## ITALIANS GAINED TWELVE MILES YESTERDAY

### GRIM STRUGGLE ON GALLIPOLI --- 700 TURKS TAKEN -- FLEET GETTING ACTIVE

#### ITALIANS GAIN TWELVE MILES NORTH OF CORIZIA YESTERDAY

**ITALIANS CAPTURE TWO FORTS AND TRENCHES—ARTILLERY DUEL TURNS IN THEIR FAVOR—AUSTRIANS ARE BRINGING GUNS FROM THE EAST—BERLIN REPORTS SUCCESS**

Geneva, June 22.—The Italians gained twelve miles north of Corizia yesterday, and southeast of Plave captured two forts and trenches.

Along the Isonzo the artillery duel has turned to the advantage of the Italians. The Austrians are bringing up guns from the eastern front.

**Berlin Report.**

Berlin, June 22.—It is announced that the Russians have been defeated before Lemberg. They are now fighting only to save their war material and artillery.

**Russians Submarining.**

Petrograd, June 22.—Russian submarines in the Black Sea have sunk a large Turkish steamer and two sailing ships.

#### FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE FOR INFORMATION BUREAU

Messrs. D. G. Stewart, H. S. Wallace, M. Albert, G. L. Clayton, John Barnsley, and F. S. Wright, representing the Board of Trade, presented a petition to the city council last night, asking for financial assistance towards the carrying on of the work of the Information Bureau.

At the request of Mr. Stewart, commissioner F. S. Wright read the petition, which set forth the work which has been done, and is being done, by this bureau for the welfare of the city. The statement made it perfectly clear that, by carrying on publicity work in every possible direction, the Information Bureau is a valuable asset to the city.

The important point at the moment is that, unless financial assistance is forthcoming, this line of public work must be closed. The assistance asked for is \$600 in installments of \$50 per month.

Messrs. G. L. Clayton, H. S. Wallace and M. Albert, in short speeches, emphasized the importance of the work done, and pointed out that the financial help asked for is very small compared to the value of the work.

Ald. Maitland, seconded by Ald. Montgomery, moved that the matter be referred to the finance committee for report.

Mr. Stewart asked that aldermen present might express their views on the subject, as the matter was urgent, and the Board of Trade intended to take immediate steps to close down this department, if no assistance was forthcoming.

Ald. Kerr said that the amount asked for was small in proportion to the work accomplished. He felt that the Board of Trade had done much to further the interest of the city, and suggested that room might be found in the City

### DRASTIC REDUCTION OF STAFF PROPOSITION BEFORE COUNCIL

**HEATED DISCUSSION BETWEEN THE MAYOR AND ALDERMAN MONTGOMERY—MAYOR CLAIMS QUESTION IS BEING BROUGHT UP TO EMBARRASS HIM PERSONALLY**

The following proposal, signed by T. R. Maitland and W. H. Montgomery, was placed before the council last night:

Prince Rupert, B. C., June 21. To the Mayor and Council, Prince Rupert, B. C.

Gentlemen:—Owing to the demand from the public for a reduction of the operating expenses of the city, we submit to council for their consideration the following proposals; if carried out would save the city about \$9,200 per annum, without impairing the city's efficiency to a great extent for the time being.

1. Suspending the office of City Purchasing agent.
2. Appointing City Engineer as City Assessor according to law, for the remainder of the year, clerical work to be carried out in the treasurer's office.
3. Building Inspector's duties to be carried out by Fire Chief.
4. Plumbing Inspector, Water Superintendent and Assessor's duties be carried out by City Engineer.
5. The position of assistant engineer to be declared vacant until such time as it is necessary to appoint one.
6. City store to be looked after by the fire brigade, with regard to superintending the receiving and delivering of stock on orders from the Board of Works.
7. The amalgamation of City Clerk and Treasurer's duties, as those positions frequently overlap.
8. The reduction of the police force to four officers, which we consider ample.
9. If the Council seriously considers the reduction of salaries as other cities have done, we recommend that only salaries over \$100 be operated on and that on

a fair percentage to all affected, showing no favors to any.

These recommendations are not made with any malice or charge of inefficiency, but purely as a matter of duty as we see it, at this very trying time and further we recommend that this Council or future Councils will reappoint those same officials as soon as necessary.

Alderman Maitland stated that Vancouver and most other cities as well as most business houses had carried out such schemes of retrenchment, and he thought that it was time Prince Rupert did likewise.

The mayor said he did not know how to take the proposition. He had been trying for months to get the council to grapple with the question, but could not get the members to make a suggestion of reform. The mayor waxed very indignant over the fact that two weeks ago the council decided to add a market manager's salary to the city's burdens, while today they brought in a suggestion to cut down the City Hall staff. He felt that the move had been made simply to embarrass him.

Alderman Montgomery said he viewed it purely as a business proposition, and brought the suggestion forward as a matter of public duty. He had no intention of embarrassing anyone. The council could do whatever it thought right in the matter.

Alderman Maitland remarked that the proposition seemed to have excited the mayor somewhat. He reminded the mayor that only last Wednesday he stated his plan to him as plainly as he could and that the mayor said he had taken the matter up with Mr. Johnson, and the treasurer had

#### GALLIPOLI PENINSULA SIEGE FLEET GETTING ACTIVE AGAIN

**ALLIES TAKE 700 TURKISH PRISONERS—A GENERAL ATTACK IMMINENT—DUNKIRK IS SHELLED AT VERY LONG RANGE—GLASGOW STEAMER IS SUNK, THIRTEEN MISSING**

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, June 22 A state of siege exists on Gallipoli Peninsula, with local attacks. On Wednesday the allies took 700 Turkish prisoners. The allied trenches are four miles from Seddul Bahr and form a square at Avic Burgu.

Activity in the fleet leads to the belief that general attacks on the straits are imminent.

**Dunkirk Shelled.**

Paris, June 22.—On the western front, Dunkirk has been bombarded at long range, fourteen shells falling in the city. Several civilians have been killed.

**More Murders.**

London, June 22.—The Glasgow steamer Carisbrook, from Montreal to Leith has been sunk by gun-fire off Kinnard Head. Eleven of the crew were saved, but thirteen are missing.

#### WILLIAMS & MANSON GET JUDGMENT IN CIVIL CASE

The case of Williams & Manson vs. Beaton & Kuhes was concluded today. The action was one to recover \$3,900 claimed as due by the defendants to the plaintiffs. Mr. Justice Gregory found for the plaintiffs' remarking that Mr. Williams and Mr. Manson had given their evidence accurately and straightforwardly, while Mr. Beaton for the defence had not done so.

Fred Peters, K. C., appeared for the plaintiffs, and J. A. Russell of Vancouver for the defendants.

They both were meant to save the people money. The market with a commission agent in charge was an utter failure, but the market under a salaried man could be made a great boon.

It was finally decided to leave the matter over for one week.

DUEL OF RESOURCES

It is evident that the Kaiser has decided to try and cripple the Russians, before making any further rushes for Calais. That his presence on the Galician front will help matters, from a German standpoint, is questionable.

The Russians have been having a hard time of it the past few weeks, but, if their ammunition is coming along at all regularly, they are liable to give the Huns as warm a reception as they got at St. Julien. The Germans have great advantage in being able to transfer troops rapidly from one front to the other, but the fact that they have to do so is going to bring about their final defeat.

If, as seems clear, a great decisive battle is to be attempted in Galicia, reinforcements will be withheld from the western front for the time being, thus allowing the French and British new forces to get a firm foothold, and to make preparations for a general advance. The movements of the past few days may be the beginning of such an advance, and, if it assumes large proportions, the Kaiser's attention must again be diverted to the west, giving the Russians a breathing spell, to be followed by another advance.

It seems certain that, ultimately, the German forces must be sandwiched closely between the Russians and Italians on the east, and the Belgians, French and British on the west. Germany's flying start has been largely discounted, and every month finds the Allies gaining in men and munitions. The fact that Germany has been able to hold on so long is clear proof of her preparedness for the colossal struggle, but her resources must gradually diminish, while Britain is able to materially increase her sources of supply, at the same time being able to

take care of the financial obligations of her allies, as well as her own. There can be but one result to such a duel of men and money, and the longer it lasts, the less difficulty will there be in making a final settlement.

EMIGRATION TO CANADA

A well-known American writer, Mr. J. O. Curwood, has been making a study of conditions in the West of Canada in relation to the war.

He considers that the war may result in an era of prosperity to that country which it has never known before, not an era of real estate boom, but of development and growth that will mean practically a new Canada in the West. "For some time," he says, "Canada, if not really sick, has been on the eve of a serious kind of sickness, caused by the fact that her town and city population and values had too greatly outrun her rural population and values"—a statement that may be applied to Australia, where the growth of the city has been far in advance of the rural district, greatly to the disadvantage of the country as a whole.

In Mr. Curwood's judgment, the signing of peace will lead to an immigration movement that will amaze the world. After the Franco-German war in 1870, 200,000 Germans settled in three of the greatest American states—Nebraska, Minnesota and Iowa, which are now German American. He thinks that where one German emigrated then five are likely to do so at the close of this war but they will not go to the United States, as there are no fit lands open to them there. They, and numbers of emigrants of other European nationalities and of the United Kingdom, will make their way to Canada and South America. We should also say to Australia as well, as to the Greater

Britain of the Southern Seas there is likely to be a considerable movement when peace is concluded.

In regard to the prospect of land values in Canada, Mr. Curwood says, "they must increase, and from now on they will increase through steady growth and development." He considers that a great deal of property had been over-sold and that certain places had consequently suffered, but he did not think this over-selling is so serious as some people believe, who forget that "every city that ever became a city had to pass through its period of boom days."

Strenuous efforts are being made throughout the Dominions to encourage the production of all commodities for which a special demand may be expected. The immediate prospects appear, therefore, to be most favorable. The purchasing power of the farmers is largely increasing, and the appeal of the Dominion and Provincial governments to put more acreage under cultivation has met with a ready response.—"World Wide."

THE GERMAN SOCIALISTS ISSUE A MANIFESTO

A manifesto is being circulated among the working classes by the German Socialist party in Germany in which Austria is accused of having caused the war. The manifesto complains of the ignorance in which the German and Austrian people are kept, and denounces the German war party, imperialism and secret diplomacy as the arch enemies of the German people. It is asserted that in March peace was possible, but "the greed of the imperialists refused it."—Ex.

GREAT BRITAIN DOES MUNITIONS BUYING

Ottawa, June 21.—The government issued today the following statement: "In the early months of the war and after the despatch of the first Canadian contingent an arrangement was made between Great Britain and Canada that the British government should undertake the purchase of all field guns and ammunition which might hereafter be required both for the forces raised in the British Isles and those raised in Canada. The arrangement was considered desirable in order that the British government and the Canadian government might not be binding in competition with each other for the supply of such guns and ammunition. The shell committee had been formed shortly before for the purpose of utilizing the industrial resources of Canada for the supply of ammunition."

"Under the arrangement already described the British government has undertaken full responsibility for all orders for field guns and ammunition. That government has been made thoroughly acquainted with the resources of Canada in that regard and is solely responsible for the amount and extent of the supply ordered."

"Neither the government of Canada nor the shell committee is in a position to utilize the industrial resources of Canada to a greater extent for supplies of ammunition to the British government under the arrangement above described than the British government directs and sanctions."

**LOCAL NEWS ITEMS**

Dr. Boe, who passed through yesterday, has gone to Granby to replace Dr. Stone, who is leaving for the front.

W. C. McMeekin, who was charged with manslaughter, was sentenced by Mr. Justice Gregory to one year's imprisonment. As accused was arrested three months ago, he will serve nine months more.

At the council last night a petition from Walter Shaw and two others was read, asking to be allowed to go to work on the roads in lieu of paying taxes this year. The matter was referred to the Board of Works for report.

**REPLANKING SCHEME**

At the city council last night, a scheme for replanking of the city streets was put forward by George Ambrose and others. They suggested doing \$2,500 worth of work, the city supplying the necessary lumber and nails, and the petitioners accepting notes bearing interest at 6 per cent. for their labor. The matter was referred to the finance committee for report.

**BYLAW NUMBER 249.**

A BYLAW TO SHORTEN THE HOURS FOR CARRY ON THE BUSINESS OF BARBERS' SHOPS IN THE CITY OF PRINCE RUPERT.

WHEREAS a petition has been presented to the Municipal Council of the City of Prince Rupert, asking that this Bylaw be passed:

AND WHEREAS it has been proved to the satisfaction of the City Council that the said petition is signed by not less than three-fourths in number of the occupiers of barbers' shops in the Municipality:

NOW THEREFORE THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PRINCE RUPERT ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:—

1. This bylaw shall be known as the "Barbers' Early Closing Bylaw."  
 2. After the coming into force of this bylaw all barbers' shops in the City of Prince Rupert shall be kept open during the following hours, and no longer, namely: On ordinary week days, namely, Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday 8 a. m. to 7 p. m. On Saturdays from 8 a. m. to 10:30 p. m.  
 On all days preceding public holidays, the same hours as on Saturday.

On holidays they shall be closed all day, except on those holidays which fall on Monday, upon which holidays they are to keep open from 8 a. m. to 1 p. m. On holidays which fall on Saturday they shall keep open all day from 8 a. m. to 10:30 p. m.

3. Any person breaking this bylaw by keeping his barber shop open after the hours allowed by this bylaw shall be liable to a fine of not more than Twenty Dollars (\$20.00) for each day, and in default in payment of such fine to imprisonment not exceeding thirty (30) days.

4. This bylaw shall come into force on the first day of July, A. D. 1915, and before that date the bylaw shall be published by inserting the same in one newspaper published in the City of Prince Rupert for one day.

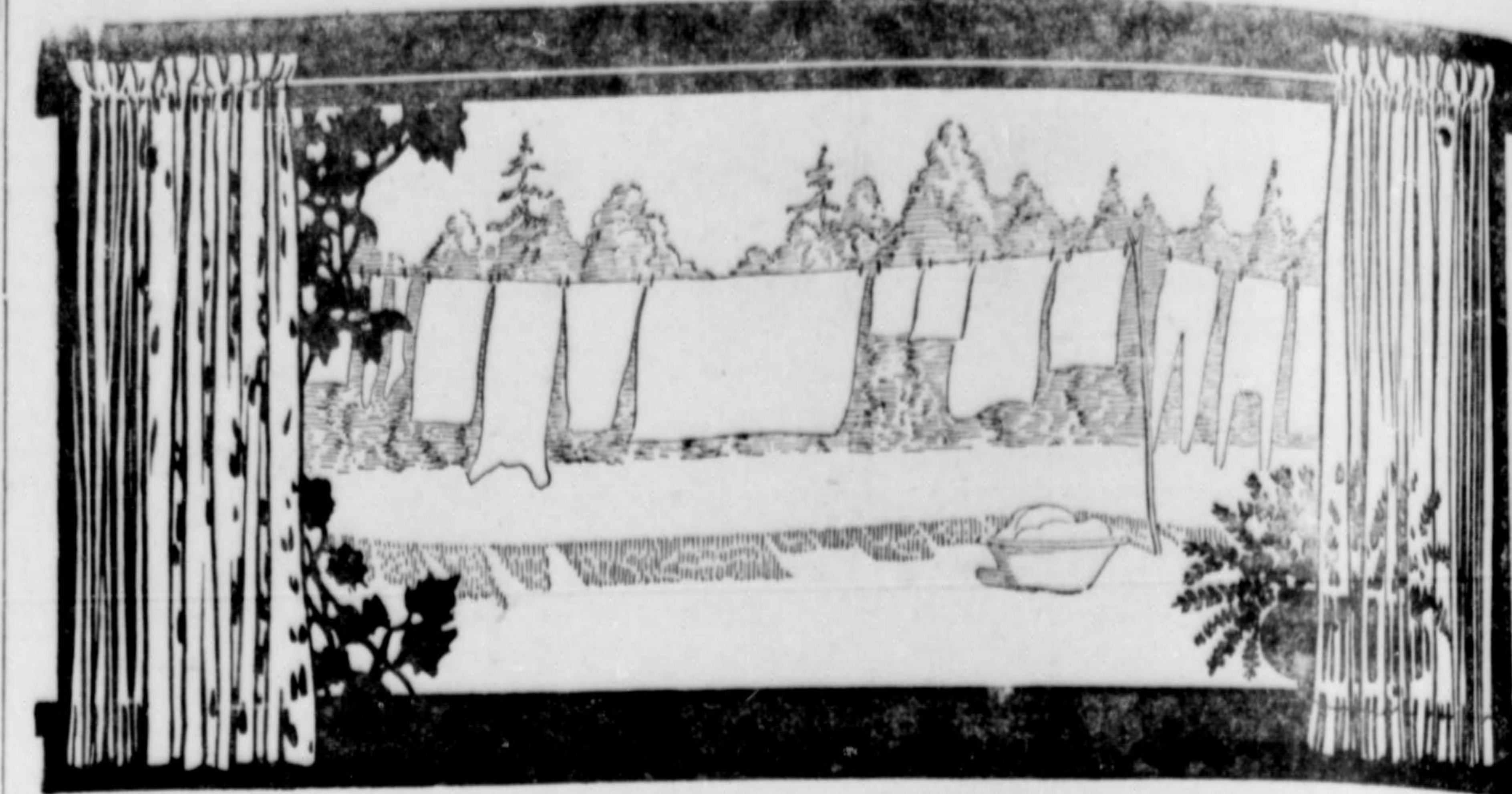

**TAX SALE WILL BE HELD IN SEPTEMBER**

The finance committee presented a further report to the city council last night on the question of holding a tax sale, urging that such a sale be held, as it was necessary in order to carry on the city's business.

Ald. Montgomery objected to a tax sale being held this year on account of the hardship it would cause, in such a time of depression.

Last week's arguments for and against, were brought out again, with the city solicitor insisting that it was an absolute necessity, in order to bring in enough money to carry the city along.

The report was adopted, with Ald. Montgomery dissenting, so that a tax sale will be held, not later than September 15, 1915, covering all property on which taxes for 1913 are in arrears.
