AUSTRIANS CLAIM PRZEMYSL IS RE-TAKEN

BRITISH SUBMARINE SINKS GERMAN TRANSPORT — KING'S BIRTHDAY HONORS

AUSTRIANS CLAIM THEY HAVE RETAKEN PRZEMYSL

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, June 3.—It was officially announced in Vienna yesterday that Przemyśl is again in Austrian hands. The fort was captured by the Russians on March 22, after a siege lasting 91 days, 120,000 prisoners being taken.

The Russians have held the fort for seventy days. The Austro-Germans bombarded it with heavy artillery for twenty days and expended more in men and ammunition in the retaking of it than were used up in the rush on Calais and the Yser.

HOW THE CANADIANS CAPTURED THE GUNS

Thrilling Description of Fighting Around St. Julien in a Letter From W. A. Mathieson.

The following interesting account of the capture of the four guns by the Canadians has been received by Fred Stork, in a letter from "Bill" Mathieson:

4th Northern General Hospital, Lincoln, Eng., May 10, 1915.

Dear Mr. Stork:

I am going to give you an account of the happenings to my bunch as I saw them myself.

Most of the Rupert Boys are with the 16th Battalion. I got with my old bunch, the Seaforths. We had the usual trench work around Armentieres first. I had a pretty good time, being section sniper, and would often ring 5 o'clock on the German loop-hole plates. We had quite a bit of fun, but were getting soft, so were taken out for hardening up by physical drill and route marches.

We were out about ten days when we were whisked away in London motor "busses" to Ypres, and took over the trenches from the French, the 16th Battalion facing Langemarek and adjoining the Algerians. We finished our four days and the 5th Royal Monarchs relieved us. Our second day out, I was on guard on a pontoon bridge north of Ypres, while the city was being violently bombarded, the debris landing in the canal and on the bridge. It was a sad sight to see the refugees pouring across the bridge.

When I got permission I slung away my pack and made for the 16th Battalion, which was marching out to St. Julien. At St. Julien we wheeled to the left and across the fields. We were soon told that the four 7-inch guns were captured and that we were to retake them, and out the Germans from the woods in front.

PUBLICITY.

If a man, or a business house, or a city have special lines to offer they must advertise. Merit usually comes into its own in the long run, but it gets there much quicker by a publicity campaign. It wasn't tea that made Lipton famous, it was advertising tea.

Every city in Canada is anxious to draw attention to its particular advantages, and Prince Rupert is no exception. In most cases such work is carried on by the Board of Trade, and usually at the expense of a few public-spirited men. If it is successful, the whole community benefits by it, and usually takes credit for it; if it is unsuccessful, the few public-spirited men are too often blamed.

Prince Rupert Board of Trade, in November, 1913, opened a Bureau of Information, in order to collect interesting facts and figures about Prince Rupert and the district of which it forms the centre, with a view to placing them before people who might be interested. Much valuable information has been collected about fishing, mining and lumbering, particularly. Enquiries at the rate of one hundred and fifty per month have been intelligently and conservatively answered; important visitors have been interviewed; articles have been published in various periodicals, and every question vital to the welfare of the city has been dealt with.

The bureau was able to furnish data to the gentlemen who worked so hard to obtain the fishing concessions recently granted, and is at present preparing a statement of the mineral resources of the district for Colonel Carnegie, while it also has under consideration the question of a copper refinery and reduction plant for the city. Valuable work has been done in regard to freight rates, passenger and mail service, customs clearances, etc.

The work has been carried on economically, but still at considerable expense to a num-

ber of public spirited gentlemen. Much valuable work has been done, and is still being done, and it seems unfair that a comparatively few private individuals should be burdened with the cost of work which is so important to the whole community. For instance, absentee property holders will benefit greatly from such a publicity campaign without contributing even one cent towards its prosecution. Funds are needed for the continuance of the work, and it is essential that the work should be carried on, and the present method of doing so seems to be the most economical and effective. Money is scarce and times are hard, but this is just the time to do publicity work. All over the country people are unsettled and considering changes, while in good times they are much more liable to be content with their present surroundings.

Prince Rupert has the goods, but it must keep on telling people that it has them.

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MAY HAVE BEEN PLOT TO DESTROY JAPANESE SHIP

Among the many theories suggested as to the scheme for destroying the dynamite at Seattle on Sunday is one that involves a plan to blow up the vessel supposed to be carrying it across the Pacific to Vladivostok. According to this view, the bomb which exploded was put among the powder not Saturday, but several days ago, with a clockwork attachment set to explode at a time when the vessel would be well out to sea, or, perhaps, at her destination at Vladivostok. It has been learned that it was the original intent of the shippers to load this explosive on the Kaifuku Maru at Tacoma.

The master of the Kaifuku received a threatening letter several days before his departure, indicating that his vessel would be blown up as a penalty for carrying munitions to the Russians. The vessel was thereupon guarded closely by the authorities at the request of the Japanese consul. As a further precaution, the powder shipment was refused at the last minute, and it was then planned to send the explosive out on the Shinsei Maru from Seattle. She also refused it, and it then became the purpose to send the explosive on the Hazel Dollar. In the meantime, however, the theorists think the hour arrived for which the explosion was set, and the scow incident followed.—Seattle P.-I.

ECHO OF GREAT BLAST REBOUNDED FROM HILLS

When fifteen tons of Hercules powder shook Seattle early Sunday morning residents in suburban hills and valleys heard the uproar of a titanic game of bowls as hill tossed the sound to mountain and mountain peak back again to hill. The first terrific clap which woke the city was prolonged for listeners in many situations into a sturdy uproar lasting several minutes. Speeding across the Sound, the reverberation met the barrier of the Olympics, and on the East the Cascade range, so that for many it continued to growl even after the great mushroom column of smoke over Elliott Bay had dissolved into clean air.—Seattle P.-I.

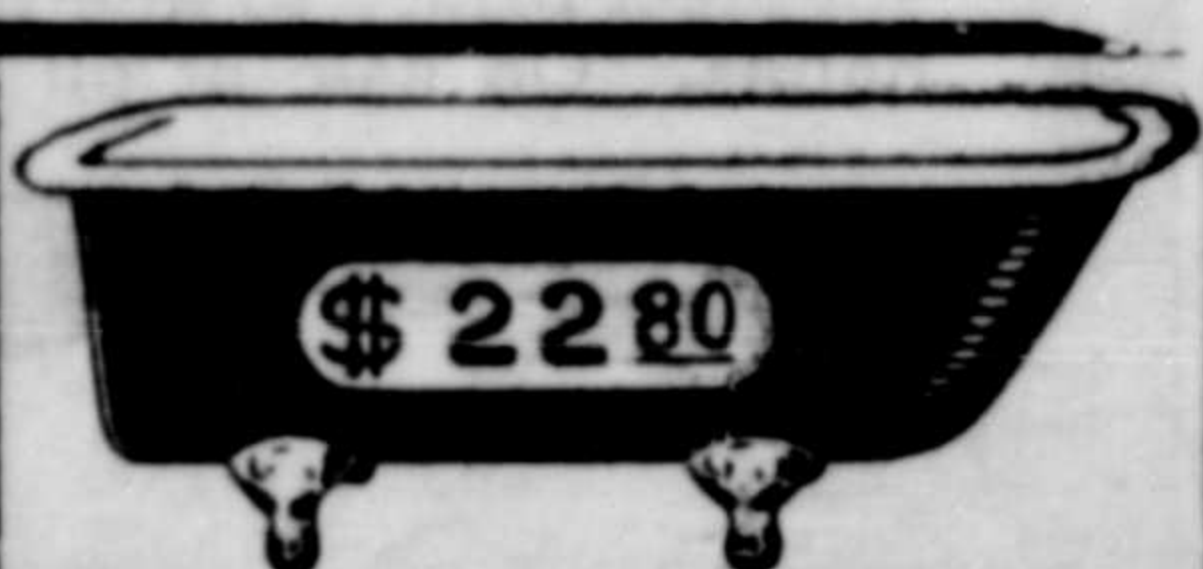

GERMANY'S REPLY
EVADES THE ISSUE

Washington, D. C., June 3.—Germany's failure even to discuss the reparation demanded by the American note and evasion of the request that guarantees be given that American vessels and lives be not endangered in the future are the main points, however, which the U. S. government, it was generally believed last night, would refer to in the second note. The expressions of regret and offers of reparation for unintentional attacks on neutral ships are expected to have little weight in determining the nature of the response of the United States.

While it is generally thought the United States will answer Germany's request for facts with a restatement of the facts as recited in the American note of May 13, the promptness with which the reply will be despatched is counted upon to serve as an indication that the American government wishes an early answer and does not desire to engage in a protracted diplomatic discussion.

Persons close to President Wilson have learned that he is determined to obtain reparation for the Lusitania victims and assurances of respect for American rights in future and that, failing in this, he would not hesitate to sever diplomatic relations with Germany.

In German quarters here it was reiterated again last night that the Lusitania was armed.

To controvert this, the United States has proof, gathered before the American note was sent, that there were no guns aboard. Furthermore, the British government entered into an informal agreement with the United States early in the war to see that no British vessels left American ports armed.

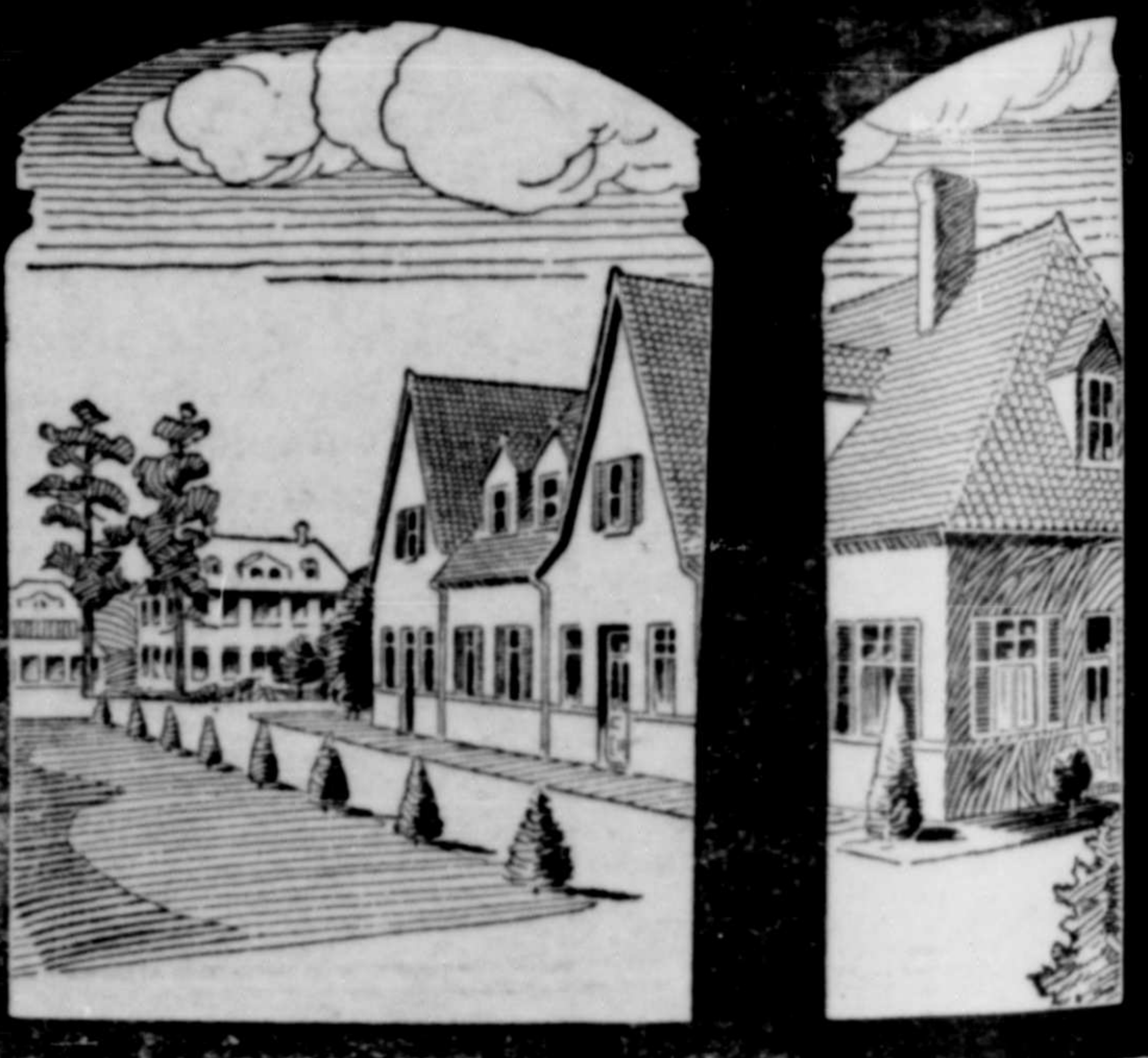
