RUSSIAN FORCE TO AID ANGLO-FRENCH

FRENCH CRUISER SUNK BY TORPEDO

BAYVIEW HOTEL BURNS DOWN-- MANY GUESTS LOSE EFFECTS

FIRE TOOK PLACE THIS MORNING ABOUT 9 O'CLOCK--ORIGINATED FROM STOVE IN UPPER ROOM--FULLY COVERED BY INSURANCE.

The Bay View Hotel is no more. It took fire this morning about 9:30 and was so badly gutted with fire that it is useless and might as well have burned to the ground. The fire seems to have started in one of the upstairs front rooms occupied by Mrs. Babington. A fire was lighted in the room every morning and this was done today as usual, so that the origin of the fire can clearly be traced to the stove in that room.

About 9:30 a representative of The News was on the way to the train, when a lady coming up from the wharf shouted that the building was on fire. At that moment heavy smoke was coming out of both upstairs windows. The News man rushed to the telephone of the Bay View to give the alarm but the lock of the door

was out of order and the door had to be broken through. It seemed to take about ten minutes to locate the fire department but finally they were located and a few moments later the firm alarm spread the story.

Both fire engines started for the scene of action and it seems that as fate would have it, both of them balked on Second Avenue in front of the government buildings and it took quite a long time to get the water turned on the fire.

In the meantime the alarm was given to the occupants of the hotel. Mrs. Emmonds, Mrs. Babington, Miss Keeler, Miss McNaughton and Miss Whitley were in the dining room at breakfast entirely innocent of the fire. Miss Woodyard was dressing in her room upstairs and although she heard the crackling of the fire she thought it was in the hall stove and congratulated herself on having a nice warm fire to greet her.

A few minutes later the cry of fire was ringing through the halls and everybody was excited and trying to save something from their rooms. Miss Whitley, Miss Woodyard and Mrs. Emmonds saved the most of their personal effects. Miss McNaughton and Mrs. Babington were not able to reach their rooms at all as they were a blaze of fire at the time the alarm was given. Messrs. Heward, Calloway and Thompson also lost all their belongings.

London, April 29.—The Germans have again failed in their great attack on Ypres and the Yser Canal, although there is still much activity at the front. Yesterday they had won ground across the Yser Canal and were only forced back by the most stubborn fighting and contesting every foot of the ground.

German Losses.
In this concentrated attack, in which a million men were engaged, the Germans have had tremendous losses. The British artillery mowed them down in heaps. In the Bruges hospital alone there are 7,200 wounded Germans. It is impossible to estimate the number of killed but it is believed to be very great.

Air Fighting.
An interesting part of the fighting was that of the air craft,

which took an exceedingly active part and fought on a large scale. The British and French aviators did great damage to the German railway stations.

French Success.
The official announcement tells of the capture of several German trenches and six quick-firing guns by the French at Het Sos. In another place the French took six guns, two bomb throwers, much war material and several hundred prisoners. At a single point near Ypres where the Germans faced the French lines there are 600 dead Germans on the field.

Fresh Troops.
Fresh French troops are being rushed to West Flanders and Northern France. All the train service north of Paris is given over entirely to the carrying of soldiers.

EDITORIALS

The use of asphyxiating gas by the Germans is something new in warfare. It is a great deal simpler and very much more humane to put a man to sleep than to shoot him, but in the case of the Germans it appears that they put him to sleep only that they may bayonet him with greater ease. The manner in which the gas is administered is not clear from the meagre information to hand, but it is likely from exploded shells. The first mention of it was when the Germans apparently accused the British for the use of it, although there is no evidence that they had done so. At any rate, there is no secret about it and either side can use it, if it becomes a recognized method of warfare. In case both sides begin its use the tide of battle will depend upon the way the wind is blowing.

The use of this gas revives the stories recently told about the deadly gas of which the British held the secret and which was so destructive that they decided not to put it into practice. The story went on to say that a whole army could be snuffed out in a moment by a few puffs of its fumes. How much there is in the story it is difficult to say, but the general impression it gives seems to imply the color of a myth. If such a gas could be employed there does not seem to be any very sound reason why it should not be employed. If its destructiveness could be dem-

onstrated even once, no more bullets would be used and the Germans would soon sue for peace. Indeed, in reality it would be a godsend for it would mean the end of war as we know it now. In all probability, however, the story is without foundation.

One can easily understand and appreciate the anger of the Canadians when they found the Germans bayoneting their asphyxiated comrades. An asphyxiated man is already in the power of his foe and the proper procedure is to take him prisoner. To turn on him with the bayonet in his helpless condition is nothing less than murder and murder is a capital offence. When the Canadians, therefore, turn on the Germans and refuse them quarter it becomes a just punishment for their heinous crime. War, of course, is itself a crime but once the object sought is attained there can be no excuse for additional cruelty. A few lessons like that given by the Canadians may bring the Germans to their senses.

The possible duration of the war is the one topic that interests everybody. Not only would it be a relief to feel that no more men would be butchered on the field of battle but the prosperity and welfare of the world is hanging in the balance. Looking at both armies at present there is nothing to indicate that the end is near. The Germans are as

strong as ever and have millions yet to fall back on. Unless a shortage of ammunition will affect them, there is nothing to prevent them pursuing the war for a few more years, at any rate. The Allies, of course, are stronger than ever, and there should be no fear of the Germans making another successful offensive campaign. Put on the defensive, however, they can probably hold out for considerable time. It will be some months yet before it will be safe to predict the possible duration of this terrible conflict.

ITALY NOW WANTS MORE CONCESSIONS

London, April 27.—It is now an open secret that Italy has been promised by Austria and Germany, as the price of her neutrality, the Italian provinces of Austria, and no more.

Until a month ago, Italy was content with that, but when it became apparent that the Allies intended to finish Turkey-in-Europe, Italy put forward a claim to Smyrna city and province and a number of Turkish islands, as well as a slice of the Austrian territory on the Adriatic.

It is not believed, however, that the Allies intend that Italy shall have any of the territory of Turkey-in-Asia. Smyrna will go to either Greece or France. It is to big a prize to add to the price of Italian assistance.

MORETON FREWEN ADVOCATES FISH COLONY NEAR TO RUPERT

TELLS BRITISH PEOPLE OF GREAT POSSIBILITIES OF FISHING BUSINESS NEARS THIS CITY—SAYS SEA IS PACKED WITH HALIBUT OFF COAST.

Prince Rupert is getting a lot of good advertising through an article contributed to the London Daily Telegraph by Moreton Frewen. The article is now being sent around in circular form, a number of them having been received by Harrison, Gamble & Co., of this city. It is reproduced herewith:

"Already the problem of the disabled or partially disabled soldier and sailor is under discussion. The writer ventures to think that any centralized scheme will break down. In the case of the complete disability the sufferers must be cared for by the State, but the partially disabled fighter and his dependents, what is the future of these? Then, also, there will be large numbers of adventurous spirits, untouched, but equally disabled after this prodigious awakening from returning to the unambitious routine, whether of the shop or domestic service. In touch on the battlefields with the overseas sons of the Empire, there is not a corner of that Empire but they will presently recruit it.

"First as to the partially disabled. These will get no doubt liberal pensions, and the question arises how to make the pensions go the farthest. And next how to make the private benevolence which will be lavished on these, best link on to the pension. Many people are asking these questions today, and there will be many replies. I venture to advance one with stong conviction. There should be organized communal settlements and on the salt sea.

"Of all the primary industries the sea fisheries are by far the most profitable, and the one-armed or one-legged man makes an excellent and patient fisherman. The colony on the seaboard has also the advantage of whatever else it produces for sale, such as potatoes, hay, the fertilizers from burned seaweed, of a cheap water freight to the nearest town. I could give a score more reasons were it necessary why practical philanthropists should establish their colonies by the 'loud-sounding sea.'

A Profitable Industry.

"First, as to the profits of the great ocean pastures, common to all. In the United States and in Canada the Government Departments of Fisheries collect very careful statistics of the yield of the fisheries. In the Atlantic fisheries of Canada there are 60,000 people connected with the fisheries. It is there a short season—only four months. The capital employed, ships, boats, nets, etc., is only \$400 per capita; but the gross value of the catch one season with another averages \$300. In Lake Huron, again, 431 fisherman earn \$560 per capita, and in a six months' season,

language that will seem credible to the lay mind. It was declared in a statement issued by the Senate at Washington that the daily fish consumption by the big Pribyloff seal herd, since very largely killed off, was 8,000 tons a day. Possible as the seals are further reduced, sea fish, notwithstanding the increasing activity of the fisherman, will still further increase. It is estimated that in our Scottish waters the gannet today takes more herrings that all the devices of man.

"Paved With Halibut."

"The writer was coming south by steamer from Prince Rupert recently with one of the contractors for the Grand Trunk Railway. Mr. S. pointed to one of his railway camps in the jaw of the harbor, and said: 'I have an old Scotch fisherman there; he put out a deep sea line the other night and in the morning had 3,000 pounds of halibut on his many hooks.' 'I think,' said Mr. S., 'the ocean here is just paved with halibut,' as, indeed, it is. Herrings and cod, halibut, salmon, and crabs are in endless profusion. Sir Richard McBride, the Premier of British Columbia says: 'Experiments have established that an hour's trawling on the Atlantic coast of Canada will yield more fish than six hours in the North Sea. British Columbia's fisheries are immensely more productive than those of the Atlantic. Our fisheries would support 1,000,000 people.' Mr. Stirratt, for many years manager of the New English Fish Company at Vancouver, when giving evidence before a committee of the Legislature, said: 'Off the Queen Charlotte Islands, in the vicinity of Prince Rupert, herrings are so plentiful that with an ordinary scoop net a man can load a boat very quickly.'

MORETON FREWEN ADVOCATES FISH COLONY NEAR TO PRINCE RUPERT

to America and to England of that vast ocean brought so close to our market by the opening of the Panama Canal, and also of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway. In those hundreds of sheltered and almost land-locked harbors and in that vigorous, equable climate is a happy hunting-ground for countless families from these congested islands. Wherever the community locates itself, there the shore must be cleared of timber, and the cost of building what a correspondent of mine describes as a 'pretentious bungalow of four rooms and a bathroom' is only \$500. There has already been opened in Prince Rupert a very large cold storage market, where halibut and salmon can now be sold across the counter for 2d a pound. The Dominion government is also constructing at Rupert the largest drydock on the Pacific Coast—a dock that will receive a warship with a displacement of 20,000 tons and of a length of 600 feet. The present monthly wage disbursements in this vast dock are \$20,000. Bearing in mind the high rate of wages earned by the artisan class now engaged on the construction of this new City of Rupert, namely, 12s to 18s a day, there exists already a great and growing market for any produce which can be grown by the soldier settler on the many fertile islands just off the coast.

"And I might add one further word—an appeal to the cupidity of the benevolent. If care is taken in the selection of a good harbor, perhaps on the north shore of Graham Island, a colony of 200 soldiers with their families will form the nucleus of a new town, certain to grow fast; cert.
