ONTARIO CABINET SHUFFLE MADE BY NEW PREMIER HEARST

ONE MEMBER OF OLD CABINET IS DROPPED—W. J. HANNA IS APPOINTED ATTORNEY GENERAL—OTHER CHANGES EFFECTED.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Toronto, Dec. 22.—The shuffle in the Ontario Cabinet as the result of Hon. William R. Hearst being called to the Premiership was completed today. The Hon. J. J. Foy, of Toronto North, formerly Commissioner of Crown Lands, was dropped. Hon. W. J. Hanna, formerly sec-

retary and registrar, was sworn in as Attorney General. The Hon. Isaac B. Lucas, minister without portfolio in the Whitney administration, became Provincial Secretary. C. Howard Ferguson, representing Grenville, was appointed Provincial Treasurer, and T. W. Garry, of Renfrew, Minister of Lands and Mines.

LOCAL ASSESSMENT AND THE WAR CRISIS

The question as to whether the present stringency would affect the local assessment was discussed last night by the Council. Some of them thought it might mean a little reduction. Others pointed out that during a crisis was no time to decide this. All the guilt edge stocks on the market had taken a slump. GERMAN IRON CROSS PINNED ON BRITISHER

Paris, Dec. 22.—One of the noblest and at the same time most dramatic stories of battlefield heroism that the war is likely to produce has just reached Paris. It is as follows:

During a recent combat German troops attacked the British trenches but were repulsed. They retired to their own trenches, taking with them their wounded, but one of the latter was overlooked and left behind. A comrade, observing him, left the German trenches to effect a rescue, but was almost immediately killed by the British fire, a score of bullets piercing him.

A British officer, however, realized the situation and, having given the order, "Cease fire," himself went out upon the open to pick up the wounded German. He was struck by several bullets and badly wounded, but the Germans, as soon as they saw what his object was, also ordered the "Cease fire." Thereupon the British officer staggered to the fallen man and carried him to the German lines.

A German officer received him with a salute and, calling for cheers, pinned upon the breast of the British hero an Iron Cross, which he took from his own breast. Then the Britisher returned to his own trenches.

He was recommended for the British Cross for this notable example of chivalry, but succumbed to his wounds.

RECREATION GROUNDS NEED MORE MONEY

More money is required to finish the recreation grounds on the Acropolis Hill. Debentures to the amount of \$30,000 have been sold but as there was a discount of \$4,500 occasioned by the forced sale the remainder was not sufficient to complete the work. The city solicitor reported that it was in the power of the Council to issue further debentures to cover the \$4,500 lost in discount, without referring it to a vote of the people. This will probably be done.

BRITISH AVIATORS RAID ZEPPELIN SHEDS

London, Dec. 22.—British aviators made another raid on the German Zeppelin sheds. Yesterday aviators flew over the sheds at Brussels and dropped bombs on the sheds there, which they set on fire. They returned to their base without any damage.

HAYSPORT DEMANDS SUBJECT OF REPORT

The city solicitor and light superintendent reported to the Council last night on the application of the Haysport people for electric power. Their request was that the city should supply it at their plant.

The report was to the effect that the city had no authority in its charter to do business with points outside the municipality. In the next place, it would cost probably \$50,000 to put up a pole line to convey the power to that point and as the city wasn't very flush with funds the scheme was not feasible.

The first intention of the Council was to receive and file the communication, but after some discussion it was felt that perhaps the company themselves would put up the pole line and buy the power at the city gates. The light superintendent wasn't present but the city solicitor wasn't sure that the city had the power to sell. Nevertheless, it was felt that the negotiations should be left open and it was decided to leave the report on the table and notify the company of the decision of the city. Any further proposals the company has will be considered.

EMPEROR NICHOLAS VISITED CAUCASUS TO INSPECT ARMY

Kars, Trans-Caucasus, Russia, Dec. 16.—Emperor Nicholas reached here December 13 from Petrograd. He was welcomed to the railway station by the military authorities and received with enthusiasm by the people. He drove through the city and visited the local hospital, where he distributed medals to the wounded. Later he looked over the fortifications of Kars and thanked the local commander for the excellent condition in which the fortresses were being maintained.

The following day Emperor Nicholas went to Sarakaiche, which is the head of the railroad leading to the positions occupied by a large proportion of the Russian troops in the Caucasus. Along the line are concentrated large numbers of reserves and supplies of munitions of war and food.

The Emperor in an automobile then proceeded to an army post at the front. Here was assembled a group of soldiers who had won distinction in fighting in the Caucasus. To these men His Majesty personally distributed decorations of the Cross of St. George and thanked them sincerely for the nobles services they were rendering the country.

The evening of December 14 His Majesty left Sarakaiche on his return.

ALLIES STILL ON AGGRESSIVE ATTACK AT VERDUN CONTINUES

WEST END OF BATTLE LINE SHOWS NO ACTIVITY—VIOLENT BAYONET ENGAGEMENT TOOK PLACE IN THE ARGONNE—ACTIVE AT VERDUN.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Paris, Dec. 22.—The French official report says that everything is quiet between the sea and the Lys. Between the Lys and the Aisne the French repulsed a German column, attacking Carency and have continued the forward movement at Blagny.

The attacks of the enemy at Mametz and Lihons have also been repulsed. Violent bayonet engagements have been recorded near Louvain and in the Argonne. The French are still continuing the forward movement northwest of Verdun and the Germans are striving desperately to check this.

GRAND TRUNK BONDS WERE WELL RECEIVED

London, Dec. 22.—The financial market here gave a great response to an issue of the Grand Trunk Railway. The issue was for three years at five and a half per cent with guaranteed notes. The demand was so keen that the lists were closed today ahead of time.

CITY HYDRO-ELECTRIC NEEDS MORE FINANCING

The hydro electric plant will also require considerable financing before everything is paid for. The amount of the first bylaw was quite exceeded in the final estimate. The city solicitor also reported on the question of issuing further debentures on this without referring the matter to the people. It was evident that this was something devoutly to be wished. The city solicitor, however, couldn't bring the needed comfort. The debentures for this work are not yet sold. This project was financed on a "shoe string," the Council evidently feeling that it was the easiest thing in the world to borrow money, which the present stringency has exploded. At any rate, the debentures, not yet being sold, it is not known what discount will have to be given before they can be sold or whether they will have to be given away. Not knowing the amount of the discount required a bylaw cannot be passed to supplement this without the consent of the people. How the predicament will end is what is bothering our wizards of finance.

VON MOLTKE IS SIDE-TRACKED

German Press Not Pleased With Condition of Affairs—Fall of Head of German Staff.

The Hague, Dec. 22.—German newspapers which have just been received here show that the German press, although prohibited strictly from criticizing the acts of the government during the war, is much displeased by the sudden change in the leadership of the German military forces.

In the short biographies of Major General Von Falkenhayne, the papers are permitted to print, they refer, in a most guarded way, to what they term his failure, up to the present time, in the operations on the western front.

"Von Falkenhayne was appointed temporary chief of the German staff on August 25," says the Berliner Tageblatt. He, therefore, has held the position since the fall of Antwerp. During this period have occurred the battles of the Yser and Dixmude.

General Von Falkenhayne then continued the operations in Flanders under direction of the Emperor, with results which are described as not wholly pleasing to the German public.

ASQUITH HOUSE LEASED.

London, Dec. 15.—What is believed to indicate that when Prime Minister Asquith retires it will be to the small villa recently built for him at Sutton Courtney, near Oxford, on one of the backwaters of the Thames, is the fact that the Asquith town house in Cavendish Square has been leased, according to reports today, for a long period of years to Sir Bache and Lady Cunard.

NORTH BEATS SOUTH IN SALMON CATCH

B. C. Catch This Season is Slightly Behind That for 1913.

Vancouver, Dec. 19.—Owing to the very poor catches made at the canneries in the Fraser River district, the British Columbia salmon pack this season has fallen short of the output in 1913, to the extent of over 200,000 cases.

Last year the Fraser River canneries had their fourth best season since 1896. The pack aggregated 732,059 cases. This year the catch was not half that, amounting to but 328,390 cases.

HARTLEPOOL CLAIMS DAMAGE TO WARSHIPS BY COAST BATTERIES

One German Light Cruiser Reported to Have Been Afire as Fleet Steamed Away to the North.

London, Dec. 22.—The Daily Telegraph's correspondent in the three bombarded towns gives the following details of the action of the German ships in their localities:

"Hartlepool—The enemy's ships were damaged by the coast batteries, which did considerable harm. One German light cruiser was afire as the fleet steamed away to the north.

"One of the killed at East Hartlepool was Adjutant Wm. Avery, of the Salvation Army, which has headquarters near the sea front.

"Whitby—The vessels steamed close in to Whitby. Their first shot lodged in the side of the east cliff, doing no damage. The range finding of the ships was faulty, and most of the shots fell short, although some of them fell as at Ruswarp, a mile inland, and much damage was done to private houses in Fishburn Park, half a mile inland.

"The damage at Meadowfield, a suburb, was chiefly to Curry's school, where the boys had just commenced their morning lessons. They fled from the school-house and took refuge in nearby places of safety.

Made for Sea.

"Scarborough—The first bombardment last twenty minutes and then stopped for three minutes while the warships turned on their course. Then it began again and lasted ten minutes, when the invaders made straight for sea at top speed.

"All the damage done here was to buildings which were without the slightest military value. There are plentiful signs of the German visitation, such as unroofed houses, shot-pierced steeples and holes in walls. Several of the central thoroughfares are littered with wreckage. There is hardly a house in the central part of the town that escaped a few broken windows."

ITALY TO BE READY IN SPRING WITH AN ARMY OF A MILLION

WHOLE NATION DESIRES TO ASSIST IN "THE DESTRUCTION OF THE BARBARIANS," SAYS ITALIAN IN LONDON—EXPLAINS ATTITUDE OF NATION

London, Dec. 18.—Why Italy has remained neutral so long is a question which has often been asked here and discussed from various points of view. That she cannot refrain from taking part very much longer, now that Turkey has come in, is a widely expressed opinion. But Italy seems to be in no hurry. She is biding her time, and when the time comes to strike she means to strike hard.

Here is the opinion of an Italian now in London, who is cognizant of the inner workings of the Italian diplomatic mind. Italy, he believes, will take her place beside the Allies in the spring.

"The strength of Germany is truly appalling," he says. "Nevertheless she has made a grave miscalculation. In reckoning on the lightning rapidity of her action she expected to wipe out France in a month, and to subdue Russia in two months. Today the situation is much changed, and for the worse as regards Germany."

Expects No Russian Victory.

While the Germans have been checked and driven back in France and Belgium, he is not so sure about the permanence of Russia's check in the eastern field of warfare, nor does he look in that direction for "great and decisive victories." But even if Germany were to advance into Russia, "the greater," he believes, "will be the disaster in the wake of Germany. And all this time the army is diminishing, sickness is rife; it is becoming exhausted, while both soldiers and civilians must eat. Corn is becoming consumed and victuals will become scarce, and how is Germany going to replenish? She must conquer quickly, very quickly—in fact, immediately. A protracted campaign spells her prostration, effacement, starvation.

"In the spring the German army will have lost half its force—if not more. It will, however, still be a terrible force. All the more reason why this sinister Power, which is the curse of the whole world, must be destroyed once and for all, never to rise again in coming centuries. If Germany emerges victorious, woe to the other nations. We must overcome, humble, and wipe out Germany now and for all time. And this task is reserved for the Allies now fighting, and in particular England, and Italy, Roumania and the Balkan States; and possibly, too, for Spain.

All Italy Wants War.

"And once and for all regard this as certain. All parties in Italy, all men, laymen and priests, pray for, loudly invoke, desire war on Austria and Germany. You will find that when the Chamber reassembles this month every deputy will clamor for war—in the spring. No government can stand against the nation that is desirous of assisting in the destruction of the barbarians. Perhaps for the moment it is as well that Italy holds aloof; the Germans

are still terribly powerful; by springtime they will be much weaker, and then will be the time for the addition of a million fresh, well trained troops, because rest assured that Italy is now arming slowly but surely.

"England is preparing for the spring at least a million men. Italy will by then have for certain another million ready. A third million can be expected from Spain, the Balkan States and the colonies. That will mean the beginning of the end. The most terrible battles will be fought on the plains of Westphalia, in the environs of Berlin. It will be the moment for England to assume her position as the head of the world. This war is for her a question of life or death."

LEFT \$50,000 TO SERVANT.

Mrs. Buchard's Only Daughter Joined a Church Order in 1885.

New York, Dec. 17.—To her servant, Tillie Anderson, Mrs. Catherine A. Buchard, who died last August at 489 Herkimer St., Brooklyn, left an estate valued at \$50,000. A clause in the will, which was made on January 9, 1896, and was filed for probate yesterday, said the domestic was made the beneficiary because Mrs. Buchard's daughter, Cora Josephine, had left her in 1878 to become a sister in an order of the Protestant Episcopal Church against her mother's wishes.

The daughter was regarded as dead because nothing had been heard from her since her departure. The estate goes to Miss Anderson during her lifetime, and at her death is to revert to Daniel D. Whiting, son of ex-Mayor Whiting of Brooklyn, who was Mrs. Buchard's counsel.

Mrs. Buchard's will was drawn in the office of Almet F. Jenks, now presiding Justice of Appellate Division. Justice Jenks said last night he recalled the will, but he did not remember under which it was prepared and signed. He was unable to say whether the daughter of Mrs. Buchard was still living.

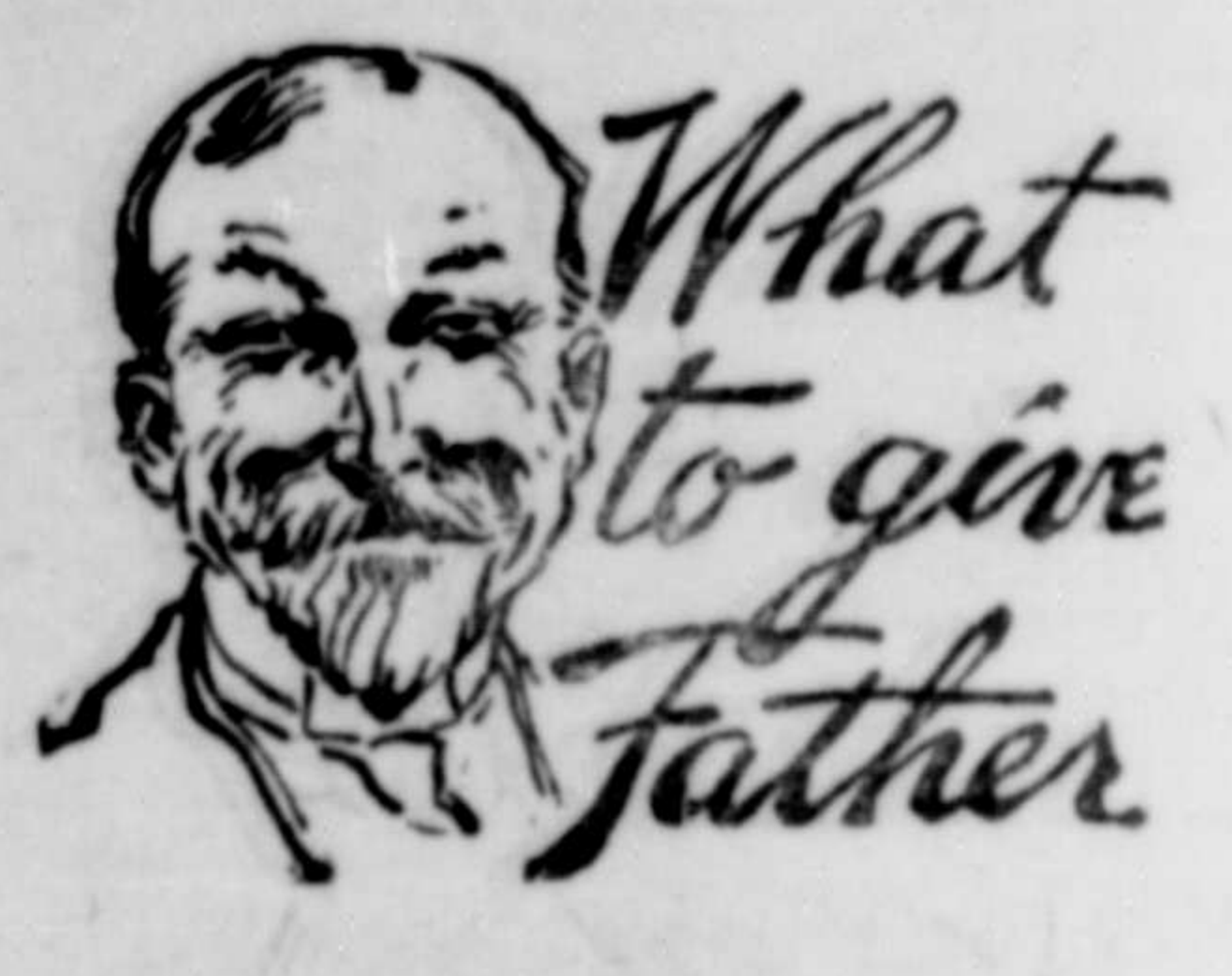
