#### REPORTED RESIGNATION OF GRAND ADMIRAL VON TIRPITZ

AND TENDERS RESIGNATION.**

London, May 13.—It is reported that Grand Admiral Von Tirpitz has disagreed with his colleagues over the dastardly torpedoing of the Lusitania, and has resigned.

Von Tirpitz is the father of the German navy, and was largely responsible for the construction of the Kiel Canal. He has always shown an intense hatred of Brit-

ain and was the instigator of Ger-many's submarine policy.

#### BRITISH IRONCLAD GOLIATH TORPEDOED IN DARDANELLES

**FIVE HUNDRED MEN LOST—BRITISH SUBMARINE ENTERS SEA  
OF MARMOSA WITH GREAT RESULTS—LAND FORCES  
DOMINATE GALLIPOLI PENINSULA.**

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, May 13.—The British battleship Goliath has been torpedeed in the Dardanelles. Twenty officers and 160 men have been saved, but it is feared that 500 perished.

The Goliath was of the 1897 type, completed in 1900, and carried the following guns: four 12-inch, twelve 6-inch, twelve 12-pounders, and eight 3-pounders, in addition to four torpedo tubes. She had a displacement of 12,950

tons, an indicated horsepower of 13,500 and a speed of 18 knots, and carried a complement of 700 men.

#### Submarine Feat.

London, May 13.—The British submarine F-14 penetrated the Dardanelles and entered the Sea of Marmosa, sinking two Turkish gunboats and one transport.

#### Allies Dominate.

The land forces of the Allies are still advancing in Gallipoli and now dominate the peninsula.

#### ALLIES HAVE SCORED BRILLIANT SUCCESSES

Paris, May 13.—(Official)—The Allies have scored brilliant successes to the north of Arras. They have captured the village and forest of Carency, killing hundreds by the bayonet and taking 1,050 prisoners, including 50 officers and a colonel commandant of Chasseurs. In the forest of Le Pretre they also took a new line of German trenches.

## GERMANY'S LACK.

For years Germany has been collecting an enormous mass of information about every nation in Europe, but particularly about Britain. Wherever there were troops, fortifications, naval dock-yards or supply bases, they had secret service men, who reported down to the last button, nut, or bolt, the slightest change made.

Every little detail of every little political move was reported minutely. Britain's little domestic squabbles were more fully described in code messages to Berlin than they were to the British public. Berlin got more information regarding the inside moves of the passing of the Irish Home Rule bill than Belfast.

In colonial affairs, the same mathematical correctness was followed. The finger of the Kaiser was ever on the public pulse of India, Egypt, Africa, Australia, New Zealand, and Canada. Every little difference between the mother and her sons was carefully weighed, measured, and docketed for future reference. Every little friction with the natives of India was carefully taken note of, and a value placed upon it. Never has a nation possessed so much detailed information regarding another, as Germany did of Britain.

With all her carefully arranged facts and figures, Germany lacked the one vital thing—knowledge. Of the great, big heart of the British Empire she knew absolutely nothing. She forgot that the British Empire has a soul.

All Germany's skillfully obtained information told her that Britain had enough to do looking after her own affairs, without giving a thought to a Prussian military parade through Belgium, followed by a little skirmish in front of Paris. Today, Germany knows, as the world knew before, that Britain has a soul big enough and noble enough, to spend and be spent in the service of her friends.

## FAULT-FINDING.

Several survivors of the Lusitania disaster are complaining bitterly because Captain Turner did not drive his ship at full speed along the Irish coast, while others find fault with him for not carrying out boat drill, especially since they suggested it.

On every liner you will find the man who knows more about navigation than the captain; on every train you will meet the man who knows more of railroading than the superintendent of the railroad; in every town there is the man who knows just how the affairs of the town should be conducted, though he rarely assists in the work, and in every war there is the local commander-in-chief, who never smells powder except on the First and Fourth of July.

Captain Turner may have appeared over-confident, but it is extremely unlikely that he was in the slightest degree careless, or neglectful of his duty in any way.

Meantime, let the survivors tell how they survived, but they may safely leave the question of responsibility for the disaster to the experts, who will have all the facts before them.

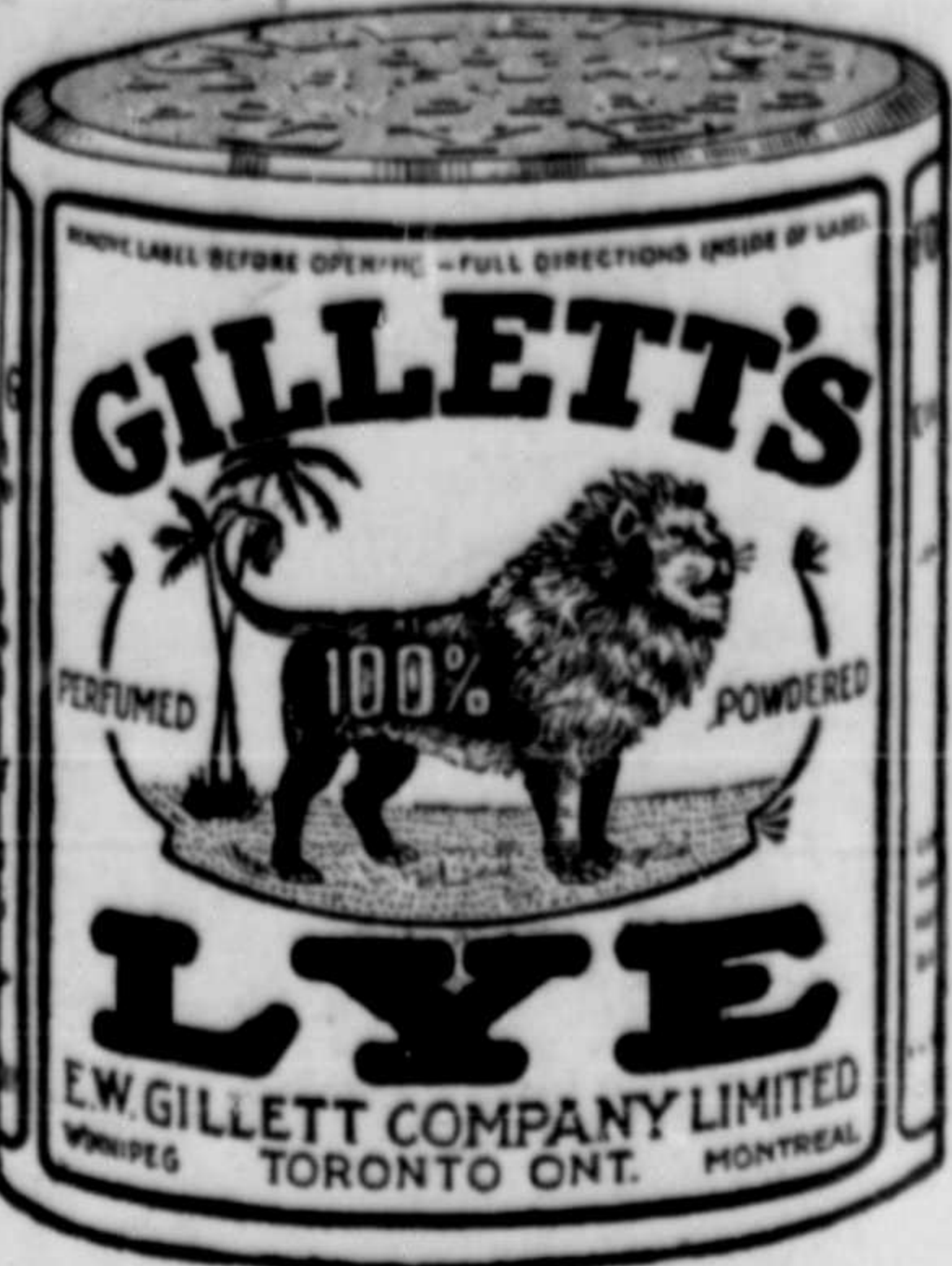

## GREAT CROWD AT SHIP CREEK

A canvas city of over 450 tents now stands at Ship Creek, where the first mile of rails has already been laid by Lieutenant Mears, of the engineering commission. In addition to the tents there are some seventy log and frame buildings. Included in the business houses are six restaurants, a billiard hall, two laundries, three barber shops and one jewelry store.

Lieutenant Mears, immediately upon arrival, started to lay the track for work trains and one mile of track has been placed in position. Miss Babe White, who was born in this division, drove the first spike on the railroad, and had the spike presented to her by Lieutenant Mears as a souvenir of the memorable occasion.

The track is laid from the beach. The machinery arrived on the Latouche for dredging and pile work. The dock will be built immediately and the mouth of the river will be dredged. It is the intention later to build a concrete canal.—Seward Gateway.

## DOGS OF WAR.

In an interesting letter, Mr. Ian Malcolm, M. P. for Croydon, who for some months has been director of the wounded and missing department of the Red Cross Society, gives some interesting facts regarding a society in France known as the "Ligue des Chiens Sanitaires," which trains dogs of all sorts, apparently, to carry dispatches from one trench to another or to hunt for wounded men.

"The dogs were each at different stages of proficiency in the art of tracking wounded," says Mr. Malcolm, who paid a visit to the training ground. "Some had begun learning that week, others had been with the trainer for months, and one was a perfectly trained dog which the police had used for a couple of years."

"The latter was a little wonder. He could climb wire-netting or a stone wall like a cat, and he had the nose and pace of a first-class pointer. It was beautiful to see him work. A man goes by devious paths and ultimately hides in a pit inclosed in a fifteen-foot wire cage, like the walls of an aviary without the roof. The dog is brought on the ground by his trainer, picks up the scent almost at once, and off he goes. Finally he reaches the pit, makes three springs up the fencing, finds the man, takes his cap, and races back to his master. He is then put on a leash, and off he goes again at full speed, dragging the man with him as fast as his legs can carry him over the broken ground until he reaches the wounded soldier, who is then tended and, if possible, brought back to the nearest field hospital."

"These dogs, I believe, are in general use in the French and German armies, but hitherto I fancy that there are few, if any, among the British regiments."—Victoria Times.

# MILITARY HONORS FOR VICTORIA MAN

Victoria, May 12.—Lance Corporal A. C. Guthrie, of this city has been recommended for military honors for conspicuous bravery near Ypres. The particular act which will receive official recognition was his attention to three wounded men under a heavy fire.  
According to eyewitnesses of the deed, Guthrie was lying in a place of comparative safety from a murderous shell-fire, when a shell landed in a dugout in which three men were sleeping, with the result that all three were wounded, one so severely that he was unable to move.  
Guthrie saw them, and leaving his shelter, went to the dugout, on which shells were dropping, and after dressing the wounds of two of the men carried the third to safety.

Lance-Corporal Guthrie, who was in Victoria for several years prior to the outbreak of hostilities, is a son of Dr. Cowan Guthrie, of Leith, Scotland. He was employed for some time in the purchasing department of the C. P. R. and joined the 88th Fusiliers in March, 1914. He is a good shot, and was always well spoken of by his officers as a smart soldier. He left here as a private and has been promoted during recent fighting.

Guthrie is the first from Victoria to be recommended for military honors.

Before they were assailed by the gas, he and half a dozen comrades, including an officer, were blown bodily some distance by a German shell, but none of them were seriously hurt.

It was when they got into the gas-zone that the Canadians began to drop like ninepins and lie where they fell.

"The Germans squealed just like pigs," he says, "when we got into the wood after them with the bayonet."
