## FIELD MARSHAL FRENCH ADDRESSES TROOPS

### ITALIANS DESTROY AUSTRIAN FORT—SEATTLE HAS BIG DYNAMITE EXPLOSION

#### SIR JOHN FRENCH SAYS YPRES RESISTANCE WILL SHORTEN WAR

FIELD MARSHAL FRENCH ADDRESSES TROOPS—ALLIES MAKE PROGRESS—ITALIAN ARTILLERY DESTROYS AUSTRIAN FORT ON TRENTINO FRONT—AUSTRIANS FIRE ON WHITE FLAG.

(Special to The Daily News.)  
London, May 31.—Field Marshal Sir John French, in an address to the troops who fought in the second battle of Ypres, said the resistance offered against a huge concentration of German infantry and artillery, aided by the use of asphyxiating gases, had done a great deal to shorten the war.

**New Progress.**  
Paris, May 29.—An official report says: "In the section north of Arras we have made new progress. After having repulsed with complete success a German counter attack on our trenches at Albain, we took the offensive and

captured at first the greater part of the houses of Albain, which the enemy held.

"We are again masters, and holding the entire village at Neuville St. Vaast. Street fighting has occurred and we took a new group of houses in the western outskirts."

#### Austrian Fort Destroyed.

London, May 31.—(Official, via Rome)—Italian artillery has destroyed the armored fort of Lusernon, the Trentino fort, in the Austrian Tyrol. When the white flag was hoisted, the fort of Belvidoes turned its guns on Luserna. The summit of Veszana, and the village below, are occupied by the Italians.

#### WHITE STAR LINER CHASED BY SUBMARINE

Queenstown, May 31.—The White Star liner Megantic, from Liverpool to Montreal, was chased by a submarine off the south coast of Ireland yesterday but outdistanced the diver when sixty miles off Cork.

W. J. McCutcheon has a letter from Wilfred Macdonald describing two skirmishes which must have taken place before the wounding of Major Peck and Captain Moore.

Constable Wm. Adams has received a letter from Pte. W. H. Kirk. He has been transferred to the Canadian-Scottish. The boys had been in the trenches for five days when the letter was written.

The censor cut out all details of place and incident from the letter. "Scotty" Dennis has an interesting letter from Malcolm Lamb, in which he tells of a Prince Rupert Belgian who wandered away from the lines and was captured by the French as a German spy and held prisoner for five days.

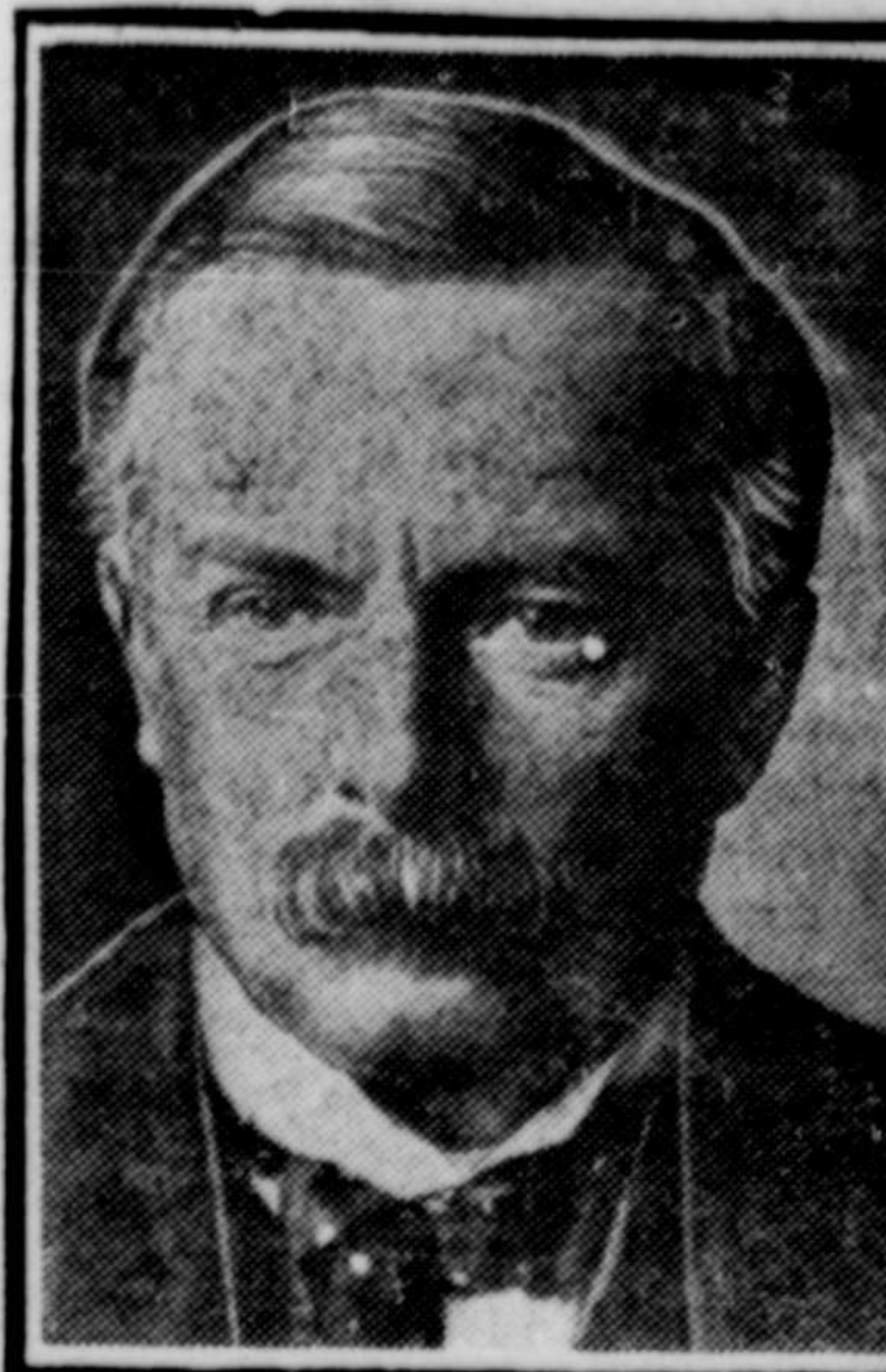

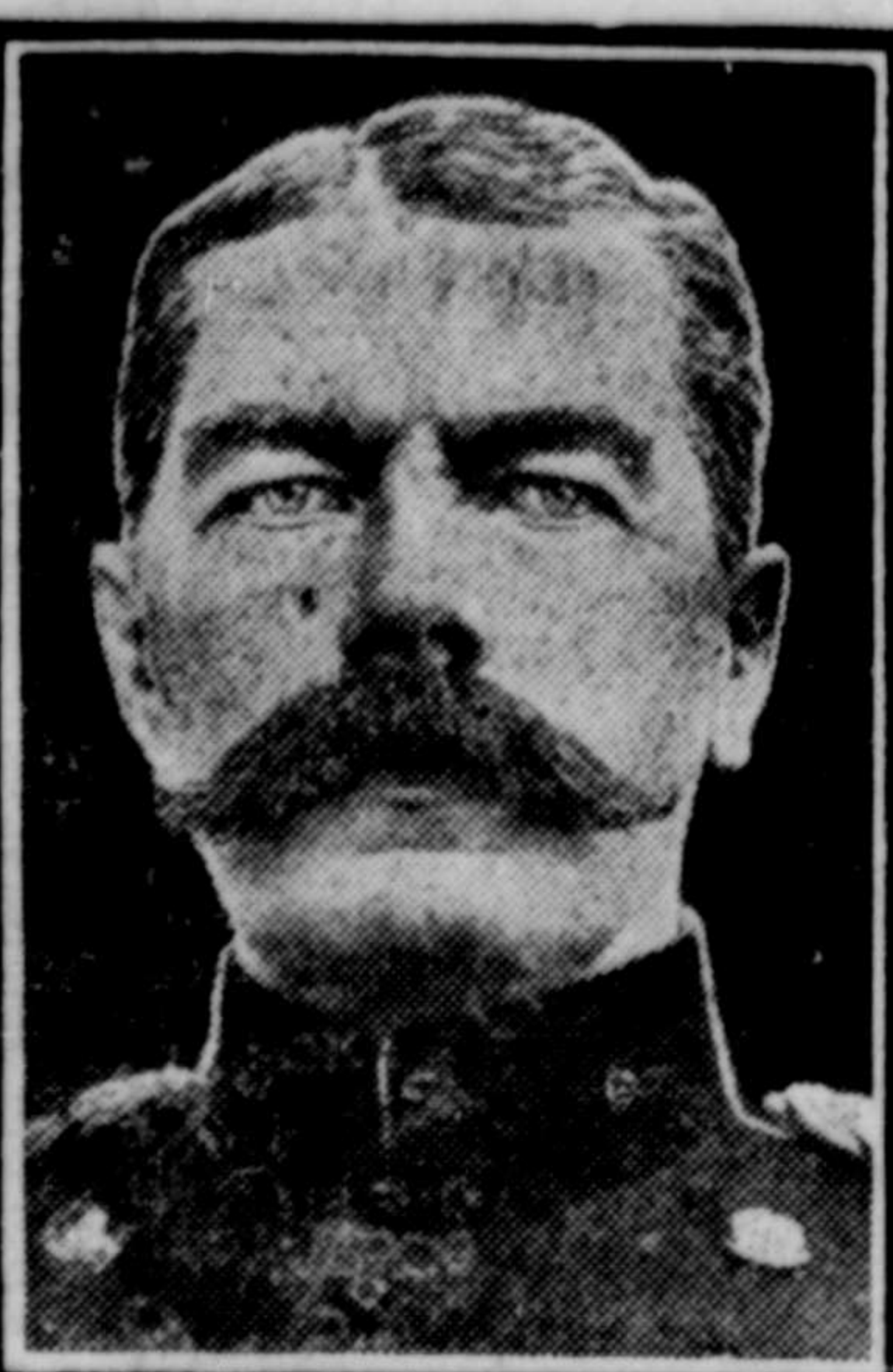

#### JACK DOWLING WRITES LIVE ACCOUNT OF LIFE IN TRENCHES

DESCRIBES HOW GERMANS USE ASPHYXIATING GASES AND HOW THEY ARE COMBATTED—JACK COMES ACROSS MR. WARTON'S GRAVE—LOCAL BOYS ARE NOW IN KILTS.

The following very interesting and splendidly written letter has just been received by Mrs. F. W. Dowling from Jack, who is now in the trenches. For a boy of only seventeen, this account of trench life shows remarkable descriptive powers and no little literary ability:

Dear Mother and All:

We are now billeted quite a distance from the firing line, with the French farmers. We had quite an exciting week in the trenches for the first time. Of course, we were in the reserve trenches, but the reserve trenches are subject to a much heavier and more severe shell fire than the most forward trenches. We had the fortune to witness the uses of the German asphyxiating gases but our men have become accustomed, to a certain extent, in combating it and of course it worked to a disadvantage to the enemy. They fire this gas in shells and it bursts just ahead of our lines. It is a greasy, greenish-yellow, and is not transparent. The Germans follow up behind it, and as soon as it lifts they charge. But in this instance our men and also the French stuck to their machine guns. When the gas lifted on came the Germans in massed formation but our machine guns opened fire and mowed them down like hay. When the Germans stopped the British and French charged themselves, retaking their own trench and two German trenches. The French have a much more deadly gas, called turpenite, which I believe they are going to use. So much the better if they do.

I am now in the quartermaster's stores at the base and will not be in the trenches so much;

and I'm not over-anxious to be in the trenches any more than is necessary, because it's pretty hard on a man's nerves. I would also like to tell you not to believe in half this paper talk. We get papers and I have read the description of the battles we were in, and it was nothing short of a fairy tale. It looks to me that the papers like to overdo things, and, for your own sake, don't take any notice of them.

Sergeant Godenrath asks me to send his best regards and to say that Mrs. Godenrath had received an appointment and is now in Ottawa. Major Gibson and the rest of the boys also send their best regards.

England did not appeal to me very much, but I have not given up the hope of seeking its pleasures yet. I did not see very much of it while I was there, but I intend to see more. I have seen more of France in two weeks than I saw of England in seven weeks. Its quaint and ancient customs unknown to Western Canada appeal to me; for instance, the farmhouse where we are billeted was built in 1714 and it still has its big fireplace, its cobbled floors, its big treadmill turned by dogs—and I can say they are the sort of things that appeal to a Westerner. When a man leaves here for Canada, they say the call of the wanderlust is in him, and he has gone to that country that calls men (men, in its true sense) and it seems funny to hear them, but, without any exaggeration, Canada does need the sturdy ones, or, at least, the best. I hardly think the common city folk of England or France would find it an easy job to make a good living in the Wild and Woolly West, as they call it.

#### AMERICAN PRESS COMMENTS ON GERMANY'S REPLY TO NOTE

GERMANY JUSTIFIES SINKING OF LUSITANIA ON GROUNDS OF SELF-DEFENCE—NEW YORK PRESS DESCRIBES REPLY AS INSINCERE, EVASIVE AND PETTIFOGGING.

(Special to The Daily News.)  
New York, May 31.—The German reply to the American note regarding the sinking of the Lusitania and the submarine warfare generally is pretty much as was forecasted by the American press.

In New York editorial comment, it is characterized as polite and evasive. The World describes it as insincere and pettifogging. The Tribune says it will not satisfy American opinion.

The note raises the question as to whether the Lusitania was armed, and seeks to justify the action on the grounds that Germany was acting in self-defence

in destroying ammunition, which was consigned to an enemy.

Full details of the communication are not yet to hand.

#### Lacrosse.

#### SUBMARINES BUSY IN ENGLISH CHANNEL

#### TERRIFIC DYNAMITE EXPLOSION AT SEATTLE

Seattle, May 31.—Fifteen tons of dynamite, loaded on a scow, awaiting shipment to Russia, exploded here on Sunday morning.

The damage resulting from broken windows in the city amounts to \$50,000. The shock was felt for a distance of forty miles.

The authorities believe the explosion was the result of a German plot to prevent the dynamite reaching Russia. The watchman is missing and is believed to have been killed.

### NAVAL LOSSES.

The Majestic, Triumph, and Goliath have been recently lost in the Dardanelles. Such losses need not cause undue pessimism. Naval losses must be looked for in these narrow, strongly fortified seas. Sea fighting close in to land forts has always been looked upon by experts as extremely dangerous, and in some quarters as sheer folly. The Allies were quick to discover that, in the Dardanelles operations, a strong land force co-operating with the fleet is necessary, in order to accomplish the tremendous task of taking Constantinople.

The ships which have been lost are all of slow, old types, which are useless for the speedy work required in the North Sea. The little sea fighting which there has been has shown conclusively that speed and weight of projectile are the great necessities of present-day naval warfare, therefore such types as the Majestic are only useful in such work as they are engaged in, in the Dardanelles. If these ships do go under, the loss is comparatively small, if the crews can be saved.

These losses have been more than counter-balanced by recent additions of superdreadnoughts, and fast light cruisers. Shortly after the outbreak of war the Berbow and Emperor of India, each carrying eight 13.1-2-inch guns, were put in commission, and more recently the Queen Elizabeth, with a broadside of eight 15-inch guns, has been completed and sent to the Dardanelles, where she has done deadly execution with her huge shells, thrown from a safe distance, her fire being directed from aeroplanes. Though nothing has been made public, it is almost certain that three more of her type, the Warspite, the Valiant, and the Barham, are now at sea.

With these additional superdreadnoughts, and a number of very fast light cruisers, of the type which proved so

effective off Heligoland, the British fleet is very much stronger than at the outbreak of war. All that the North Sea fleet lacks is a sight of the enemy.

### SUBMARINE HISTORY.

While the submarine, as used in the navies of the world, is more of an evolution than an invention, there still survives the man who can be fairly credited with being the creator of the modern submarine. This is John P. Holland, inventor of the Holland submarine, the first type of under-water vessels ever actually accepted and adopted by the United States navy. It is rather a curious chapter in invention, considering it in all of its phases.

Fifty years ago, John P. Holland was one of the active leaders of the Fenian Brotherhood. He was one of the ardent believers in the possibility that Ireland might some time achieve absolute independence of England by force. He was interested in bringing about the Fenian raid in Canada, which narrowly escaped embroiling the two countries in war, and also in the abortive Fenian uprising in Ireland, which came to such a melancholy end. But he never fully believed that the military power of England could be overthrown by any uprising of the kind.

His fixed idea was that the way to Irish success would come through the breaking down of England's naval power, and this he conceived possible of accomplishment only through the perfection of submarine craft. For the accomplishment of this end, for this purpose, he devoted his entire thought and energy to the solution of the problem of a practicable submarine torpedo boat. He was looked upon as an impractical dreamer by his associates, but he stuck to his task until success came.

Thirty years after the collapse of the Fenian movement the first Holland submarine was built by him for the navy

of the United States and passed the tests required of it. A dream of Irish liberty was thus responsible for the creation of the naval weapon which may, in further development, although it has not yet done so, entirely revolutionize naval warfare.—Seattle P.-I.

### GERMAN CONFESSION OF MISCALCULATION

The German newspaper Der Tag, which during the first month of the war shouted, "Herr Gott, sind diese Tage Schoen" (O Lord, how delightful these days are), has arrived now at a totally different state of mind, and declared recently:

"So many of our calculations have deceived us. We expected that British India would rise when the first shot was fired in Europe, but in reality thousands of Indians came to fight with the British against us. We anticipated that the whole British Empire would be torn to pieces, but the colonies appear to be closer than ever united with the Mother Country. We expected a triumphant rebellion in South Africa, yet it turned out nothing but a failure.

"We expected trouble in Ireland, but instead, she sent her best soldiers against us. We anticipated that the party of 'peace at any price' would be dominant in England, but it melted away in the ardour to fight against Germany. We reckoned that England was degenerate and incapable of placing any weight in the scale, yet she seems to be our principal enemy."

### CANADIAN STEAMER SUBMARINE VICTIM

Cardiff, Wales, May 29.—The steamer Morwenna, of Montreal, was torpedoed and shelled by a German submarine at midday Wednesday at a point 160 miles west by south of St. Ann's Head.

One member of the crew of the vessel was killed, while three were wounded. The others have been landed safely at Milford Haven, Wales. The Morwenna was owned by the St. Lawrence Shipping Company.

The Morwenna was bound from Cardiff for Sydney, Cape Breton, in ballast. The Belgian trawler Jaqueline picked up the crew.

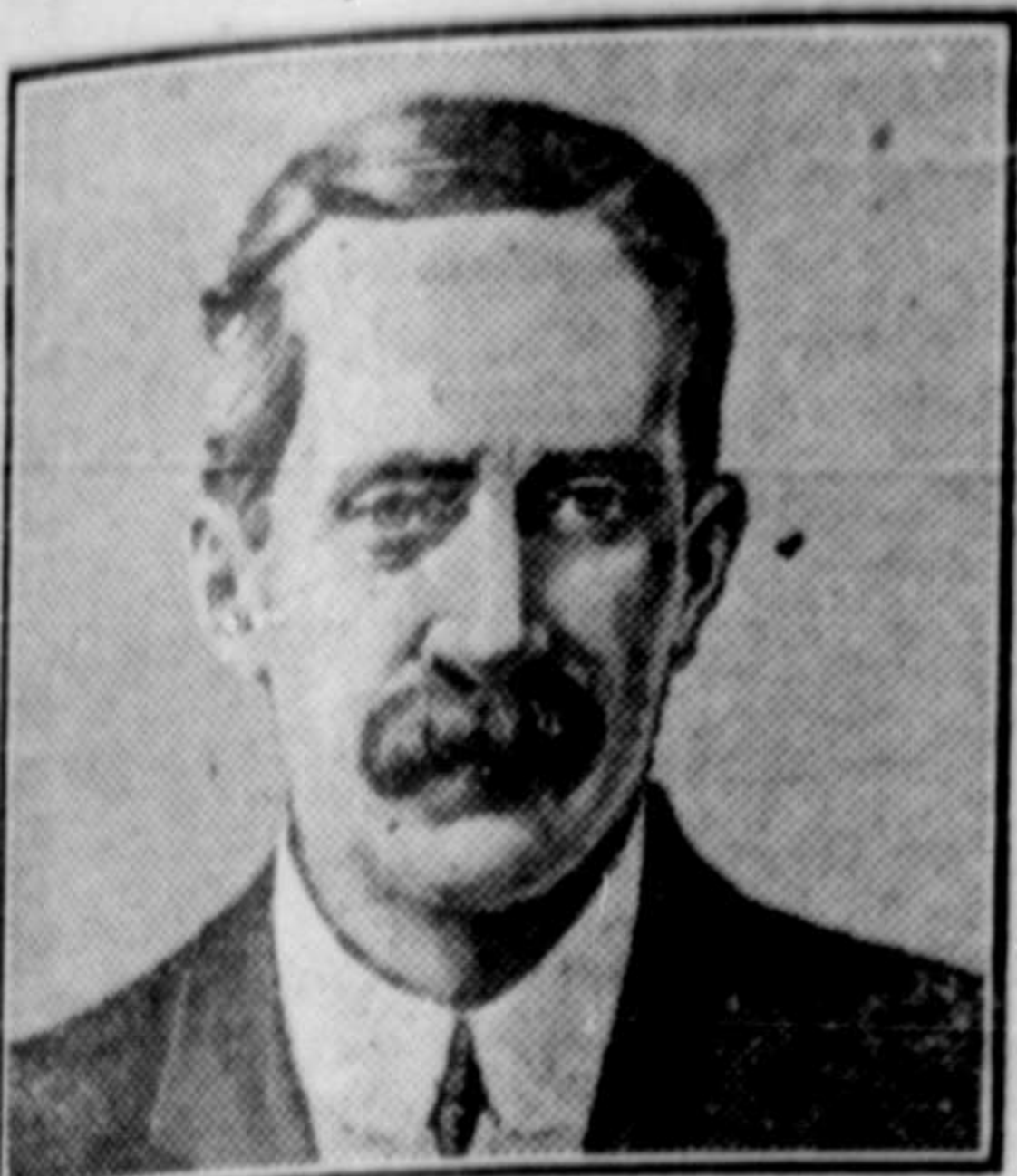

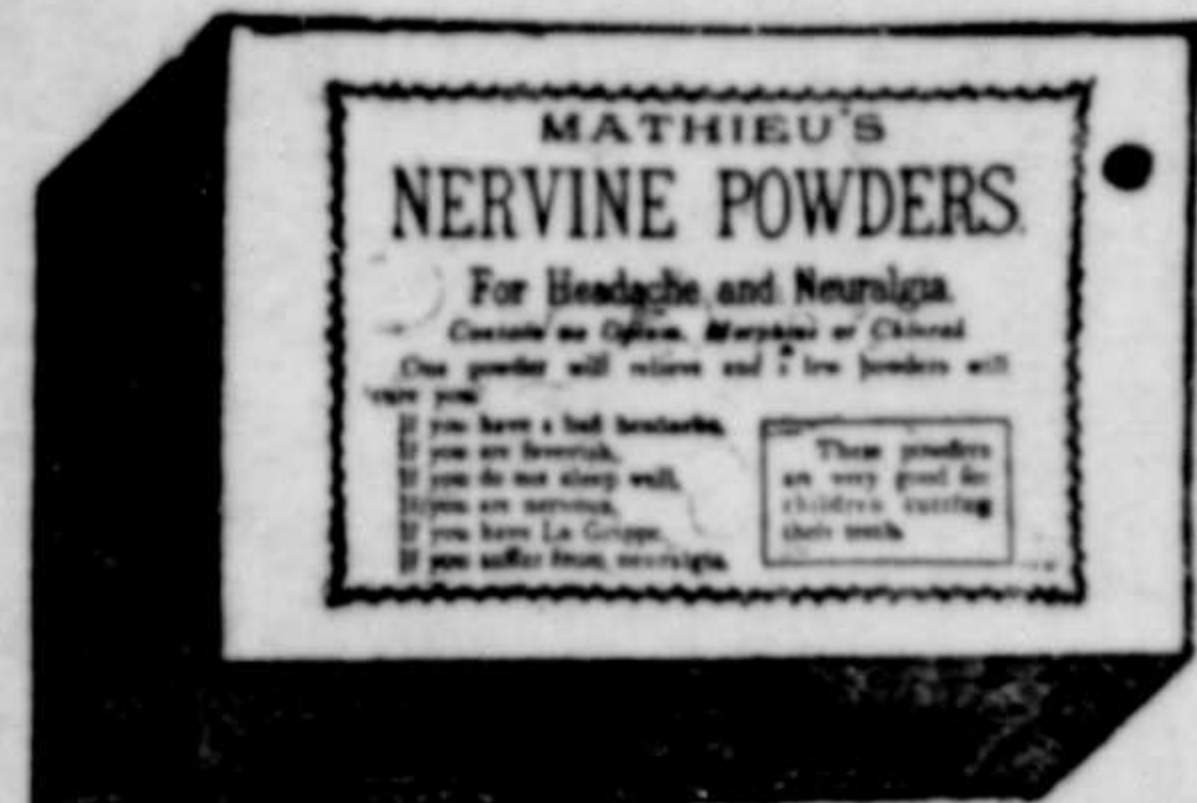

This has dragged into the mire the es-cutechons of Saxony, Bavaria, Swabia and Wuerttemberg to the eternal disgust of many American citizens of German descent like myself."

"Some of us wish to express our indignation and abhorrence of this damnable deed, which has been foisted by these Prussian vi-pers upon the fair name of old Germany. May the ultimate just retribution for these murders be vested where it rightfully belongs, upon the Prussian, the Branden-burger and the Brunswicker. This from a granddaughter of the men of '48."

## JACK DOWLING WRITES LIVE ACCOUNT OF THE LIFE IN THE TRENCHES

(Continued From Page One.)

We are quite interested in the aeroplanes. Their part in this war is no little bit, and we had quite a good chance to study their operations while in the trenches. Very seldom you will see a fight between them, because the Taube always runs away because he knows he cannot scare our men.

Captain Brown, who is quartermaster in our battalion, is the man who used to be in partnership with Flexman in the furniture business, and you will also remember he was at one time our scout master. He says he is glad to have at least two of his old corps with him at the front. I am in his stores.

Just before we left the trenches to come into billets, I came across the grave of Warton, of Fisher & Warton. He was killed by a big shell while his corps was constructing a bridge across a canal.

We have quite a time figuring out the money over here. They use English, French, and Belgian coins and when they hand you three different kinds of coin in about a franc of change it takes a little figuring; but we manage to get along, all right. I can speak enough of French now to get anything I want at a store. I studied it in England and it certainly comes in handy. I will be a French-Scotch-English-Canadian when I get back—after fighting in France, wearing kilts, training in England, and born in Canada. It's certainly some combination. They say a man goes through seven stages of life while on this earth. Well, if you know anybody who wants to go through them quick, you send them over here—they will go through them, all right.

You have my address in my first letter. We are the 16th Battalion, Canadian-Scottish, 3rd Brigade, France (No. 1 Co.). I have had no mail while over here and I am waiting anxiously.

Well, I think I will close. Hoping to hear soon,

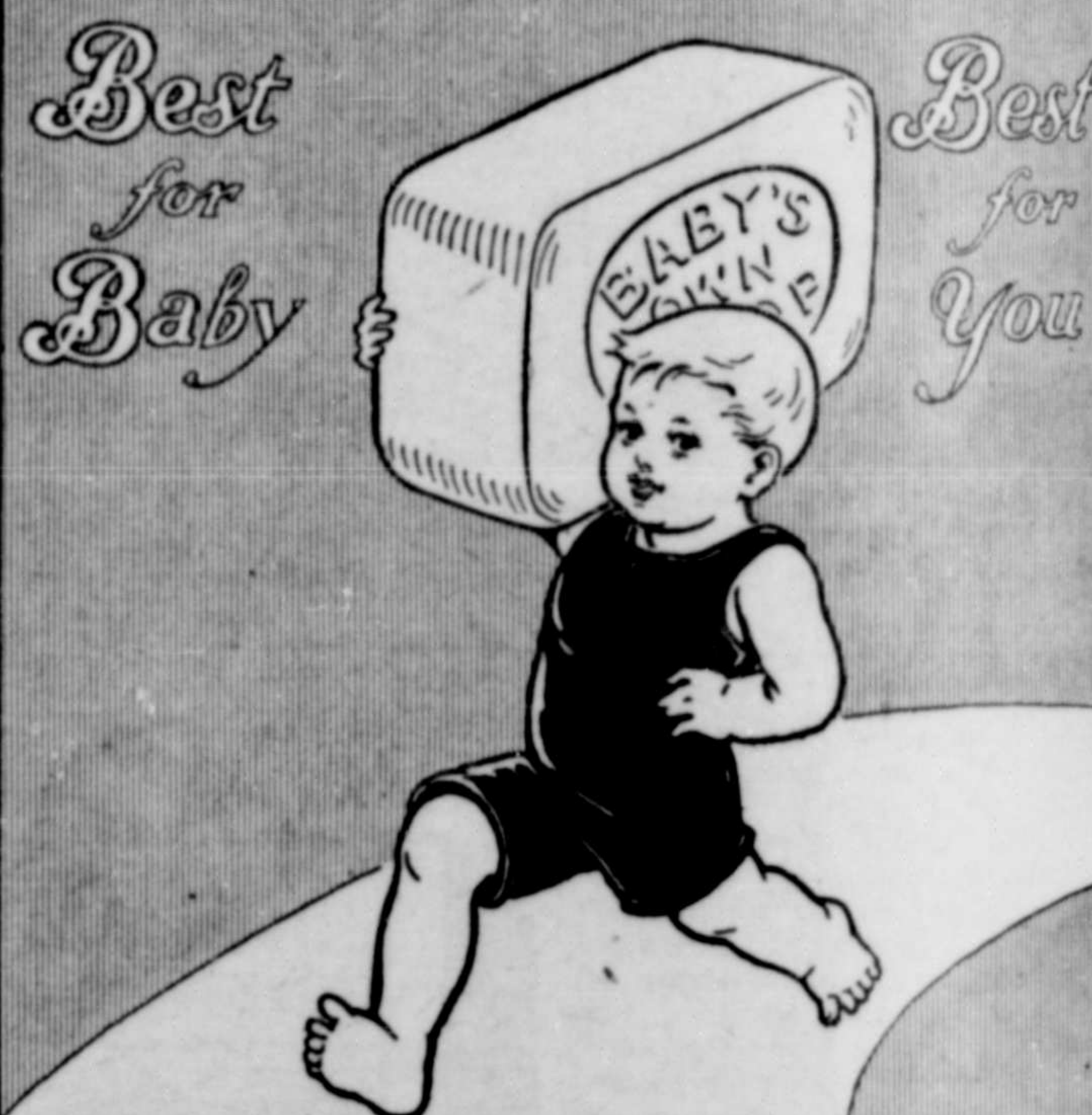
