ALLIES TAKE MANY GUNS AND PRISONERS

ITALIANS MAKE SUCCESSFUL AIR RAID -- BERLIN ADMITS REVERSE IN GALICIA

ALLIES CONTINUE TO ADVANCE-- HUN FORT AND TRENCHES TAKEN

SIX HUNDRED PRISONERS, MANY OF THEM OFFICERS, TAKEN AT SOUCHEZ--MORE ARE CAPTURED AT LE PRETRE--ALL ATTACKS REPULSED--MAJESTIC LOST.

London, May 28.—The Allies continue to advance. At Souchez they captured a German fort and trenches, taking over six hundred prisoners, many of them officers, twelve guns.
Le Pretre the Allies have captured sixty prisoners and repulsed all attacks.

London, May 28.—A submarine enemy torpedoed H. M. S. Majestic while the warship was en route to the Scilly Isles. The crew was saved.

Geneva, May 28.—The Italians continue to advance in the Carinthia district, taking several more towns.

German Reverses.
Berlin, May 28.—The War Office admits that the German troops have met with a reverse at the hands of the Russians at San River in Central Galicia.
The Germans at Sieniawa have been forced back and have lost six cannon.

EXPLOSION OF GAS IN NANAIMO MINE

Nanaimo, May 28.—A Gas explosion occurred yesterday in the Reserve mine of the Western Fuel Company. About forty employees were in the mine at the time. Sixteen of them were rescued. Two dead bodies have been found, while eighteen or twenty are still in the workings.

BRITISH SOLDIERS ILL TREATED IN GERMANY

The following is an extract from a letter written by a British soldier held prisoner in Germany: "We are being starved here. We get rice water and horse beans only; no solid food. One loaf of bread for six days. Several men have been run through with bayonets by the guard, and a large number are being flogged and tied to a barbed wire post for six hours, with their toes just touching the ground. They do this without any just cause. We have one blanket, and all the men are suffering with itch and dysentery. The guards knock us about unmercifully with rifles and sticks. We have hardly anything to wear, as our captors took them away. It is worse than being in Hell. They have given pants, coats and shirts to the French, but will give the British nothing. The wounded do not get proper treatment, and several have died, and there will be a lot more yet. All I have said is quite true. I could tell you a lot more, but this is quite enough for now."

PRINCESS IRENE BLOWN UP IN HARBOR

London, May 28.—All but one of the crew of 250 men of the British steamer Princess Irene lost their lives when the vessel blew up in Sheerness Harbor yesterday. Seventy-eight dockers who were working on board the vessel at the time of the explosion also perished. The cause of the explosion is unknown.

The Princess Irene was one of the new fast steamers which the C. P. R. had built for their Pacific Coast service, and which were taken over by the Admiralty on completion.

SIR DICK'S FATE.

Sir Richard McBride's statement of his position in British Columbia politics, to a representative of Canada, is as enlightening as the remark of the Scotch farmhand, who, when his sweetheart wept bitterly on his departure for Canada, said, "Dinna greet, Jean, I'll come back in twa years and marry ye, I think, maybe."

Sir Richard says "a formal dissolution did not take place, because the Redistribution Bill necessitated a change in the voters' list." How Sir Richard must bless that Redistribution Bill, and that voters' list. The voters' list, like the Canadian troops at Langemarck, saved the situation.

When Sir Richard announced an election for April 10th, he must have forgotten the voters' list completely. Bowser, however, jogged his memory, and then Sir Dick remembered that he had urgent business elsewhere. He sought comfort in Ottawa, but found that Ottawa had troubles of its own, arising chiefly from bum boots and high priced drugs and autos, and had no sympathy to spare for a politician who could not control his satellites. Pinning his faith to the old and time-worn party cry of railroad development, the Premier fled to London, and now he is in the position of the drummer who, after spending a month on the road without booking an order, wrote, "Dear Firm, am I still with you?"

Sir Richard adds: "Meanwhile nothing has occurred of a nature to disturb the political situation in the province." In this, at least, he is truthful. Nothing has occurred, and nothing will occur if the Hon. W. J. Bowser can avoid it. The rumpus between the Premier and the Attorney General did not occur, that is, not officially. Sir Richard's election notice was merely a little informal affair, as it was given without the consent of the dictator. Bowser will intimate when the voters' list is ready, and it will not be ready until he says so.

Hold your breath, for Sir Richard is about to emulate Blondin on the tight rope, but, alas, he is weighted down, and thrown out of balance, by a multitude of C. N. R. bonds, P. G. E. bonds, timber licenses, land grabs, and a host of other awkward things to carry. No shouting by critics, nor advice from friends, can affect his fate in the least. The cargo he carries will swamp him, without any outside assistance.

NORTHERN WHEAT.

When the final report of Sir Sandford Fleming, as chief engineer of the Canadian Pacific Railway, was published thirty-eight years ago, it furnished the Canadians of that time with a mass of new but authentic information regarding the area now included in the province of Alberta. The surveyor's reports showed that among the various "passes" through the Rocky Mountains that might be used in the construction of a transcontinental railway, three were more available than any of the others: the one used quite recently for the National Transcontinental and Canadian Northern lines, and the one through which the Peace River runs from west of the Rockies east toward Lake Athabasca. Of these three the first was, from a railway engineer's viewpoint, the most difficult, while the Peace River Valley was the easiest. The only objection to the last named was its far north location, and Sir Sandford's choice ultimately was the middle pass, known as the Yellow Head.

During this long interval of time it has been a matter of common knowledge that there is in the Peace River District, east of the Rocky Mountains, an extensive area of good, arable land, that the climate is favorable, and that much of the country is well watered by nature. This view of its capabilities for agricultural purposes is corroborated by the recent information that a carload of wheat grown there has arrived in Winnipeg, and that

the grain is of good quality and appearance. As there is no railway near where it was grown, it must have been teamed many miles by the farmers themselves, perhaps to afford the outside world an object lesson as to the value of the district for farming purposes. This end the information will certainly serve, because it is accepted as established that the nearer to its northern limit wheat is grown the finer its quality. There is no reason to doubt that the Peace River District is a "Manitoba Hard" and "Number One Northern" region.

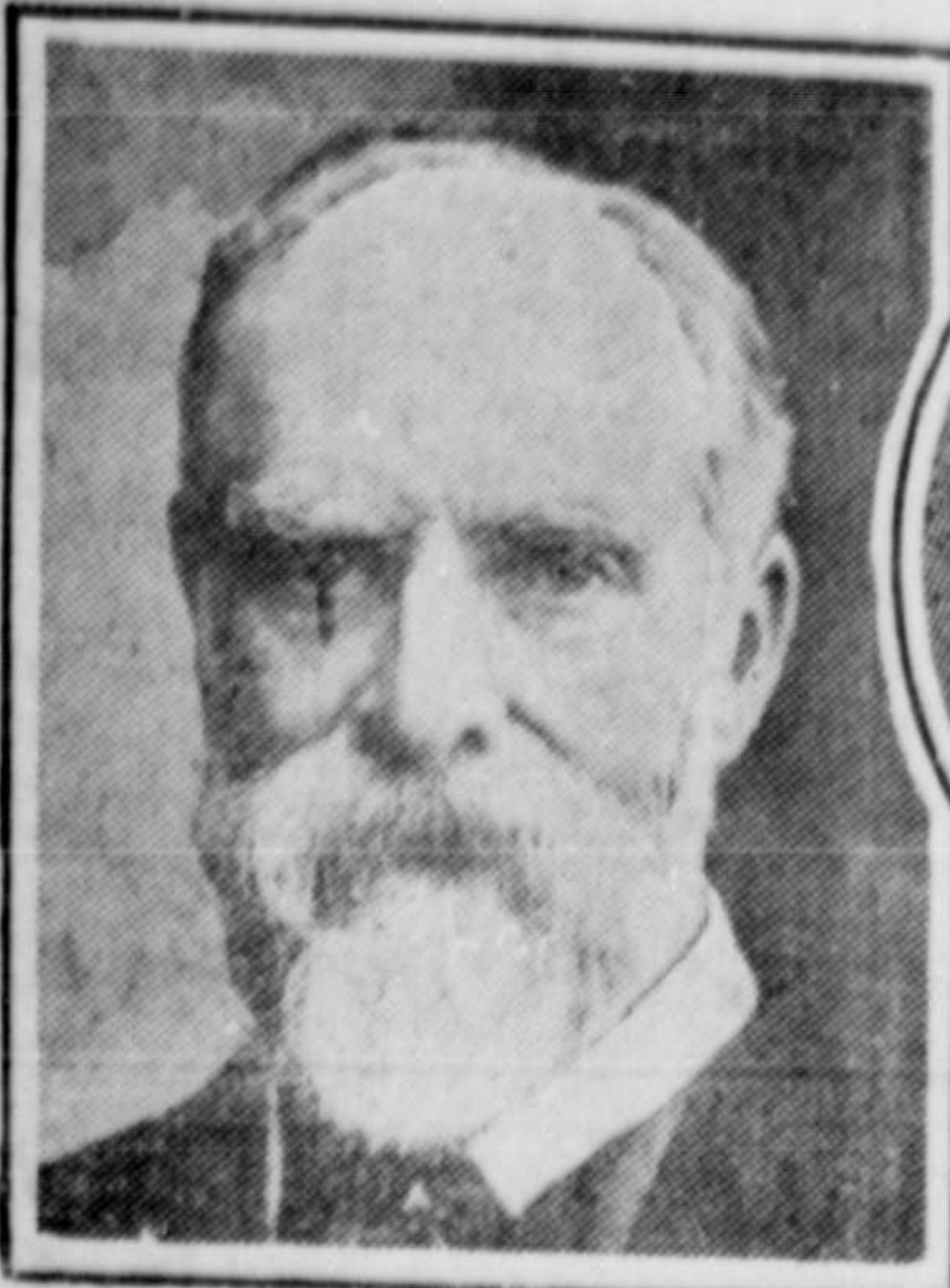

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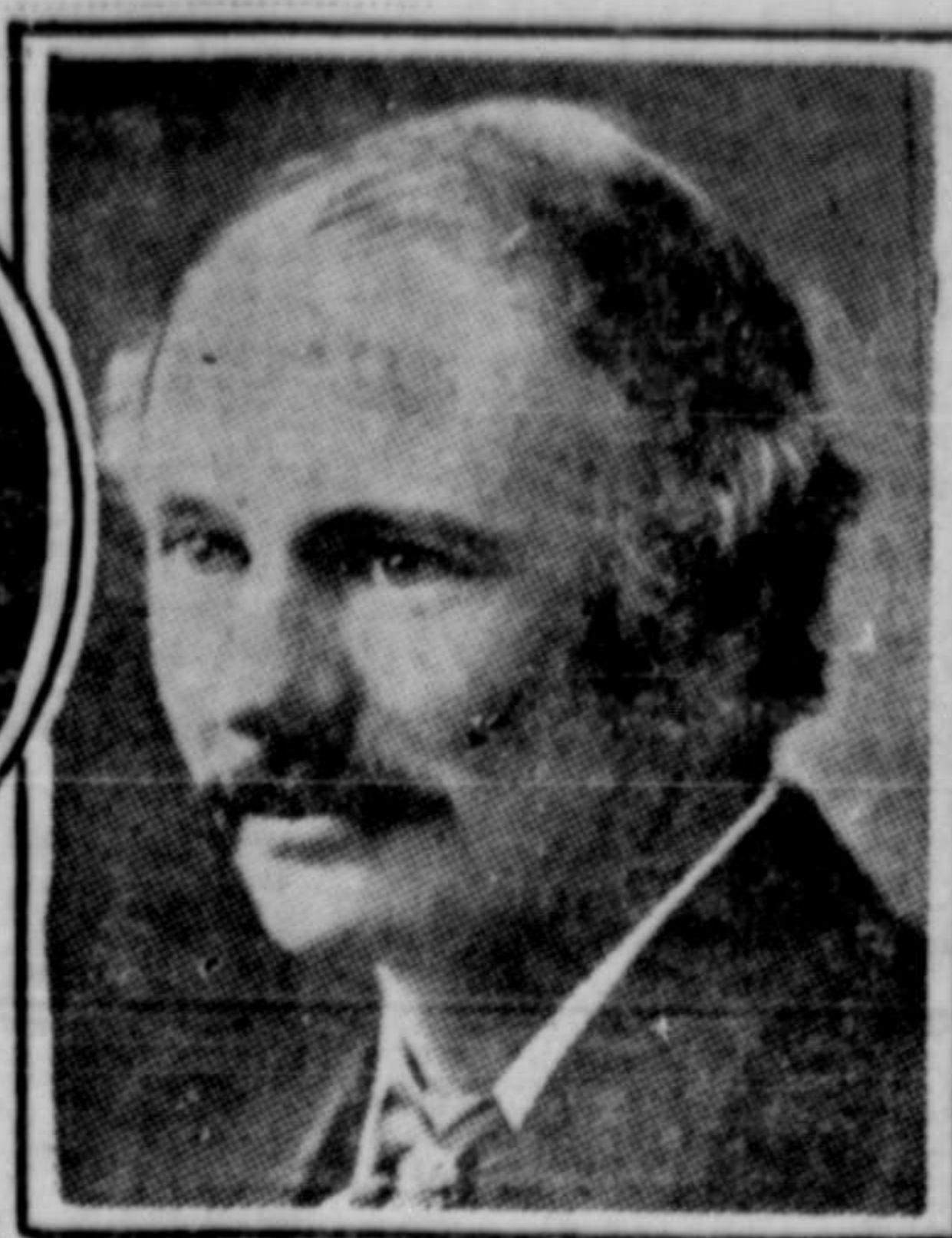

DOES THE PROFESSOR NOT WANT CANADA TOO?

The German Press has not discussed peace terms very freely, believing now that peace on any terms is still far off. But Prof. Ernst Haecel has made up for the reticence of the press by formulating some peace terms of his own. Here is what the veteran scientist thinks necessary both for the future of Germany and a federated Europe:

"(1) The crushing of the English tyranny.

"(2) The invasion of Great Britain and the occupation of London.

"(3) The division of Belgium. The largest portion, from Ostend to Antwerp in the west, to be a confederated German State; the northern part to be given to Holland; the southeastern part to be given to Luxemburg, which, thus enlarged, becomes also a confederated German State.

"(4) A large number of the British colonies and the Congo Free State to go to Germany.

"(5) France to surrender to Germany some of her northeastern frontier provinces.

"(6) Russia to be rendered impotent by the reconstitution, under Austrian auspices, of the kingdom of Poland.

"(7) The German provinces of the Baltic to be returned to the German Empire.

"(8) Finland, united with Sweden, to become an independent kingdom."

It would be interesting to know what is to happen to Canada when British tyranny is crushed. Is the Dominion one of the large number of colonies that must go to Germany, or will its position on the North American continent save it from that fate? Prof. Haecel might have been somewhat more considerate. If he does not want Canada it would be a courteous and kindly thing to tell Canadians so at once instead of leaving us under the harrow of uncertainty.—Toronto Globe.

LAKE KATHLYN'S COAL DEPOSITS
