## GERMAN BASE TAKEN, LOST, AND RE-TAKEN

### RUSSIANS MAINTAIN SOLID FRONT -- AMERICANS WARNED TO LEAVE LONDON

#### RUSSIANS MAINTAIN SOLID FIGHTING FRONT IN GALICIA

AUSTRO-GERMANS MAKING LITTLE PROGRESS—RUSSIAN LINE UNBROKEN—GERMANS SENDING HEAVY REINFORCEMENTS TO YSER—ANOTHER ZEPPELIN RAID ON ENGLAND.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, June 5.—The Austro-German salient has been pushed back to Tikhlah, northeast of Przemyśl. Notwithstanding the capture of the fortress, the Russians have maintained an unbroken fighting front on both sides of the railway to Lemburg. Austro-Germans have made no progress since the retaking of the fortress.

London, June 5.—The closing up of the Belgian frontier indicates that the Germans are moving heavy reinforcements to the Yser Canal.

##### Zeppelin Raid.

London, June 5.—Hostile airships dropped bombs on the east and southeast coasts of England last night. Little damage was done and there were few fatalities.

#### FINANCIAL WORRIES OF VANCOUVER CITY

Indications point to a bumper crop of strawberries this year and it speaks volumes for these districts, when our wholesale merchants find it necessary to seek an export market in which to dispose of a portion of this crop.

Mr. Dawson made several shipments of berries last year to Alaska points, and met with sufficient success to warrant making further efforts to increase this export trade.

#### GRAND TRUNK OFFICIAL GETS IRISH SHILLELAGH

Montreal, June 4.—H. R. Charlton, the general advertising agent of the Grand Trunk System, received today an interesting souvenir of a visit paid to Canada by a party of prominent British journalists.

Among the newspaper men was T. Moles, of the Belfast Telegraph, Belfast Ireland. Mr. Moles has now sent to Montreal for Mr. Charlton's use a splendid specimen of the genuine Irish shillelagh, some two feet in length and decorated with the shamrock emblem. The shillelagh attracted a great deal of attention on its arrival at Grand Trunk headquarters. In sending it Mr. Moles wrote:

"The real shillelagh is a little difficult to get now, the Americans having scooped such as are easily available. This particular one was grown at the foot of Slemish Mountain, upon which, you may know, St. Patrick, the 'patron saint' of this country often herded sheep. In case you find it necessary to lay somebody out, a wallop with this will be almost equivalent to having him die in the odor of sanctity."

#### GERMAN BATTERIES DESTROYED—BASE TAKEN, LOST, AND RETAKEN

BASEMENT OF SUGAR REFINERY FILLED WITH GERMAN DEAD—GRIM STRUGGLE FOR GERMAN BASE—3,000 GERMANS BURIED AND 3,000 TAKEN—MORE TRAWLERS SUNK.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, June 5.—The capture, by the French, of a sugar refinery at Souchez reveals the basement of the factory filled with German dead. The German batteries were demolished by artillery.

Furious at the loss of their base for attacking Ablain, the Germans made a furious attempt to retake it, and succeeded at midnight, but, aided by reinforced

ments and artillery, the French again recaptured the position.

In the last three weeks, the regiment engaged has buried nearly 3,000 Germans and has taken over 3,000 prisoners.

##### More Trawlers Sunk.

London, June 5.—Five trawlers, owned at Norwich, Peterhead and Lowestoft have been sunk in the North Sea. The crews were saved.

## BUY A BOAT.

In the opinion of the gentlemen who have been investigating the fishing situation for the President of the Booth Fisheries, every man who can should buy a boat and get busy.

The slogan, "Buy a Boat," raised by Geo. W. Nickerson in his address on "Fishing" at a Board of Trade luncheon some time ago, was evidently the right one. Our recent visitors have had a world-wide experience in the business, and their opinions must carry weight.

Certainly, the concessions granted by the Dominion government are very valuable, and have already brought tangible results, but, according to Mr. Smithers, we must strive hard to develop a large Canadian fishing industry here. So long as there is the possibility of counter action from Washington, at the instigation of the large interests in the South, it is unwise to depend too much on the trade we are getting from American bottoms.

A reform in the fishing license regulations, as suggested by Mr. Nickerson, would do much to create a large Canadian fishing fleet here. A general expansion of the industry is much more desirable than the procuring of a share of what already exists. Prince Rupert is ideally situated as a base for such an expansion, being near the banks, and at the same time being the terminal point of a transcontinental railroad second to none on the continent.

## PROFIT FROM OBSTRUCTION.

British Columbia's fertile valleys have been stolen, but the police will have no trouble in locating the stolen goods. It is a principle of law and equity that stolen goods can always be claimed by the owners, no matter in whose hands they may be or by what means the holders obtained possession. That the thefts were committed with the approval of the government of the day does not affect the situation, for the

rightful heirs were not consulted. The Pacific province has made a slight advance toward eliminating the possibility of profit from the idle holding of land. But, while the possibility of profit is tolerated, her development will be made impossible by land holding. Loss should be as fully assured to the man who prevents wealth production by the idle holding of land. Loss should be as fully assured to the man who prevents wealth production by the holding of idle land as gain should be assured to the man who engages in productive industry or enterprise. Every dollar obtained by holding idle land must be taken from someone who has honestly earned it and is deprived of it. Not only is the idle holding not productive, but it is destructive, so the producer loses many dollars for every dollar gained by the speculator. British Columbia is furnishing the world an example of land-policy folly, and should now furnish an equally instructive and more inspiring example of reform and restoration.

The fertile valleys along the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway have been bought up or secured from the government by various devices. This is because of the possibility of profit from idle holding. Were that possibility abolished no one would buy land except for use. It is only by use that land can yield an actual return. The only real return is the crop, the pleasure and advantage of residence, of the profit of business and manufacture. What the speculator gets must be at the expense of the user, for economically, he is not a producer, but a parasite. It is only within a certain distance of markets or means of transportation that land can be profitably used. Virtually all within that area in British Columbia has been secured for speculation. It is held at prices

which it will not yield. The result is that it might as well be under the sea. The superimposed strata of title deeds and bad legislation makes it as unproductive as naked rock. The remedy is simple. Let the province levy taxation according to the land-famine values caused by obstructive speculation. That would make idle holding unprofitable and impossible, as it always should be. Land will not wither up or leak out through the cracks if it is not owned. It is use that yields real returns, and the idle land should be awaiting the user. Let taxation make idle holding as unprofitable as it is unproductive, and let it be known that use will be as profitable as it is productive. In this simple way, British Columbia can show the world how to rectify a blunder that is making her development for the present impossible. Other provinces will find it advantageous to follow such an example—Toronto Globe.

## INTERESTING LETTER FROM THE TRENCHES

The following is an extract from a letter received yesterday by A. W. McLean from Wilfred Macdonald, who left here with the first contingent

"We were rushed through from Shorncliffe the day the Canadians were so cut up, and landed square into one of the biggest scraps of the war, without a stop. "Entrenched, we stood our first six nights and five days without a loss, whilst close to us, in the first trenches we dug, in fact, men were blown to atoms. On our left, a French party doing ration fatigue was blown to pieces, not twenty yards from Neville and myself. Our 'Latrine' in communication was visited by a 'Jack Johnson,' which made a hole something like the excavation on the postoffice site on Third Avenue, right where Vic Tompkins had just left. Jim Neville and I went out in the morning and got the 'Frenchies.' Baked beans, fresh pork and lovely French bread were fine after a week's bully beef and biscuit.

"That afternoon, I beat it up to the left and got a Lee-Enfield rifle off a dead 'Tommy.' We had a few wounded by shrapnel and one by a rifle bullet, but all are well. The noise was like the blasting along the Skeena River in the early days, only 1000 per cent more terrific, if you can imagine what that would be like. We are with the battalion which got cut up so badly at St. Julien. The general inspected us yesterday. Vic Tompkins joins in kindest regards to all the boys."

## RETREATING RUSSIANS DESTROY OIL WELLS

Berlin, June 5.—News from the  
Galician front concerning the re-  
treat of the Russians indicate that  
they fired and destroyed twenty or  
more great crude oil wells as well  
as a number of wells from which

ducing region between Boryslaw  
and Dropodycz lying to the west

000 tons of oil was destroyed.

the wells for the production of



### THE WORLD-WIDE POPULARITY OF TEA

The greater demand means higher prices in our households, especially as there is said to be no corresponding increase in the supply. Dealers are naturally uneasy as to the position."—London (England) Times, April 24.

## P. L. SMITHERS SAYS BUILD UP A CANADIAN INDUSTRY

NEVER MIND SEATTLE—GO AHEAD AND BUILD A CANADIAN FLEET—IF PRINCE RUPERT CAN SUPPLY THE FISH IN CANADIAN BOTTOMS, THE BOOTH COMPANY WILL DO THE REST.

P. L. Smithers and T. P. Gorman, who have been here for the last few days, are directly representing A. B. Carpenter, president of the Booth Fisheries. The Booth Fisheries, of which Mr. Smithers is vice president, is the largest concern in the fresh and frozen fish business in the world. Mr. Gorman has merged his big canning interests with those of the Booth Company.

These gentlemen, along with L. D. Rosenheimer, traffic manager for the Booth Fisheries, are satisfied with the attitude of the Grand Trunk Pacific towards their establishing a purchasing branch here, and arrangements have been made for a temporary place of business at the old Foley, Welch & Stewart wharf, provided the city will do its share in regard to water and power. They expressed themselves as satisfied with the facts placed before them by General Superintendent W. C. C. Mehan and Industrial Commissioner G. A. McNicholl, of the G. T. P.

In an interview with The Daily News yesterday afternoon, Mr. Smithers discussed the fishing business, and pointed out most emphatically that Prince Rupert should forget about Seattle, in this respect, entirely. "Go ahead and develop a Canadian fishing industry here," he said. "There is enough fish in the Pacific to make Prince Rupert a thriving city, and still let Seattle do as big a business as ever. Prince Rupert must quit theorizing about fishing and get down to business. There is a growing demand for fish, and Prince Rupert has an opportunity to build up a big industry for Canadian fishermen."

"The great essential is to develop a business for Canadian bottoms. The large fishing and railroad interests in the South are not going to allow such a business to slip away from them; therefore Prince Rupert must get together a fleet of Canadian bottoms, which shall bring a permanent business, unassailable by any American legislation. We have 135 selling branches throughout the continent, and, if Prince Rupert can supply the fish, we will establish new centres on the Prairies. We can place the fish, if Canadian bottoms in Prince Rupert will provide it."

In discussing the question of inducing American fishermen to locate here, Mr. Smithers pointed out that most of these men have farms and other property in the South, and could not be expected to tear their homes up by the roots to come North. Mr. Smithers suggests that Prince Rupert should get Scandinavians, who thoroughly understand the business, to come here and carry on fishing under Canadian registry.

Mr. Gorman, who is a Canadian by birth, has been interested in the canning business on the Coast for years, and is conversant with every phase of the fishing industry. He stated that the Booth

Company is in earnest about coming here, if conditions are suitable. He pointed out that, if Prince Rupert can develop a large fishing industry of its own, such firms as the Pacific Net and Twine Company would naturally open branches here. Both gentlemen are satisfied that the city's immediate future depends upon its fisheries, and that they must be developed by Canadian fishermen to be permanently successful.
