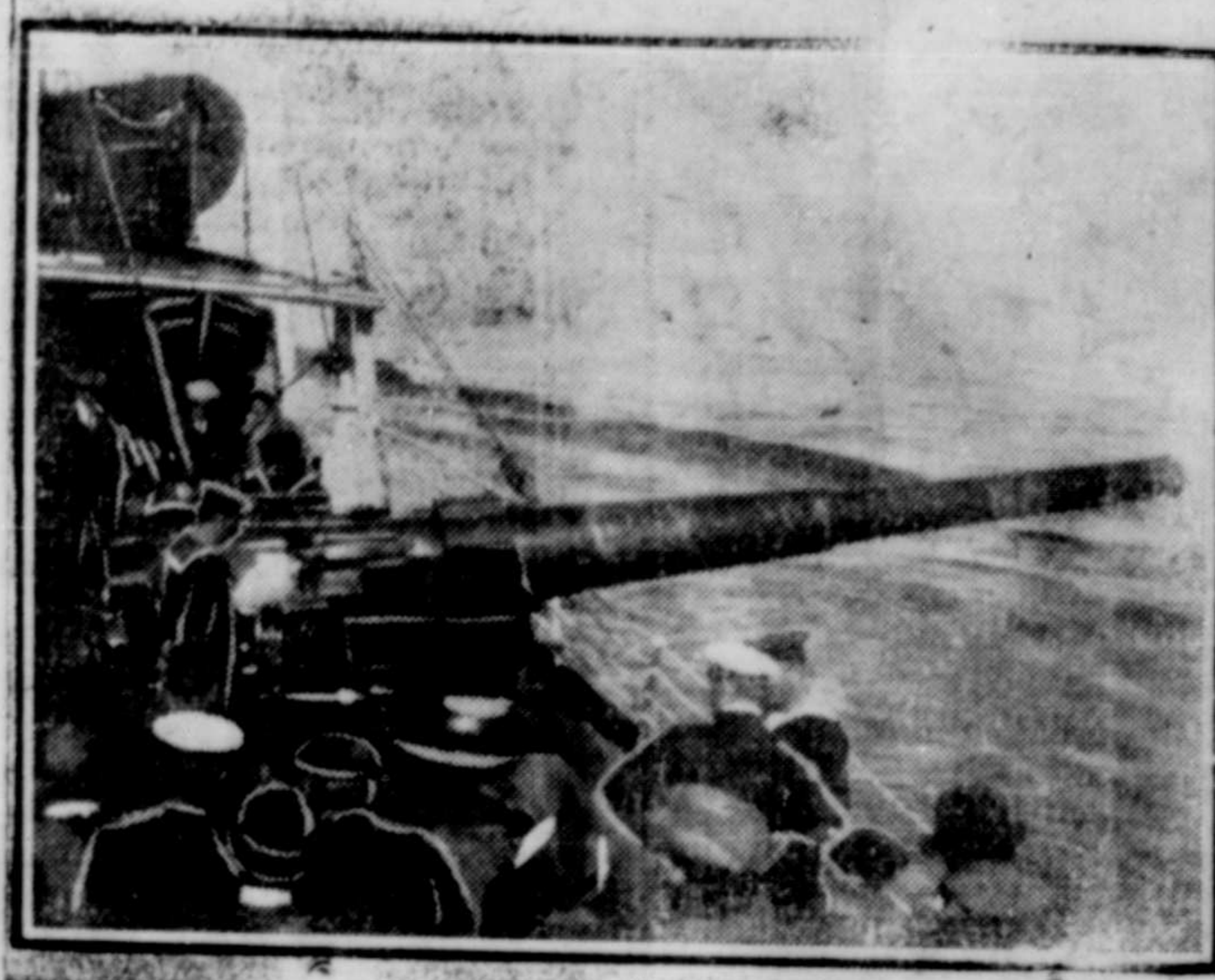

NORTHERN B. C. FAIR OPENED BY MINISTER OF AGRICULTURE

FAIR IS BEING HELD IN NEW EXHIBITION BUILDING ON ACROPOLIS HILL—IN SPITE OF INTERNATIONAL AFFAIRS THE DISPLAY IS VERY CREDITABLE ONE.

The annual fair of the Northern B. C. Agricultural and Industrial Association will be formally opened this afternoon at 2 o'clock by Hon. H. E. Young, Minister of Agriculture for the province. The fair is being held in the newly completed Exhibition Building on Acropolis Hill—it adds the advantage of scenery to that of the display within. The secretary of the association, Mr. L. Bullock-Webster, has been untiring in his efforts to make the fair a success and if it will not come up to the expectations of the public it will not be his fault. International affairs have made it necessary to reduce the outlay, but in spite of that the display that is offered is a creditable one and well worth the efforts that have been put forth. On last night's train there was a big supply of products from the Interior which will add materially to those already in place.

FIRST CAR OF FRESH FISH SHIPPED FROM RUPERT TODAY

THREE REFRIGERATOR CARS CONTAINING 20,000 POUNDS OF HALIBUT EACH WENT EAST, TWO FOR CHICAGO AND ONE FOR TORONTO—CONSIGNED BY CANADIAN FISH AND COLD STORAGE COMPANY.

The first car of real fresh fish went out of Prince Rupert this morning by the G. T. P. The car of fish taken out recently was mild-cured salmon. Today's train had three refrigerator cars, which came in last evening, and the loading took place throughout the night. Each car consisted of 100 boxes of halibut packed in ice. The boxes contained 200 pounds of fish, so that each car carried 20,000 pounds. On the sides of the cars were large painted signs bearing the following words: "To F. T. James & Co., Toronto, from Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Company. Shipped from Prince Rupert, B. C., over the G. T. P. Railway, September 30, 1914."

Two more cars were consigned to Chicago. This is just the beginning of a big trade for Prince Rupert to which there is no limit. The placards will be a good advertisement for the city.

MORE DETAILS ABOUT SHOOTING ACCIDENT

(Special to The Daily News.) Haysport, B. C., Sept. 30.—A painter named L. J. Hoyt, from Prince Rupert, accidentally shot himself while hunting with two companions from Prince Rupert at Mile 24, three miles from the railway track, on Sunday about 1:30 p. m.

Hoyt and one of his companions had just finished their lunch in the woods and separated. A few minutes afterwards the companion heard a muffled report and rushed over in the direction of the sound and found Hoyt expiring, a bullet from a 45-90 having entered his side. His companions came in and notified the Port Essington police, who are searching the woods for the body, which will likely be brought out today. A party was in the woods all day yesterday was was not able to locate the body.

REVEALED 300 MINES TO SAVE HIS LIFE

Captive From German Mine-Laying Trawler Saved British Much Trouble.

London, Sept. 29.—A story is going the rounds here that when one of the British mine-hunting craft captured a mine-laying trawler manned by Germans in the North Sea, the British captain lined up his captives and picked out the weakest looking of the lot. Ordering him to step forward, he said: "I want you to tell me where those mines are that you laid."

"I'll die first," said the sailor, as he straightened up. "Very well," replied the captain. "You are going to die first, anyway, if any of us do. You helped lay those mines. You know just where they are. We are going to hunt for them and your position is going to be right in the bow of this ship so that if we hit one of them you surely will be the first man to die."

He ordered the prisoner placed directly in the bow and then the ship steamed ahead and over the waters known to be mined. The end of the story is that this vessel picked up nearly 300 mines while the captured sailor was kept in his position of danger.

AUSTRIANS HAVE CHOLERA.

Venice, Sept. 29.—Nine cases of Asiatic cholera have been discovered among wounded soldiers in Hungary, according to an official announcement by the Hungarian Minister of the Interior. The announcement has excited great apprehension throughout the dual monarchy. It is also learned here that the first suspected case of cholera in Hungary was that of a wounded soldier who was brought on September 15 to Bescsaba from the Galician battlefield.

HUNGARY RETALIATES— BRITISH PATENTS AND TRADE MARKS CANCELED

Vienna, Sept. 28.—In consequence of the reported action of the British government in canceling Austrian, German and Hungarian patent rights in the British Isles, the Hungarian Cabinet has empowered the Ministry of Commerce to adopt immediate retaliatory rules regarding patent rights and trade marks in Hungary. It is asserted that 3,338 British patents have been granted in Hungary, as against 780 Hungarian patents granted in Great Britain.

Owing to the constantly increasing demands of the army for meat, the supply of cattle arriving in Vienna has considerably diminished.

BRITISH MINES BENEFIT.

London, Sept. 29.—It is announced by the Newcastle Coal Exchange that owing to the inability of the German coal owners to execute the contract for supplying the Portuguese railways,

the contract has reverted to British collieries. This is the first reported instance since the outbreak of the war of the diversion of business from Westphalia to this country.

Ten Canadians Were on Berwick and Had Part in Sinking the Spreewald.

Ottawa, Sept. 29.—Ten Canadians, including two British Columbians, took part in their first naval action when the British cruiser Berwick sank the armed cruiser Spreewald in the North Atlantic. W. J. R. Beach, of Ganges, Salt Spring Island, B. C., and R. W. Wood, of Duncan, B. C., two naval cadets who passed their examinations at the Royal Military College at Halifax, were on the Berwick and took part in the action.

Washington, Sept. 29.—Secretary Danians has ordered the Marconi wireless station at Stiasconsett, Mass., closed, in consequence of the failure of the company to give assurance that it would comply with naval censorship regulations.

Today witnesses the opening of the Fair. What is now but a small beginning should develop into a big and important institution for Northern British Columbia. In older districts people would never think of getting along without their fair. It not only brings producer and consumer together, but it is one of the best advertisements a district can have. To make the Fair a success requires the untiring efforts of all concerned. It will not do to be easily discouraged. Patience and perseverance will win every time and every citizen of this north land should put his shoulder to the wheel and see that every successive Fair is better than the one before.

Is the German soldier by nature wantonly brutal? In reading of his shooting of women, children and prisoners it would seem so. Still, it is probably just the working out of the law of cause and effect. The German conscript is bullied into the army and bullied while he is in it. From authentic reports, he is being driven at the point of a gun or at the ends of the nine tails of the "cht." Every semblance of pity or compassion is bullied out of him and he becomes a machine to slaughter or be slaughtered. For years he has been subjected to the discipline of the "mailed fist," with the result that, when he breaks loose in a conquered town, he mistakes license for liberty.

The time may soon come when this same recoil will hurl the Hohenzollern dynasty, or what is left of it, into oblivion forever.

There seems to be another explanation of the vandalism of the German army that is

gaining ground. It is said on excellent authority that the German soldiers in Belgium were a drunken mob. The Belgians are apparently fond of seasoned wines and the best the vintage affords is stored away in their cellars. As the Germans conquered they also pillaged and the wine cellar was the first place sought after. The consequence was that every soldier was a drunken maniac and no treasure was sacred in his sight. If this caused the loss of Louvain it will be another black mark against King Alcohol.

Out of every war new characters flash into the world's history. Already, in the present conflict, a nation has found itself famous—and a King.

It is not long since Albert, King of the Belgians, ascended the throne and he was then, comparatively speaking, unknown. He soon proved himself to be an unconventional ruler with a keen interest in applied mechanics and the arts. He personally attended the public gathering to fete Maurice Maeterlinck, when Maeterlinck was awarded the Nobel Prize, and carried off the author of "The Blue Bird" to dinner at the palace. To literary and artistic societies King Albert has freely given patronage.

Today he is famous throughout the world as the gallant leader of a brave little people holding out valiantly against tremendous odds.

When the tragic story of this horrible holocaust comes to be told, one of the brightest pages will be that which tells how the Belgians held Liege and kept the invader at bay until the legions behind were able to take up strategic positions.

BRITISH SUBMARINES WENT RIGHT UP ELBE

Couldn't Get at Kaiser's Ships—German Trip to the Scottish Coast.

London, Sept. 28.—A German submarine recently made a reconnoitering cruise to the Scottish coast, according to a letter written by a German sailor and published in the German newspapers. She was ten days absent from her base and went along the English coast, at times under water, and passed under a British squadron. "It was the prettiest picture I ever saw," the sailor wrote. "Up there, like a peaceful lamb, lay the British squadron, without a care and as if there were no German sea wolves in armored clothing. For two hours we lay there under water on the outposts. We could with certainty have succeeded in fetching under a big cruiser. But we must not; we were on patrol and our boat had further work to do."

New York, Sept. 28.—A lieutenant-commander in the British navy writes a friend in this city as follows: "We have been right up the Elbe in our submarines, but could not get at the big German warships. They are lying well apart and protected by scores of trawlers and small steamships, with huge steel cables and nets in between. "Don't get down-hearted about any bad news. The Germans will soon be done for, as immense preparations are going on of which I dare not write more fully."

MAXIM GORKY JOINS RUSSIAN RED CROSS

Author Volunteers His Services at the Front.

London, Sept. 29.—A dispatch from Moscow states that among those who have volunteered their services with the Red Cross at the front is Maxim Gorky, the author-revolutionary.

The torpedo gunboat Speedy has been sunk by a mine in the North Sea, while rescuing the crew of a trawler that also had been sunk. The Speedy was of an obsolete type, and has not been in the active line for some time.

IS UNITED STATES SILENT PARTNER?

Information Advanced That United States Is Silent Partner of Triple Entente.

The Wall Street Journal gives prominence to a statement of Professor Roland G. Usher, of the Washington University, St. Louis, in which he says the United States is a silent partner in the Triple Entente. He asserts that as long ago as 1897, although no papers were ever signed, an understanding was reached between the governments of Great Britain, France and the United States that "if ever Germany began a war for the purpose of extending Pan-Germanism, the United States would support the Allies to the extent of using its navy for keeping open the Atlantic highway and protecting the merchant marine of England, if the British navy should not be adequate to the task." He says that the assent of Great Britain and France to the control of the Gulf of Mexico and the building of the Panama Canal by the United States was in pursuance of this understanding, and that the willingness of the two European powers to give to American power a free hand in Mexico also arises out of it. Professor Usher says that, if Germany should be successful in the war, her next move would be against South Africa and the Panama Canal. He takes the position that Germany has been deliberately planning this very war for years, and intended to invade France by way of Belgium.

ARTIST WOUNDED IN BATTLE.

Berlin, Sept. 29.—The well known German painter, Arthur Schlubeck, now serving as a lieutenant of hussars, was wounded by a piece of shrapnel while fighting on the River Aisne. He has been given the iron cross. Herr Schlubeck has painted several portraits of the Crown Prince of Germany. His wife is an American woman, formerly a Mrs. Heyl, of Milwaukee.

The police made a raid on what appears to have been a gambling joint on Third Avenue last night. Seven or eight people were taken in. The case was heard in Police Court this morning and sentence was deferred until Friday. The parties were let out on bail.

Prince Rupert has another finger-print artist among the police force. In the absence of Mr. Bailey a few days ago, one of the newer men, S. V. Deiff, who has had a large experience in this work in the Old Country and in Winnipeg, took the impression of a prisoner's finger and a few days later got word back from Ottawa that the man was required there for other offences.
