Gallipoli Defence.

London, May 29.—Eighty thousand Turks are defending the Gallipoli Peninsula against the British. The Turkish supplies of ammunition are decreasing rapidly.

FIRST OIL TANKER ARRIVED YESTERDAY

Yesterday the first of the Imperial Oil Co.'s tankers, the Atlas, arrived in Prince Rupert, with a supply of oil for the new tanks at Hays Cove.

The Atlas came from San Francisco, but it is expected that future supplies will come from the refinery at Vancouver. The Atlas is under the command of Captain Kirkwood, and carries a crew of twenty-seven men. This trip she had a cargo of half a million gallons of distillate, which is used by fishing craft and launches generally.

By 8 o'clock last night the vessel was completely unloaded and ready for the return journey.

PATRIOTISM.

The speakers at the Conservative convention struck a true note of Conservative patriotism: "Be true to your party and your party will be true to you." That is the highest level of patriotism it is possible for them to attain to.

One speaker, evidently intoxicated by the excitement of the moment, declared, "The man who votes Liberal is not worthy of the name of Britisher." What a glorious conception of British worthiness that Conservative must have. Evidently the necessary qualifications for a Britisher is an ability to peddle postoffice and drill hall sites, at fabulous prices, to a site-loving government. Collecting sites is a hobby of the Borden government. It is about as useful as the hobby Mark Twain's friend developed, of collecting echoes, and more profitable to the seller.

Prince Rupert Conservatives need not run away with the idea that they are the only patriots who were permitted to display their patriotism by catering to the site hobby. There are others. There are sites, just as expensive, in Vancouver, and most other places, though Rupert has one advantage over the others—the site here has a pumping plant all to itself. If there are any statisticians in the party, they might find it interesting to calculate how many million gallons of water you must pump before you can grow a postoffice.

The real secret behind the site-buying is the fact that a Conservative government must spend to live. When it quits spending, it is time for the post mortem examination. You can't expect to get such a valuable thing as Conservative patriotism for nothing. Every valuable commodity has its price, and Conservative patriotism has several prices, all piled on top of each other.

The war was a perfect windfall to the Conservatives. Every nickel of the millions that

have been squandered in the past three years can now be attributed to the war, though it will take years of the present war taxes to pay the enormous sums squandered before the war was dreamt of. Not only has the war been an excuse for the huge past expenditure, but it has opened up untold new avenues for patriotic activity. A tremendous amount of expensive patriotism was lavished on the purchase of horses, autos, binoculars, shoes, drugs, etc. Every Conservative glance cast on a decrepit old nag cost the country a liberal per centage on the purchase price. It is perfectly legitimate to charge a price for such patriotism, but, according to the rules of the game, it is quite illegal to be caught charging. One poor soul got rid of \$9,000 worth of the very best; had the money in the bank, and must have thought he was in a fair way for Conservative fame, but, alas, he had to hand it over. Such patriots must be more careful in future, as the credit of the party must be kept up. Graft, but don't be caught grafting, is their motto.

SELLING MUNITIONS OF WAR.

In an editorial, well reasoned after a manner for which it is famous, the San Francisco Argonaut discusses the question of a neutral nation selling munitions of war to a belligerent, and defends the practice.

It defends the practice not only as being according to usage in all wars by all nations—by Germany, conspicuously among nations, for she has been foremost as a producer and seller of such wares to all who could buy—but defends the practice as being right in itself. In regard to this it says to those who are demanding an embargo on arms and munitions:

"But for the fact that munitions of war can be purchased in other countries every nation in the world would find it necessary to stock armaments



in sufficient quantities for any conceivable emergency that might arise. They do not do this, because they know that they can always supplement their own resources from any neutral nation that is willing to sell to them. An embargo of this kind would mean that armament factories would spring up all over the world like mushrooms. No nation would sleep in peace unless it was perpetually ready for an Armageddon."

It is well to keep in mind, however, that the agitation in the United States for an embargo on war munitions originates with the pro-Germans. As Germany cannot be a customer for these goods they think Uncle Sam should refuse to sell to anybody. The condition that would result if neutral nations refused to sell such wares to any belligerent is well described by the Argonaut. But the picture that is drawn would not strike a Prussian colonel or a Krupp gunmaker as a bad one. They would like to see the whole world armed to the teeth, a world turned over to soldiering and war. That is the world-condition they are now out to produce. But mankind will not have it so.—Toronto Globe.

REGINA SUCCEEDS IN SELLING DEBEN.

Regina, May 29.—Mayor Balfour and Commissioner Thornton, of Regina, were successful in negotiating the sale of about \$1,000,000 worth of debentures in Eastern Canada. The money secured through the sale of these debentures will be sufficient to finance the city for the balance of the present year, and it is not likely that the additional \$500,000 worth of debentures which the city still has on hand will be sold. A portion of the funds thus secured will be used in the construction of local improvements of a nature that will provide considerable employment. It is intended that these improvement works be completed prior to August 1 in order that all labor possible may be available to harvest this year's grain crop.

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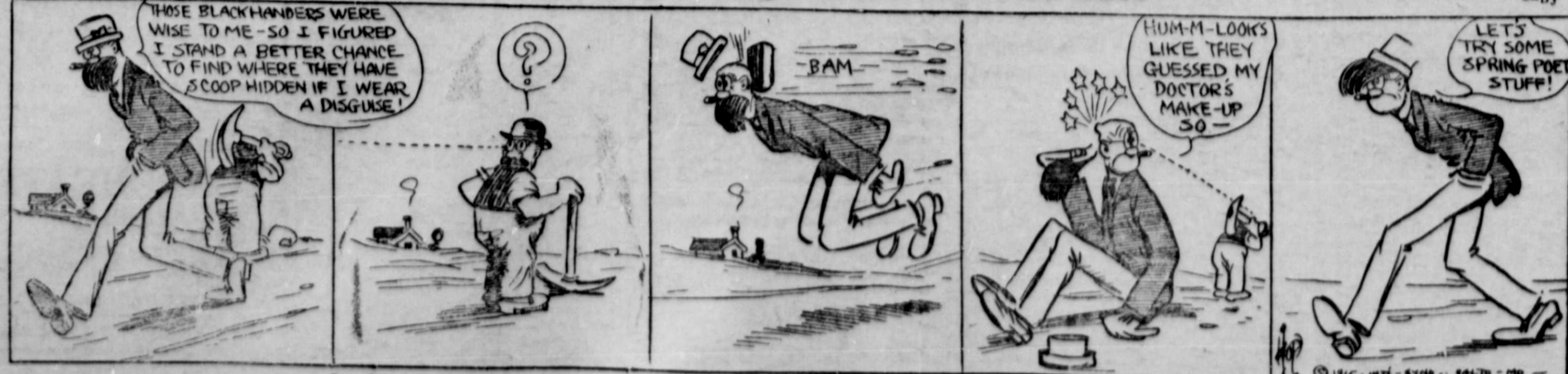

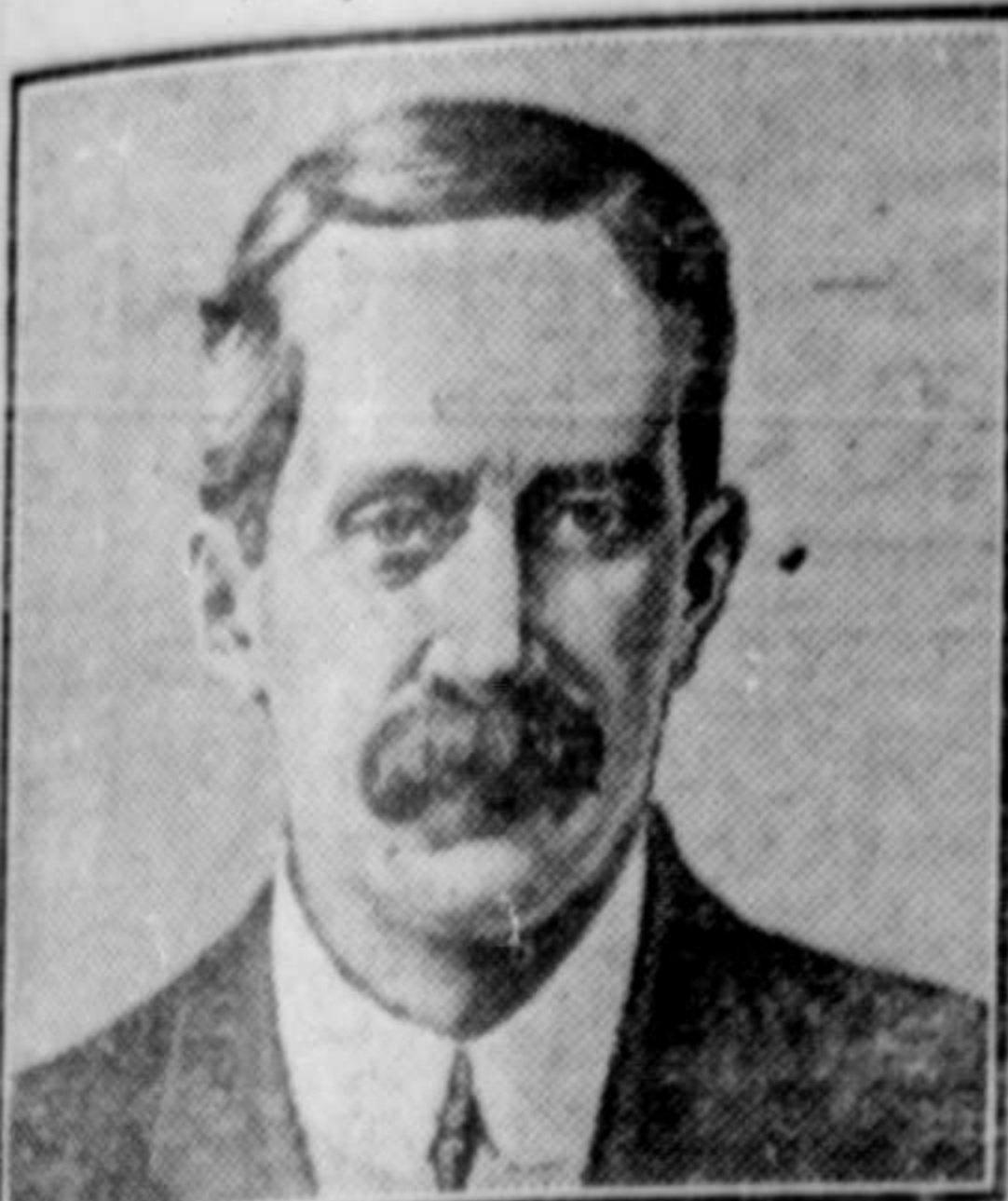

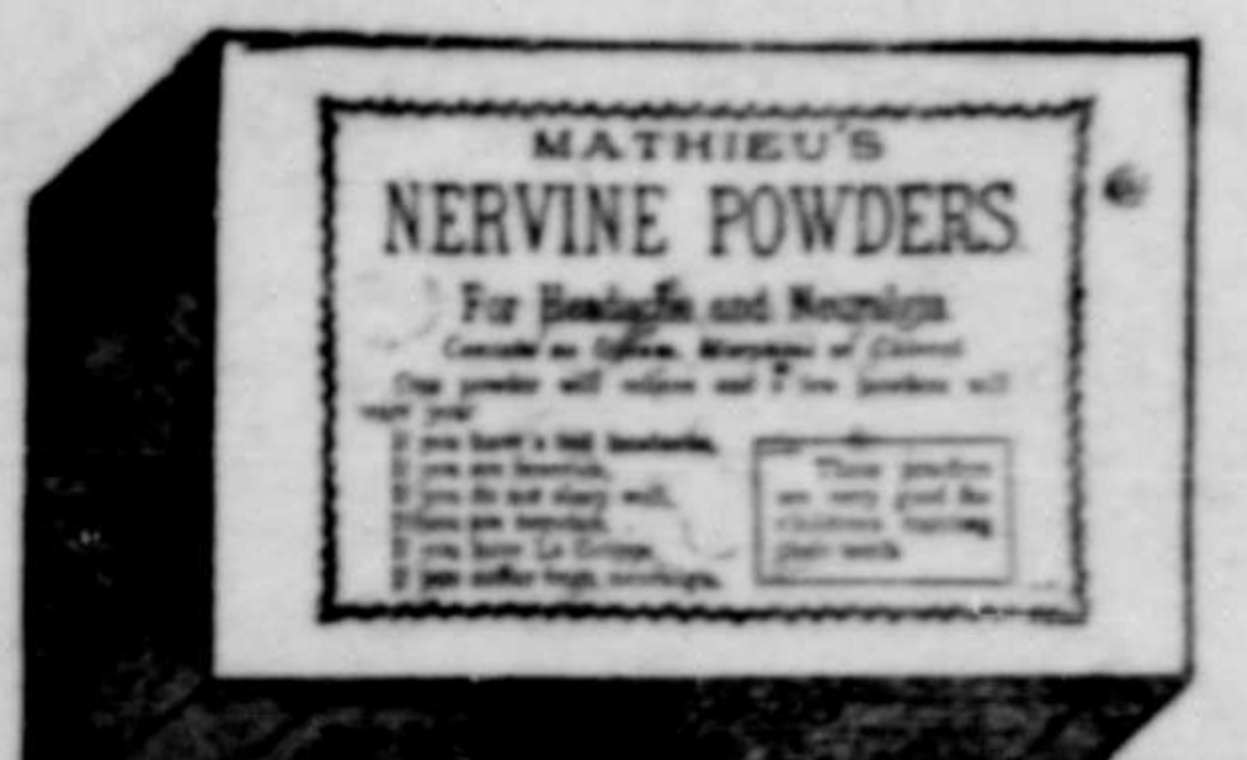

THE GREAT WORK OF THE ALLIED NAVIES

The following is from a recent issue of the Naval and Military Record:

"The magnitude of the task which the navies of the allied powers have performed since the outbreak of the war is in a measure indicated by the fact that a year ago the actual tonnage of Germany's merchant shipping stood second in the world, and in eight months the German flag has been swept off the seas. This means that the enemy's mercantile marine, which consisted of 2,388 steam and sailing vessels, with a total tonnage of nearly 5,500,000, has been paralyzed, so that, apart from the fact that the enemy's food supply has been jeopardized, the income of the holders of shares in many of the shipping companies has been depleted almost to vanishing point.

"This has already been shown by the reports of some German steamship companies for 1914, and now the report for the Reederei Aktiengesellschaft of Hamburg permits of a comparison in the case of sailing ships. According to The Financial Times, the Reederei is the biggest concern in Germany engaged in the sailing ship trade, and formerly had a wide connection, mainly in South American ports. The break of hostilities brought the earning power of the company to a complete end, and eleven vessels were captured."
