## FIERCE FIGHTING ON AT THE DARDANELLES

### GERMAN SHIPS BOMBARD DUNKIRK--NEW ATTACK ON YSER CANAL REPULSED

#### NEW ATTACK ON DARDANELLES-- ALLIED FLEET ENTERS NARROWS

FIGHTING ON LAND SAID TO BE FURIOUS — FIVE THOUSAND  
TURKISH PRISONERS TAKEN — ALLIES MAKING  
GOOD PROGRESS.

Athens, April 30.—The greater part of the Anglo-French fleet has entered the Dardanelles and has renewed the bombardment. They have been furiously bombarding the forts at the Narrows and continuing the bombardment throughout the night.

**Allies Win on Land.**  
On land, the Allies have been making good progress. They have occupied the towns of Maitos and

Gallipoli and have taken 5,000 prisoners, who have been brought to Tenedos and Lemnos. Additional forces were disembarked at Gallipoli at dawn. The land fighting on both sides of the Dardanelles is said to be terrific.

**Meeting Success.**  
London, April 30.—The allied ships are now at Vrysey fronting the Chanak forts eight miles up the straits. They are making a furious attack on the forts.

#### VANCOUVER GERMANS TO DETENTION CAMP

Vancouver, April 30.—Four local Germans, Baron Von Luttwitz, Dr. Otto Grumert, Paul Koop and Frederick Spritzel have been arrested and sent to the military detention camp. It has been found that they are the parties who celebrated the recent Canadian casualties in a house in Point Grey.

#### PROTESTS AGAINST HOLDING ELECTION

Toronto, April 30.—At a public meeting held in Burwash Hall, Victoria University, to "protest against the dissolution of Parliament this year," and "against the holding of a Federal election while the war is on," two resolutions were advanced, drafted originally to be sent to Premier Sir Robert Borden, protesting against any intention to bring about an election, was amended after several speakers had contended that party press and party followers had been responsible for the threatened election, and it was resolved to send it also to the leader of the opposition, Sir Wilfrid Laurier. The second resolution declared that other public meetings to protest against holding an election should be held throughout the country.

The resolution as adopted was moved by Chancellor Bowler, seconded by Mrs. L. Hamilton. It was resolved:

"That in the opinion of this meeting there should be no election in Canada before the close of the year 1915, unless the war is previously ended, in order that in the meantime the government may have the support of the entire nation and may give its undivided attention to helping to bring the struggle to a successful end.

"That this involve on the part of the opposition a friendly co-operation in the present crisis and that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the Premier, Sir Robert Borden, and the leader of the opposition, Sir Wilfrid Laurier."

Chancellor Bowler, who spoke first, confessed to the "inbred sin of party feeling," but maintained he had placed such considerations behind those of the weal of nation and empire. He called upon all to see that "the promise made for a general election shall not come through."

Amongst those who spoke were A. E. Ames, R. D. Fairbairn, A. C. McDonald, Prof. M. G. Wrong, Mrs. L. A. Hamilton and Miss Constance Boulton.

#### GERMAN FLEET ATTACKS DUNKIRK AND ESCAPES WITHOUT INJURY

TWENTY CIVILIANS KILLED AND FORTY-FIVE INJURED BY  
BOMBARDMENT—SAID TO BE BOLDEST RAID  
OF THE WAR.

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Paris, April 30.—The German fleet stole out again last night and made another raid. This time they attacked the coast of France. They bombarded the city of Dunkirk, nineteen shells being thrown

into the city, killing twenty civilians and wounding forty-five. The attack is said to have been one of the boldest of the war. After bombarding the city they left in the greatest hurry and apparently returned unhurt.

#### BRIGANDS LOOT AND KILL IN SMYRNA

Syracuse, Sicily, April 29.—Travelers arriving here from Asia Minor say the situation in Smyrna is terrible. They state that bands of Mussulman brigands are committing all kinds of outrages, pillaging, burning property, killing and taking hostages. Persons bringing this report say the Europeans in Smyrna urgently ask the assistance of the United States cruiser Tennessee, now in Eastern waters, or any other force or influence which America can exercise.

#### VANCOUVER MINISTERS MAKE ATTACK ON THE M'BRIDE GOVT.

ISSUED PAMPHLET CALLED THE CRISIS, IN WHICH THEY SET  
FORTH CONDITIONS IN THE PROVINCE — WILL  
AFFECT PUBLIC OPINION.

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Vancouver, April 30.—A great sensation has been created here by the part taken by the local ministerial association in the attack on the McBride government. A pamphlet entitled The Crisis has been issued by that body showing in plain words the conditions that exist in this province under the present government.

**Charges Graft.**  
Straight charges of graft are made against several of the ministers of the Crown as well as that of misfeasance of office. The fact that an independent body like the Ministerial Union has taken this stand lends a tone of seriousness to the charges and will have an important bearing on the opinion of the country.

#### GERMAN WIRELESS "STEPPED UP" OVERNIGHT

New York, April 30.—The big Telefunken wireless station at Sayville, Long Island, the plant through which the German government transmits most of its official communications to the United States, and through which the German embassy communicates with Berlin, has been quietly, almost overnight, so to speak, changed from a 35-kilowatt plant into one of 100 kilowatts. Three 500-foot towers are ready to be placed in position, and probably before the end of next week the new and more powerful apparatus will be working.

The transformation of the Sayville plant into one of the most powerful of the transatlantic communicating stations in this part of the world has been carried on so quietly that very few persons outside of the radio officials of the Department of Commerce and a few naval officials connected with the wireless naval service have known what was being done.

The new plant has not yet been licensed by the Department of Commerce, but there is no reason to doubt that the license will be granted as soon as the station is ready for operation.

**Dead Unburied.**  
Paris, April 30.—Sixteen thousand unburied bodies lie on the battlefields between the coast and Ypres. Neither side will grant a truce to bury the bodies. Determined efforts are being made to prevent an epidemic of cholera.

#### TOOK ESCAPED SHIP.

## EDITORIALS

A full-page advertisement appeared recently in many American daily papers containing a protest against the sale by the United States of munitions of war to belligerents, and signed by a host of names of publishers of foreign newspapers in the United States. That page of solid names must have made many an American sit up and do some thinking. He would be astonished at the number of these newspapers, printed in all languages and exerting an influence about which he knew nothing—about which nobody in particular felt called upon to know anything.

That page of names thrust on the notice of the American people may have an effect far different from what the Austrian publisher, who is president of the society to which all these foreign publishers belong, had in view when he secured the signatures to the protest he wished to make. His object was to serve Germany and Austria. Those countries could not get munitions in the United States owing to the British fleet. Therefore the German scheme was to arouse American opinion to declare against selling munitions to any belligerents, and to do this as a peace-loving people with strong humanitarian views.

The protest failed, of course, because the American people are not as easily duped as the German schemers supposed they would be. President Wilson replied that Germany was as free to buy munitions in the United States as Britain or France, but if she is unable to do so and get the goods home that is not the fault of the United States, and the Republic would not take such action as would equalize Germany's disadvantage in that respect.

But long after today many an American will remember that

solid page of the names of foreign publications whose owners could, at a moment's notice be brought forward in solid phalanx by German agents to advocate Germany's interests against those of the United States as represented by the President and the Washington government. The American-Americans will want to know more about that great array of foreign publications, what they are for, and what they are favoring in American affairs. Are they helping in the work of assimilating foreigners; or are they retarding it? In a serious article the Springfield Republican says:

"Of the hyphenated press it is needless to speak, because its motives are too apparent. If the New York Staats-Zeitung tries to stir up hostility toward Japan, it is because Japan is England's ally, and therefore Germany's enemy. Of the extent to which these trouble-breeding forces have been at work in recent years the typical American has little conception; only the perfect freedom of the press in this country has made possible such systematic efforts to injure our relations with friendly powers. In Germany such a thing is unthinkable; it is but a year or two since the Norwegian explorer, Amundsen, was refused permission to lecture in Berlin because he was to speak in a foreign language."

These people abuse the liberty of the country they dwell in. They take advantage of a free country to war against freedom and to assist absolutism in its efforts at conquest. But the man of whom the Springfield editor speaks as "the typical American" has had much food for thought since August last, and will be influenced for years to come by what he has learned.

## AUSTRIAN PEACE IS NOT DESIRED

London, April 29.—The Daily Mail's Warsaw correspondent sends to his paper a long statement from a "high authoritative source," in which the possibility is discussed of an early conclusion of peace with Austria.

"Although the air is full of such stories and the indications show that Austria is desirous of an instant and lasting peace," the statement says, "it must be understood that if Austria ceased to be a belligerent her position as a neutral would mean that she would be able to offer as great, if not greater, obstacles to the succession of Russian arms as if she remained a belligerent."

"The Russian plan of campaign is now definitely based on Grant's despised American Civil war theory of a continuous extension of battle line. It is necessary that Russia possess herself, temporarily at least, of the Austria-German frontier line from Cra-cow westward. Grant failed to hack his way through, although he had the preponderance of five men to his opponents' two, which is a greater preponderance than we can hope to attain. But he kept extending his line until one day the foe failed to get him and was outflanked."

From the same source the correspondent says he learns that recently there have been two conferences between Emperor William and Emperor Francis Joseph and Archduke Eugene of Austria, at which a possible separate peace for Austria was discussed.

**CERTIFICATE OF APPROVAL.**

1. WHEREAS the Corporation of the City of Prince Rupert is incorporated under an Act entitled the "City of Prince Rupert Incorporation Act, 1910,"—B. C. Statutes 1910, Chapter 41:

2. AND, WHEREAS, by Resolution of the Council of the said Corporation authority was given to stake water rights on the North Arm of Wark Channel:

3. AND, WHEREAS, the said Corporation has applied for a water licence to divert water from Thulme River, a tributary of the said North Arm, for power purpose:

4. AND, WHEREAS, the said corporation has, after due notice, petitioned for the approval of its undertaking as far as it relates to the said application for a licence:

5. AND, WHEREAS, no objection has been filed to the said petition:

6. THIS IS TO CERTIFY that the undertaking of the said corporation in so far as it relates to the said application for a licence is approved, subject to the terms and conditions of the "Water Act, 1914," and to the following additional terms and conditions:

7. Any licence issued under said application shall, notwithstanding the issue of this certificate, be subject to adjustment by the Board of Investigation:

8. The said undertaking has been divided into two parts, the first part consisting of the surveys of such of the works proposed in the said application for a licence as the Comptroller of Water Rights shall consider necessary, and the second part consisting of the construction, maintenance, and operation of such works.

9. The surveys required under the first part shall be commenced on or before the 1st day of June, 1915, and the plans thereof shall be deposited with the Comptroller of Water Rights on or before the 1st day of November, 1917.

10. The second part of the undertaking shall not be commenced until a bylaw under the provisions of which the said Corporation propose to carry out the undertaking has been duly passed and approved, nor until a further certificate of approval under Section 83 of the "Water Act, 1914," has been issued.

11. The territory within which the said Corporation shall exercise its powers in respect of the use of the said water is the City of Prince Rupert.

12. This certificate shall not in any way be deemed to be an approval of the plans of any works covered by the proposed undertaking or to authorize the construction of such works, but shall have the effect only of a certificate issued under the provisions of Section 81 of the "Water Act, 1914," and shall be subject to such provisions, and to the rights of the Continental Power Company under an application filed on the 18th day of August, 1908.

13. This certificate shall become null and void without any notice unless a further certificate as required by Clause 10 hereof be applied for before the 1st day of June, 1917.

**ITALY'S ATTITUDE  
FORESEEN IN 1890**

Rome, April 30.—The Giornale d'Italia, of Rome, has published a document of great historical importance—the report sent by Cardinal Agliardi when Nuncio at Vienna in 1890 to Cardinal Rampolla, the Papal Secretary of States.

The Triple Alliance, now practically dead, was on the point of being renewed in 1890, and the late Pope Leo XIII was striving to prevent its renewal, in order that Italy should remain isolated. Accordingly Cardinal Rampolla sent confidential instructions to the Nuncio at Vienna, Monsignor, afterward Cardinal, Agliardi, whose report, now published for the first time, sounds almost like a prophecy.

"The object of the Triple Alliance," wrote the Nuncio, "is to guarantee European peace and to defend the three contracting states from attacks by possible or probable enemies. Italy, a young nation and full of life, will not remain an indifferent onlooker when conflicts arise which threaten her interests, but she will bargain for her intervention and will join those who make the most profitable and advantageous offers. It is natural, therefore, that Germany and Austria should spare no effort to have Italy by their side, since otherwise Italy would join Russia and France.

"There are two drawbacks in the Triple Alliance for Italy. One is that Italy is compelled to keep up a large standing army, which weakens her economically, and the other is that the Triple Alliance sanctions Italy's spoliation of the Pope's temporal power. The first drawback is not due exclusively to the Triple Alliance, since even if Italy remained isolated or joined other powers she would have to have an army all the same. As regards the temporal power of the Popes, which

trials deny that this is guaranteed by the Triple Alliance, since they merely accept an accomplished fact which it does not follow they approve. The Pope would have been justified in protesting against the Triple Alliance if any power was willing to restore to him the lost temporal power which the Triple Alliance prevented.

"As a matter of fact, however, such a contingency never will happen. France has no interest in meddling with Italian politics and it is evident from the principles she professes and the declarations she made that she is unfavorable to the restoration of papal temporal power. It is certain that France would conclude an alliance with Italy instead of Germany and Austria. It is not right, therefore, to say that Germany and Austria are the gendarmes of the Pope's captivity, because without the Triple Alliance the Pope would be in the same condition."

It was no doubt due to the Nuncio's failure in detaching the central empires from Italy that all hope of the restoration of temporal power gradually was given up by the Holy See. Strangely enough, what the late Cardinal Agliardi predicted as inevitable in case of Italy's isolation is happening now despite the Triple Alliance, when Italy is on the point of joining the Allies against the central empires.

**WOMAN MASQUERADES  
AS MAN FOUR YEARS**

Holyoke, Mass., April 29.—The death of Miss Florestine Albertine Beaudoin revealed that she had been disguised as a man for four years. She resided with her sister, Mrs. Mary La Chappelle, and as "Albert Beaudoin" worked in paper mills here. The only motive suggested for her masquerade is that she could earn more as a man for the support of herself and her sister, who is a widow. Her death was due to heart trouble.

**KRON PRINZ WILHELM  
UNDER COAL CHUTES**

Newport News, Va., April 29.—The German auxiliary cruiser Kron Prinz Wilhelm, which put in here for repairs two weeks ago after her raiding cruise, has been towed to a coal pier. She will take aboard between 3,500 and 4,000 tons of bunker coal, it was stated at the pier.

**AVIATOR'S GOOD TRY.**

San Francisco, April 29.—Valiant effort on the part of Harry Christofferson, an aviator, who circled above an overturned boat here yesterday and dropped a dozen or more life preservers to men struggling in the breakers, was unavailing to save their lives. Four men were drowned.

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
