## SECRETARY OF STATE BRYAN HAS RESIGNED

### PRESIDENT WILSON'S NOTE LEAVES TODAY--DISASTROUS FIRE AT PORTLAND

#### DISASTROUS MIDNIGHT FIRE AT PORTLAND ROSE FESTIVAL

FIVE BLOCKS DESTROYED ALONG WATERFRONT — \$300,000 DAMAGE DONE—TWENTY-THREE FIRE COMPANIES AND TWO FIREBOATS FIGHT THE ROARING FLAMES.

Portland, Ore., June 9.—The fifth annual Rose Festival here today was the scene of a disastrous midnight fire which destroyed five blocks along the waterfront south of the east approach to Burnside bridge. The damage will amount to \$300,000. The heaviest sufferer is the Standard

Box and Lumber Company, with a loss of \$250,000.

Twenty-two fire companies and two fireboats were engaged in fighting the spectacular fire.

A sunrise salute fired from the cruiser Boston opened the Rose Festival, which is to last for three days.

#### AUSTRIAN GENERAL RELIEVED OF COMMAND

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Paris, June 9.—Emperor Franz Joseph of Austria has relieved Gen. Conrad Von Hootendorff of his command of the Austrian forces on the Italian front as a result of the Italian successes.

#### CALGARY DETACHMENT CHASED BY SUBMARINES

The liner carrying the last detachment of Calgarians destined to form part of the Army Service Corps for the second Canadian contingent was chased by two submarines off the south coast of Ireland, and was actually reported lost at Liverpool, according to the information contained in a letter from Sydney Judge, of Calgary. The following is an extract from the letter:

"Arrived at Shorncliffe, O. K. We had a very good trip, except that we had a narrow escape off the south of Ireland. We sighted two German submarines, but they were behind us, and we beat them for speed, and got away O. K.

"If they had been in front of us when we sighted them, the chances are we should now be keeping the Lusitania company in Davy Jones' locker.

"It was, in fact, reported at Liverpool that we were sunk, and we created some surprise when we steamed up the Mersey.

"The captain of the boat kept us out of sight of land until we were thirteen miles from Liverpool. We went 500 miles out of our course to escape the Huns.

"Everything here in England is black as Hades at night. No lights anywhere. In the train all the blinds have to be drawn after dark, and the lamps of the stations are all out but three or four, and those are shaded. It's very much different from the England that I know.

"By the time you get this, we shall be at the front. Every available man is being sent over now, and we only expect to be here a few days.

"Everywhere you are there are soldiers, soldiers, soldiers. Trains full of them are running all day past here. Wounded by the hundreds are coming to England all the time, and just as many whole ones are going to France as fast as they can be shipped."

#### SECRETARY OF STATE BRYAN RESIGNS SEAT ON PEACE ISSUE

WILSON'S NOTE TO GERMANY WILL LEAVE WASHINGTON TODAY—ROBERT LANSING SUCCEEDS BRYAN PROM—BRYAN TO GO TO COUNTRY ON PEACE ISSUE.

Washington, June 9.—President Wilson's note to Germany will leave here today, and will be published tomorrow.

Robert Lansing, counsellor for the State Department, has been appointed Secretary of State pro tem as a result of the resignation of William Jennings Bryan.

It is believed that Bryan will start a campaign for the Presidency on a peace issue.

Trains now leave for the East on Monday, Thursday and Saturday at 10:30 a. m., and arrive here Monday, Wednesday and Friday at 6:15 a. m.

#### GERMANS MAKE PROTEST AGAINST DRASTIC ACTION

At the request of the National Alliance, Jacob Schaefer, president of the Washington State and Seattle German-American Alliances, sent a telegram last night to President Wilson protesting against drastic action against Germany. President Schaefer also asked the Tacoma and Spokane alliances to send similar messages. The telegram follows: "To the President, Washington, D. C.—The members of the German-American State Alliance, as well as the majority of the citizens of our state, are opposed to drastic action against Germany as an unwarranted step. Jacob Schaefer, president German-American State and City Alliances."—Seattle P.-I.

#### VICTIM OF WIRE TAPPING SWINDLE

Los Angeles, June 9.—Having invested \$1,500 in a wire-tapping scheme to beat the gamblers on horse races, H. B. Dauman, a farmer from Baxter Springs, Kan., traveled 1,700 miles east to obtain his winnings, and failing to get the money, traveled 1,700 miles back to this city to make complaint.

Dauman met two alleged wire-tappers there two weeks ago. They showed him, he said, "tables loaded with about a million in gold." That induced him to invest \$1,500 drawn from a bank at Miami, Okla. He then had \$100, which the men borrowed before they departed, after telling him to meet them at Topeka, where they would hand him a huge sum as his share of the winnings. Dauman procured enough money to go East, but did not find the men at Topeka.

**ANOTHER EXAMPLE.**

Alvo Von Alvensleben, a German baron, was one of the pets of the McBride government. Like a good many others, he was permitted to exploit the lands of British Columbia at the expense of the people. One of his promotions, the Hardy Bay Lands Company, was wound up the other day. This company bought lands at Hardy Bay, on Vancouver Island, from the provincial government for \$5 per acre and sold it to the public for \$30 per acre. The company is now in bad shape; it has not paid up the \$5 per acre to the government, and purchasers at \$30 per acre are unable to get title to the property paid for.

The fact that Alvensleben is a German is immaterial. The great matter is that the McBride government allowed the people of British Columbia to be exploited in any such way. Bowser and his satellites will tell you that any man buying land takes a speculative risk. They have taken great care, however, to protect the exploiter against speculative risks. Such syndicates are holding hundreds of thousands of acres of land which they have not paid for, and have no intention of paying for until they can unload it at a huge profit on the public. Taxes will be paid at their own sweet will.

The war has upset business, but British Columbia's great problem had its origin years before war was ever thought of. Long before last August, the McBride government had allowed this province to become a tightly squeezed sponge. The fact that the Empire is now at war is no excuse for leaving the lands of British Columbia in the hands of thieves. The final crushing of Germany tomorrow would not solve the problem. Prosperity can never return until the land thieves have been forced to give up their booty, and so long as the McBride government remains in power they

will be permitted to retain it.

This is not a question of politics, except in so far as the thieves were aided and abetted by politicians. According to McBride-Bowser rule, it is quite permissible to steal the best part of a province, but it is a heinous offence for a Nanaimo miner to protest against dangerous working conditions.

What are you going to do about it? Are you going to tolerate a government which allows greedy grafters to make huge fortunes at your expense? Are you satisfied that a few syndicates should be permitted to hold vast areas of the pick of this northern country, without paying a cent more than the initial payment? Are you quite content to pay interest on the \$15,000,000 which the McBride government refuses to collect from the land grabbers?

**THE BUSINESS OUTLOOK.**

The new president of the Imperial Bank, Mr. Peleg Howland, in his annual address to his shareholders, considers the situation of Canada coolly and frankly. He notes a certain decline in the speed with which the country was advancing, and he instances the decline in immigration, building permits, bank clearings, and railway earnings. He does not seek to gloss over these facts, nor does he draw from them any gloomy inferences. As a man of business, he seems willing to accept the lean years as a matter of course, and average them up with the fat years.

At the same time he points out that the country is getting the benefit of increased prices for grains and produce, of the unusual sale of horses, and of the war orders that come to some of our factories. Two things seem needful—to look the facts in the face, and not be despondent, but just go on working cheerfully, ready for any condition that may arise. Mr. Howland's straightforwardness creates confidence.—Toronto Star.

**ARRANGEMENTS MADE FOR AGRICULTURAL FAIR**

The dates for the Prince Rupert Exhibition have been fixed for September 22, 23 and 24th next. The decision to hold an exhibition this year has been arrived at after a careful review of conditions, and the directors feel assured that it will be a success.

Financial arrangements are such as to enable the fair to be held, with assurances received from local people, with reasonable prospects of success. It is intended to have the program fully equal to that of 1914, with a good line of attractions, announcement of which will be made later.

The prize lists for 1915 have been mailed, and copies are available at the Board of Trade rooms, Second Avenue. Entry forms have been sent out and floor space for exhibits is now open for allotment. The allotment of space will be made as applied for, and already some has been spoken for. A strong bid is being made to interest the Canadian Manufacturers' Association and the British Columbia Manufacturers' Association, with a view to their members exhibiting, and it is hoped that they will take advantage of the opportunity for pushing "Made in Canada" in the North.

Donations toward the fair are coming in steadily, amongst the donations being one from A. J. Prudhomme of \$100; the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Company, Limited, \$50; R. McIntosh, \$10; and A. H. Allison, \$25; and while the directors do not expect the same amount of support from direct donations as last year, owing to financial conditions, they feel assured that all who take an interest in the work of the association will help the good work along.

A Fair Bulletin will be published monthly until the fair, and will keep the public posted as to fair events. The first number will be published on June 20.

## CONFEDERATE VETERANS PLEDGE WILSON LOYALTY

Richmond, Va., June 9.—Thousands of Confederate veterans at the opening of their twenty-fifth reunion here on Tuesday cheered the hope expressed by their leaders that peace in America may not be disturbed by war in Europe. They reiterated their loyalty to the Union, shouted pledges of support to the President in any crisis and bowed assent to prayers that those who guide the Republic's destinies might be blessed with wisdom to deal with pending international affairs.

Frequent references to the European war were made at the convention of the United Sons of Confederate Veterans, who cheered a pledge of support to the President in upholding the nation's honor. Tributes were expressed to Jefferson Davis, Robt. E. Lee, Stonewall Jackson and other Confederate leaders, among them Gen. E. J. B. Stuart, whose widow appeared on the platform and received an ovation.

The Southern posts were welcomed to Richmond by Governor Stuart and Judge D. G. Tyler, who spoke in behalf of Virginia veterans. Judge Tyler, a son of President Tyler, compared the Confederacy to Belgium.

"If ever the dream of universal peace shall be realized," he said, "it will be due to the acceptance by the nations of the principles for which the Confederate soldier died, the cause for which Washington threw off his allegiance to Great Britain and that for which gallant Belgium is being immolated."
