## THE RUSSIAN BEAR AT BAY IN GALICIA

ITALIANS OCCUPY BIG AREA IN AUSTRIA -- FRENCH ADVANCING AT SOUCHEZ

### A COMBINED SEAPLANE AND DIRIGIBLE RAID ON ISONZO

ITALIAN TROOPS OCCUPY 6,000 SQUARE MILES OF AUSTRIAN TERRITORY—AIR RAID ON ISONZO FRONT—FRENCH GAINS AT SOUCHEZ—STEAMER SUNK BY SUBMARINE.

(Special to The Daily News.)  
London, June 19.—The Italian advance is shown by the shelling of the station at Gorizia.  
The Italian troops now occupy over 6,000 square miles of unredeemed territory, which is more than twice as much as was offered by Austria.  
A combined naval seaplane and dirigible raid on the Isonzo front

was the chief feature of yesterday's operations.  
**French Advancing.**  
London, June 19.—The French are holding the Germans at Arras, and have gained on the sides of Souchez and are still advancing.  
London, June 19.—The steamer Dulcie, of 2,000 tons, has been torpedoed off Suffolk. One man was drowned.



**OBJECT OF GERMAN TORPEDO.**—The Norwegian oil tank steamer Belridge was torpedoed by a German submarine. The explosion occurred well forward, enabling the ship to keep afloat.

### SOUTH VANCOUVER'S MUNICIPAL TROUBLES

### D. A. THOMAS ACCEPTS WAR OFFICE POSITION

(Special to The Daily News.)  
London, June 19.—D. A. Thomas, the Welsh coal magnate, and survivor of the Lusitania disaster, has accepted a commission from Lloyd George to supervise the War Office's ammunition contracts in the United States and Canada.

### MASONIC GRAND LODGE.

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Victoria, June 19.—At the Masonic Grand Lodge, which has just concluded, W. D. Dittmars, of Vancouver, was appointed Grand Master, and Douglas Sutherland, of Prince Rupert, was elected District Deputy Grand Master.

### KAISER WILL DECIDE DEATH SENTENCES

Amsterdam, June 19, via London.—Every sentence of death by a court martial in Belgium must hereafter be endorsed by Emperor William before the prisoners are executed, according to a telegram received yesterday by The Tyd from its correspondent at Maastricht.

The writer of the dispatch intimates that Emperor William telegraphed these instructions on learning that eight citizens of Liege had been executed for alleged espionage and that twenty others were in prison charged with the same offense.

There was great anxiety as to the probable fate of the twenty until Emperor William's order was posted, along with the list of names of those who already had been shot.

### DREADNOUGHT ARIZONA SUCCESSFULLY LAUNCHED

(Special to The Daily News.)  
New York, June 19.—The super-dreadnought Arizona has been launched successfully. As a concession to the Y. W. C. A. temperance protests, a double christening took place, both champagne and water being used. In a speech following the ceremony, Secretary of the Navy Daniels said that United States naval experts are experimenting with devices for the protection of battleships against submarine attacks.

### GIANT AEROPLANES TO DEAL WITH ZEPPELINS

London, June 19.—Giant aeroplanes of great carrying capacity are in process of manufacture for the British government, according to an announcement made in the House of Commons by H. J. Tennant, Under Secretary of the War Office.

This statement was made in reply to the suggestion by a member of the House that machines of this character were needed to adequately deal with raiding Zeppelins.

### JAPAN SENDS NEW PROTEST TO CHINA

Tokyo, Japan, June 19.—According to an announcement made yesterday by a Japanese news agency, Japan has sent a protest to China concerning the anti-Japanese movement in the republic.

### W. GRANT GETS PLUMBING CONTRACT AT DRYDOCK

Wm. J. Grant has secured the contract for the plumbing work on the ship shed, machine shop, boiler house and foundry of the drydock.

London, June 19.—The Russian forces are at bay along the Grodek line in Galicia, behind heavy fortifications on the west flank, and on the Lemberg flank are protected by the marshes of the Dneister.

Amsterdam, June 19.—All: J airmen yesterday dropped bombs on the German balloon sheds at Brussels.

### AUSTRIAN WANTS TO FIGHT FOR CANADA

Calgary, June 19.—Frederick Feuer, of Rocky Mountain House, Alberta, sold out his farm and came to Calgary yesterday and tried to enlist with the 50th Battalion. He explained that he was a born Austrian, but a naturalized Canadian, and that he did not want the Kaiser to get control of this country. His application was refused, but he secured the consent of the recruiting officer, Captain Costigan, to report his case to the military authorities.

### ILLUSTRATED LECTURE IN SALVATION ARMY HALL

Very special services will be conducted by Staff Captain Smith, the chancellor of the Salvation Army, in the Salvation Army Hall next Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday nights. On Wednesday evening the staff captain will give an illustrated lecture on "The Life and Work of General William Booth." He will show over one hundred and fifty views of the general's work in the early days of the army, and also results of his labors all round the world. There are also some magnificent views of the general's last motor tour. The views of the funeral procession winding its way through the immense crowds in London, carrying the remains of the founder of the Salvation Army to his last resting place are exceptionally fine and impressive.

The staff captain is a good speaker and accompanies himself with the banjo or concertina when singing, and the local Salvationists are therefore looking forward to an interesting series of meetings. All are heartily welcome to these services.

### MARCONI'S GREAT ASSISTANCE TO ITALY

Paris, June 19.—A report issued by Admiral Thaon di Revel, chief of the Italian Naval Staff, shows that Austrian wireless messages are intercepted regularly by the Italians, says a special dispatch from Rome. The Italians have been enabled to obtain this information, which is of immense military value, by the use of a new device invented by Guglielmo Marconi. The device is said to make it impossible for the Austrians to intercept Italian messages.

### IRISH LEADER HAS PTOMAIN POISONING

London, June 19.—John E. Redmond, the Irish Nationalist leader, is suffering from ptomaine poisoning and will be unable for some time to attend the sessions of Parliament.

### FRENCH TROOPS TO HAVE HELMETS

Paris, June 19.—French soldiers in the field are soon to begin wearing light steel helmets, suggesting in their design the antique headpieces of men at arms. In color they will be a gray blue, harmonizing with the service uniforms which French soldiers have been wearing for several months past.

The Ministry of War has adopted a design for this helmet after a prolonged examination of different types submitted. The new helmet will afford considerable protection to the head from fragments of shells and rifle bullets traveling with lessened velocity. The customary cap will be retained for service behind the front.

## ARMAMENTS.

In "The Causeless War," William Jennings Bryan seems to be trotting out all the old arguments against armaments. Mr. Bryan seems to lose sight of the fact, that, today, the civilized world is dealing with a set of circumstances which exists, and not with circumstances which might have existed, or may exist in the future.

Mr. Bryan claims that "military preparedness provokes instead of prevents war." This all depends on the reason for such preparedness. Germany was steadily adding to her military strength for years before the present war broke out, and we know today that the additions were made as a preparation for attack. Britain, during the same time, added steadily to her naval strength, simply as a matter of defence. The British navy has been to Europe what a thoroughly organized police force is to a civil community. Would Mr. Bryan suggest that an efficient police force promotes, instead of preventing crime? Had Britain been as well prepared for fighting on land, as she was for naval warfare, the Kaiser would probably have viewed things very differently.

It is useless, at the present time, to discuss what might have been. There is no doubt that an international agreement to reduce all armaments would be a splendid thing. The ideal state would be to have a civilization which required none whatever. Unfortunately, so long as one nation keeps piling up armies for aggressive purposes, the other must do likewise as a means of protection. Not more than three years ago, Winston Churchill, as First Lord of the Admiralty, proposed to the Kaiser that Britain and Germany should cease spending money on new armament for a space of several years, but naturally the

idea did not appeal to the German Emperor.

World-wide peace for all time is one of the highest ideals a statesman or a nation can strive after, but, so long as one nation shows criminal intent, the others must be ready for eventualities. Mr. Bryan suggests a delay of one year in starting war, in order that thorough investigation may be made. This course might be applicable to certain disputes, but imagine suggesting to the Kaiser that he should not have rushed at poor little Belgium until the other nations had investigated the matter thoroughly.

Mr. Bryan makes the statement that America would have been in the war now, had she been prepared. This is a serious charge to make against the honor of the United States. If, as Mr. Bryan suggests, America's sole reason for not protesting against the German invasion of Belgium was that she was unprepared for war, she acted miserably indeed.

## GRAFTERS STILL BUSY.

The Toronto Telegram (ultra Tory) of June 8, has two columns of editorials, the burden of which is a demand on Premier Borden that he exercise the authority of the government of which he is head to prevent grafting by Canadian middlemen in New York, on the French and Russian war contracts now being let or desired to be let to Canadian manufacturers. The Telegram says "Such an investigation will show that France and Russia cannot do business with Canadian manufacturers via New York, except under a system of 25 per cent commissions. Thus the people of France and Russia will be overcharged to the amount of \$50,000,000 on \$200,000,000 of war supplies; or the Canadian manufacturer will be underpaid \$50,000,000

on \$200,000,000 war supplies." The Telegram further says:

"New York is today infested with Canadians, some of whom have lived by their wits. Others lived off the country. A few weeks ago some of these Canadians could not have raised sufficient money to take a box of paper collars out of pawn. Today these personages are unanimously housed in palatial apartments. They are approached with difficulty. Cards have to be sent in by Canadians soliciting contracts. The amiable confiding weakness of Sir Robert Borden has allowed a horde of middlemen to thrust themselves in as high-priced intermediaries between European governments that wish to place orders for war supplies and the Canadian manufacturers who wish to fill these orders."

A form of procedure showing a striking, not to say startling, resemblance to the Kelly contract for the Manitoba Parliament buildings, now in process of elucidation. It may be mentioned that early in the last session of Parliament, Hon. Dr. Pugsley specifically drew the Premier's attention to this condition of facts regarding Canadian contracts in New York, giving names and instances—Toronto Globe.

Frank Caldwell was a passenger south this morning on the Rupert, on a visit to the San Francisco fair.

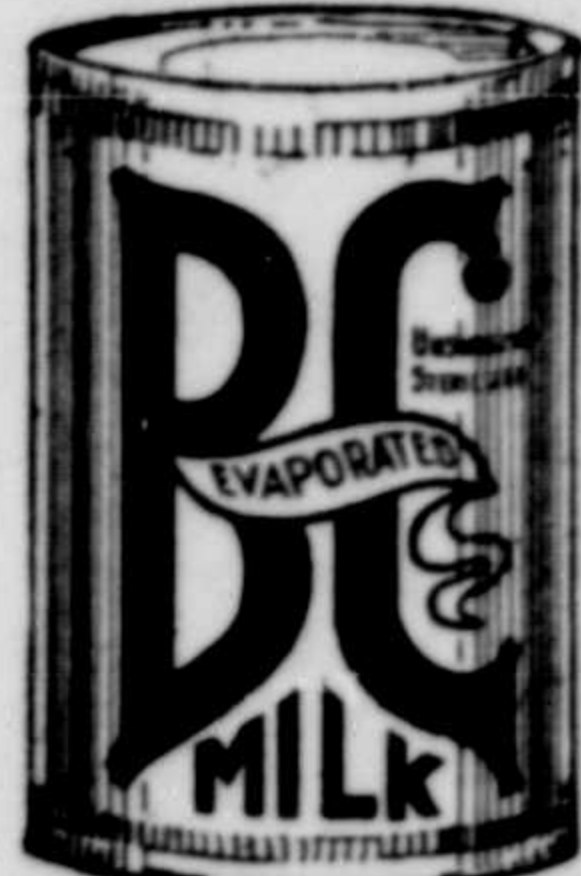
Horace Du Hammell, of Hazelton, who has been in the city attending the Assizes, was a passenger on this morning's train to the Interior.

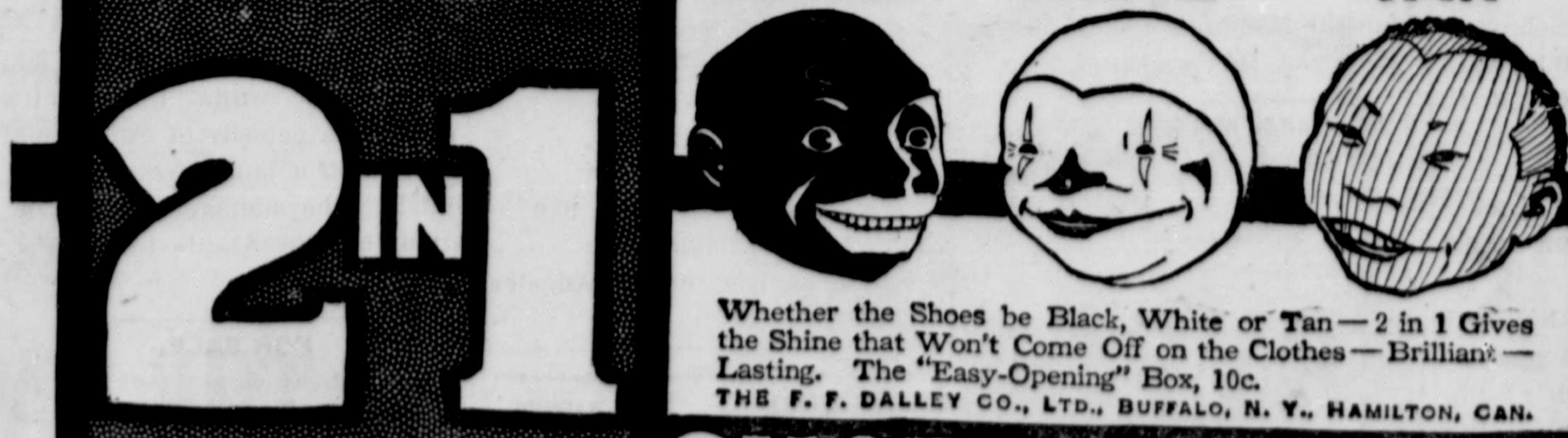
The orchestra was up to the usual high standard, and was heard to great advantage in their selection from "Les Contes d'Hoffman."
