THE COALITION

The significance of the political truce in Britain will now be clearly understood. There has never been any doubt of its genuineness, as leading members of the opposition have been working hard on government committees ever since the outbreak of war, and have been consulted on every important question of policy.

Premier Asquith's suggestion of a coalition cabinet is just what might be expected of that broad-minded and clear-sighted statesman. The Empire is fighting for its very existence, and the brains of both political parties are needed to control the various departments. Report sends the Rt. Hon. D. Lloyd George to the War Office, and the Rt. Hon. A. J. Balfour to the Admiralty. Both gentlemen will be sources of strength to these departments. The Rt. Hon. A. Bonar Law will make an admirable Chancellor of the Exchequer, on account of his wide business and financial experience.

The Rt. Hon. Winston Churchill has been pitchforked into so many varied positions and has done wonders in all, that he may make quite a sound Secretary for India, though his temperament is rather robust for such a delicate job. The statesman filling this position has usually been of a careful, diplomatic type. Churchill is a wonder in adapting himself to things, but has never been able to adapt himself to people. In the Conservative party, and in his several positions in the present cabinet he has shown a tendency to run counter to the ideas of his colleagues, which on several occasions led to rupture.

Churchill was responsible for the fact that, last August, the navy was ready, and that should wipe out a host of minor indiscretions. Since then he has shown a tendency to run the navy all alone, and the idea of a landsman controlling naval movements would not appeal to "Jacky" Fisher. If, as suggested in recent reports,

the premier had to choose between Lord Fisher and Churchill, he chose wisely. Austen Chamberlain will ably fill the position so long occupied by his late illustrious father.

This reorganization carries with it a big lesson for Canada. Had Britain followed the patronage system in allotting army and navy contracts, such splendid co-operation at this time would, in all probability, have been impossible. If the Asquith government had followed the methods of the Borden administration in the matter of buying shoes, horses, binoculars, motor trucks, etc., it would certainly have been impossible.

In the present crisis there are no parties; no party friends, and no party enemies in Britain. Statesmen are devoting all their energies and attention to the welfare of the Empire, and have neither the time nor the inclination to figure out just how many of their old party friends should get something for nothing. Is it too much to expect that the government at Ottawa will forget pockets and politics, and attend strictly to the real business of Canada and the Empire?

LEFT BEHIND.

The Prince Rupert left one disappointed man behind this morning. Just before the gangway was slipped, a man was led, protesting vigorously, from the steamer and escorted to the wharf.

It seems he had booked from Granby to Rupert, and had forgotten to come ashore.

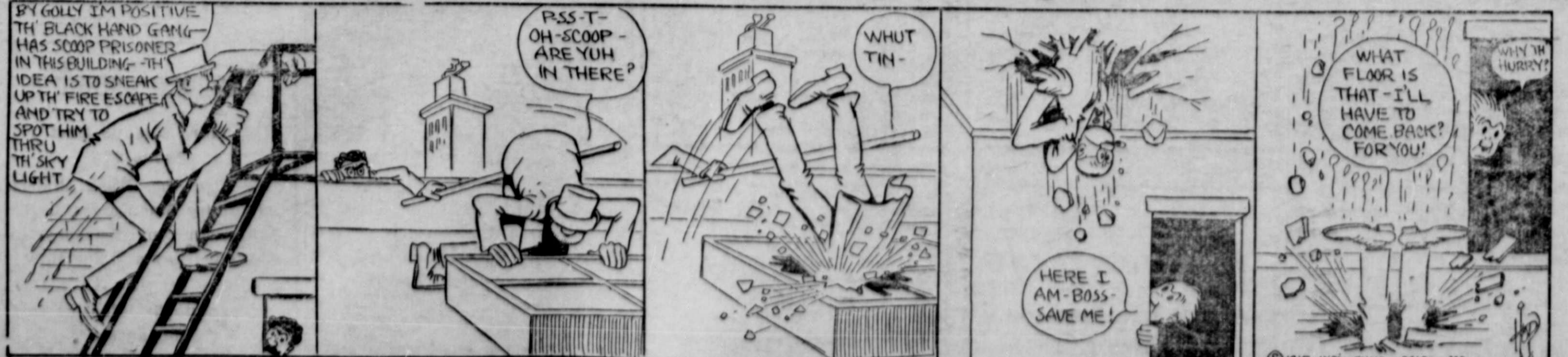

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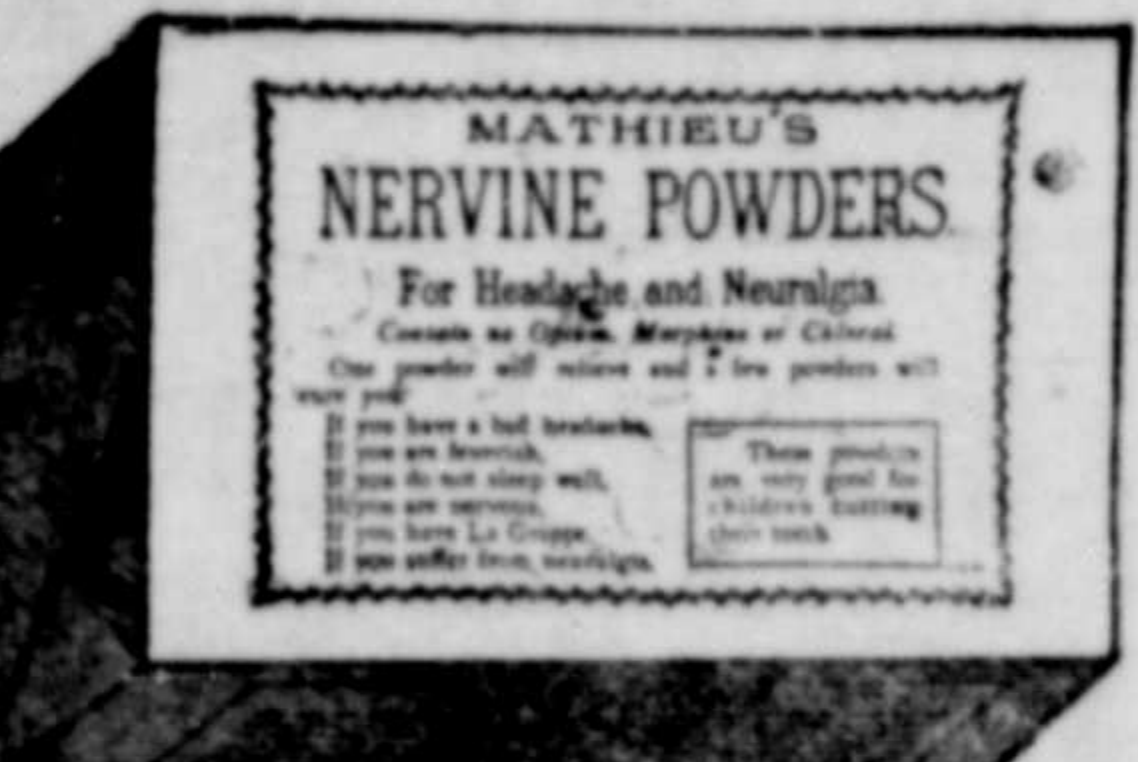

FIRE DANGERS IN THIS DISTRICT

Victoria, May 15.—Advices received by the Minister of Lands indicate that the fire situation is considered dangerous in the Rupert, Hazelton, Fort George, Lillooet and Tete Jaune districts, the weather for the past week having been hot and dry. Thirty large fires have occurred in the Fort George district alone.

Clearing operations are general throughout the province, much activity being shown in this direction by the pre-emptors, especially in the Fraser valley, Vancouver Island, Vernon and Tete Jaune areas. From Cranbrook heavy rains are reported, which with the heavy growth of green vegetation have greatly reduced the fire hazard. In that district some eighteen hundred acres of logging slash have been disposed of this spring and more will be dealt with.
