War Office has issued a statement that in Lorraine the allied armies have taken up an offensive movement and the battle recommenced yesterday and is still raging.

War Situation To-day

Some details of the big battle in southwestern Belgium are now coming through and while the British losses come with a terrible reality of the awfulness of the slaughter, they are not as heavy as it was at first feared. Field Marshall French gives an estimate of 2,000, and the British have never minimized their losses so that the figure can be taken with some assurance of accuracy. This represents probably only two per cent of the British troops engaged. The French losses were probably equal or even more and undoubtedly the Germans did not escape without a tremendous casualty list.

The capturing of 10,000 French prisoners reported from German sources through Washington, must not be accepted as fact until some official announcement comes from Paris. There is nothing yet to indicate the truth of it.

The commanders in charge of the campaign do not consider Sunday's battle a decisive one, and judging from the fact that the French are withdrawing troops from the Alsace campaign to put into the battlefield along the Meuse the Germans have a terrible struggle ahead of them.

Russia appears to be getting busy on the north and claims to have the enemy cornered in East Prussia.

Austria has declared war on Japan. She appears to be wielding her pen better than her sword.

In the Mediterranean and on the Yellow Sea the Allies are clearing out the common foe.

The Overseas contingent in support of Great Britain will make up an army of considerably over 100,000 men, a great fighting force in itself. The first of them will be at the front in a few weeks.

BRITISH LOST ESTIMATED 2,000 IN BATTLE AT CHARLEROI

OFFICIAL ANNOUNCEMENT BY THE BRITISH PREMIER --LORD KITCHENER SAYS BRITAINS FOUGHT WITH GREAT GALLANTRY

(Special to THE NEWS)
London, August 26.—Premier Asquith made a statement in the House of Commons yesterday afternoon concerning the big battle from Namur to Mons on Sunday and Monday. He said Field Marshall Sir John French estimates the British forces lost 2,000 men in the battle in southern Belgium. Later in the day Lord Kitchener made his first speech in the House of Lords. He said the British troops were in the fight thirty-six hours, and behaved with great gallantry.

THE GERMAN VERSION

Washington, August 26.—The German Embassy here states that a wireless message received here from Germany gives a great victory to the Germans. It claims the Germans captured 10,000 French prisoners and 150 field guns. The army of the Allies under General Joffres is said to be broken up.

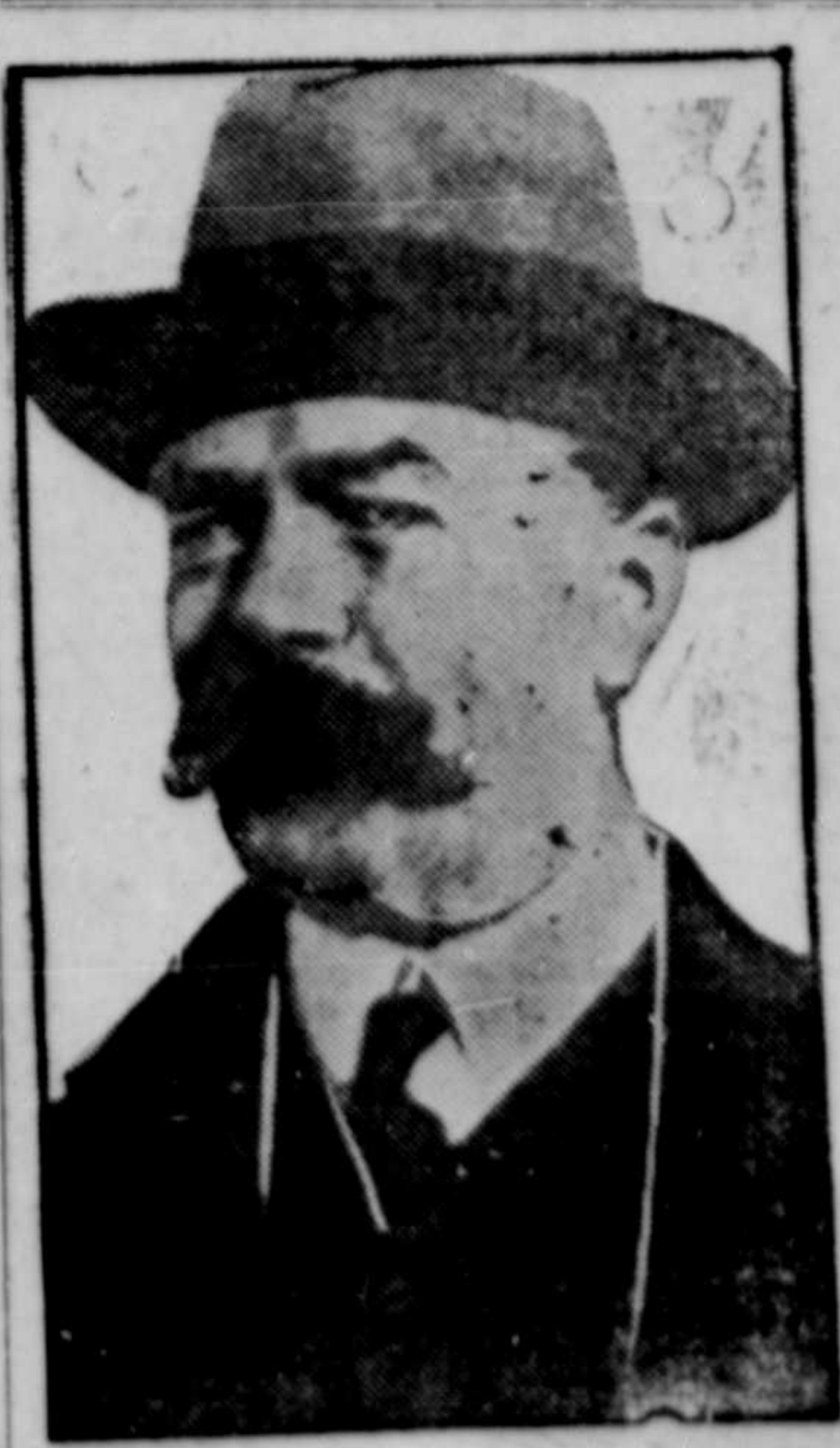
SWISS MINISTER PLEADS FOR LOAN

Washington, August 26.—Dr. Paul Ritter, the Swiss Minister, again made representations today to the State Department in behalf of his Government for a loan of gold from the United States.

Switzerland, in a state of siege, with practically all her male population under arms, is facing a serious situation in regard to feeding her army.

The imputation that his country might involve the United States in a violation of neutrality by using the proposed loan for war purposes was ridiculed by Ritter. He said that aside from the question of national honor, Switzerland's domestic financial stringency was such that she must have fluid currency to restore normal conditions at home.

Assurances are given from all over Canada that trade conditions have a very prosperous outlook. With the "Made in Germany" articles off the market there should be a boom in Canadian manufacturing. The assistance given by the Government to the banks too has made it possible to carry on the country's financing without any crowding. Canada no doubt will learn a lesson from the Mother Country which has always come out of an international war stronger and more prosperous than she went into it. This is because she has always controlled the seas and its trade routes while at home the people gave themselves over entirely to production. Canada will no doubt take advantage of her opportunity and in the trade of the world she should be able to get a goodly portion of "the Lion's share."

It has not even been rumored that anybody in Prince Rupert or, indeed, in all Canada had resorted to the unpatriotic custom of hoarding money. This is primarily because the Canadian banks have a reputation for stability and because at this particular time they are specially backed by the government. While money is in the bank it not only bears interest to the depositor but it becomes part of the life blood of the nation.

Valuable advice has recently been given out by the Board of Trade of Vancouver in which they urged everybody to go ahead with their business as usual and to deal as much as possible with home manufacturers. Following this up it

would be good policy for everyone to pay their bills as soon as they can so that money will loosen up and general confidence be restored.

The Vancouver Board of Trade has also decided to urge the Governments to proceed with whatever work was under way. This action should also be taken in Prince Rupert. The money for the postoffice, the drill hall and the detention building has been voted and this work should be proceeded with at once. Were this work in full swing this city would have little to fear from outside disturbances. Those in authority should get busy and take this matter up with the department. There is no need for Rupert to sit down while the rest of the country is getting busy. A prompt action ought to bring results.

The death of Francis Joseph of Austria is announced. It is only through the peaceful attitude of the late Emperor that the dual kingdom did not throw the world into chaos years ago. Francis Joseph has proved himself a good ruler and his personal popularity was great among his people. The recent declaration of war against Serbia was no doubt carried over his head and perhaps was the cause of his sudden demise. It was the popularity of the Emperor, too, that has knit the warring factions of his empire so long together. Now that he is gone it will be strange if there is not internal strife. Indeed a portion of the Empire may join their foes on the promise of future liberty. The developments of the next few weeks in this connection will be watched with interest.

CANADA WANTS BRITISH PICTURES

Lack of British Films in Canadian Movie Shows is Cause of Much Complaint

Several correspondents, writing from Canada to The Daily Mail, complain of the lack of patriotic energy on the part of the British film producers, which allows the Dominion to be flooded with moving pictures of American subjects.

One correspondent expresses the hope that the British army film which shows completely the life of Tommy Atkins will also be exhibited in the Dominion. He concluded his letter by declaring that this would certainly cause a more martial spirit in Canada as well as a strong imperial link.

Your correspondent is informed that the army film will shortly be sent on a tour across Canada, and will also visit Australia. This tour will be under the auspices of the British war office, but the cost is being guaranteed privately.

Regarding the flood of American films in Canada crowding the market from British films, several London purchasers explained that they originally sold the entire rights to New York exchanges, and that these rights included Canada, but now the Dominion has become such a large field that none of these contracts are being renewed without a revision which alone the right to exhibit in Canada.

Several London producing companies have lately been preparing special films for the Dominion. One of these was on the Plains of Abraham and around Quebec. It is described as an accurate account of the British conquest of Canada.

Several others which have been taken in the Rocky Mountains with the English company of actors, will be released shortly.

"Even apart from patriotic motives, we look upon Canada as a lucrative field, and another year should see a score of English producers with Canadian agencies," declared one of the leading British directors whose name is a big one in the moving picture world.

INDIAN RAILWAY ORDERS TIES FROM B.C.

Big Order Is Received for Creosoted Railway Sleepers from South

Victoria, Aug. 26.—The Dominion Creosoting Company, Ltd., of this city, have received an order for 150,000 creosoted railway sleepers from the Bengal & Northwestern Railway Company of India.

The Indian railways are annually using very large quantities of railway sleepers, and the habit of the past has been to secure a large portion of this timber from Australia, but as the timber there is becoming scarcer the price is slowly advancing.

The specifications call for best quality well seasoned Douglas fir to be treated with twelve pounds of creosote per cubic foot under specified temperature and pressure conditions.

Arrangements have been made to have the Forest Branch inspect the ties both before and after treatment, so as to insure of the specifications being strictly carried out.

PANAMA EXPOSITION

Contractors Employ Union Labor Exclusively

San Francisco, Aug. 26.—It is a source of much satisfaction to organized labor in general to learn that up to the present time all state and foreign nation commissions to the Panama Pacific international exposition have awarded contracts for their buildings to firms employing union labor exclusively. This has been done of their own volition, as the agreement entered into between the Panama-Pacific International Exposition Company and organized labor, as represented by the San Francisco Labor Council and the Building Trades Council, only stipulated that union labor should be employed on such work as was actually done under the direct supervision of the exposition company, and that the employment of union labor on state and foreign nations buildings should be optional with the various state and foreign nations commissions.

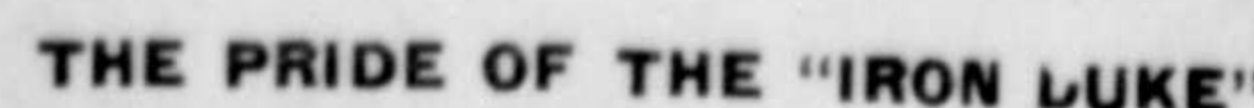

GAMBLING IN FOODSTUFFS UNPATRIOTIC UNDERTAKING

**CITIZENS WHO ATTEMPT TO "CORNER" SUPPLIES MAY
FIND THEIR STORES SPOILED, IF NOT SEIZED
LATER ON**

Montreal, August 26.—The Imperial Government has accepted with gratitude the proffered contribution of one million bags of Canadian flour, to be transported from Canada and used as the British Government sees fit. Four of the principal milling companies, the Ogilvie Western Canada Flour Mills, Maple Leaf Milling Company and Lake-of-the-Woods Milling Company, will supply the flour. The price that the milling companies have consented to receive is about \$2.80 per bag, which would be about the present ruling rate in the market. This one fact may well be taken by any portion of the public which tends to become panicky over future flour prices in Canada as an indication that so far as the present at least is concerned flour in Canada will not sell at fabulous prices. Many people have allowed themselves to foster a foolish misapprehension as to the amount of flour the average household consumes in a given period. It is probable that the ordinary family would find it difficult to consume a barrel of flour within a twelvemonth.

When one considers the comparatively very small amount of flour per day that goes into the making of bread and pastry combined for the consumption of one family, it becomes plain that those who store up large amounts of flour at this time will probably see a large part of it spoil on their hands before they can possibly make use of it. The above also applies in large measure to other staples. The large pack-

ing houses are warning the public that any great quantity of cured meats will not keep in perfect condition over a long period of time except in cold storage.

A word to those who contemplate speculating in foodstuffs in Canada. Any person who, in cold blood, is at the present time hatching scheme to make profit on the strength of the possible food shortage in Canada as the war progresses is certainly engaged in an unpatriotic undertaking, and he will also probably be reckoning without his host. Even in these early days of the campaign, the whole of Canada is practically under military supervision, if not military rule. The Imperial Government has taken steps to see that no cornering of the food supply is possible there and there is no doubt but that later on the Canadian federal authorities will pass legislation aimed at keeping the prices of staples on a reasonable basis. Any undue supply kept on hand by individuals may possibly be ordered to be distributed, or may even be seized by the authorities. One grain expert in Canada gives it as his opinion that Canadian wheat will more likely reach a lower, than a higher price, at least until there is free and unrestricted transportation once more on the high seas.—Saturday Night

Olympia, Aug. 26.—The State board of education today upheld State Superintendent Joseph H. C. Preston in revoking the teaching certificate of Charles Milliron of Usk, Pend Oreille. Milliron was found guilty of unseemly conduct with reference to girl pupils.

Milliron admitted that in former schools and possibly in the present school, he had kissed the little girls, but said it was solely on the basis of friendship.

The board of education also confirmed the revocation of the certificate of Joseph Fuss, of Endicott, charged with taking liquor into dry territory.

**LIEUT. GORDON INVENTS
SAFETY CONNING TOWER**

St. Catharines, Aug. 26.—Lieut. G. S. Gordon of the British navy, who completed a model of a submarine in St. Catharines, has sent it to the Naval Office in England where the new invention will be given a practical trial.

The invention consists of a conning tower which can be detached from the main part of the craft in case of disability while under the water, allow the entire crew to take refuge in the tower, and ascend to the surface of the water in safety.

He made a recent trial in Lake Ontario, near Port Dalhousie, at a depth of 250 feet, and the model worked perfectly.

SIR HIRAM MAXIM SEES DISASTER FOR GERMANY

BELIEVES KAISER'S FORCES WILL SUFFER BAD DEFEAT AT ALLIES' HANDS

London, August 26.—I have seen this coming for a long time said Sir Hiram Maxim, speaking to a representative of the N.Y. American. Four great continental powers have been straining every nerve to see how large an army they could raise and equip. They had these armies, and, like a boy with a plaything, they wanted to use them.

It appears to me that the Kaiser was anxious for war. He was of the opinion that he had the strongest army the world had ever known. He deemed this a favorable time to strike, as he believed England was so absorbed in the Irish troubles that she wouldn't support her friends. The Kaiser fully expected no opposition would be offered to the march of a large portion of his army through Belgium in order to attack France.

Now that Serbia has been quite successful in keeping Austrians out of her country, the colossus of the East—Russia—will sweep down upon Germany and Austria like an avalanche in about three weeks.

Fort of Great Strength

French and Belgians are very much alike; they have the same system of fortifications. A great deal has been done in the last twenty years to make the eastern frontier of France impregnable. They have a great variety of defensive works of great strength; not only this, but the French artillery is undoubtedly the best in the world.

Austria has a very large army, but the Austrians will have all they can do and a great deal more to keep the Russians out of their own country, to say nothing of keeping them out of Germany.

It will be necessary for Germany to send a large force to the east to aid Austria, and in all

probability the alliance will not last a great deal longer than the war.

The English army, it is true, is not very large, but England can certainly send 200,000 men to the front. Little Belgium can send a like number. If England is pressed she can send fully 600,000 to the front. The English are very good, stubborn fighters and as matters stand I don't think the Germans have much chance.

Ten to One Against Germany

If I were to look at it from a purely mathematical standpoint, I should say the chances against Germany are fully 10 to 1.

Nothing but a very unfavorable mistake on the part of the English and French will enable the Germans to reach Paris.

This particular war is not like the war in South Africa or any other uncivilized country. Troops can and will be moved with great rapidity.

Napoleon said that battles were won by quick marches. I opine that this war will be of rather short duration. In regard to the sea, England is supposed to have a force little more than equal to two of the largest continental fleets.

There are no better sea fighters in the world than the English. If they had to deal with Germany alone there would be little chance but that the German fleet would be wiped off the sea, but when you consider the French and Russian fleets are added, I should say the Germans don't stand one chance in a hundred.

Money is the great factor in war. Leaving the United States out of the question, England is the richest country in the world. France is second, Russia third and Germany fourth.

France is extremely rich; her

people are quite as patriotic as any.

The war of 1866 between Russia and Austria lasted only six weeks.

ESCAPED FROM JAIL

John Ellis, a man charged with attempt at murder, walked out of the city jail yesterday and made good his escape. Warden Bailey was out at the time and one of the patrolmen was left in charge and while he was engaged at something the prisoner opened the door connecting the office with the guard room and walked out into the street. He has not been found since.

Ellis is charged with stabbing another man during a drunken fight up the line.

Latest War Bulletins

NAMUR HAS BEEN TAKEN

London, August 26.—A despatch to the Exchange Telegraph from Paris says: "It is said at the French capital that the Belgian city of Namur was taken by the Germans."

PRINCE ARTHUR GOING TO THE FRONT

London, August 26.—Prince Arthur of Connaught is going into active service immediately. Owing to this his infant son was christened last evening, receiving the name of Alastair Arthur.

\$130,000,000 WAR LEVY

In addition to the \$40,000,000 war levy made by the Germans on the city of Brussels, the Province of Brabant has been levied for \$90,000,000 to be paid before September 1st.

CRUISERS CREW SEEK REFUGE

Fourteen officers and 170 of a crew of the Austrian cruiser Seanta have sought refuge in Montenegrin territory.

AUSTRIANS STILL BOMBARDING BELGRADE

A despatch from Nish gives the information that the bombardment of Belgrade is still most severe. Shells of large calibre are doing immense damage. Hardly one building still remains undamaged. The palace has been partly burned down. Another large building in the city has been struck by twenty-five shots.

BANKERS WILL HAVE STATE CREDIT

Lloyd George has introduced in the House of Commons a Bill enabling him, instead of issuing notes to bankers, to issue certificates to give bankers the benefit of state credit without actually taking out notes.

ORDERED OUT OF TANGIER

The following is from Berlin by wireless: "It is officially announced that the German and Austrian consuls at Tangier were ordered to leave by the French on August 15th."

TOOK SEVENTY GERMANS OFF ITALIAN BOAT

London, August 26.—An Italian steamer, Anconia from New York to Italian ports, was held up near Gibraltar and about seventy German conscripts were taken to Gibraltar and are being held prisoners of war.

NO BOOZE FOR SOLDIERS

London, August 26.—Lord Kitchener announces that no presents of wine or spirits will be accepted for the troops at the front and no consignments of this nature will be forwarded.

EVACUATE MEULHAUSEN AGAIN

The Paris War Office makes the announcement that the commander in chief, requiring all the available forces on the Meuse, has ordered a progressive abandonment of occupied territory. Meulhausen has, therefore, again been evacuated.

AUSTRIA AT WAR WITH JAPAN

A London despatch from Vienna, says the Austrian Government on Tuesday handed passports to the Japanese ambassador. The Austrian ambassador at Tokyo is also stated to have been recalled. A Rome despatch from Vienna announces that Austria has declared war upon Japan.

ALLIES DESTROY CATTARO

Cattaro, the Austrian port and city on the Adriatic, has been destroyed by the fleets of the Allies. The bombardment was in progress on Saturday.

ATTACK ON MALINES NEAR ANTWERP

The Germans attacked Malines yesterday and were driven out after four hours fighting.

AUSTRIANS ROUTED AGAIN

The Russians put to rout the Austrian cavalry in Galicia. They captured 200 prisoners and several guns.

SYSTEMATIC EFFORT TO EXTEND TRADE

British Government Taking Full Advantage of Germany's Disability

London, August 26.—The colonial and foreign secretaries are sparing no effort in supporting the movement which has been earnestly started for the expansion of British trade, by capturing the markets, overseas and elsewhere, which Germany and Austria can not now supply.

Rt. Hon. Lewis Harcourt, colonial secretary, has addressed an important document to some of the more important colonies, not possessing representative government, requesting them to furnish full and up-to-date information respecting the principal imports into each colony from Germany and Austria, and as to the products of each colony hitherto exported to these countries. Samples to illustrate particulars are also requested.

Action on the above lines, says Mr. Harcourt will not only be of immediate benefit as regards employment in the United Kingdom, but should also lead to permanent advantage of British trade. As regards neutral foreign countries, Sir Edward Grey is addressing a similar request to His Majesty's consuls in all places where such enquiry likely to have useful results.
