## ANTWERP FALLS—RUSSIANS TAKE 10,000 PRISONERS

### BELGIANS SURRENDER ANTWERP; WHITE FLAG HOISTED YESTERDAY

BRITISH GOVERNMENT CONFIRMS REPORT—AFTER FURIOUS  
ATTACK BY GERMANS IT WAS DECIDED TO EVACUATE  
CITY—NOTRE DAME CATHEDRAL NOT DAMAGED.

(Special to The Daily News.)  
London, Oct. 10.—The British government announces that Antwerp was evacuated by the Belgians yesterday.  
The Hague, Oct. 10.—Antwerp surrendered to the Germans at 3:30 Friday afternoon. The war flag was removed from the cathedral and the white flag raised its place at 9 in the morning. The actual surrender took place at 11 and a half hours later. The Germans delivered their last furious attacks between 6 and 7 o'clock Friday morning. The Belgians resisted valiantly and desperate fighting resulted in heavy losses to both sides. The Cathedral of Notre Dame has not been damaged.  
London, Oct. 10.—The Morning Post says it has been informed on good authority that Antwerp has fallen. The official press bureau is unable to confirm the foregoing. A telegram from the Rotterdam correspondent says that a more hopeful view prevails regarding Antwerp. Refugees from the city declare that not a single German soldier has yet entered Antwerp. The Belgian minister is unable to confirm the fall of Antwerp. (The foregoing is an earlier despatch. There is no doubt about the surrender.)

### RUSSIANS TOOK 10,000 PRISONERS

Petrograd, Oct. 10.—A despatch says the Russians took 10,000 prisoners and 40 cannon in the latest fighting in East Prussia.

### LEIPZIG IS REPORTED SAILING TO PANAMA; SHIPPING SUSPENDED

Panama, Oct. 7.—Shipping along the western coast of South America has been almost suspended, owing to the reputed presence in those waters of the German cruiser Leipzig, which is reported to have sunk two British ships in the last week. British lines operating ships from Balboa to the south have withdrawn their sailings, thus delaying the mails for Santiago, Chile and points beyond. Only Chilean and Peruvian boats are now plying to the ports on the west coast. According to reports reaching here, the Leipzig is sailing toward Panama, but it is impossible to verify these rumors.

### EFFECT OF ANTWERP'S FALL

The fall of Antwerp is one of the worst blows in the campaign. There were 150,000 Belgian soldiers in the city, but whether these have surrendered or not is not known. It shows that in attacking fortresses the Germans are supreme. Indeed, this is their strongest point, for in the open field the Allies have proven their superiority.

The German cry will now be "On to London," and that's the very thing the British want. In this attempt they will have to take their navy out and then the "British Dogs" will get a chance. The result in such a case no Britisher fears and it is to be hoped that the Germans will make the try.

The fall of Antwerp, too, will hearten the enemy, but then that is also the very thing that will nerve the British and the Allies. With Antwerp out of the way of course the Germans will have another quarter of a million men to throw against the Allies. This will bring about a new phase of the battle of the Aisne, so that the next few days are pregnant with results for the future world.

### ANTWERP IN FLAMES; NO ATTEMPT TO QUENCH

Paris, Oct. 10.—A light blue German aeroplane approached Paris, but disappeared when chased by the French air sentinels. The Chronicle says that every sign indicates that Antwerp is falling. The town is in flames through the southern section. No attempt is made to quench them.

### MORE SUCCESS FOR THE ALLIES IN NORTHERN FRANCE

Paris, Oct. 10.—The Allies are advancing in Northern France, the war office has proclaimed today. The fighting seemed to be confined to the Allies and the Germans' two wings. Gen. Gallieni, as well as the war office, was the authority for the statement that it was progressing satisfactorily from the Franco-British standpoint.

### JAPS SINK THREE GERMAN SHIPS

Tokio, Oct. 7.—The belief was expressed at the war office today that the German cruiser Cormorant and two other German gunboats had been sunk in Kiauchau Bay. The Japanese army has occupied the Shantung railway as far west as Chinan.

### Election Not Wanted.

Those who have started the talk of a general election in Canada are poor imitations of good citizens. Those who are spreading the talk are as bad. Those who support it are worse. The British Empire is engaged in the greatest struggle of its history, and the first in which the concentrated labor, energy and sacrifice of its units have been needed. To make political capital of the situation is nasty work. If certain members of the Dominion cabinet want a general election, they should recognize, first, that the people of Canada do not want one. Our citizens could not be enthusiastic in a political fight at home when such a war rages abroad. About the causes, justice and stakes of that war, all Liberals and Conservatives in Canada are agreed. We may well be content with the leadership of Borden and the loyal assistance of Laurier. There is no need whatever to celebrate the government's policy with a general election. Whichever party had been in power, the same policy would have prevailed in this time of crisis.—Monetary Times.

Mexico seems to be entering upon the fourth revolution of the current series. Or perhaps it would be more correct to regard the revolt against Carranza as the fourth phase of a continuous revolution. Diaz, Madero, Huerta and Carranza were all revolutionists before they took office. All but the last were despots in office, and Carranza will need to be one if he is to defend himself and what is left of his party. A people who need a dictator and desire a genuine democrat are doomed to many disappointments.

In the opinion of an American contemporary it does not make much difference on which side the balance of crimes and outrages in Belgium falls, since the thing to remember is that such things were not happening there until the country was invaded in spite of a treaty guaranteeing that it should not suffer in that fashion.

There is something to be said for that view. When two aggressive countries go to war there is something to be said for the observance of certain rules of war which resemble those of the prize ring. But a peaceable citizen who is suddenly and wantonly attacked by a burglar or a highwayman is not bound to observe the rules

of the prize ring. He has a right to defend himself in any way that is best for himself and with any weapon that comes handy.

The position of Germany in Belgium was not that of a regular combatant, but that of an outlaw and a criminal, who had broken every rule of international law and international good faith. Having done that, it was not at all likely that the German troops would be squeamish about murdering non-combatants—whether they had given provocation or not. In exactly the same way the burglar who knows he has no business in your house would commit murder rather than be thwarted.—Ex.

### C. P. R. TAKES ON 6,000 MORE MEN

Object to Furnish Employment Before Winter and Relieve Distress.

Montreal, Oct. 7.—Labor conditions in Canada should be considerably improved by a decision of the C. P. R., announced recently, by which the operating departments of its eastern and western lines have been authorized to take on six thousand extra laborers for suitable work during the next two months at current rates of wages. The object of this measure, it is explained by the company, is to help furnish employment before winter and relieve possible distress occasioned by the temporary dislocation of business due to the war.

### A CANADIAN IS WOUNDED.

Montreal, Oct. 7.—W. E. G. Murray, appointed a Canadian Rhodes scholar two years ago while attending McGill University, according to advices which have reached his friends here, has been wounded while bearing despatches in Belgium. Mr. Murray joined the King Edward Horse in London. He was connected with the Montreal Herald and had been engaged in journalism in other parts of Canada. His home is in Vancouver.

## PASSING EVENTS

Alberic Magnard, the French composer, has been killed while defending his house near Nanterre from the Germans. His son-in-law escaped by pretending to be the gardener. M. Magnard was born at Baron, Department of the Oise, in 1865. He composed several lyric dramas, including "Yolande," "Bernice" and "Guereoeur." He was a pupil of Massenet and of Vincent d'Indy.

Since the outbreak of the war H. M. S. Pegasus, working from Zanzibar, has rendered very useful service, including the destruction of the German gunboat Mowe, at the floating docks there. Early on the morning of September 20 she was attacked by the German protected cruiser Koenigsburg while coming to anchor in the harbor of Zanzibar, for the purpose of cleaning and making repairs to her machinery. The Pegasus was taken at a disadvantage, and was somewhat outranged by the newer four inch guns of the Koenigsburg. She was completely disabled, and 25 killed and 80 wounded out of a crew of 234.

Montreal has subscribed a million and a half dollars to the patriotic fund; Toronto and York a million, and other places are also giving generously.

The first disaster in the Australian navy occurred on September 19, when the submarine AE1 suddenly disappeared with all hands. The loss is attributed to accident, as the weather was fine and no enemy within a hundred miles.

President Wilson allowed it to be known that he was prayerfully working for peace in Europe, but indicated that nothing of a definite or formal character had yet been done. He told callers that publication of stories that he would call a world conference to discuss peace interfered with his serious work. The President declared that a world's crisis exists and that only serious remedies should be discussed. There has

been laid before him for consideration a strong appeal that he lead a movement to end the war, presented him on behalf of a million women, members of suffrage organizations in 13 countries, including nearly all those engaged in the conflict. The plea was laid before the President by Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt of New York, president of the International Woman's Suffrage Alliance, and Mme. Rosika Schwimmer of Hungary, secretary of the alliance.

Pope Benedict has sent a despatch to the Emperor of Germany protesting in dignified terms against the ruthless destruction of the cathedral at Rheims. The Pope says this crime cries for God's vengeance. He warns the Kaiser lest the destruction of the Lord's temples provoke the anger of God, against which the most powerful armies are powerless. He has also sent a similar telegram to Emperor Francis Joseph of Austria urging him as a Catholic sovereign to defend his religion.

Brigadier General Christian Frederick Beyers, commandant general of the Union of South Africa's defence forces, has resigned his post because of his disapproval of the action of Great Britain in sending commandos to conquer German Southwest Africa. Gen. Smuts, minister of finance and defence, in his reply to the letter of resignation says plans for operations against German Southwest Africa were made in consultation with General Beyers and that his suggestions were largely carried out. "Your bitter attack on Great Britain," General Smuts says, "not only is entirely baseless, but most unjustifiable, coming as it does in the midst of a great war. Your reference to barbarous acts during the South African war cannot justify the criminal devastation of Belgium, and can only be calculated to sow hatred and division among the people of South Africa." General Smuts refers to the freedom given South Africa by Great Britain, "which allows you to write a letter for which you would, without doubt, be liable in the German Empire to the extreme penalty."

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### CANADIAN TRADE SHOWS BIG GAIN IN SPITE OF WAR

Aggregate of \$100,137,000 Is Reached—Last Year Was Only \$97,832,000.

Ottawa, Oct. 8.—For the month of August, which was the first month of the European war, the total Canadian trade reached an aggregate of \$100,137,000, corresponding month of 1913. This is the outstanding feature of the trade statement issued by Hon. J. D. Reid, minister of customs. While there has been a falling off in the imports, exports show a healthy condition exists in the trade of the Dominion.

During August last Canada exported \$8,780,000 worth of animals and their produce, as against \$4,817,000 for August, 1913. For the five months of the present fiscal year ending August 31 last, the total exports under this head were \$26,063,000, against \$17,190,000 for the corresponding five months of the previous year. There is also an increase in the value of manufactured articles exported. For August last these amounted to \$5,049,000, against \$4,911,000 for August, 1913.

For the five months the exports of manufactured articles were \$26,728,000, compared with \$20,963,000 for the corresponding period of 1913.

Coin in bullion imported into Canada during August reached to the total of \$14,452,000, against \$572,000 for August, 1913. During August \$7,425,000 worth of domestic agricultural products were exported and \$19,924,000 worth of foreign agricultural products were imported.

### LEFFINGWELL BRINGS NEWS OF STEFANSSON

When Ice Broke Up About the Karluk, Captain and Crew Abandoned Her.

San Francisco, Oct. 5.—After a year in the Arctic, where he completed charting the North Alaskan coast, E. De K. Leffingwell of Pasadena, Cal., returned to San Francisco today on the whaler Jeanette.

Mr. Leffingwell journeyed north on the Mary Sachs, one of Stefansson's vessels, and returned with the word that two ships of the Canadian expedition which were frozen last winter near Flaxman Island, thirty-five miles from Leffingwell's headquarters made their way to sea in July and now are on their way to Dominion waters.

Speaking of a visit from Stefansson, Mr. Leffingwell said today: "Early in December I was surprised on answering a knock at my door to see Stefansson stride into my cabin. I had supposed him to be hundreds of miles distant."

"He and several of his party were encamped at Collinson Point and later they sent a dog team to my camp and took me to their headquarters for Christmas. We exchanged several visits after that."

"When the ice broke up about the Karluk, Stefansson's ship, her seams were found open, and she was abandoned, the explorer and his party embarking on one of the other vessels."

Leffingwell says that he believes that land to the north of Canada for which the Stefansson party is searching exists and soon will be discovered.

### DESTROY GERMANS BY AMBUCADE

London, Oct. 7.—"The French, taking a leaf out of the German book, are adopting the ambuscade methods used so successfully by the Germans during the early stages of the war," says Reuter's Paris correspondent.

"When the approach of two German divisions was reported between the Oise and the Somme rivers, French dragoons advanced to meet them, occupying a village. After exchanging a few shots the dragoons retired, drawing the Germans after them as far as a forest, where a heavy force of French infantry had been posted, supported by light artillery."

"When the Germans were drawn into range by the pretended retirement of the dragoons, the French batteries opened and the German columns in panic threw down their arms and fled. In this action the French took 800 prisoners."

### GERMAN BRUTALITY WREAKED ON NURSE SAVING A BELGIAN

Vancouver, Oct. 8.—In a letter received from relatives in England by Mrs. J. B. Brooks of New Westminster a pathetic incident is related. The letter states that a few weeks ago Mrs. Brooks' brother, A. Gooderich, who is a private in the King's Own Regiment, was invalided home, and while crossing the English Channel got into conversation with a nurse who had both arms cut off, and who was on her way home. Although suffering intense agony, the young woman was quite rational and recounted with great clearness and wealth of detail how she had lost her arms in trying to protect a wounded Belgian from the attack of German soldiers. When the Germans saw that she was determined to protect the life of her patient they seized her and with brutal force severed her arms at the elbow. She died before reaching England, states the letter.

### PRECAUTION FOR TROOPS.

Sir Wm. Osler, by desire of the authorities, has issued a bulletin to troops urging the taking of sanitary precautions. He states: "It was formerly said that an army marched on its belly; now it is marched on brains. Bullets are less fatal in war than bacilli. Where one slew a thousand the other slew tens of thousands. Twenty-two thousand lives were lost in the Boer war. Of these 1,800 were by bullets and 14,000 by bacilli. I appeal to each individual soldier to use intelligent co-operation to combat this more deadly enemy. Dysentery, pneumonia and enteric were the three great scourges.

"Only by boiling all water can dysentery be prevented. To stave off pneumonia don't neglect coughs and colds. The most fatal enemy, however, is enteric or typhoid fever. Enteric killed more British soldiers than Boer bullets. It is urged that vaccination against typhoid be carried out."

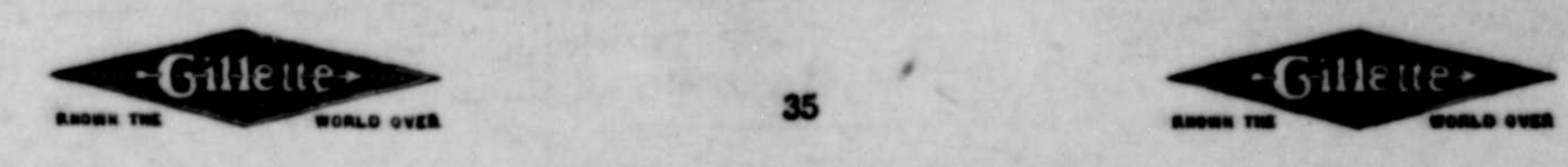

The enthusiastic crowd, following the speech, paraded the streets, and attempts of the police and carabinieri to restrain the people were in vain. At the Montenegro consulate the crowd made a manifestation of sympathy and then marched to the monument of Garibaldi, where other speakers delivered fiery speeches.

Rome, Oct. 7.—Italians from Trent, Austria, who reside in Italy, have petitioned the Italian parliament to complete the work of freeing Italy began by King Victor Emmanuel and Garibaldi. They request that Italy unite to the kingdom the Austrian provinces inhabited by Italians. The petition is headed by Signor Battiste, Socialist deputy from Trent.

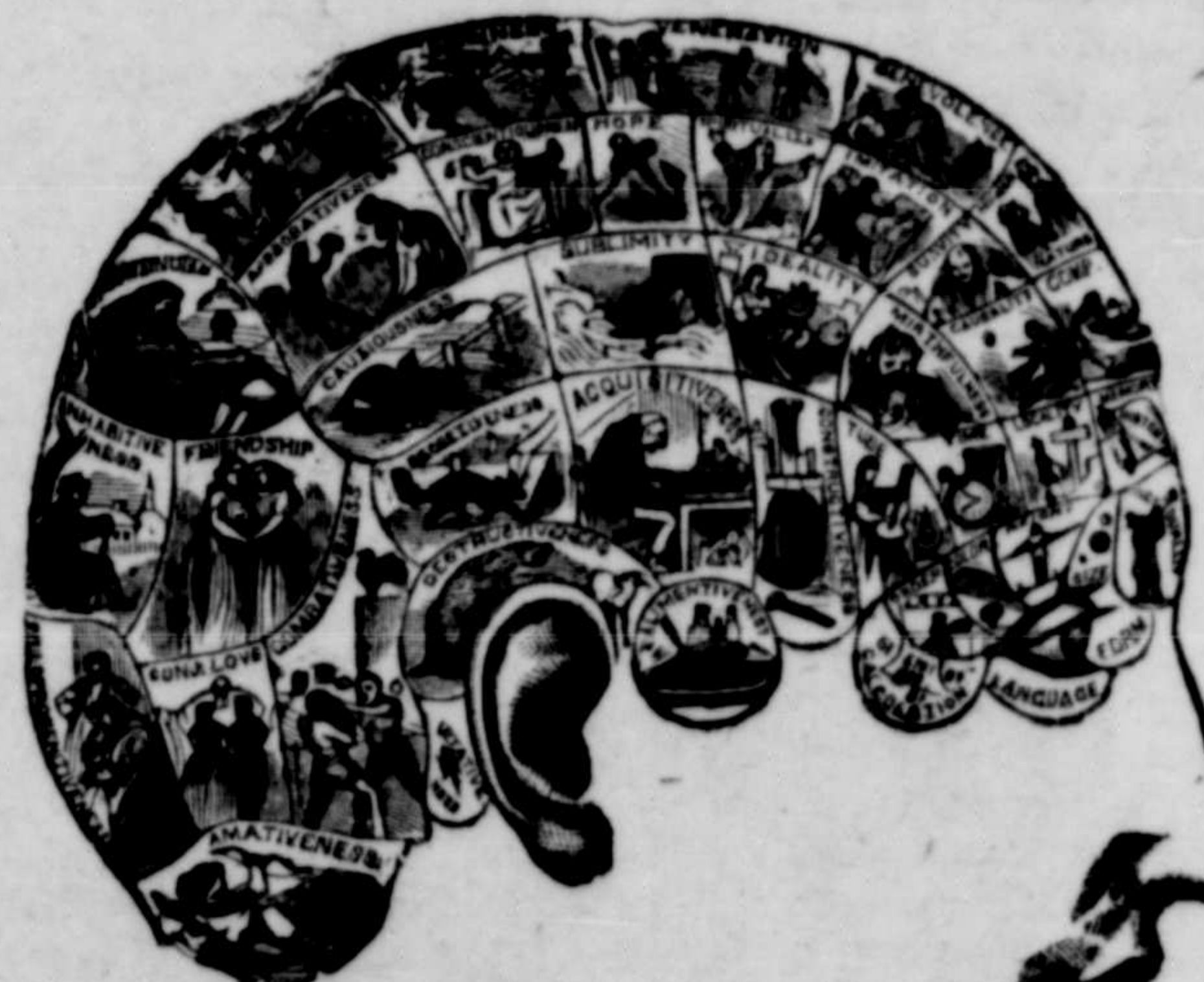
