

Canadians will be glad to learn that Earl Grey's connection is still to be maintained in this way with the Dominion of Canada, over whose destinies he presided as Governor General with such success and distinction. Of course, the distinguished Earl would still have been remembered in Prince Rupert even if the local loyalists had removed his name from the Militia List of Canada. NORTH BEATS SOUTH IN SALMON CATCH

B. C. Catch This Season Is Slightly Behind That for 1913.

Vancouver, Dec. 19 .- Owing to the very poor catches made at the canneries in the Fraser River district, the British Columbia salmon pack this season has fall-Although the Skeena River packing houses had an excellent season; the Naas River canneries turned in their second best catch since 1896; Rivers Inlet more than doubled its output of 1913, and the outlying districts, including the west coast of Vancouver Island and the Queen Charlotte Islands, showed a splendid gain over the previous year, the total catch only reached 1,111,039 cases, compared with 1,353,901 cases in 1913.

Last year the Fraser River canneries had their fourth best season since 1896. The pack aggregated 732,059 cases. 

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HARTLEPOOL CLAIMS DAMAGE TO WARSHIPS BY COAST BATTERIES

One German Light Cruiser Reported to Have Been Afire as Fleet Steamed Away to the North.

London, Dec. 22. - The Daily Telegraph's correspondent in the three bombarded towns gives the following details of the action of the German ships in their locali-

"Hartlepool - The enemy's ships were damaged by the coast batteries, which did considerable harm. One German light cruiser was afire as the fleet steamed away to the north.

"One of the killed at East Hartlepool was Adjutant Wm. Avery. of the Salvation Army, which has headquarters near the sea front.

"Whitby-The vessels steamed close in to Whitby. Their first shot lodged in the side of the east cliff, doing no damage. The range finding of the ships was faulty. and most of the shots fell short. although some of them fell as at Ruswarp, a mile inland, and much damage was done to private houses in Fisburn Park, half mile inland.

"The damage at Meadowfield, a suburb, was chiefly to Curry's school, where the boys had just commenced their morning lessons. They fled from the schoolhouse and took refuge in nearby places of safety.

Made for Sea.
