ENEMY IS CHECKED BRITISH CAPTURE MERCHANTMEN AND GUNBOATS

RUPERT FAIR IS GRAND SUCCESS THE DISPLAYS ARE OF HIGH ORDER

PLAY OF VEGETABLES CANNOT BE BEATEN ANYWHERE
ON CONTINENT—GRAVESTON APPLES FROM LA-
KELSE AND KITSUMKALUM ARE EXEMPLARY

GERMANS NOW PLAN TO ATTACK BRITISH SHORES AND FLEET

THEY ARE SUCCESSFUL IN TAKING ANTWERP THEY WILL
USE THIS FOR A BASE AGAINST THE POWER OF BRIT-
AIN—IF THIS FAILS THE WAR WILL END.

(Special to The Daily News—9:30 A. M.)
New York, Oct. 1.—Advises
from Europe to important bank-
ers indicate that the Ger-
man attack on Antwerp is intend-
ed as a prelude to a concentrated
attack on the British coast.
After the fall of Antwerp, ac-
cording to the plan, the Germans
will come overland by aeroplanes
and underwater by submarines to
make an attack on the British
fleet, together with an attempt to
land troops from Antwerp.

GERMANS HOLDING OWN IN AISNE BATTLE

(Special to The Daily News—10:30 A. M.)
Paris, Oct. 1.—The official bul-
letin says: On our left wing
of the Somme the action con-
tinues to develop rapidly. To the
right, between Oise and Aisne,
the enemy has delivered an attack
Tracy le Mont, being repulsed
with heavy losses. On the cen-
tral front, a relative calm prevails along
the entire front. We have made
no progress between Argonne
and the Meuse. In the Woëvre
district there have been severe
fights. Our troops have advanced
at several points.

BRITISH CAPTURE NINE MERCHANTMEN AND TWO GUNBOATS

(Special to The Daily News—12 Noon)
London, Oct. 1.—The Admiralty
announces that the British cruis-
er Cumberland captured off Cam-
eroon River, West Africa, the
German-American liner Arnfried
and nine merchantmen. The gun-
boat Soden was captured and
is in commission, while it is
expected that the floating dock
of the Herzogin Elizabeth, both
of which were sunk, can be
raised.

ITALY AND TURKEY.

Paris, Oct. 1.—A Rome dispatch
says that Italy is ready to protest
against the abolition
of capitulations at Constanti-
nople.

ITALY PROTESTS TO VIENNA GOVT. OVER SINKING FISHING-BOAT

(Special to The Daily News—9:30 A. M.)
Rome, Oct. 1.—As a result of
the sinking of an Italian fishing
boat by an Austrian mine, the
Italian government has instructed
its ambassador at Vienna to
enter an energetic protest against
mines which prevent the safe and
free navigation of the Adriatic.

announces that the northern ser-
vice will be resumed Sunday,
when the Prince George will be
restored to the coastwise run.

BRITISH OFFICERS PRO- MOTED FROM RANKS

London, Oct. 1.—To fill up the
gaps in the ranks of officers caused
by the casualties in France,
the war office is promoting a large
number of non-commissioned of-
ficers. The first list of these ap-
pointments just appeared.

ROUMANIAN CABINET TO CONSIDER WAR QUESTION

(Special to The Daily News—10:30 A. M.)
London, Oct. 1.—A Bucharest
dispatch says the King of Rou-
mania has called a cabinet meet-
ing for tomorrow to decide on the
attitude of Roumania regarding
war.

An Antwerp dispatch says the
garrison there made sorties from
various points, repulsing the
Germans with heavy losses. The
bombardment of the outlying
forts by the Germans continues.

HELP WANTED FOR FRENCH RAILWAYS

London, Oct. 1.—The British
War Office has issued a call for
1,000 expert railroad men to help
operate the French railways. The
French railroadmen are all at the
front.

GERMAN WARSHIPS ATTACKING JAPANESE

Tokio, Oct. 1.—German war-
ships opened a severe engage-
ment today, cannonading the
Japanese position at Tsing Tau.
Two officers were killed. A Ger-
man destroyer was sunk by the
Japanese guns. A Japanese mine
sweeper was destroyed by a mine.

FIERCE CONTEST STILL ON— GERMANS STILL HELD IN CHECK

FIERCE FIGHT ON AT JUNCTION OF AISNE AND OISE—COUN-
TER ATTACK OF ALLIES RELIEVES SITUATION FOR
THE PRESENT.

(Special to The Daily News—1:30 P. M.)
Paris, Oct. 1.—The Germans
continue a fierce attack in the
angle formed by the Rivers Oise
and Aisne. In the direction of
Tracy and Lemont, northeast of
the forest of Aigue, the contest
has been singularly desperate, but
the Allies by delivering counter-
attacks have checked the bold at-
tempts of the foe.

AUSTRIAN ARMY SURROUNDED DEFEAT IS MADE COMPLETE

AFTER SEVERAL DAYS FLEEING BEFORE THE RUSSIAN FORCE
THEY ARE OVERTAKEN AND SURROUNDED—ALL FOOD
AND WAR MATERIALS TAKEN BY RUSSIANS.

(Special to The Daily News—9:30 A. M.)
Rome, Oct. 1.—The Russian
ambassador announces that the
Austrian army which had been
fleeing before the Russians has
been surrounded near Douklo and
that the defeat is complete.

All food, ammunition and war
material being conveyed to Aus-
tria fell into the Russian hands.

SKIPPER THOUGHT MINE WAS CASK OF WINE

Came Toward It and Threw Out
Rope to Draw It Near—
Exploded Killing All.

(Special to The Daily News—12 Noon)
Rome, Oct. 1.—Details of the
destruction of the fishing boat off
Rimini by a floating mine shows
that the fisherman mistook the
mine for a cask of wine, which
he sought to recover by throwing
a rope overboard. He drew the
supposed cask toward him and
when it touched his craft the ex-
plosion occurred. The boat was
blown to pieces. All nine men
aboard were killed.

Hundreds of mines from the
Austrian coast are believed to
have drifted towards the Italian
side. Coastwise shipping has
been stopped.

TERRIFIC STORM ON THE NORTH SEA

Copenhagen, Oct. 1.—The se-
verest storm in living memory is
raging over Denmark and the
North Sea.

RUSSIANS CAPTURED GERMAN POSITIONS

(Special to The Daily News.)
Petrograd, Oct. 1.—On Septem-
ber 28 the Russian troops, after
a series of fierce conflicts, cap-
tured the German positions at
Augustow and Koptzyewo.
The German siege artillery
is continuing the bombardment of
Ossowetz, in Russian Poland,
without success.
Small engagements have taken
place at Ichtseheentschin, in the
vicinity of Andreyev, in Russian
Poland.

GERMANS GETTING READY FOR RETREAT

(Special to The Daily News—12 Noon)
Rotterdam, Oct. 1.—Dispatches
from the south indicate that the
preparation for a retreat of the
German right has already begun.
The German troops were observ-
ed coming from North France to-
wards Tournai and Mons, prepar-
ed to cover the main army in case
of a retreat.

UNFORTIFIED TOWN REPORTED DESTROYED

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, Oct. 1.—The Daily
Mail correspondent reports the
destruction by heavy artillery of
Albert, an unfortified town eight-
een miles from Amiens which has
been the scene during the past
few days of a prolonged and ter-
ribly murderous artillery battle.

SERBIANS RETAKE SEMILIN AND ADVANCE

(Special to The Daily News—10:30 A. M.)
Paris, Oct. 1.—After a san-
guinary combat the Serbian
troops have retaken Semlin. This
secures an advantage, they being
able now to take the offensive.

WHY ITALY PROTESTS TO VIENNA GOVT.

Rome, Oct. 1.—Another float-
ing mine has exploded near Ri-
mini, Italy, blowing up a fishing
boat, killing nine of the crew and
injuring several others.

JAPANESE BUSY.

Tokio, Oct. 1.—It is officially
announced that a portion of the
Japanese fleet has landed a force
which has occupied Lao Che har-
bor in the neighborhood of Tsing
Tau. They took four field guns
abandoned by the Germans.
New York, Oct. 1.—A cable-
gram from Tokio to the East-West
News Bureau states that the Ja-
panese besieging army has begun
an attack on the German advance
position outside Tsing Tau.

CRUISER LEIPZIG AGAIN HEARD FROM

Lima, Oct. 1.—It is officially
announced that the German cruiser
Leipzig and the naval tug Marie
received coal from the German
steamer Anasis at Lobon de Ti-
erra.

WAR IN EUROPE MAKES GOOD TIMES IN CANADA

Sir William Mackenzie states that the Canadian Northern Railway will soon put 10,000 men on the finishing of the system.

To The Monetary Times, Mr. J. H. Plummer, president of the Dominion Steel Corporation, says: "Enquiries from abroad are beginning to reach us and a few weeks may change the situation for the better."

The favorable effect of present conditions upon the Canadian cotton industry has resulted in the resumption of full working time in the ten mills of the Dominion Textile Company, Ltd.

A rush order from England for 500 piano actions has been received by a Canadian house, The Monetary Times is informed by a member of the firm in question. This business formerly went to Germany.

Announcing the usual quarterly dividend of 1 1/2 per cent on preferred stock, payable to shareholders on record on the fifteenth; Vice-President and Manager C. C. Ballantyne, of the Sherwin-Williams Company of Canada, stated that business was being maintained, that the company was in a strong financial position, and that there need be no anxiety regarding the payment of interest and dividends in the future.

The Oxford Knitting Company, Woodstock, Ont., which closed its plant shortly after the beginning of the war, resumed operations on Monday, with its full staff of 150 hands.

October dividends already declared call for a total disbursement to shareholders in concerns of a Canadian capital interest amounting to \$13,456,748.

That Canada should suffer least, have a quicker recovery from the effects of the present war, and ultimately make more from it than any other country in the world, is the opinion of Dr. Adam Shortt, civil service commissioner at Ottawa, and one of the best authorities on economics in the Dominion.

The Canadian Pacific Railway will have a busy six weeks moving the harvest. For this it makes preparations in advance. Our wheat and grains of all descriptions will put about \$250,000,000 in the pockets of the Western farmers, while the higher prices which will obtain for wheat, especially, will compensate for any lessened bulk that may obtain. The company has on hand about 95,000 freight cars, and is turning them out at the Angus shops at the rate of ten a day.

The embargo on the exportation of jams from the United Kingdom will increase the demand for Canadian-made jams. During the fiscal year ending March 31, 1914, over \$500,000 worth of jams, jellies and preserves were imported from the United Kingdom into Canada. The deficiency created by the shutting off of these imports under the embargo instituted by the British government must be made up by the Canadian jam factories.

WAR, FINANCE, COMMERCE

A decree has been signed in Paris to issue treasury bonds of from three months to a year, of 100, 500 and 1,000 francs and national defence bonds at 5 per cent.

The Peruvian government, which proclaimed a moratorium for thirty days on August 7, has announced that payments will now be resumed.

A dispatch from Bordeaux says that at the request of M. Ribot, the Minister of Finance, the brokers have associated and decided to reopen the Bourse at Bordeaux.

Major L. Meredith and Dr. T. Greenside, of London, Ont., who represent the British government, made this week from Cincinnati, the first shipment of 3,000 horses for the use of the British army in the European war.

The Austrian government, says a London cable, has offered to remit money for the payment of the coupons of the Hungarian loan of 1914, but as this would involve a transaction with an enemy's government the London firm of Rothschilds have declined to accept the offer.

The Russian government has bought from the Great Lakes Towing and Wrecking Company a big ice-breaking tug, which will leave immediately for Montreal to cross the Atlantic. It is believed the ice-breaker is wanted to assist in keeping open the Russian White Sea port of Archangel.

An extra of the Canadian Gazette announces that "it is contrary to law for any persons resident in British dominions to trade or have any commercial or financial transactions with any person resident or carrying on business in the German Empire or Austria-Hungary without permission of the authorities."

The Bank of England has undertaken temporarily, on behalf of the National Bank of Belgium, to cash Belgian bank notes at the fixed exchange of 25.40 francs per £1. The arrangement has been made solely for the purpose of enabling refugees from Belgium to this country to obtain moderate amounts of cash to meet their immediate needs.

Telegraphing from The Hague, the correspondent of the Exchange Telegraph says that Queen Wilhelmina has accepted the offer of six of the richest men in Holland to give one-tenth of their fortunes to pay the expenses of the present mobilization, which is costing 1,000,000 guilders a day. A guilder is equivalent to about 48 cents in Canadian money.

GOODS ARE SEIZED; GOVERNMENT'S WAY

How Food Speculators Are Punished in the British Empire.

London, Oct. 1.—The proclamation issued authorizing the Board of Trade to take possession of any articles of commerce which are being unreasonably held from the market, paying the owners fair prices for them, has been most effective.

London, Oct. 1.—A dispatch to Reuters from Sydney, N. S. W., says: "The state government, acting in accordance with the powers conferred upon it by Parliament at the outbreak of the war to prevent gambling in food-stuffs, yesterday seized 140,000 bags of wheat which its holders had refused to sell at four shillings two pence per hundred-weight, the price fixed by the government."

RUSSIANS MAKING GREAT PROGRESS

Petrograd, Oct. 1.—(Official communication)—In the region of Ossowetz and Drzsenkiki the Russians attacked the Germans furiously in a new attempt of the Germans to cross the Niemen. In this they failed.

A violent combat took place for possession of the northern routes to the forest of Augustow. In Galicia, the Austrian rear guard suffered another defeat near Doukl and they abandoned a great number of cannon, 400 wagons and many prisoners.

It is officially announced that the Serbian troops in Bosnia have captured Sanpesak. Also, they seized an Austrian train of sixteen cars, six of them loaded with ammunition.

BIG BATTLE RAGING—MAY BE LAST EFFORT MADE BY BOTH PARTIES

(Special to The Daily News—9:30 A. M.)

London, Oct. 1.—The Chronicle correspondent with the Belgian army, writing on Tuesday, estimates that nearly 150,000 troops are engaged in a desperate battle along the line extending from Termonde to Aerschoot. This battle, he says, appears to be the last effort on both sides.

The Belgian resistance in face of the superior German artillery is magnificent.

As regards Antwerp, it is not easy to make a definite statement until the result of the battle is known. In any case, the town is well provisioned and defended.

The German losses in the past few days are enormous, many thousands having fallen.

GERMAN SEARCHLIGHTS

Used to Seek Out Positions of Allies With Disturbing Effect—Hillside Searched.

London, Oct. 1.—The Chronicle's correspondent at Paris in the course of a lengthy dispatch, describes the use of searchlights by the Germans. He says as soon as darkness falls the Germans light their lamps and play them upon all points.

These long, tapering fingers of light creep along the hillsides, touching the positions of sleeping battalions with a light luminescence. They feel their way along the fringe of autumn woods, so that in a moment where there had been black laps of darkness one sees the shimmer of leaves and grasses and tree trunks like columns of burnished metal. They are extraordinarily inquisitive, these feelers of light, and point suddenly and arrestingly at moving objects, which halt at the first touch of that perilous illumination.

A friend who has been driving officers about the front says that a few nights ago he was driving rapidly towards the wireless station when his car was picked out by one of these traveling rays. In a moment he and the officers who were with him were flooded with a white brilliance, so that they were dazzled and startled. A moment after a shell came hurtling overhead and several bullets buried themselves in the chassis.
