## GERMANS SHOW HATE TO UNITED STATES

### MARTIN'S PAPER CEASES PUBLICATION--MAKES BITTER CHARGE ON ROBT. KELLY

#### MARTIN CALLS KELLY GRAFTER--- KELLY RESENTS VIGOROUSLY

MARTIN HAS DEPOSITED \$1,000 WITH BANK OF MONTREAL AND ASKS KELLY TO COVER IT--LOSER'S MONEY TO GO TO HOSPITAL.

Vancouver, April 21.—Joe Martin's paper, the Evening Journal, ceased publication last night. It had published just forty-three issues. The immediate cause of the suspension is said to be a lack of funds.  
**Exciting Charges.**  
The Journal went out in true Martin style. The last issue contained a bitter attack on Robert Kelly, alleging that he was a grafter and that he was in with the McBride government and the supply agent of the P. G. E.

**Calls His Bluff.**  
Kelly today deposited a cheque for \$1,000 with the Bank of Montreal, which he announces he will forfeit if the charges can be proven. He also announces in an advertisement on the front page of The Sun that he has thrown his books open for audit and gives Joe Martin forty-eight hours to cover his cheque on condition that the loser's money goes to the hospital. Kelly asks him either to do this or admit that he is a "lying and contemptible coward."

#### REFUSED UNION BOOKS AND WAS DYNAMITED

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Erie, Pa., April 21.—Samuel Leonoff and wife were killed by a dynamite explosion in their home today. Twelve others were injured. Leonoff was secretary of the longshoremen's union and had refused to give up the books owing to a dispute in the accounts.

#### NO DECISION ON GENERAL ELECTION

Ottawa, April 19.—No definite decision as to a general election is likely to be made by the government for some time to come. Should a June election be decided upon, dissolution will probably occur about May 1. Owing to the absence from the capital of several ministers, including Hon. Messrs. Rogers, White, Cochrane, Hazen and Casgrain, the matter has not been considered by the government since Parliament prorogued.

### VANCOUVER PROVINCE SCORES BORDEN'S VOTES FOR SOLDIERS

#### RIDICULES IDEA OF DRAGGING SOLDIERS OUT OF TRENCHES TO VOTE — THINKS CANADIAN STATESMEN SHOULD NOT WASTE THEIR TIME THUS.

Academically speaking, the idea of giving the Canadian soldiers at the front a vote at a general election, if that happens to take place during their absence, may be excellent, but to the ordinary citizen the spectacle of our legislators spending a lot of valuable time arguing about it at Ottawa seems rather puerile. Obviously the soldiers will not vote if there is no general election, so that it would see this anxiety to provide them with the rights of free citizens is the real basis for the supposition that there will be a general election this summer.

But supposing there is a general election the extraordinary spectacle of paid civil servants of the Dominion of Canada gravely pursuing the Canadian soldiers through the trenches and taking their names and aforesaid residence in order that they may register a vote is a spectacle which would make the Gods on High Olympus shriek with laughter. There have been many humorous incidents in this war but surely none can be more humorous than the passing of special legislation in order that the patriotic citizens who have for once been able to break away from all politics and do some honest fighting for their country, should be dragged

to the polling booths in "some place in France or Flanders" in order to register their vote for some unknown gentleman in Canada who aspires for political honors. Surely the latter in Canada attaches more importance to himself than the former in the trenches is likely to accord him. What on earth will it matter to the man who is fighting for his country and using every ounce of his energy for the purpose of getting the war over whether there is a general election in Canada? On what sort of great issue can the general election turn to make it of sufficient importance to worry the poor beggar at the front who has managed to escape the bullets and bayonets of the enemy only to fall into the snare of the ballot taker?

Imagine for one moment the expression on the face of one of the Canadian soldiers who possibly comes from the United States or Scotland, when a civilian-clad person taps him on the shoulder and asks him whether he has voted yet? The only possible corollary to the futile demonstration which has been taking place at Ottawa is that the members who desire the votes of the soldiers should pay their own expenses to

#### GERMANY ANGRY WITH STATES--- HOPES JAPAN WILL FIGHT THEM

#### GENERAL LULL ON WESTERN FRONTIER AND FEELING THAT TRENCH FIGHTING IS NEAR AN END--GERMANS TO ASSIST IN CARPATHIANS.

London, April 21.—There is a lull on the Belgium-France lines. The Germans are moving men and munitions to the Carpathians. It is believed that the trench fighting is near an end. The Berlin papers are delirious with joy over reports of devastation and terror in England as a result of the Zeppelin raids. The hope is expressed that the United States and Japan will engage in war over the Turtle Bay incident. They say that as the States

has forfeited the German love they deserve to taste the bitterness of war.

**EDITORIALS**

The stand taken by the G. T. P. with regard to the site for a city fish wharf is hardly worthy of a company that must expect to reap most of the benefits. Indeed, it doesn't seem possible that they were serious in the proposals that were put before the Council Monday. Mr. Morley Donaldson, general manager and vice president of the company, was represented as saying that his company would be glad to assist with a cash donation if it were not that financing was so difficult. In the next breath we are told that the G. T. P. will give a five-year lease to the city but they insist on getting 6 per cent per annum on its valuation as a rental, which is considerable, especially as the city is finding it hard to even find the money to build the wharf.

It has been contended that the government has fixed the rental at 6 per cent, but that is only the maximum charge. The government very wisely and apparently very necessarily insisted that no more than 6 per cent could be charged but there is nothing to prevent them from giving it free or making any charge less than 6 per cent that they wish. It is again

contended that it would be setting a precedent to give away leases at less than 6 per cent and that others would want a similar rate. Well, this is not an individual or a private corporation that is seeking rights, so why should anybody come along a little later and ask for similar terms? Surely the city of Prince Rupert can be placed in a class by itself.

But the fact of the matter is that the city is offering to do what the G. T. P. should have done long ago themselves if they had used ordinary business foresight. What nonsense it is to build a costly road into this part of the country and then fail to go after the business that naturally belongs to them. When they refuse to build a fish wharf in order to induce the fishermen to come here they are cutting off the channels of revenue which they must have in order to exist. They contend, of course, that the strenuous times prevents them from getting the necessary funds. Well, if the city is willing to assist why shouldn't they come half way and offer a free site? Not only is this good business, but it is ordinary common-sense.

If this proposal of theirs is

to be taken seriously, the G. T. P. cannot find fault with a feeling that is getting very general, that there is a great deal of incompetence in many departments of the service. Most of the local men exhibit a willingness, not only to provide a popular service, but to assist in the development of this port, but they seem to be hampered by "the man higher up." The G. T. P. should have a man stationed in Prince Rupert who was big enough to have complete sway over every department without having to refer it back to Winnipeg and Montreal. It is only by having a man on the ground who knows the local conditions and who has sympathy with the aspirations of the people that conditions can be established that will give local satisfaction and make every man a booster for the company.

It's an old-fashioned idea that a company can prosper and ignore the good will of the people. Modern business is beginning to understand and appreciate the psychological element as never before and no wide-awake company would ever think of creating an unnecessary discord with their employers or with their customers. A man who is in perfect harmony with his employer is worth a dozen who cherish a grudge. The same applies to the public. In a hundred ways will its value come back to the corporation or individual that takes pains to please the people. That's something the G. T. P. haven't yet learned and which they must learn before they ever pay a cent of dividend on the great investment they have in this railroad.

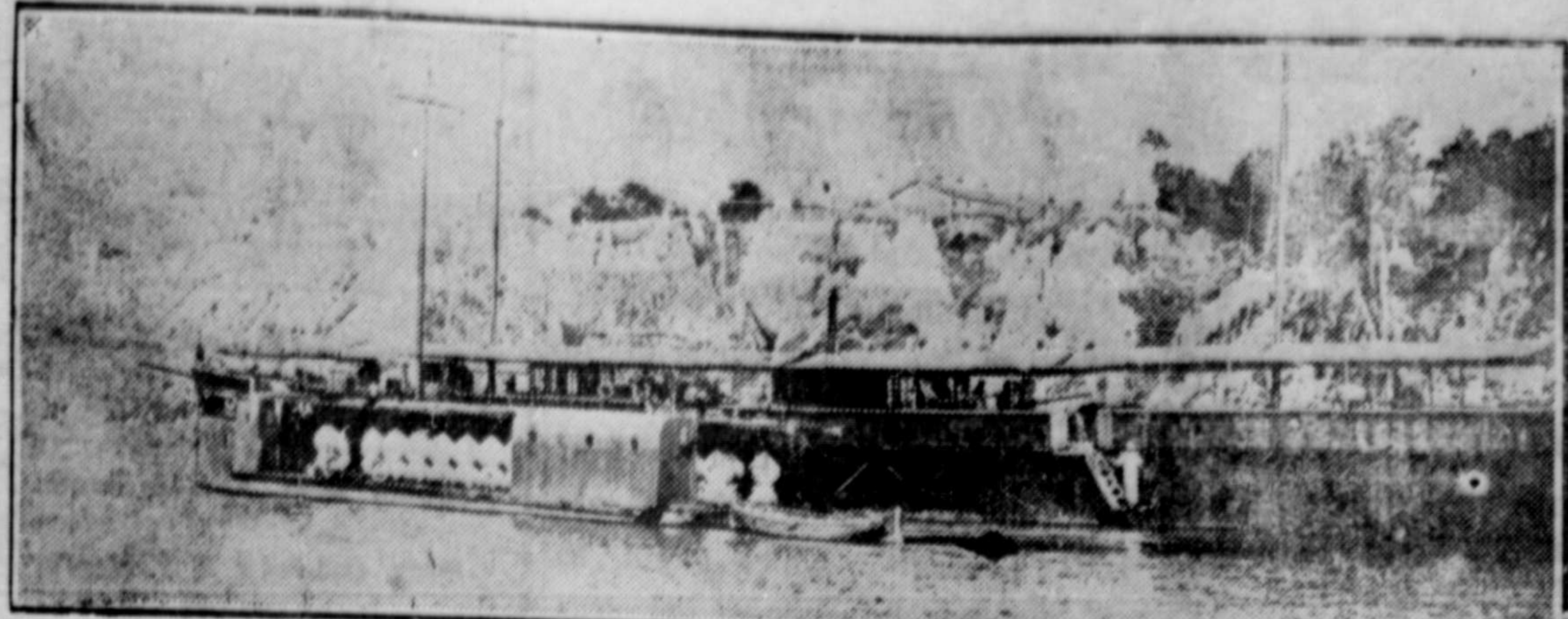

## FOE FAILS TO PAY LOAN.

**Germany Holds Back \$30,000,000 Bulgaria Wanted.**

Paris, April 20.—Germany has failed to pay to Bulgaria the portion of the loan she agreed to remit April 1, according to a Sofia special to the Petit Parisien, which says it is believed Germany distrusts the Bulgarian attitude and suspects she already has decided to join the Allies.

When it was announced in February that negotiations had been completed for a loan of \$30,000,000 to Bulgaria by German and Austrian bankers it was stated that no political conditions were attached to the arrangement, but it was regarded as significant that Bulgaria had refused the proffer of a similar loan made several months before by the powers of the Triple Entente.

1. WHEREAS the Corporation of the City of Prince Rupert is incorporated under an Act entitled the "City of Prince Rupert Incorporation Act, 1910,"—B. C. Statutes 1910, Chapter 41:

2. AND, WHEREAS, by Resolution of the Council of the said Corporation authority was given to stake water rights on the North Arm of Wark Channel:

3. AND, WHEREAS, the said Corporation has applied for a water licence to divert water from Thulme River, a tributary of the said North Arm, for power purpose:

4. AND, WHEREAS, the said corporation has, after due notice, petitioned for the approval of its undertaking as far as it relates to the said application for a licence:

5. AND, WHEREAS, no objection has been filed to the said petition:

6. THIS IS TO CERTIFY that the undertaking of the said corporation in so far as it relates to the said application for a licence is approved, subject to the terms and conditions of the "Water Act, 1914," and to the following additional terms and conditions:

This certificate shall not in any way be deemed to be an approval of the plans of any works covered by the proposed undertaking or to authorize the construction of such works, but shall have the effect only of a certificate issued under the provisions of Section 81 of the "Water Act, 1914," and shall be subject to such provisions, and to the rights of the Continental Power Company under an application filed on the 18th day of August, 1908.

13. This certificate shall become null and void without any notice unless a further certificate as required by Clause 10 hereof be applied for before the 1st day of June, 1917.

the front and go and get them. Fancy them making speeches on whether Hon. Frank Oliver did or did not make \$147.55 or some such sum on a certain tract of land outside Edmonton. The terrific peroration which might be indulged in by some of our orators just at the moment the audience was told off to take a village held by the Germans would be lost to posterity in the whine of shells. Presumably each member will want to take a reporter with him so that nothing may be lost of the valuable contributions which may be made to political literature.

To add to the glorious humor of the whole proposal, it was also suggested that it should only be allowed if Lord Kitchener gave his consent. The Prime Minister stated that this would be a serious interference with the autonomy of Canada but surely he is making a mountain out of a molehill. Lord Kitchener presumably will have to give his consent before the votes can be taken or else how will those who will be responsible for the farce get to the front? Supposing that at the moment when place the general advance is also taking place, will the election or the advance be postponed until such time as the troops have the time and opportunity to vote?

The absurdity of the whole thing is so plain if it is once realized that it is extremely unlikely that the great majority of the men at the front will have the faintest notion what the election is about. Under ordinary conditions when they are in Canada probably not more than 33 per cent of them ever vote or take the slightest interest in politics.

There is no need to suggest depriving them of their vote because they are at the front. Let it be announced by the Canadian headquarters that there is an election on in Canada and that anyone who desires to vote can write a postcard specially provided for that purpose with the one word Liberal, Conservative, Socialist or Labor on. He can cross out the party for which he does not desire to vote and send the postcard to Ottawa. But imagine the bother in the middle of a war of finding out where the man comes from and who happens to be running in his constituency. Judging by the casualty lists a great many of the voters have no constituency in Canada. Pity the poor officer who is in charge on election day.

Well, well, well—Major General Samuel Hughes must have his little joke, we suppose, and possibly at Ottawa they appreciate that sort of humor better than we do in the West. We suggest that Hilliam's Follies do not lose such an excellent opportunity for a skit.—Vancouver Province.
