ANTI GERMAN RIOTING AT VICTORIA, B. C.

GERMANS MAKE AIR RAID ON ENGLAND—RUSSIANS SINK TURKISH TRANSPORTS

GERMAN AIRMEN DROP BOMBS ON SOUTHERN ENGLISH TOWNS

INCENDIARY BOMBS FIRE HOUSES AND LUMBER YARD—FOUR WOMEN KILLED—ONE AEROPLANE BROUGHT DOWN AT PITSEA.

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, May 10.—While England was mourning, Germany launched an aerial attack at 3 p. m. today.
Aeroplanes and Zeppelins bombed several towns with incendiary bombs. One aeroplane was brought down at Pitsea. Several women were killed at Southsea.
Four Zeppelins dropped fifty bombs on Leigh, near Southend. Several houses were fired but meantime there are no deaths. A lumber yard was fired at Shoeburyness, and bombs were dropped on Romford, but none of the women reached London.

AUSTRIANS FROM INTERIOR FOR DETENTION CAMP

About 150 Austrians were brought in from Fort George last night, and escorted on board the ship George by a squad of the Fusiliers under Lieutenant King.
They looked a good deal happier, and more comfortable, than the majority of their fellow-countrymen in Europe will be these days. The government will send them to a detention camp at Balmuccia.

PARSONS' SONS.

SOLDIER SUICIDES AT VANCOUVER

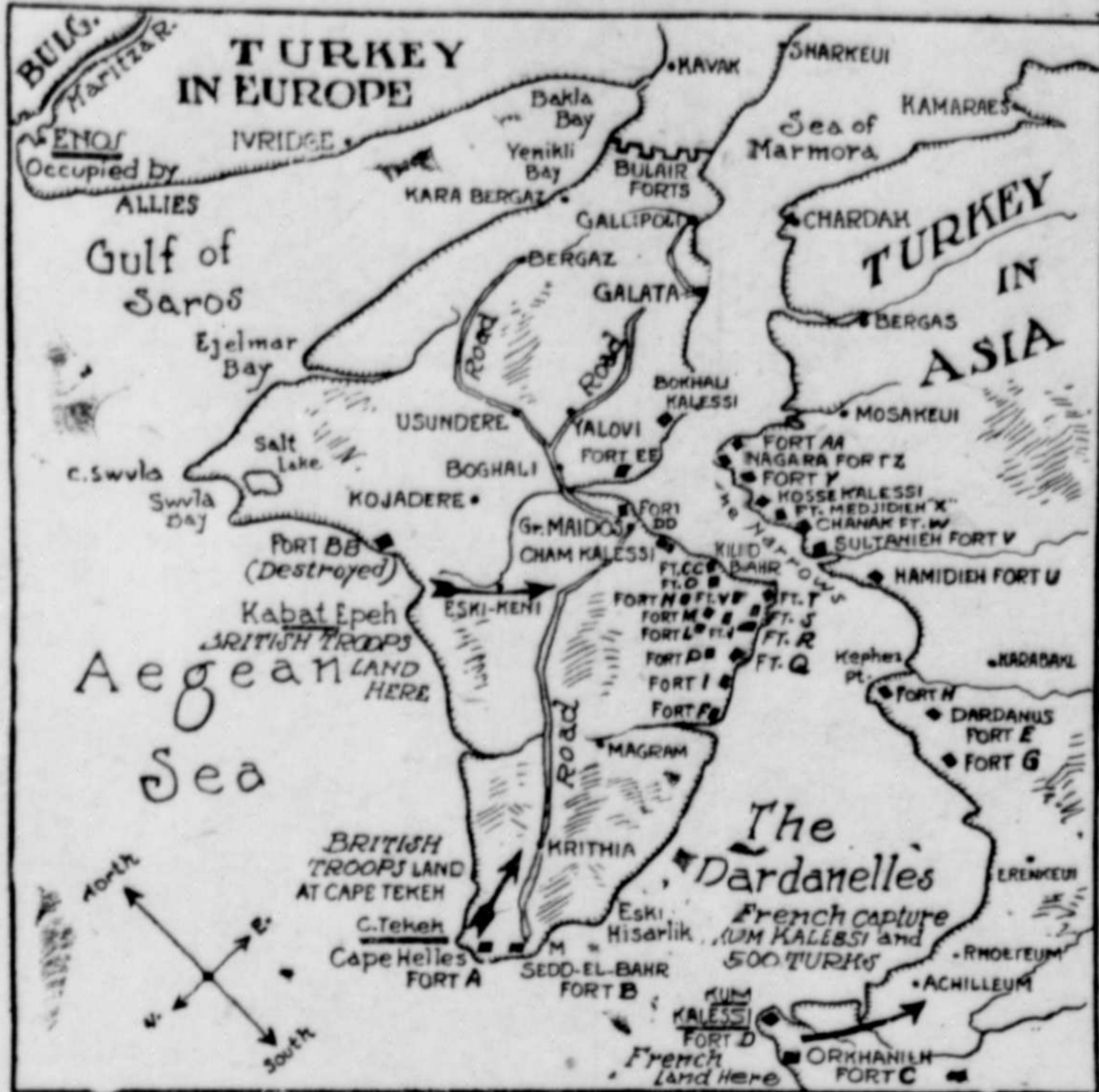
Private Thompson Hunter, of the 29th Battalion, shot himself with his rifle at Hastings Park, Vancouver, yesterday afternoon.

TROOPS LAND AT THE DARDANELLES.

This map shows some of the difficulties in the way of the Allies' armies and navies in the Turkish campaign. British and French troops have been landed on both sides of the entrance, the British on the north shore and the French on the south or Asiatic shore. The French advanced, taking Kum Kalessi and five hundred Turks. Constantinople claims they and the British were driven back to the coast. The same claim is made as to the British force that landed at Cape Tekeh on the tip of the peninsula of Gallipoli. The map indicates the battleground.

BRITISH SOLDIERS DIG THE GRAVES AND CARRY COFFINS—NO TRACES OF MISSES ALLAN—REV. GUVIER SAW SUBMARINE.

CREW OF PROGRESS HAVE EXCITING TIME

Two brothers of the captain of the American halibut schooner Progress, which arrived here yesterday, had a thrilling experience on the banks.

They were working in a dory, when a squall struck them, upsetting the boat and throwing them into the sea. Both were exhausted when rescued and the crew had quite a time bringing them round. The dory was lost.

JAPAN CANCELS MOVE AGAINST CHINA

Tokyo, May 10.—The government announces that all naval and military movements against China have been cancelled.

Queenstown, May 10.—British soldiers are digging three great graves for the unidentified dead of the Lusitania.

A hundred of the victims were buried yesterday. The coffins were carried by soldiers, and the townspeople stood uncovered as the long procession made its way to the grave.

There is no trace of the Misses Anna and Gwen Allan, daughters of Sir H. Montague Allan, Montreal director of the Allan Line. Lady Allan is prostrated with grief and shock.

Saw Submarine.
The Rev. Mr. Guvier, one of the survivors, says he saw a submarine come up three yards from the ship, survey the disaster and disappear again.

TOURIST CAMP FOR JASPER PARK, ALTA.

Montreal, May 10.—The Grand Trunk Pacific has received so many enquiries respecting the accommodation to be obtained at Jasper Park, through which the trains are now running, that it has determined to create a tent city in the heart of the park, which is 5,000 square miles in extent and comprises the heart of the Rockies, lakes, rivers, waterfalls and scenic wonders to delight the eye.

The ultimate thought is to build a great modern hotel in the park; but in the meantime there will be summer tents for sleeping, marquees, in which meals will be served; while the Federal government has provided shelter houses. All this is temporary. It is believed that the park (situated at the southwest corner of Alberta, close to Mount Robson) will attract hundreds of tourists this year, while it will be the playground for thousands in the near future.

RUSSIANS SINK SIX TURKISH TRANSPORTS

Paris, May 10.—Six Turkish transports have been sunk in the Bosphorus and two in the Sea of Marmora by the Russians.

FIERCE ANTI-GERMAN RIOTING IS THE RESULT OF THE LUSITANIA DISASTER

PROPERTY OF PROMINENT GERMANS IN VICTORIA SMASHED---FIREMEN REFUSE TO QUELL DISTURBANCE---MARTIAL LAW DECLARED

TWO RUPERT MEN ON THE LUSITANIA

It is feared that there were two men from Prince Rupert on the Lusitania. George Smith and Wm. Bennett, formerly carpenters at the drydock here, left for their homes in Scotland intending to sail on the ill-fated Cunarder. Smith was single and a native of Buckie, Scotland, but Bennett had a wife and six children in the Scotch city of Dundee. It is not yet known whether they perished.

BASEBALL PUGS FINED.

Manager Herzog, of the Cincinnati Nationals, and Umpire Rigler, of the National League, were fined \$5 and costs in the St. Louis Police court for fighting at a recent St. Louis-Cincinnati game. The fines were remitted on payment of costs. Neither Herzog nor Rigler appeared in court.

Throughout the English-speaking world feeling is running high against the Germans as a result of the dastardly attack on the unarmed Lusitania. In Canada and in England riots are reported, and in Washington fears are entertained for the safety of the German ambassador.

Washington Report.
Washington, D. C., May 10.—An armed guard is protecting Von Bernstorff and the German embassy.

From Liverpool.
Liverpool, May 10.—The torpedoing of the Lusitania has caused anti-German riots here. Shops owned by Germans have been wrecked, the windows broken, and contents scattered.

The police made twenty arrests and had to use their batons to restore order.

From Victoria.
Victoria, May 10.—There has been a recurrence of anti-German riots. The Mayor read the Riot Act and martial law was proclaimed, after the firemen refused to turn the hose on the crowd when ordered to do so.

Crowds smashed the bars of the

Kaiserhoff and Deutscher Verein Hotels, and attacked the stores of Simon Leiser, Moses Lentz and Carl Lowenburg, the former German consul.

LEO FRANK WILL BE SENTENCED TO DEATH

Georgia Courts Will Soon Resume Jurisdiction of the Famous Murder Case.

Atlanta, Ga., May 10.—A petition filed here by the State in the Supreme Court for the resentencing of Leo M. Frank will not be acted upon until the case is restored to the jurisdiction of the State court from the Federal tribunal, according to announcement by Presiding Judge Hill.

Judge Hill explained that when the Supreme Court's mandate on Frank's habeas corpus appeal, which was denied, is made, the judgment of the Georgia Federal Court, the State will resume automatic jurisdiction, after which Frank will be produced before him and again sentenced to death for the murder of Mary Phagen.

NO ELECTION.

It must be a relief to all to learn that the Dominion Cabinet has decided that there will be no election until "near the close of the war." This is no time for party strife, with its petty bickerings. The united mind and energy of Canada, and of the Empire, must be concentrated on one thing only—the shattering forever of Prussian savagery.

This does not mean, however, that certain members of the Borden government, through their friends, are to be allowed a free hand in robbing the people of Canada on every purchase of war supplies. Canada's share of this great business of freeing the world of a malignant militarism must be done along economical, businesslike lines.

It is the business of the government, and of the opposition, to see that the people of Canada get the right goods at the right price. The politician who accepts illicit commissions is a traitor, and is, if possible, more despicable than the man directing the German submarine piracy.

The opposition has all along sought to co-operate with the government in conducting Canada's share of the war, but, co-operation in wholesale, treacherous robbery is the last thing to be expected of a man of the stamp of Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

POINTS OF VIEW.

Everything depends on the point of view. The manufacturer of war material will tell you that things are good; the jewelry manufacturer will tell you they are bad; the grocer will admit that things would be moderate, if collections were better; the real estate man will declare that the bottom has dropped out of everything. These men are perfectly honest in their opinions, but their view is naturally limited.

As with men, so is it with nations. Forty years ago Prussian militarists began to dream

of Germany as the great world power. In that time Germany has taken a foremost place in the sciences, music, philosophy and commerce, but along with this splendid development has grown up the hydra-headed monster of militarism, with its dreams of conquest. Europe must be Germanized, whether it will or not. It is for the benefit of Europe ultimately, and the end must justify the means. Continuous dreaming of this ideal has shut out the view of everything else.

Today we have German militarism gone mad; mad because of the thwarting of the end of its forty years of scheming and dreaming. The Allies have fought according to the rules of war, but they must now realize that they are not fighting an ordinary foe. They are fighting a madness which knows no law; an insanity which honestly believes itself sane.

Armed or unarmed, every British ship will be torpedoed if possible; therefore every liner should have guns and expert gunners, and every known protection against a submarine foe. On land, rules must to a certain extent be abandoned. A pugilist tackling a murderous lunatic would not strictly observe the rules of the ring, and the troops of the Allies are exactly in the same position.

"LIFE OF LINCOLN" AT MAJESTIC THEATRE

SEATTLE WRITER DEALS WITH PRINCE RUPERT FISH TRADE

RAILWAY AND MARINE NEWS OF SEATTLE SHOWS ALARM AT PROSPECT OF PACIFIC COAST FISH TRADE COMING HERE.

The May issue of The Railway and Marine News, published in Seattle, devotes nearly three pages to an article on "How to Hold the Halibut Industry to Seattle." The writer states that the Puget Sound halibut industry has shown improvement in recent years, but that its decline will be marked very soon, unless it receives forceful aid from the government.

The article goes fully into the recent order-in-council by the Dominion government, showing how Prince Rupert is going to gain a huge slice of the halibut business unless some drastic action is taken by Seattle packers and shippers. The writer claims that the trade will continue to follow the old lines if the United States government will place an import duty of one cent per pound on bulk fresh halibut from or via points in British Columbia destined to points in the United States.

At the same time he admits that "the shorter run to Prince Rupert will permit vessels to make about five more trips per year than could be made to Seattle, the additional gross earnings for the year on a vessel of ten tons net registry would amount, approximately, to \$3,000."

This all goes to show once more how alarmed Seattle is at the prospective moving of this industry to Prince Rupert. Already we have ample evidence of the change. American boats which have come in here have sold their fish at good prices and are bound to return. Yesterday afternoon

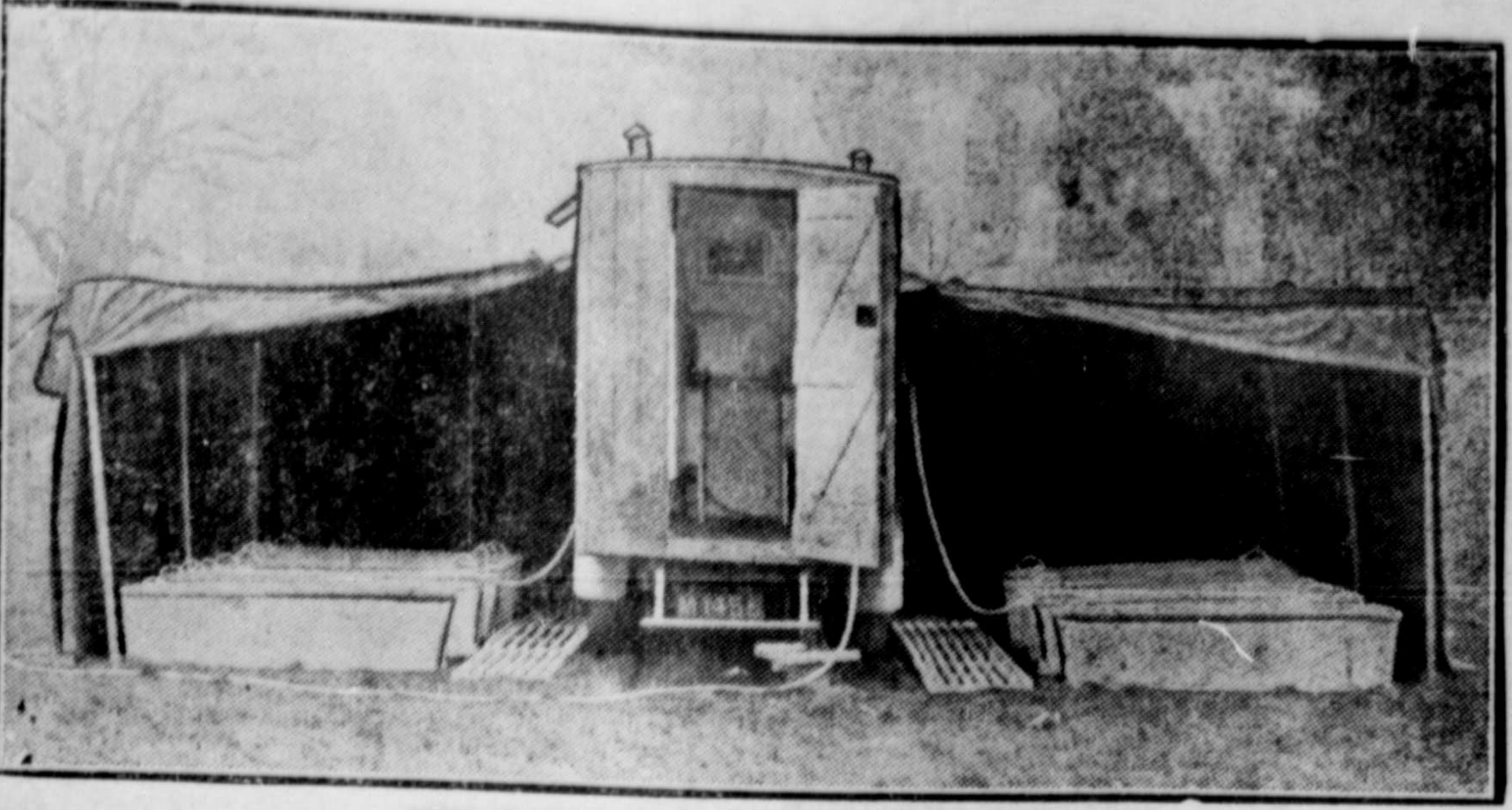

GERMAN EXCUSE FOR USING DEADLY GASES

The Frankfurter Zeitung, in its defence of the employment of the asphyxiating gas bombs, asks whether the enemy really believes it makes any difference whether hundreds of guns and mortars and hundreds of thousands of grenades of all calibres are thrown into a small district, tearing away every living thing to pieces, and making the German trenches an inferno, as at Neuve Chapelle, or whether the Germans fling grenades that spread gas not more deadly than the poison of the English explosive, but spreading over a wider area and obtaining its end more quickly and without the pain and suffering of torn bodies.—Ex.

SMITH-DORRIEN DISCUSSES TERMINATION OF STRUGGLE

Montreal, May 8.—Discussing the duration of the war in an address he delivered to the officers and non-commissioned officers of the Canadian contingent upon their removal from Neuve Chapelle to Ypres, General Smith-Dorrien said:

"No one can say definitely when the war will end. As you know, we are optimistic out here, and rightly so. I do not say the war will end in one or two months, but I think I can promise you that there will not be another winter campaign. We know that Germany's reserves of fighting men are nearly exhausted. They have one more reserve to draw on; when this is trained and put in the field they will have used every available man. We are satisfied of this; so is General Joffre."

WANT OF CONFIDENCE—IN KAMLOOPS MEMBER

Kamloops, May 10.—J. P. Shaw, member of the legislature for Kamloops and one of the members of the joint Indian commission as well, with a special act of Parliament to enable him to draw remuneration which the Independence of Parliament Act would have precluded him from doing, had the unique experience of having a vote of want of confidence in himself passed by a meeting of his electors at Heffley Creek last week.

The meeting was one called by his own party in connection with his campaign for re-election. W. H. Johnston was in the chair, and the member was the principal speaker, taking the platform after ex-Mayor J. T. Robinson, of Kamloops, had spoken. There were a number of ladies present, and many of the audience were interested in the suffrage and local option movements.

Mr. Shaw maintained that though the Liberal platform planks were excellent, the Conservative party had placed many of them on the statute book. He insisted, for one thing, that the Conservative party had always and still favored a non-partisan civil service.

This statement aroused caustic criticism, and many pertinent questions were asked, to which no satisfactory replies were even attempted. His remarks upon the policy of prohibition met with scant favor from the strong temperance party present.

W. R. Austin, at the close of the address, made some pungent comments upon the Conservative record and proposed a vote of "no confidence in the government or the member for this riding, "all of whom should retire from the political arena."

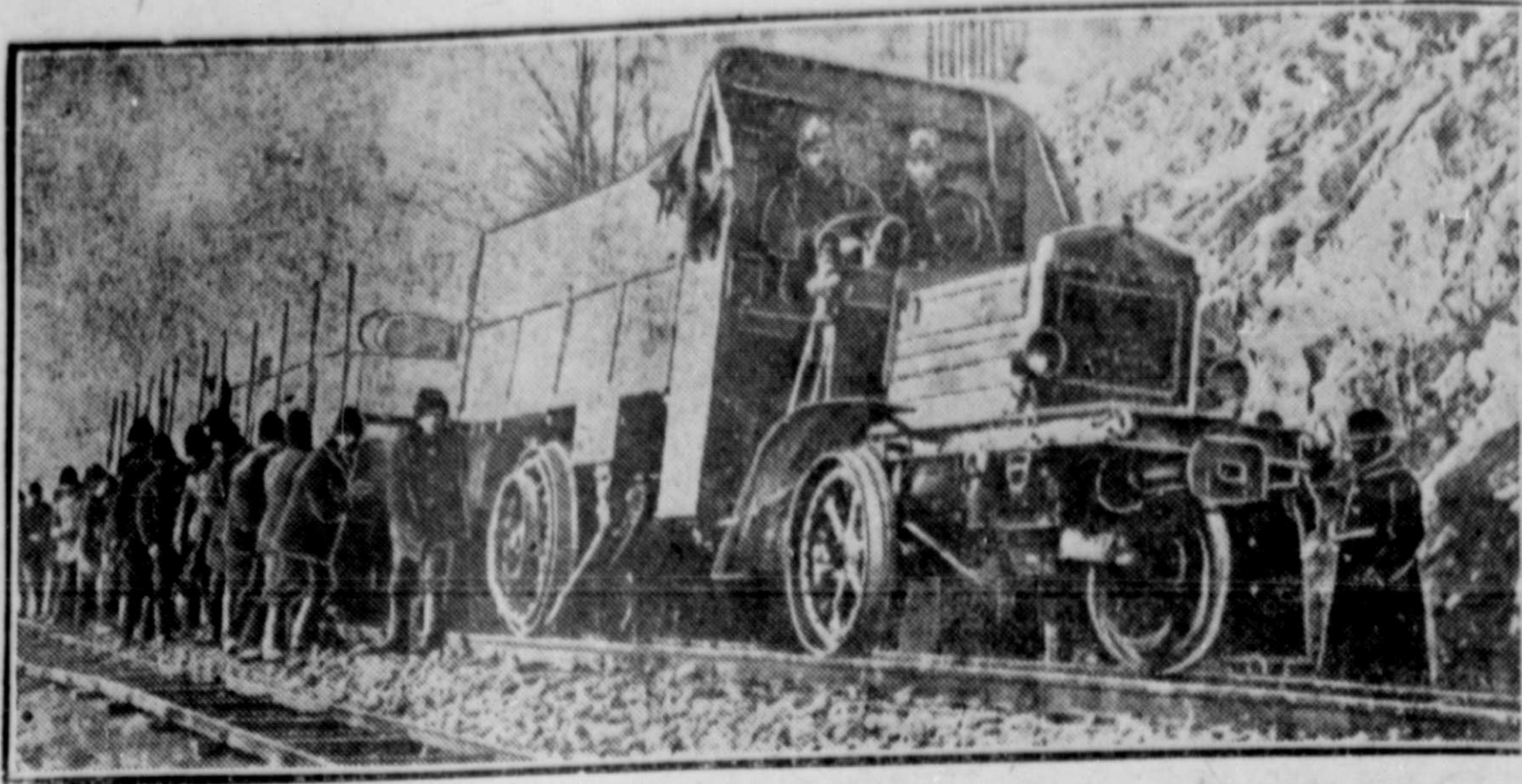
This was carried by a very large majority, taken on a standing vote, and the meeting closed with the singing of the National Anthem. Hearty cheers were called for and given for the Liberal candidate, F. A. Anderson, and consolatory cheers for Mr. Shaw, who seemed to take the opposition in good part, and admitted that the criticisms made had been offered in a perfectly fair manner.
