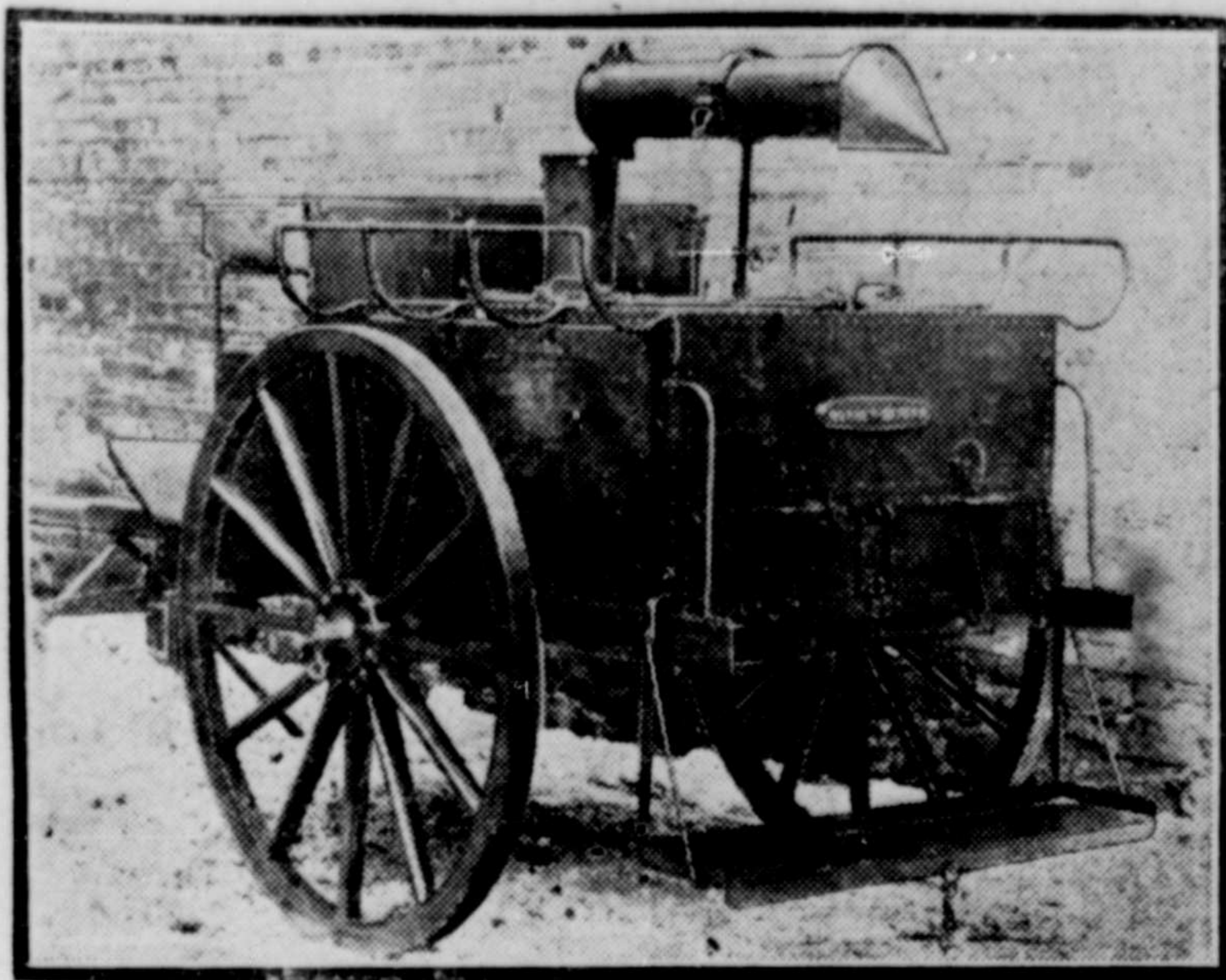
WANTS TO SMASH AT VANCOUVER FIRE--BULGARIA AND ROUMANIA MAKE COMPACT

BULGARIA AND ROUMANIA COME TO UNDERSTANDING

BULGARIA TO OPPOSE TURKEY AND ROUMANIA TO FIGHT AUSTRIA—RUSSIANS TAKE SIXTEEN THOUSAND PRISONERS—GERMANS USE GAS IN GALICIA—ALLIES PROGRESS.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Paris, June 2.—Bulgaria and Roumania have arrived at an understanding, and will enter the war together.
Roumania will proclaim war against Austria, and Bulgaria will pick up arms against Turkey. Roumania will cede back to Bulgaria the territory of Dobrudja, which has been the cause of so much friction between these two powers.
16,600 Prisoners.
Belgrade, June 2.—We have captured 16,600 prisoners in the last four days.

The gas cloud along the Austro-German front in Galicia extends for a distance of twenty miles.
Allies Progress.
Paris, June 2.—An official report says:
"Very spirited actions have extended in a section north of Arras. We realized new progress notwithstanding counter attacks. The enemy has been unable to dislodge us from the trenches conquered by us."
"In the woods near Auxoulet-tes we also maintained our gains."

POLICE ON TRAIL OF SEATTLE DYNAMITER

VANCOUVER FIRE AUTOS IN SERIOUS COLLISION

Vancouver, June 2.—Fireman Chas. D. Milne was killed, and Firemen H. Dunn, W. D. Reid, T. E. Laface, R. Dinsmore and C. T. Freeman were injured in a collision between a hose auto and a chemical engine going at fifty miles an hour at the corner of Burrard and Pender Streets at midnight last night on their way to a \$400,000 fire in the Percival Building, at the corner of Nelson and Helmcken Streets.

BODY OF MISSING MAN FOUND OFF ISLANDS

Word has been received by the provincial police here that the body of Thomas Doyle, of Naden Harbor, has been found by an Indian off Cape Edenshaw, on Graham Island of the Queen Charlottes. The whereabouts of the man has been sought for several weeks. The last that was seen of Doyle was on May 7, when he left Naden Harbor for Massett. It is believed that he met with some accident, and search has been made by the police ever since. The man was 35 years old.

FIRST STEP TO CONSCRIPTION-- REGISTRY OF MANHOOD ORDERED

NEW COALITION CABINET SEEMS TO BE PREPARING FOR CONSCRIPTION—STIRRING FIGHT AT CHAPEL LORETTE—450 PRISONERS TAKEN—SUBMARINE MURDERS.

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, June 2.—One of the first steps taken by the new coalition Cabinet is to order a registry of the manhood of the country. This is regarded as the first move towards some measure of conscription.

Violent Engagement.
Paris, June 2.—Northeast of Chapel Lorette a violent engagement has taken place in which the sugar refinery at Souchez has been the centre. This has extended over two days. It ended to our advantage. We had occupied the refinery, but during the night the enemy recaptured it. At daybreak, however, we drove them out. We are now masters of the

positions in spite of all counter attacks. We inflicted heavy losses on the enemy.

450 Prisoners Taken.
Paris, June 2.—Southeast of Neuville, we have taken several German trenches and 450 prisoners. The artillery duel at Lorette continues.

The Germans are again bombarding the city of Rheims, including the cathedral.

Submarine Murders.
London, June 2.—The steamer Saidish, bound from Alexandria to Liverpool, has been submarined in the North Sea. Seven of the crew, including the stewardess, were drowned. Forty-one survivors have been landed at Chatham.

PRINCE RUPERT AS A MINING CENTRE

(By A. C. Garde, Consulting Engineer.)

From the very earliest times, minerals and metals have been of great interest to all races, vied the Phoenicians, the Romans, the Britons, and the Chinese. The most direct way of adding to the wealth of the world is by winning precious metals from the crust of the earth.

When you mine, you bring to daylight shining metals that have been waiting, locked up in the rocks since the dawn of day. Today, metals are more interesting to men than usual, for they are the sinews of war. Copper, lead, zinc, and nickel are in greater demand today than at any other time in the world's history. War is one of the few things which actually destroys wealth. Fortunes are being shot to dust every day. One of the first lessons in chemistry is that matter is indestructible. The thousands of tons of copper, lead, and nickel, used up by the opposing armies and navies, are not really destroyed, but are rendered irrecoverable, and must be replaced by fresh supplies won from the virgin rocks.

Little wonder then that men are turning their thoughts and hands to mining. In the past, large quantities of the metals have been mined in British Columbia, but the vast storehouse of this wonderful province has been little more than sampled. Since 1852, the huge total of \$502,000,000 worth of minerals has been taken from the earth in British Columbia. This is made up of: Gold, \$154,000,000; silver, \$38,000,000; lead, \$32,000,000; copper, \$86,000,000; zinc, \$2,000,000; coal and coke, \$150,000,000; In round figures, this is a staggering total, yet British Columbia's production is increasing rapidly. At present \$30,000,000 worth of minerals are produced every year and there are hundreds of square miles of valuable

ORIGIN OF NICK-NAME "UNCLE SAM"

Hailing from the town which claims to have given the United States government its nickname of "Uncle Sam," H. B. Morris, member of the executive board of the Chamber of Commerce of Catskill-on-the-Hudson, is spending a few days in Seattle. Mr. Morris, who is accompanied by Mrs. Morris, called at the local Chamber of Commerce yesterday.

"The nickname of Uncle Sam, as applied to the United States government, originated in Catskill in 1812," said Mr. Morris. "Three brothers of the name of Wilson were in the meat business there and had a contract to supply the United States army, then at war with Great Britain, with meats. They were known locally as Uncle Sam, Uncle Jonathan, and Uncle Eben. The meat was shipped in barrels marked 'U. S.' Someone asked Uncle Eben what 'U. S.' stood for and was solemnly assured that it stood for Uncle Sam, the senior partner in the business. This story got out and traveled along with the barrels until it spread over the United States. The story is practically forgotten, but the nickname of Uncle Sam is international."—Seattle P.-I.

PRINCE RUPERT AS A MINING CENTRE

(Continued From Page One.) deposits still awaiting the miner.

Mining, either to the prospector or the capitalist, is a most fascinating occupation. It is different from any other business, in its lack of bitter competition and strife. The miner deprives nobody of anything. What he gains is there for all, and a lucky strike is a stroke of luck for the whole community. The prospector is pioneering for all who come after him, and often unconsciously lays the foundations of cities.

Mining is of particular interest to the people of Prince Rupert. The city is the centre of a mining area of 700 miles by 500 miles, the greater portion of which is still as it was formed ages ago. Tributary to this centre are the mining districts of Omineca, Peace River, Stikine, Liard, Atlin, Cassiar, Yukon, and Queen Charlotte Islands. Prince Rupert, being the centre of such a vast mineral-laden district, is the natural location for reduction and refining works.

Copper, the most important metal of today, is of particular interest to this district—and the price of it is soaring high. British Columbia produced 41,221,628 pounds of copper last year, and almost one-third of this was produced in this district, 117 miles from Prince Rupert. Many low-grade properties, which hitherto cost more than they were able to earn, will now be worked. The Granby Consolidated Mining Company at Anxoy is able to produce copper for 7 1-2 cents per pound, so that, even after the price of copper becomes normal again, there is still a safe margin for profits.

Where cheap power can be obtained, electric smelting will partly replace former methods and Prince Rupert with its great resources of water power will eventually become a favored location for plants designed along these new lines. This city has also the advantages of an open harbor all the year round, excellent dock facilities, and water transportation to any part of the world.

This article has merely touched on a few points in regard to this large and interesting subject, but enough has been said to show that in the near future Prince Rupert is certain to come into its own in the mining world.

The ground is splendidly adapted for viewing the game and any encroachment on the field of play is absolutely unnecessary.

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
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
