

AMERICAN SOCIALIST FAVORS THE BRITISH

Pays Tribute to Action of Britain in Taking Up Arms in Interest of Humanity.

An American Socialist, Mr. Charles Edward Russell, has addressed the following letter to Mr. H. M. Hyndman, the chairman of the Socialist party in Great Britain. The letter was written at The Hague and dated August 23:

"Dear Comrade Hyndman was delighted to have your most kind, fraternal letter, and to see that your clear perception of things was not astray about the present situation. I should have known it. Some of the comrades seem to be strangely muddled. The cause of Socialism, as well as the cause of political democracy, good faith, national honor, morality, and everything else that decent men care for, is at stake in this horrible conflict. If the principle should once be established that big nations should have no obligations to respect their solemn guarantees to small nations, there would come such a flood of reaction and of the supremacy of mere brute strength as would overwhelm us for years. Socialism is true, right and moral; it can have no tolerance of international brigandage suc as Germany practiced on Belgium. If nations may violate faith, shall individuals be any better?

"I am not fond of the government of Great Britain, but I confess that I do not see, in the main, how it could have done otherwise. Let any doubter read the correspondence; that seems to me conclusive. I acknowledge also, that in times gone by I have been in error about the British armament. If it were not for the British navy today we should be at the mercy of the banditti of Berlin, and civilization would go backward 400 years, and remain there for the rest of this generation.
