THE ITALIAN GOVERNMENT DECLARES WAR

THE ITALIAN ADVANCE BEGINS—KITSILANO RESERVE DEAL DECLARED INVALID

DECLARATION OF WAR BY ITALY— GERMAN COUNTER DECLARATION

FRANCIS JOSEPH ISSUES MANIFESTO—AUSTRIA ATTACKS BY SEA AND AIR—ITALIAN ARMIES ADVANCE—INTERNED SHIPS SEIZED—AUSTRIAN WARSHIP DAMAGED.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Rome, May 24.—The Italian government, at 2 p. m. on the 24th, declared war against Austria-Hungary, to commence on the 24th.

Germany Declares War.
London, May 24.—Germany has declared war on Italy, and has recalled Prince Von Buelow.

Francis Joseph's Manifesto.
Vienna, May 24.—King Francis Joseph issued the following manifesto to his troops: "The King of Italy has declared war on me, a perfidy which history does not know has been committed against allies. In the hour of danger I went with flying colors into camp of our enemies."

Aeroplane Attacks.
Rome, May 24.—Austrian aeroplanes this morning attacked the German arsenal at Venice, and were driven off. Lotto, Corsetti, Ancona and Baretta Gosti were also attacked.

Many Ships Seized.
Rome, May 24.—Italy has been

successful in all her engagements on the frontier today. The authorities have seized hundreds of Austrian and German ships which had been interned.

Naval Attacks.
Paris, May 24.—Havas reports state that Austrian warships have been attacking ports on the east coast of Italy, but were driven off by heavy fire.

Italian Advance.
Rome, May 25.—An official announcement states that Italian armies have crossed the frontiers and are occupying the Austrian towns of Caporetta, Cormona, Cervignagno, Terzo and the heights between Judnio and Isonza. All these towns are within a few miles of the border line running north of the Gulf of Trieste.

Austrian Warship Damaged.
Rome, May 25.—An Austrian warship with a heavy list and escorted by four torpedo boats is off Gargano. It is believed to have been damaged by the fire of the forts of Bareletta on Monday.

BOILERMAKERS WALK OUT AT DRYDOCK

A number of the boilermakers working at the drydock walked out this morning. They were working for Pool & Co., contractors, and had a difference with the foreman over the charge of one of their number.

KITSILANO RESERVE DEAL DECLARED INVALID

Ottawa, May 25.—The Indian Commission recommends that the Kitsilano Reserve, which was bought by the British Columbia government for \$300,000, be handed over to the Harbors Commission for wharfage and harbor purposes.

The government claims that the purchase of the province was invalid, as it was done without the consent of the Indian Department.

BRILLIANT FRENCH VICTORY— THOUSANDS TAKEN PRISONERS

FRENCH TAKE LORETTE HILL AFTER THIRTEEN DAYS' HARD FIGHTING—RUSSIAN OFFENSIVE—TURKISH DEFEAT—TURKISH GUNBOAT SUNK—VAN RELIEVED—HOLLAND PROTESTS.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, May 24.—After thirteen days' fighting the French have gained a brilliant victory at Lorette Hill. Thousands of German prisoners were taken.

Reports from observers state that the German western line in Flanders has been thinned.

Russian Offensive.
Petrograd, May 24.—The Austro-German forces in Galicia have now assumed the defensive, all their assaults having been repulsed. The Russian assault has begun.

Turkish Gunboat Sunk.

Constantinople, May 24.—The Turkish gunboat Belenk-L-Deria has been sunk by a submarine. Two of her crew were killed. She was built at Kiel, and was acting as a depot ship for a torpedo flotilla.

Van Relieved.

Tiflis, May 24.—Russian soldiers have relieved Van, in Asi-

atic Turkey, where the Armenians were besieged by the Turks. The Turks have retreated to Bitlis.

Turkish Defeat.

Athens, May 25.—Thousands of Turkish wounded of the First Army Corps, the best in Turkey, are arriving at Constantinople. They met with complete defeat at the hands of the New Zealanders and Australians in the Dardanelles. There is a shortage of coal, wood, oil and bread reported.

Holland Protests.

The Hague, May 25.—The Netherlands government has sent a note to Germany protesting against the sinking of the Lusitania. It was similar in tone to that sent by the United States.

LACROSSE.

Victoria, May 25.—New Westminster won the Mann Cup in lacrosse by defeating Victoria yesterday by 7 to 5.

CHARGE OF SEDITION AGAINST EASTERN MAN

A man called Ross Bell, who hails from Prince Edward Island, was brought up at the Police Court this morning on a charge of sedition, the charge being laid by a well known citizen.

The charge is that the accused, in the presence of several persons on Sunday, made the following statement:

"I hope the Germans will cut the heart out of every damned Canadian who went to the war."

It appears that Bell was under the influence of liquor at the time and got into a heated political discussion, and does not remember what he said. As a matter of fact, he recently wanted to go to the front but was turned down on account of his age.

Bell will be tried before His Honor Judge Young.

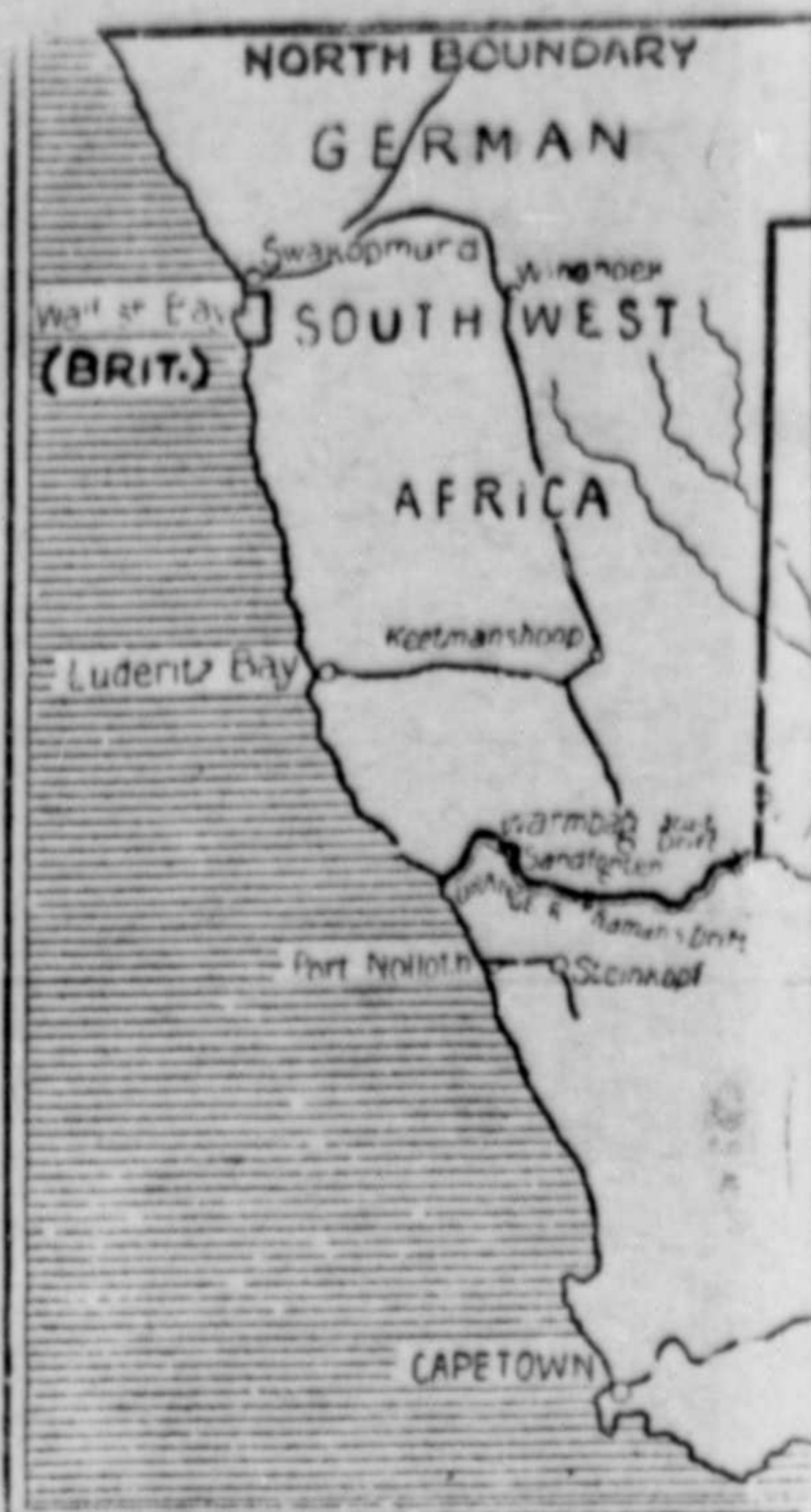

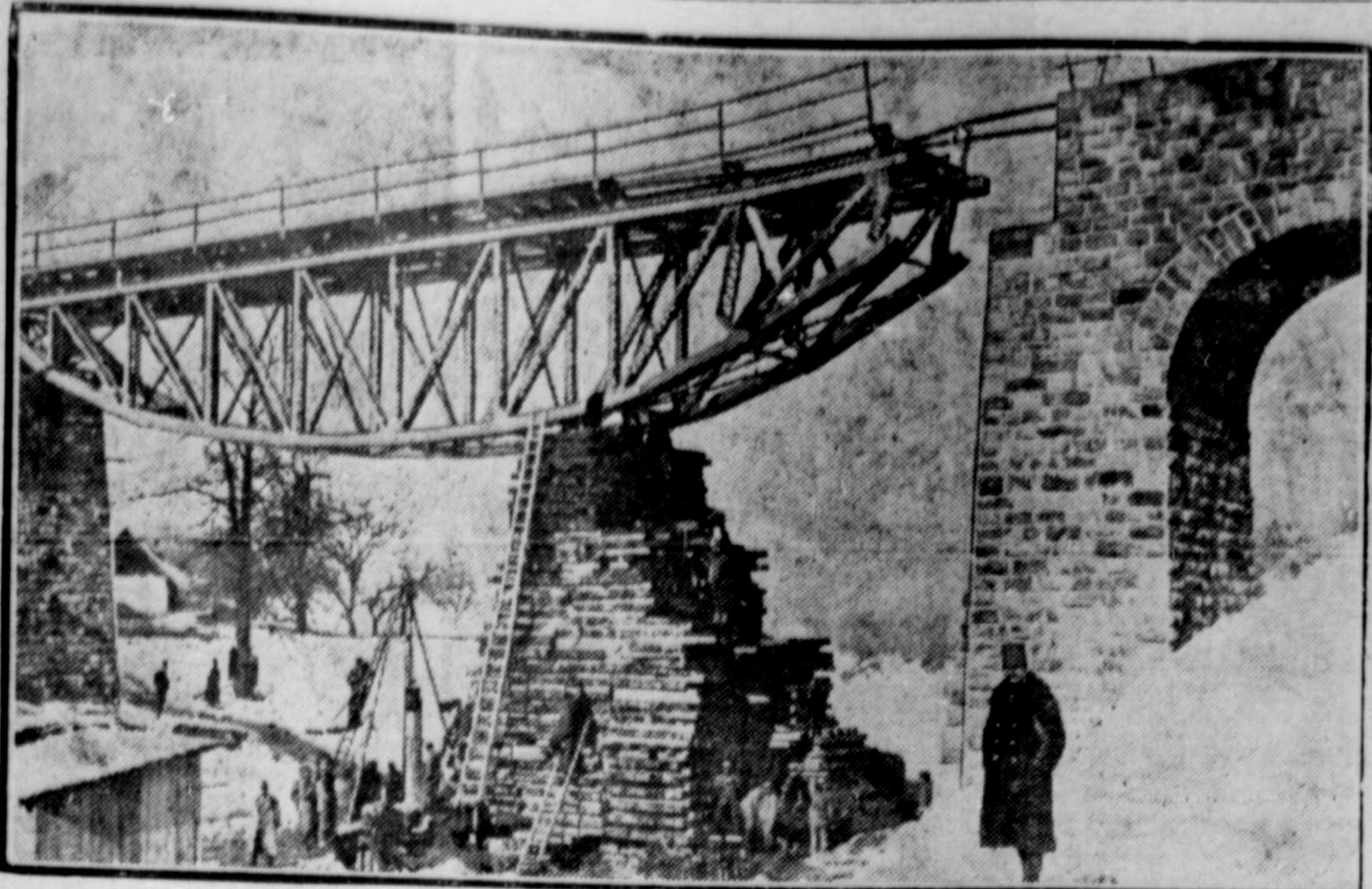

HOWARD ODLUM REPORTED SAFE

A letter received by Prof. Odium from his son Major Odium, contained the good news that Major Odium's cousin, Private Howard Odium, who had been reported killed at the battle of Langemarck, had turned up safe and unwounded. The letter received was written on April 29. On April 26 Major Odium had written that Private Odium had been killed, but in this he was mistaken. Corporal Joseph Odium, Major Odium's brother, was killed while bringing up ammunition. He had gone to the assistance of a wounded comrade, when a shell exploded beside him, snuffing out his life.—Vancouver Province.

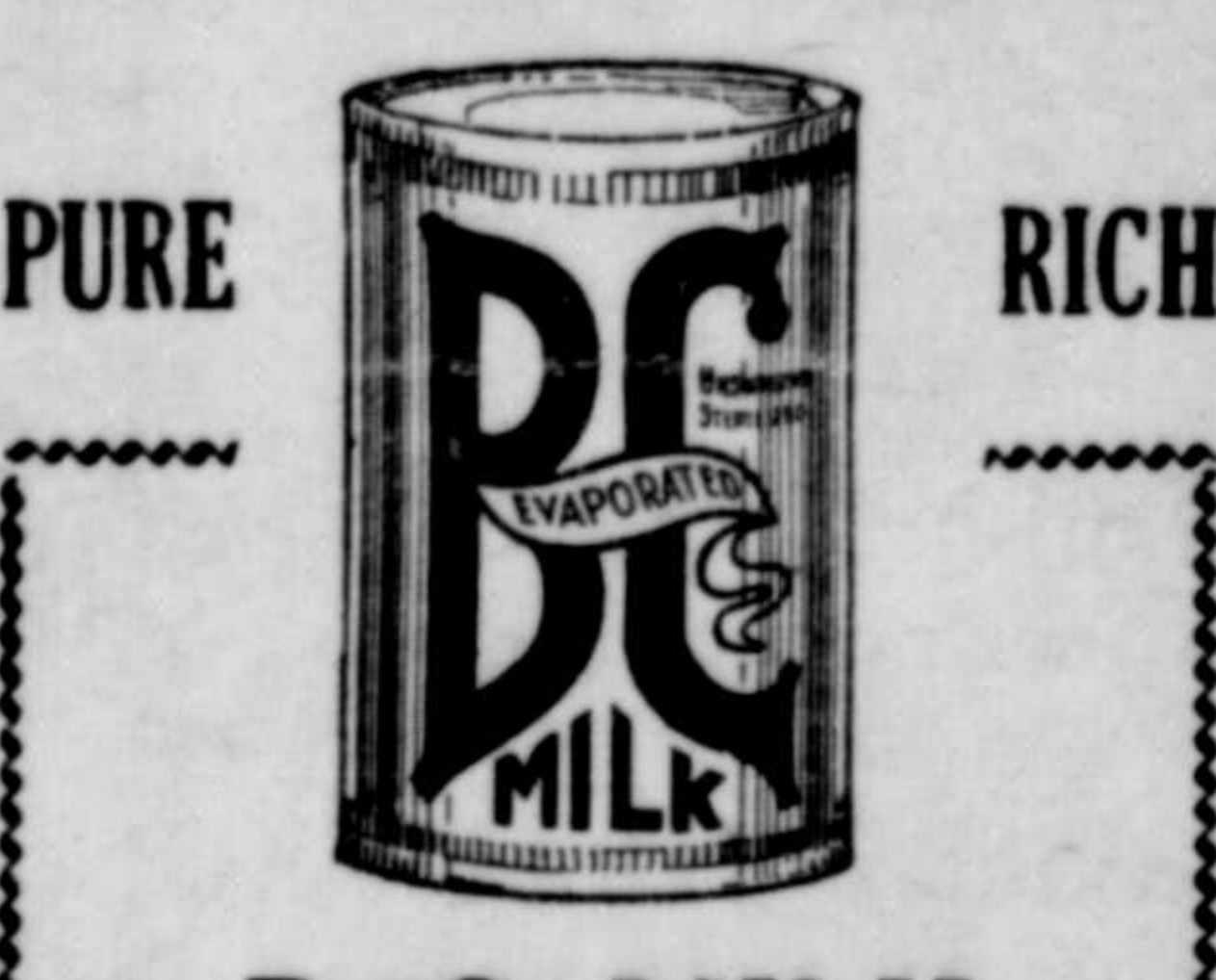

ENGLAND BEATEN IN A POOR GAME

The international football game between England and Scotland, played at the recreation ground yesterday afternoon, by no means realized expectations, the exhibition of football being decidedly below the standard of ordinary league games—a state of matters due no doubt to the fact that the players were unprepared to stand the storm of ninety minutes football under the climatic conditions that existed. There was quite a large concourse of people present when the following teams lined up, viz.:

England won the toss and Scotland had to kick off against a strong sun and varying wind, a state of matters that helped the Englishmen to dominate the game during the opening period, when a bad clearance by Grant almost cost his side a point. Nothing daunted, they returned to the English goal and a good shot from Neilson found the inside of the post, and seemed over the line, but, as the referee was not in a position to judge, the effort went for naught, as the ball came into play again. Soon after, Hunter let the Scottish left away and from Neilson's cross Kinghorn gave his side the lead. Ineffective play by the English forwards spoilt numerous chances, but on one occasion Cameron was going strong through when he was brought down within the dreaded area, and with the resultant kick Garnet made no mistake. Play ruled even after this, but deteriorated from the opening period; half-time arrived soon after, with the score standing one all.

The second half opened with Scotland forcing a corner which proved abortive. At this period the Englishmen adopted the one-back game, due to the absence of F. Hardy, who had been injured during the closing minutes of the first half. This helped to spoil a game which at no period could have been termed good. The Englishmen made one or two desperate efforts to take the lead, but failed, while Scotland were more successful a little later, when Kinghorn converted a penalty kick. The only redeeming feature of the game at this period was the good goal-keeping of young Brand, who saved numerous likely shots, but was unfortunate in the saving of a cross shot from the left, which he palmed out for the Scotch forwards to put in the net. Kinghorn and Broughton sharing in the honor. This seemed to finish the Englishmen, who only made frequent attacks on Grant to no purpose. From a rather wide corner kick by the English right, the Scottish left broke away and a corner was forced off Slocum, and from the free kick W. Murray put Scotland still farther ahead. Soon after the Englishmen lost their best chance to score, when S. Hardy watched a good shot from Hooper hit the post instead of rushing it through. An uneventful game soon afterwards came to a finish with the Scots winning by four goals to one.
