MAJOR PECK AND CAPTAIN MOORE WOUNDED

AUSTRIANS RETREAT BEFORE ITALIAN ARMY--AMERICAN STEAMER TORPEDOED

MAJOR C. W. PECK AND CAPTAIN DON MOORE WOUNDED IN ACTION

INFORMATION TO HAND INDICATES THAT PRINCE RUPERT BOYS HAVE BEEN IN HEAVY FIGHTING--NO DETAILS HERE YET.

Word has just reached the city that Major C. W. Peck and Captain Don Moore, his second in command, have been wounded in action. It is evident that the local boys have been through some hard fighting, but there are no details to hand yet. There will be some hope throughout the city that our two gallant officers have not been seriously wounded. Both are well known and deservedly popular gentlemen, and the sincerest wish of both will be that they may soon be well enough to resume their commands.

It is possible that more of the boys have been wounded, but the fact that no telegraphic reports of any having been killed have reached town, is reassuring.

ITALIAN TROOPS ADVANCING THROUGH MOUNTAIN PASSES

AUSTRIANS ARE RETREATING AND DESTROYING BRIDGES—MANY PRISONERS TAKEN—ITALIAN AVIATORS BUSY—AMERICAN SHIP TORPEDOED—THE CREW SAVED.

Rome, May 26.—Italian troops now occupy the Austrian territory along the frontier from Lombardy to the Adriatic, and have seized all Austrian frontier towns.

They are forcing their way through the mountain defiles. The Austrians are in full retreat, destroying all bridges behind them. Many prisoners have been taken.

Italian aviators are bombarding the town of Monfalcone.

Nebraskan Torpedoed.
London, May 26.—The American steamer Nebraskan, from Liverpool to Delaware, has been torpedoed forty miles south of Fastnet. The sea being calm, the crew took to the boats, and, as the Nebraskan remained afloat, they returned to the ship.

INTERNMENT OF ALIENS

ALD. MONTGOMERY WANTS NO SECRET BUSINESS

At the conclusion of business at the Council last night, Alderman Montgomery raised the subject of questions and answers. He objected strongly to the Mayor's statement that, in future, he would suit himself as to whether he would make replies or not. The alderman read the procedure by-law, and pointed out that, in 1911, the Mayor had been very insistent on a close interpretation of the clause covering questions.

The Mayor replied that he did not intend to take back what he had said. Any legitimate question would be answered, but questions asked simply to tantalize the chair would be ignored. He wanted to see harmony prevail at the board.

Alderman Montgomery said that personalities should not enter into city business. He defied the Mayor to point to any question which he had asked which was not asked entirely in the public interest. He represented the people and in asking these questions was simply doing his duty. For instance, he thought the public ought to know where the Mayor had been, what business he had done, and if the trip cost the city \$8 per day.

The Mayor said he had explained all that to the special meeting Saturday night.

Alderman Edge objected to such a discussion being continued and Alderman Nicol moved the closure.

KITSILANO DEAL.

Bowser's chickens are coming home to roost. The Dominion government has declared that the purchase of the Kitsilano Indian Reserve, by the McBride government, was invalid, as it was done without the consent of the Indian Department.

It will be remembered that, over two years ago, the McBride government claimed to have purchased this valuable piece of property from the Indians for \$300,000, and, incidentally, Mr. Read, a legal associate of the Hon. W. J. Bowser, "earned" a commission of \$120,000 in putting the deal through. At the time, the Liberal press asserted that the Provincial government had carried the deal through illegally, and that, though they had handed over \$300,000 and a huge slice of commission, they would never be able to obtain a title to the property. Events have proved these assertions to be correct.

The Attorney General, who is supposed to stand, above all things, for law in British Columbia, permitted an absolutely illegal deal to go through, and also took care that his legal partner received \$120,000 for doing something which was illegal. It is astounding that a man capable of such procedure should remain for one day the recognized head of the law in British Columbia. Was there ever such a flagrant case of "Bowserism"?

The particulars of this "purchase" will be reported in detail in the London press, and must impress the financiers there with the ability of the Attorney General of British in putting the law at defiance. It must enhance the financial credit and standing of British Columbia in the money market of the world, to be able to show these magnates that this province has a man at the helm who can rise superior to the law of the Dominion, and do just what he pleases. The whole miserable business is just on a par with the framing of the Dominion Trust regulation for depositors. The welfare of Bowser

and his friends comes first; the good name of British Columbia comes along a very poor second, if in the running at all. Dominion law is to Bowser what international law is to the Kaiser; something to be recognized if it suits his purpose, but merely a "scrap of paper" if it runs counter to his nefarious ends.

Doubtless William Manson, M. P., is as kindly, purposeful, complacent, and affectionate as his friends claim him to be, but, unfortunately for him personally, he represents "Bowserism." He has to obey the will of the dictator of British Columbia, whether it is right or wrong. His political existence depends on his quiet, calm acquiescence in such deals as the "purchase" of the Kitsilano Reserve. What the people of Prince Rupert are concerned with is not what William Manson is, but what he represents. "Bowserism" has been the curse of British Columbia for years, and will be a curse so long as the people permit it to exist. It is just as detrimental to the best interests of British Columbia as Prussian militarism is to Europe, and must meet the same fate.

PREMIER BORDEN MAY GO TO ENGLAND

Ottawa, May 26.—The Morning Citizen says:

That Sir Robert Borden may pay a visit to England this summer is now within the range of probability. Nothing definite has been decided but it would appear that the Prime Minister is considering the idea of going to the Old Country for a short period.

"The reason for his projected trip has not been given out, but it is well known that there are many matters arising out of Canadian co-operation in this war which could well be taken up with the British authorities by Sir Robert.

"The Premier will return to Ottawa at the end of the week and Hon. Robt Rogers, who has been in Winnipeg, is also expected back in a few days."

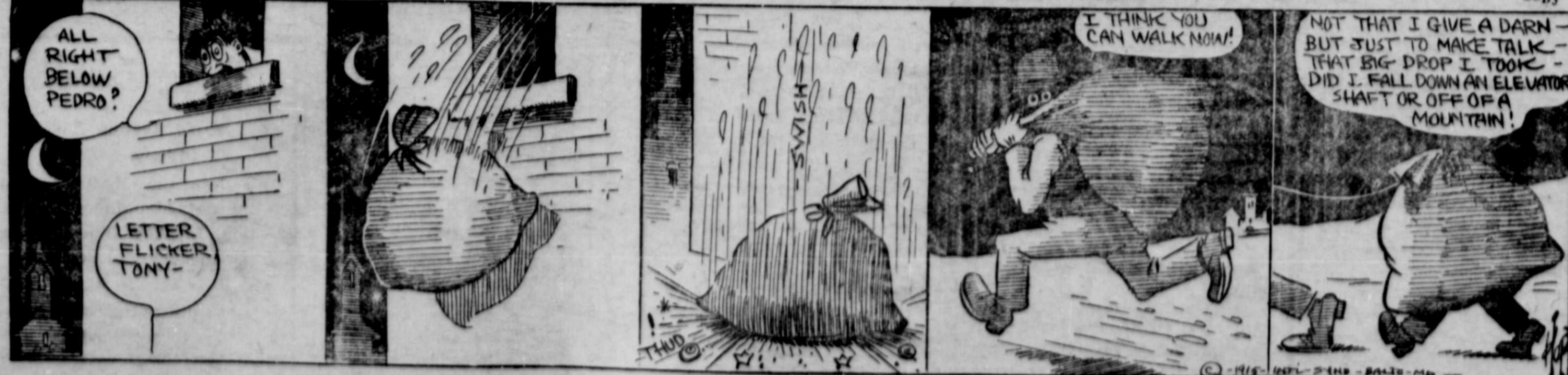

WONDERFUL SALT MINES IN POLAND

At Wieliczka, a small town nine miles from Cracow, where the German and Russian forces have been fighting, are the most wonderful salt mines in the world. These are on seven different levels, connected with the surface by eleven shafts and have over sixty-five miles of chambers and passages. The mines have been worked since the eleventh century, but their productive power seems unending. They are remarkable for the many chambers which have been cut, some of them with statues and candelabra including two large chapels and high altars, with all their ornaments complete, a large dancing saloon, and many others rooms, each of them having been cut out of rock-salt. "Within them is also the Lake Prysides, 195 feet long, 120 feet broad, and varying in depth from 10 to 26 feet," says Mr. George Hume in his book, "Thirty-Five Years in Russia."

IMMORTAL WILLIAM CAPTURED BY GERMANY

The funniest episode of the war so far has been the formal annexation of Shakespeare by Germany. It was a bloodless victory, England offering not the slightest resistance. The event was announced in a theatre of Leipzig before the rising of the curtain on "Twelfth Night." A special prologue was written for the historic occasion by one Ernst Herdt, of Weimar, and it was recited by the Fool in attendance on Olivia. It referred to Shakespeare as a man who "was godhead by his works." England was his "first and native home," but that country has now become so "contrarious" and "abhorred," and so repugnant to his proud, free-born spirit, "that he doth find himself quite homeless there."

Hence as a fugitive he seeks a second home in Germany, "which loves him most of all." And the precious prologue, which ought to find an enduring place in the world's catalogue of unconscious humor, winds up with the Bard of Avon apostrophizing the country ruled by the Royal Baby-killer:

Thou wonderful and noble land!
Remain thou Shakespeare's one
and only home,
So that he wander not uncom-
prehended,
Without a shelter in the barren
world.
