## ROYAL DUEL TURKEY AUSTRIAN CITY FELL TO SERBIA'S BOMBARDMENT

### ES GAINED TWELVE MILES IN YESTERDAY'S FIGHTING

OF THE DAY SHOWS VICTORIES FOR THE ALLIES  
ALL PARTS OF THE THEATRE OF WAR—RUSSIAN  
VICTORY COMPLETE.

(Special to The Daily News—12 Noon)  
Paris, Sept. 11.—A Petrograd dispatch to the London Times says the great battle in the district has ended in a complete victory for the Russians. The Austrian armies are completely routed. The summary shows that the official statements give a picture of the great battle in which it is apparent that the forces are still falling from the announcement that they had gained 37 miles of ground in their advance, which was increased by 12 miles in the past 24 hours. Both British and French have crossed the Marne and captured many men.

### ATROCITIES AGAINST BELGIANS SEEN BY AMERICANS

(Special to The Daily News—12 Noon)  
Sept. 11.—Official reports from the American legation in Brussels recently witnessed with their many fresh samples of atrocities toward the Belgians. They passed through Louvain and saw sitting outside a burned house an 8-year old child with hands and feet had been cut off. His mother, when asked to do it, said, "The Germans do it."

### BRITISH DRIVE GERMANS BACK 70 MILES FROM PARIS

GERMAN ARMY NO CHANCE TO RECOVER—THE BRITISH  
NOW HAVE 300,000 MEN IN BELGIUM AND FRANCE.

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Sept. 10.—Field Marshal French reported to the enemy had been driven back yesterday all along the British capturing guns and prisoners. Fighting the fiercest character is progress. The Germans are routed. The British have crossed the Marne in a northerly direction. A attack by the Allies on the invaders was delivered with such speed and impetuosity that the invaders were given

An action of the greatest severity is being fought between Mailluy, Vitry and LeFrancois. In an engagement between the British and Germans in Nyassaland, British Central Africa, the Germans were driven back to the River Songwe, which is part of the frontier between the British and German protectorates. Both the allied armies in France are receiving reinforcements. The battle in France is likely to last some days yet. Reports regarding the progress of Russian-Austrian fights are meagre. A Petrograd dispatch says it is believed the German Crown Prince has been appointed commander-in-chief of the forces which are to oppose the Russian advance.

### BIG INCREASE IN BRITISH NAVY DURING COMING YEAR

(Special to The Daily News—12 Noon)  
Ottawa, Sept. 11.—Hon. Lewis Harcourt, in a message outlining the first month of the war, states that the British navy will be increased within 12 months by 10 capital ships, 15 cruisers and 20 destroyers. During the same period the German navy will not add more than one-third that number to her navy.

Vienna, Sept. 11.—It is reported here that the Austrians are assuming the offensive again in the Lemberg region. This was reported yesterday by the Russians, who claimed to have defeated the Austrians again.

### AUSTRIAN BOAT BLOWN UP BY MINE

Rome, Sept. 11.—An Austrian torpedo boat has been blown up near Fasana, south of Trieste, by a mine.

### SERBIANS CAPTURE AUSTRIAN CITY

Nish, Sept. 11.—After a bloody battle following the Austrian bombardment of Belgrade, the Serbians have occupied Semlin, an Austrian city across the river from Belgrade.

### TURKEY VIRTUALLY DECLARING WAR

Washington, Sept. 11.—Turkey is virtually declaring war. Austen Bay, the Turkish ambassador here, has been advised by his government that all conventions between the Powers and the Porte conferring special privileges or restricting the sovereignty of the Porte have been abrogated.

### ROYAL DUEL IN TURKEY OVER QUARREL ON WAR SITUATION

MINISTER OF WAR SHOT BY CROWN PRINCE AND MAY DIE  
—CROWN PRINCE ALSO SHOT BY THE MINISTER.

(Special to The Daily News—1 P. M.)  
Paris, Sept. 11.—A Havas dispatch is authority for a statement that in an argument over Turkey's foreign policy, Enver Pasha, the war minister of Turkey, shot at the Crown Prince of Turkey and wounded him slightly. The Prince also shot Enver Pasha in the leg. Another version says that Enver Pasha later died of his wounds.

### GERMANS IN FULL RETREAT TOWARDS THEIR OWN COUNTRY

CONCENTRATING ON THE EASTERN END TO PROTECT LINES  
OF COMMUNICATION AND FORM JUNCTIONS WITH  
THEIR OWN ARMIES.

(Special to The Daily News—12 Noon)  
London, Sept. 11.—A dispatch to Reuters from Antwerp gives the following Belgian government statement: "Military operations continuing in the district of Antwerp are of a very satisfactory nature. A great battle continues westward. Of the part of the field eastward our positions are firmly held. It is important at this moment not to foster exaggerated hopes, but the prospect is favorable to the Allies. The British, who have the honor of forming the extreme left wing, have advanced 26 miles in a single day. This shows how severe the pressure is on the German western army. This pressure is much more than the local pressure. Already it is necessary for the enemy to concentrate towards the east, both for the sake of resting on its lines of communication through Luxembourg, and in order to make a junction of the armies in Rhineland. A disorderly retreat from Oureq and Marne must necessarily hasten the march of the German east wing westerly. The offensive was probably designed for this purpose."

### BRITAIN HOLDS SAMOA SEIZES GERMAN ISLAND

London, Sept. 11.—The occupation of German Samoa by a British expedition removes from the theatre of war a possibility that might later have become serious. When Japan declared war on Germany the German press in America insisted that this action was designed so that she might take not only additional territory in China but also German Samoa, which has strategic possibilities when the safety of the Panama Canal is considered. That the British government was determined there should be no ground for this position in America is shown by the announcement that an expedition, sent from New

Zealand, took over Apia, the capital of German Samoa. Apia is 20 miles west of Tutuila and Pago Pago, the United States naval station.

According to the official War Office announcement the British force taking Apia was from New Zealand. German possessions in Samoa are 1,050 square miles, with a native population of 35,000.

### WAR OFFICE ISSUES ADDITIONAL CASUALTIES

London, Sept. 10.—Additional British casualties to September 7 are officially announced to be as follows: Officers—Killed, 10; wounded, 63; missing, 61. Men—Killed, 64; wounded, 510; missing, 2,883.

### BRITISH SWEEP NORTH SEA-- NO GERMAN SHIPS IN SIGHT

ADVOCATES THAT GERMAN PRISONERS BE USED FOR THE  
HAZARDOUS WORK OF CLEARING THE NORTH  
SEA OF MINES.

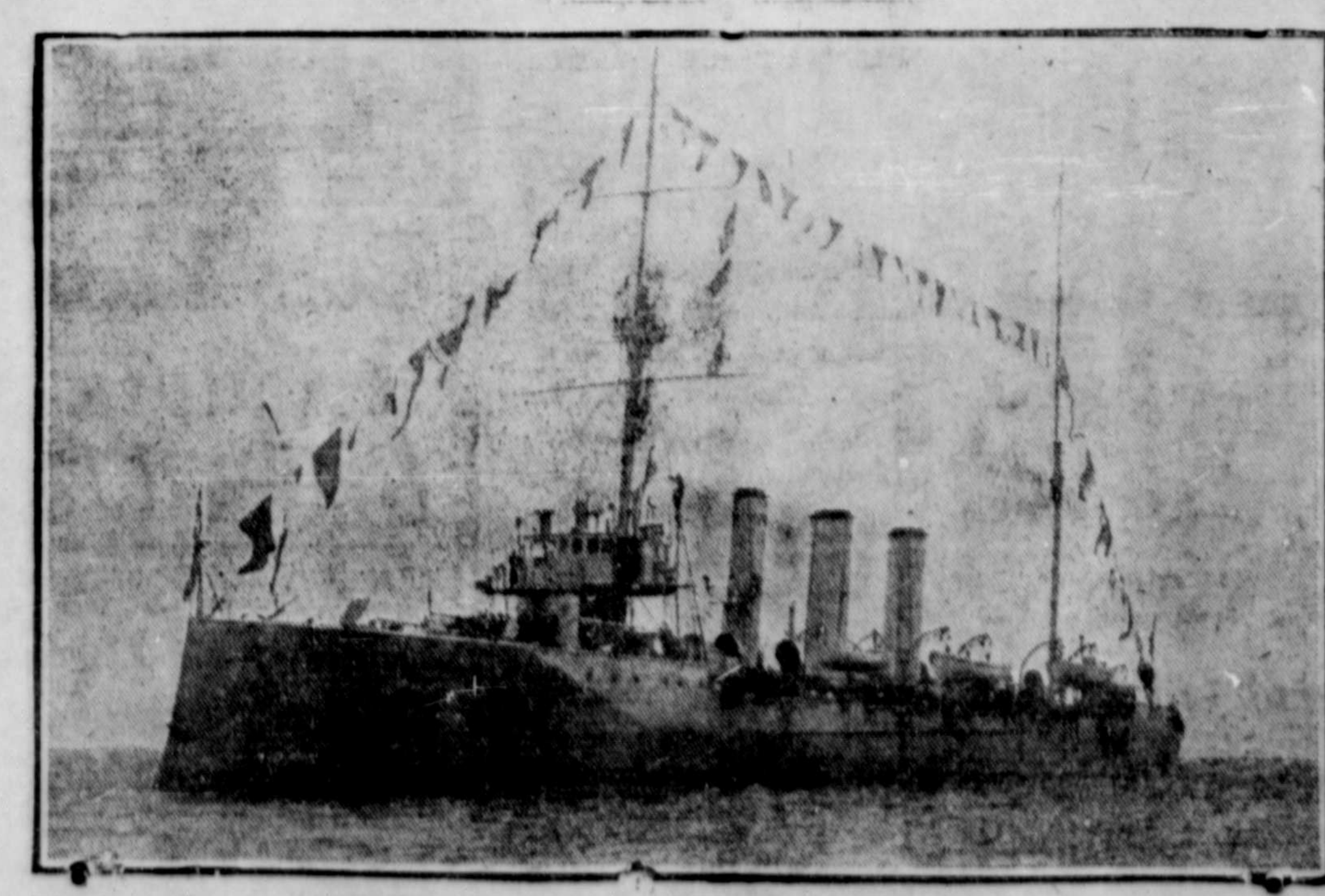
(Special to The Daily News.)  
London, Sept. 10.—The official information bureau issued the following statement tonight: "Yesterday and today strong and numerous squadrons and flotillas made a complete sweep of the North Sea up to and into Heligoland Bight. The German fleet made no attempt to interfere with our movements and no German ship of any kind was seen at sea." "That the German prisoners be pressed into service in the highly hazardous work of sweeping the North Sea of mines was the suggestion made in the House of Commons today."

### GERMANS ADMIT RETIRING MOVEMENT

Washington, D. C., Sept. 11.—The Berlin embassy states that in the two-days' battle east of Paris the Germans held their own against superior forces. The Germans claimed to have captured several thousand prisoners and some guns, after which they retired.

### AUSTRIAN STEAMER SUNK BY RUSSIANS

Petrograd, Sept. 11.—An Austrian steamer has been sunk on the River Vistula by a Russian battery. Some men are honest because they are too poor to be otherwise.

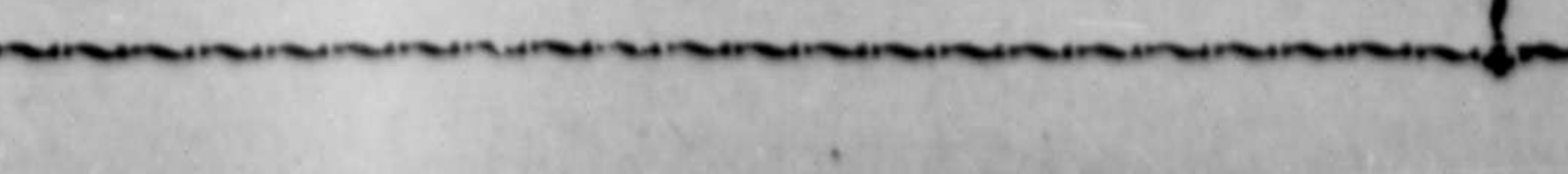

That the Allies will ultimately win in the present struggle is never doubted by those who understand their strength and the issues at stake. What a good many people, however, are asking is, after that victory what then? Will a united Slav movement create another menace to the liberties of the world as the German has done. Would an additional power put into the hands of Russia be dangerous? To all these misgivings the same answer can be given, and which history confirms is that tyranny can never be successful. Any ambitious and suspicious move on the part of Russia or any other power would soon be confronted by a coalition of all Europe as Germany has been.

The days of the world conquerors are all over. There will never be another Alexander sweeping because there is no other world to conquer. There will never be another Napoleon with half the world trembling at his feet, and very soon there will be no Kaiser with world-wide ambitions. So long as Britain continues to walk the narrow way of justice and liberty there will always be a coalition possible that will defy the enemies of freedom. Indeed, the triumph of the right throughout the ages tends to strengthen the faith of humanity in an unseen personality that rules and sways. Terrible though, often, are the methods made use of, perhaps, after all, the way of the

sword is a necessary step in the evolution of the finally civilized-being.

One of the striking facts in connection with the effects of the war on the increased cost of living is the results of public opinion as expressed in the press on the price of food-stuffs. In the United States, Canada and Britain the press strongly denounced the conduct of those who would take advantage of the present exigencies and raise the price of food. As a result of this, too, the governments and other bodies took the matter up and the uncalculated inflation ceased. Restoring the dealers to sanity if not to humanity is a useful service and will have far-reaching effects.

## NEW HAZELTON NOTES

The Montana Continental Development Company has purchased the materials in one of the big storehouses and is having it taken down to be used in the company's work.

# RUSSIANS AT KOENIGSBURG ATTACKING CURTAIN FORTS

GERMAN SQUADRONS MOVING ABOUT THE BALTIC—RUSSIANS  
NOW IN TOUCH WITH REINFORCED GERMAN ARMY IN  
THE EAST.

(Special to The Daily News—12 Noon)

London, Sept. 11.—A dispatch from Stettin states that the Russians are bombarding the string of German fortresses at Koenigsburg. Part of the city is in flames.

The German Baltic fleet is beginning to move. Last Monday a German squadron of 29 vessels was seen between Gotska and Kepparstenarnu. Yesterday a squadron of 31 large German warships was sighted at Huusvskadr, steaming eastward. A German squadron consisting of three cruisers was seen southeast of Stockholm steaming in a norther-

ly direction towards Petrograd.

An official statement says the victory achieved by the Russian troops in the fighting with the Austrian and German armies near Krasnick continues to grow. On Tomassow Rawa and Dneister front hard fighting has occurred.

The German troops transported from the west concentrated in Eastern Prussia on the River Alle on September 9. They commenced an advance, directing considerable forces through the Mazu Lakes district. The Russian advance guard opposed the enemy's march and they retreated in an easterly direction.

A special space is being reserved for the department, in which will be shown the products of the experimental farms in the north.

Indian Agent C. C. Perry has arranged for a splendid list of prizes for native work of every description. Printed lists can be obtained by those who are interested. The category includes totems, cedar bark mats, baskets, moccasins, model Indian houses, et cetera.

There will also be given several good prizes to the native who appear in the most striking Indian costumes during the time of the Exhibition. So we are likely to have chiefs in war paint and feathers which will be a surprise to come of our eastern friends who are expected to arrive in four-gallon hats and claw-hammer coats.

Fred W. Bohler, of Kitsumkum, has sent 68 exhibits from his ranch. This is the highest number of entries from one party.

## COMMITTED SUICIDE IN COMOX RESORT

W. B. Chivers, late of New Hazelton, and known there as a Texan, committed suicide last night in a Comox Avenue resort. He had been hanging around the city for some time and latterly was drinking heavily.

Last evening he went down Comox Avenue and entered Alva O'Neill's place. Soon after he pulled a gun out of his pocket and fired a shot through his breast. It was fatal and he dropped instantly.

Chivers was a young man of powerful stature. During the recent bank robbery in Hazelton he took an active part in the defence of the town. He was a good man with a gun. So far as is known Chivers has no relatives in this country. An inquest will be held today by Coroner McMullin.

## IT WAS SUBMARINE SANK PATHFINDER

(Special to The Daily News.)  
London, Sept. 11.—Later reports say it was a German submarine and not a torpedo boat which sank the British cruiser Pathfinder.

## BRITISH DEFEATED GERMANS IN AFRICAN COLONIES

London, Sept. 10.—The British troops met and defeated a German force of 400 which entered Nyassaland in British Central Africa according to an announcement made by the official bureau.

The Germans lost seven officers killed and two wounded, together with two field guns and two machine guns. The loss among the rank and file has not been ascertained, but was heavy.

## DECLARES RUSSIAN REPORTS GIVE TRUTH

Times Correspondent Says St. Petersburg Believes in Final Success.

London, Sept. 9.—Telegraphing from St. Petersburg, the correspondent of The Times declares that the war reports given out by the headquarters staff in the Russian capital are generally rather meagre, but in contra-distinction to what is the case in Berlin and Vienna, they are always true. That the headquarters will stick to this plan also when the news is bad is proved by their recent announcements.

At the same time the Russian Fourth army crossed the eastern frontier of Galicia and after a series of minor encounters in which it was everywhere victorious, drove back the Austrian forces massed there until a general battle ensued, about thirty miles east of Lemberg. After long-sustained and heavy fighting at this point, the Russians occupied several places where the Austrians had taken up positions fortified by field works, namely at (name deleted by censor). Of the continued Russian advance on reports.

In conclusion, the correspondent of The Times says that the information given out at headquarters in St. Petersburg indicates that the Russians, in spite of the Austrian stubborn defence, will bring victory home in this long sustained and terrible battle in which probably more than 1,000,000 men are engaged.
