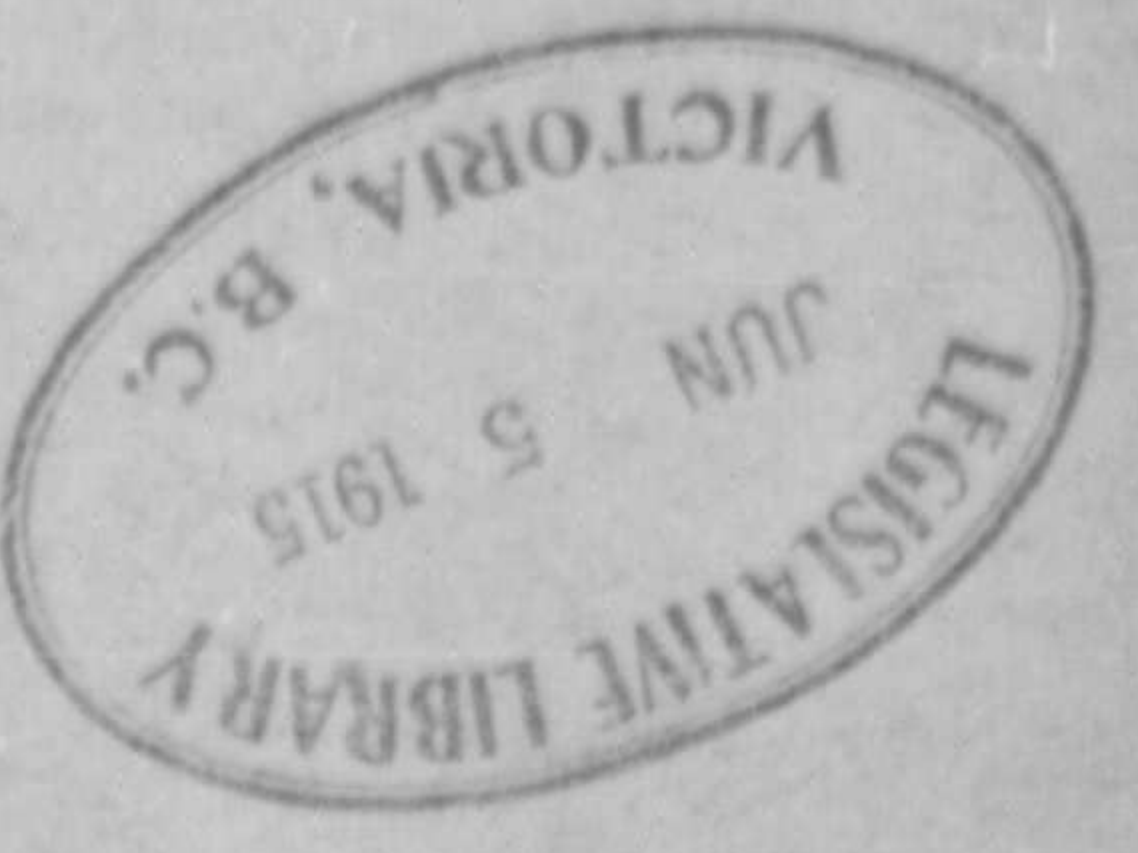

LONDON RAIDED BY ZEPPELINS LAST NIGHT

PUGET SOUND FORTS TAMPERED WITH—ITALIANS ARE STEADILY ADVANCING

LONDONERS WAKE UP TO FIND THEY MISSED A ZEPPELIN RAID

THE LONG EXPECTED RAID DID LITTLE DAMAGE—MILLIONS KNEW NOTHING OF IT UNTIL THEY READ REPORT—MAJESTIC OFFICERS SAVED—RUSSIAN SUCCESSES.

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, June 1.—The long expected Zeppelin raid on London was made last night, and millions of people remained in utter ignorance of the fact until they read the Admiralty report in the papers this morning.

Very little damage was done. Several fires were started but were soon quelled.

Majestic Officers Saved.
London, June 1.—The Admiralty has made an announcement that all the officers of the Majestic were saved. The transportation of Turkish troops in the Cardanellas is being impeded by a British submarine which is cruising off Constantinople.

Russian Successes.
Petrograd, June 1.—An official

report says: "In the Shavli region, the Germans continue to resist our offensive with violent fire, but the fighting in this district continues in our advantage."

"On the front between the River Pilica and the upper Vistula, we captured 109 officers and 18,617 rank and file.

"In Galicia, the battle on San River is developing in our favor. Our troops have successfully assumed the offensive. Last night we crossed the River Lubaczowka and occupied the village of Monasterzn, inflicting heavy losses upon the enemy.

"An offensive move by the enemy along the road from Jaroslau to Radymno in an easterly direction has been stopped by our fire."

SENSATIONAL DISCOVERY AT PUGET SOUND FORTS

Port Townsend, June 1.—A sensational discovery was made last night. The breechlocks have been removed and the loading mechanism destroyed on four guns, including the siege guns mounted at Fort Flagler. The discovery followed a report at Fort Worden had been photographed, the location of the guns and the hidden batteries being revealed. Sight-seers have been forbidden to visit the batteries and extra guards have been mounted.

These forts are situated at the entrance to Admiral Inlet, in Puget Sound, almost directly opposite Victoria, B. C.

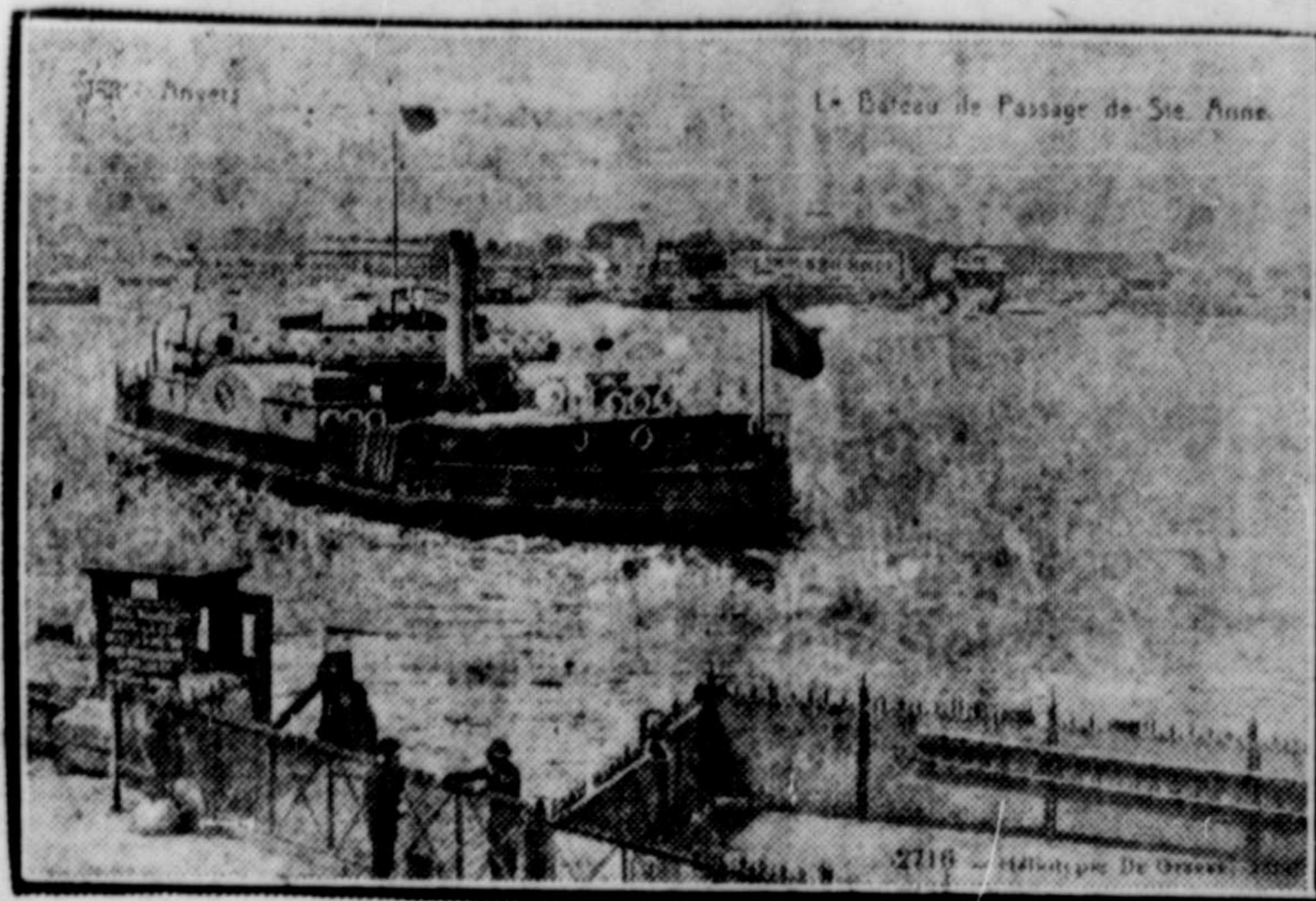

PARTIES OF TOURISTS COMING THIS SUMMER

News has been received that several parties of tourists are passing through Prince Rupert enroute to the Panama Exposition in July next.

One party consists of over 100 people from points east of Winnipeg. They will reach Prince Rupert about July 14th next, and wish to stay over long enough in Prince Rupert to make side trips.

Another party consisting of young ladies, winners in newspaper contests, over 100 strong, will arrive here July 21st. They are intending to stay over half a day, but if side trips can be arranged will make a longer stay. They come from Halifax, Montreal, London, Boston (Mass.), Lawrence (Mass.), Manchester (N. H.), Detroit, Winnipeg, Edmonton, Calgary, etc. Over \$30,000 of newspaper publicity has already been given to this party and the Eastern press has arranged to have reports of their progress through the districts covered wired daily to each paper interested.

Another party consists of educators county and city superintendents of schools, etc., and will arrive early in August at Prince Rupert. They are making a stop-over in Prince Rupert for side trips of one day or longer, provided there are facilities for convenient sight-seeing. These people will have a special train, and come from points in Minnesota, North and South Dakota, Iowa, Illinois and Nebraska.

The Board of trade has the matter of entertaining these parties by way of organizing transportation facilities, etc., under consideration.

There is no doubt that Prince Rupert will get considerable notice through parties of this description, of which the above seem to be the advance guard of the 1915 travel.

G. T. P. NEW SCHEDULE BEGINS NEXT WEEK

W. C. C. Mehan, general superintendent of the G. T. P., returned Sunday evening from Edmonton, after having made arrangements for the starting of the new train schedule. The first train under the new arrangement will arrive in Prince Rupert on Wednesday, June 9, at 6:15 p. m., and the first departure will be on Thursday, June 10, at 10:30 a. m.

Thereafter, trains will arrive in this city on Monday, Thursday and Saturday evenings at 6:15, and will leave for the east on Monday, Wednesday and Friday mornings at 10:30.

Every Monday morning a tourist car will leave Prince Rupert in addition to the standard sleeper. These cars are electrically lighted throughout, having electric reading lamps at either end of the berths, both upper and lower. In order that tourists may travel in luxury, in the hottest weather, through the Northern Alps, and along the wonderful Skeena River, the company has provided electric fans which keep a continuous current of cool fresh air circulating.

Another great advantage resulting from the changed schedule is that all trains will now go right through to Winnipeg.

Commencing on Monday, June 8, the Grand Trunk Pacific Steamship Company will make three trips each way weekly between Seattle, Victoria, Vancouver and Prince Rupert. The steamers Prince Rupert and Prince George will make the runs in the fastest time ever made on the Coast. The boats will leave Vancouver on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays at 12 midnight, arriving in Prince Rupert at 6:30 a. m. on Thursdays, Saturdays and Mondays. Returning boats will leave Prince Rupert on Thursdays, Saturdays and Tuesdays at 10 a. m. and will arrive in Vancouver Fridays, Sundays and Wednesdays at 4 p. m.

The boat which arrives in Prince Rupert on Mondays will make the trip to Anyox.

ITALIANS STEADILY ADVANCE KEEPING THE AUSTRIANS MOVING

ITALIANS OCCUPY THE HEIGHT OF ZUGNA AND MOUNT BELVEDERE—INFANTRY SOLIDLY ESTABLISHED—ALL ATTACKS REPULSED—GERMAN CONSULATE BOMBARDED.

Rome, June 1.—(Official)—Our forces continue to advance beyond the Tyrol along the Trentino frontier. They now occupy the height of Zugna, dominating Bovertio. The Austrian fort of Belvedere is weakening and our infantry is solidly established and Mt. Belvedere is in our hands.

Our Alpine troops repulsed five attacks of a machine gun battalion on Mt. Croco, putting the enemy to final flight.

Near the northeast of Paneveggio, a hostile detachment began to retire itself, but was forced to retire before our fire.

Consulate Bombarded.

Paris, June 1.—As a result of the German consul at Haifa, Syria, inciting the Turks to fire on

a boat carrying a flag of truce and to violate the French graves at Haifa, a French cruiser bombarded the consulate after giving due notice. No other buildings were hit.

PHOTOGRAPHERS' PETITION.

The City Council had before it last night a petition from the local photographers asking that the license bylaw be amended in order to deal with transient photographers.

The petitioners suggested that all photographers who could not show that they had paid two months' rental for recognized business premises, not including hotels or boarding houses, be classed as peddlers, in order to protect taxpayers who were doing a legitimate business.

The matter was referred to the License Committee for report.

BERLIN BOARD OF TRADE PRESENTS RESOLUTIONS

Two lengthy resolutions, passed recently by the Board of Trade of Berlin, Ont., were read at the City Council last night. They dealt with the question of employment for ex-service men after the war, and that of Canadian fire losses.

In the first, they pointed out that many of the best men in the country had made great sacrifices in fighting for the Empire, and urged that some employment scheme be drawn up so that those brave fellows might be provided with employment on their return.

Many would be unfitted to return to their former work, and many others would come back to find their places filled.

The second resolution urged that steps be taken to reduce Canada's enormous fire losses. It pointed out that losses through fire in Canada are greatly in excess of such losses in European countries, and that, consequently, fire insurance rates are much higher.

Alderman Kerr remarked that Prince Rupert had a smaller fire loss pro rata than any city in Canada, and therefore the question was not a burning one here.

Berlin Board of Trade has sent copies of these resolutions to the Dominion government and to each provincial government, and all municipalities in the Dominion.

They were referred to the Finance Committee.

BORDEN SHOULD SPEAK.

From this time forward the responsibility for a war election—if an election there is to be—must rest squarely upon the shoulders of the Prime Minister. Sir Wilfrid Laurier has placed his views before the country in unmistakable terms. In his own striking phrase, he does not care to open the portals of office with the bloody key of a war-time struggle at the polls.

This offer from the responsible leader of Canadian Liberalism should induce Sir Robert Borden to end the uncertainty and political unrest in the country. Some of the most influential journals in touch with the Conservative managers at Ottawa persistently seek to prepare the way for an election by pointing to the country's great expenditure of money upon the war and to the sending forth of tens of thousands of young Canadians to battle, and by asking if it is not reasonable that the electors should share the responsibility with the government.

than with the intention of lessening the activity of Sir Robert Borden and his colleagues.

In some respects Liberal criticism has materially improved conditions. This is true particularly in regard to army contracts. Great sums of money were wasted during the first few months of the war by the awarding of contracts for supplies to party favorites, who, being unable in many cases to manufacture the required articles, peddled the contracts around among genuine manufacturers, and in not a few instances made more profit than the actual producers of the goods.

But while reserving their liberty of action in this respect, Liberals take the ground that purely party issues ought not to be raised either by the government or the opposition, and that, in effect if not in name, the government of Canada during the war should be national and non-partisan.

COL. H. M. ELLIOT, Assistant Adjutant General of the Toronto military division, and probably the most popular officer there, who will take command of the camp of 8,000 soldiers at Sewell, Man. He is an Imperial officer loaned to the Canadian government by the British authorities and has been in Toronto since 1913.

General Superintendent Fettes, of Foley, Welch & Stewart, leaves here on tonight's train for Vancouver in order to discuss with Mr. J. W. Stewart the future of construction on the line south of here. The announcement recently made of the release of a sum of about \$2,500,000 to the P. G. E. by the Dominion government provides for the completion of the line from the end of steel south to a point near the 100-mile house, on the Cariboo Road.

It is persistently rumored that Sir Richard McBride has secured a large sum for the continuation of railway work in this province, and it is anticipated that the Premier will return from England and make his plans public before very long, and that a provincial election will follow.

An indication which points to the starting up of work on the line south of here is the presence of the Foley, Welch & Stewart executive force here, and also of several prominent contractors who are identified with this construction work. None of the caches of supplies have been moved from points south of here to Prince George, as would be the case if there was no prospect of the resumption of construction in the near future.—Prince George Post.

THOUSAND DOLLARS RAISED EMPIRE DAY

Seattle, May 28.—One thousand dollars raised at the Empire Day celebration of the British-American Relief Association Tuesday evening brings the total, which has been forwarded by this Seattle organization to the Prince of Wales fund, to \$9,000.

More than 250 were present Tuesday evening, when patriotic speeches and musical numbers representing all countries were on the program.

Nearly \$1,000 has been raised each month since the relief association began its work in Seattle after the outbreak of the war. The Irish concert, held recently in the Metropolitan Theatre, swelled the fund to the extent of \$1,300.

MAIL POUCH RIFLED ON STEAMER MARIPOSA

Seattle, June 1.—The opening of one of the mail pouches on the steamer Mariposa during her recent trip from Alaska to Seattle is being investigated by the postoffice inspectors.

Before the Mariposa arrived here J. H. Thawites, mail clerk aboard the steamer, reported that while he was at dinner the mail room had been opened and one of the pouches rifled. Local inspectors were notified by wireless and a search of the steamer was made, also a surveillance kept on the passengers and the members of the crew.

The value of the pouch's contents is not divulged. It is believed that it contained a shipment of gold dust. Some of the currency shipped from Seward, Cordova, Juneau, and other points in Southeastern and Southwestern Alaska is reported missing.

SEVEN RUSSIAN GENERALS FIRED

Petrograd, May 31.—Seven generals of the Russian army have been removed from their commands as a result of the recent Austrian successes in Galicia. They have been retired. Five others have been relieved of field service and attached to the commissary and the transportation departments.

The change in personnel of commanding officers has been expected ever since Emperor Nicholas left for the front, and it therefore caused no surprise here. The names of the generals removed from active service have not yet been made public.

U. S. CRUISER NORTH CAROLINA AGROUND

Washington, May 31.—The United States cruiser North Carolina is aground within the outer harbor of Alexandria, Egypt, according to a report to the Navy Department by her commander, Captain J. W. Oman, who says the ship is undamaged and that dredging operations will be undertaken to release her.

Efforts made yesterday to release the North Carolina, Captain Oman reported, had failed. The cruiser Des Moines has arrived off Alexandria as relief to the North Carolina in Mediterranean waters.

BARBERS' PETITION.

At the City Council last night a petition, signed by ten of the twelve barbers in town, was read, asking that a bylaw covering their hours be framed, under the Shops Regulation Amendment Act.

They requested that barber shops be kept open from 8 a. m. until 7 p. m. on week days and from 8 a. m. until 10:30 p. m. on Saturdays and days preceding a holiday.

Two of the barbers who had signed the petition presented notice of withdrawal, as they had signed the petition on the understanding that they keep open until 8 p. m.

The city clerk reported that the petition did not carry the requisite number of signatures and suggested that the barbers draw up a new petition in proper order and present it at the next Council meeting.

LOCAL IMPROVEMENT REBATE.

At the City Council last night the city treasurer's report as to the question of a rebate on local improvement taxes to residents on Tenth Avenue and Conrad Street was presented, along with its approval by the city solicitor.

The report stated that no rebate could be made until the arrears of taxes had been met and the amount paid out of the general fund under this bylaw had been remitted. This could not be before 1916, when the last payments fall due.

Alderman Montgomery objected to this procedure as being unjust to those who had paid up.

The report was approved by the Council, Alderman Montgomery dissenting.

PREMIER HOTEL RENT.

The City Council last night heard the city solicitor's report regarding the city's liability for the rent of the old Premier Hotel during its occupancy by the Fusiliers.

The solicitor held that the city is in no way responsible for the rent of the building. He pointed out that the arrangement was carried out on behalf of the Militia Department, and that there was no agreement entered into between the city and the hotel proprietors.
