ALLIED SUCCESSES IN THE DARDANELLES

RUSSIANS RETIRED FROM LEMBERG IN GOOD ORDER -- LINE REMAINS UNBROKEN

SUCCESSSES IN DARDANELLES BRITISH TAKE 500 PRISONERS

THE FRENCH AND BRITISH GAIN 400 YARDS ON A ONE MILE FRONT—GUNNERS FROM GOBEN AND BRESLAU CAPTURED—VATICAN PROTESTS AGAINST ARTICLE

Paris, June 24.—(Official) The result of attacks yesterday by the French and British in the Dardanelles was a gain of 400 yards along a one mile front. The British took five hundred prisoners in the capture of a redoubt, which was manned by German gunners from the Goeben and the Breslau.

Vatican Denial.
Rome, June 24.—The official Vatican organ warns the people

against accepting the conclusions of La Liberte regarding the Papal interview, and claims that it was not an official document and is inaccurate. The article created a great stir in Italy owing to its pro-German sentiments.

SEATTLE TO KEEP BIG FISH TRADE

Efforts of Prince Rupert to divert that portion of the fisheries industry controlled by the Booth Fisheries Company of Chicago from Seattle were barren of anything but some good advice given to the citizens of Prince Rupert by L. P. Smithers, vice president of the Corporation. Mr. Smithers who recently returned from that city, inspected what the city had to offer, but made no agreement to change from Seattle to the British Columbia port.

"Although we were offered a free site and cheap power and ice I do not think that we will move our coast business to Prince Rupert," said Mr. Smithers last night at the New Washington. "Of course, if our hands are tied too much in the United States, there is a possibility of a move, but I do not consider this likely."

"When the subject was broached to me at Prince Rupert I advised the people of that city to build up their own halibut trade and handle the fish brought in in Canadian bottoms, instead of trying to take the Seattle industry away from Seattle. If they do so into the business extensively enough we will probably put in a branch at Prince Rupert to handle our Canadian trade."

ITALIAN ARRESTED ON MURDER CHARGE

PRUSSIAN CASUALTIES ARE MILLION AND A HALF

Amsterdam, June 24.—Prussian casualties since the beginning of the war aggregate 1,409,489 men, according to an official statement issued at Berlin today.

The statement adds that \$75,000,000 damages on German soil was caused by the Russians in East Prussia.

RUSSIANS WITHDREW FROM LEMBERG WITH LINE INTACT

RUSSIANS RESISTED STRONGLY TO LAST—TOWN IS LITTLE DAMAGED—RUSSIAN LINE REMAINS UNBROKEN—PRIZE COURT TO TRY CASE OF AMERICAN TANKER

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, June 24.—Details of the taking of Lemberg show that the Russians resisted strongly to the last and then retreated from Rowa Ruska to an angle formed by the rivers San and Vistula.

The town was little damaged, except by fire at the oil tanks,

railway stations and factories, started before the Russian withdrawal. The Russian line remains unbroken.

American Tanker Seized.
London, June 24.—The case of the American tanker Gargoyle is to be tried before a prize court. The vessel was seized at Malta carrying oil for Alexandria.

PUBLIC FUNERAL FOR WARNEFORD

Paris, June 24.—Arrangements for the funeral services at Versailles for Lieut. R. A. J. Warneford, of the British Royal navy Flying Corps, and Henry B. Needham, the American writer, who were killed in an aeroplane accident last Thursday, have been cancelled and the bodies have been brought to Paris. Mr. Needham's body has been placed in the mortuary chapel in the American Church of the Holy Trinity, awaiting a reply to a dispatch to his widow, who is in the United States, asking for instructions. Lieut. Warneford's body will be sent to England, where some form of public funeral befitting the man who has been hailed as a hero for his recent destruction of a Zeppelin, will be held.

A small aeroplane, composed of flowers, was laid on Warneford's coffin by the officers and men of the English hospital. On the left wing was a Victoria Cross and on the right the legion of honor. The propeller, composed of white roses, bears the inscription "Honored by the King; admired by the Empire, but mourned by all."

Warneford's body will be transported to London tomorrow morning under a guard of honor.

GOOD PROSPECTS OF LIEUT. TUPPER'S RECOVERY

Ottawa, June 24.—A miraculous escape from death at St. Julien was that of Lieut. Reginald Tupper, son of Sir Charles Tupper, according to a letter received here. Lieut. Tupper was shot through the thigh, the bullet passing through the lower part of his body. He managed, however, to stick to his gun when a second series of shots went through both legs. One leg was broken and the heel of the other was shot off. Lieut. Tupper crawled to a trench where he waited for some hours before a stretcher-bearer came. Gangrene developed and the doctors gave him up, but the young officer has pulled through and is now in England with good prospects of recovery.

The fact that five valiant officers of the Canadian Expeditionary Force have been mentioned in despatches, and recommended for the Distinguished Service Order, by Sir John French, is something for all Canadians to be proud of.

In the terrific onslaughts around Ypres and St. Julien, every man must have been a hero, and, in years to come, to have taken part in the charge at St. Julien will be a mark of distinction equal to any decoration.

Heroism produces heroism, just as surely as wheat produces wheat, and the spirit of Waterloo and Balaclava is reproduced today.

THE WAR SITUATION

Though it seems as though the Russians have vacated Lemberg, they are by no means defeated. Latest reports from Petrograd are decidedly cheering, and, if the Russians can keep the Austro-Germans busy along the Dneister, and in Bukovina, the enemy will not have much spare energy to devote to stopping the Italians.

With the French assuming the offensive in Alsace, the Kaiser's attention is going to be spread over a wider area than ever, and, with a strong offensive developing on the western front, things are becoming much more interesting than they have been for weeks.

It now transpires that, when the Italian fleet left Taranto recently under sealed orders, they were not bound for Trieste as was supposed, but to join the Allied fleet in the Dardanelles. The Italian fleet must have reached its destination now, and a fresh naval attack in that quarter is liable to be reported at any moment.

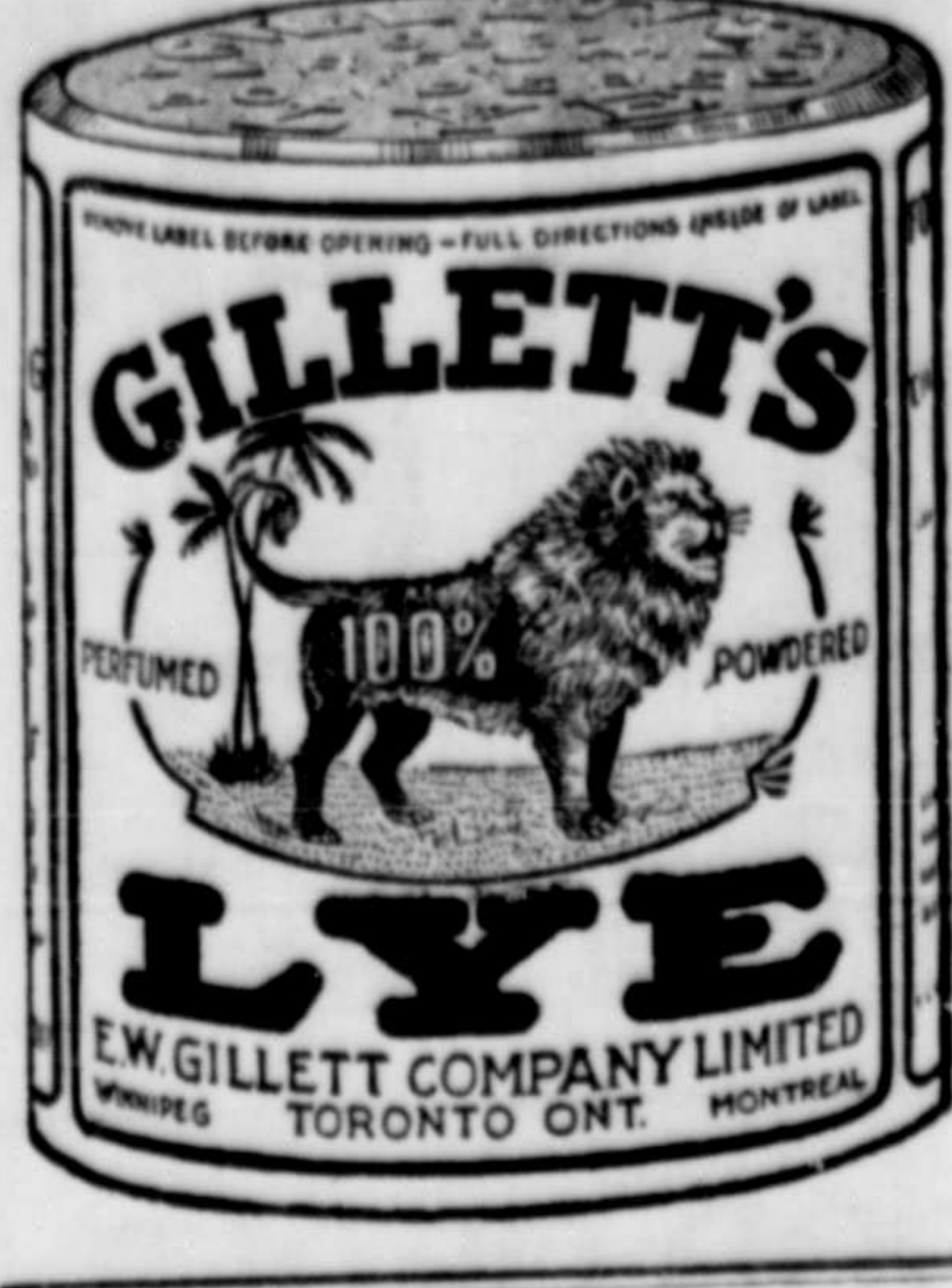

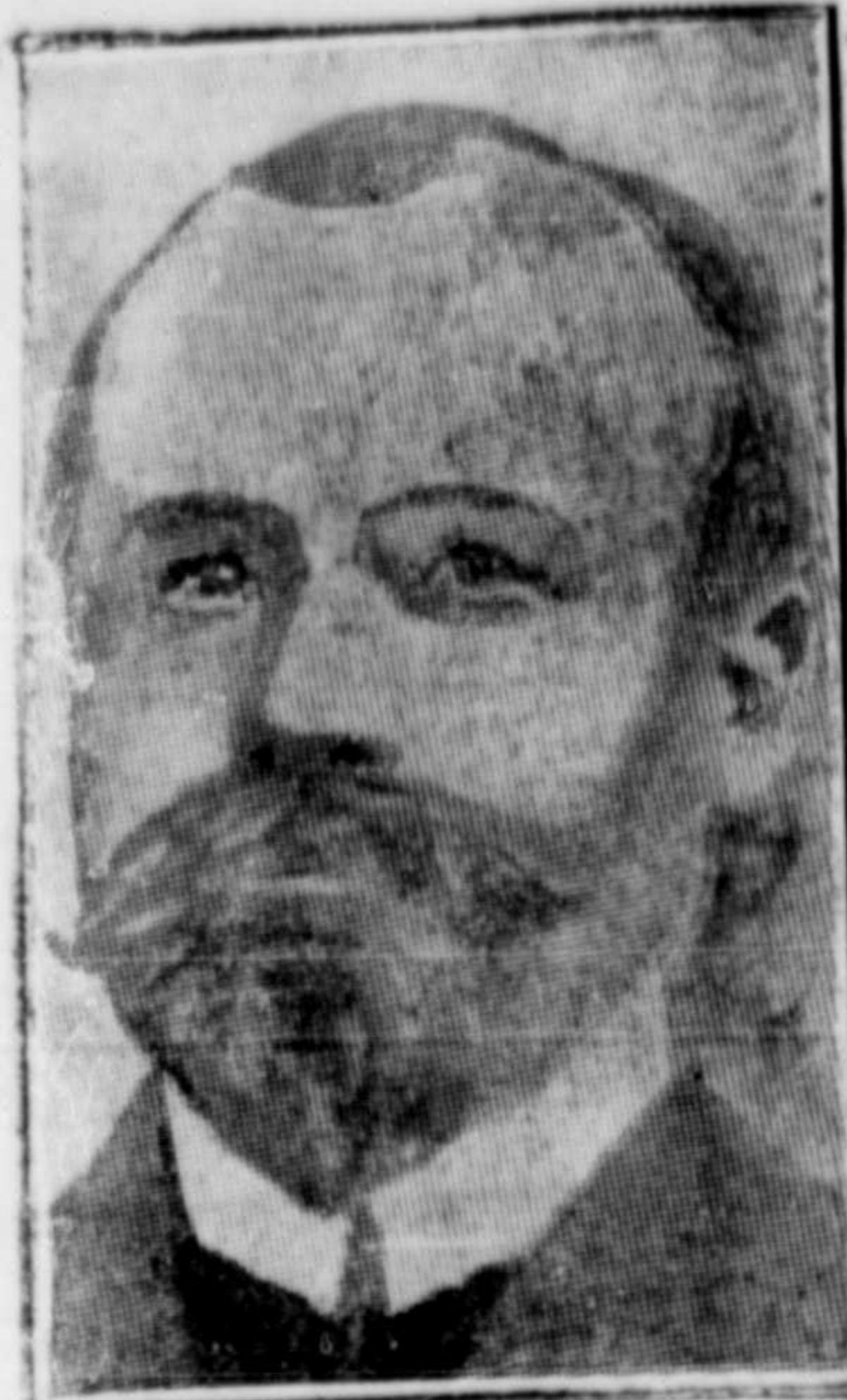

BANISHMENT FOR GERMAN PRINCE

Paris, June 23.—Prince Von Radolin, former German ambassador to France, and the Princess Von Radolin, the Petit Journal says, have not been formally arrested, as was reported from Milan last week, but have been banished to their estate at Jarotschin, Posen, which they are not allowed to leave.

According to the Petit Journal the reason for their banishment is that the princess, who is related to the Radziwill family of Russia and the Talleyrand family of France, manifested sentiments which were resented in high circles in Germany. The prince aroused equal enmity when he took her part.

Prince Von Radolin retired as ambassador to France in June, 1910, after nine years' service in that capacity. The Corriere Del La Sera, of Milan, printed on June 17 a report that he and his wife had been arrested in April by German authorities on a charge of espionage against that country.

BYLAW NUMBER 249.

A BYLAW TO SHORTEN THE HOURS FOR CARRYING ON THE BUSINESS OF BARBERS' SHOPS IN THE CITY OF PRINCE RUPERT.

WHEREAS a petition has been presented to the Municipal Council of the City of Prince Rupert, asking that this Bylaw be passed:

AND WHEREAS it has been proved to the satisfaction of the City Council that the said petition is signed by not less than three-fourths in number of the occupiers of barbers' shops in the Municipality:

NOW THEREFORE THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PRINCE RUPERT ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:—

1. This bylaw shall be known as the "Barbers' Early Closing Bylaw."

2. After the coming into force of this bylaw all barbers' shops in the City of Prince Rupert shall be kept open during the following hours, and no longer, namely:

On ordinary week days, namely, Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday 8 a. m. to 7 p. m. On Saturdays from 8 a. m. to 10:30 p. m.

On all days preceding public holidays, the same hours as on Saturday.

On holidays they shall be closed all day, except on those holidays which fall on Monday, upon which holidays they are to keep open from 8 a. m. to 1 p. m. On holidays which fall on Saturday they shall keep open all day from 8 a. m. to 10:30 p. m.

3. Any person breaking this bylaw by keeping his barber shop open after the hours allowed by this bylaw shall be liable to a fine of not more than Twenty Dollars (\$20.00) for each day, and in default in payment of such fine to imprisonment not exceeding thirty (30) days.

4. This bylaw shall come into force on the first day of July, A. D. 1915, and before that date the bylaw shall be published by inserting the same in one newspaper published in the City of Prince Rupert for one day.

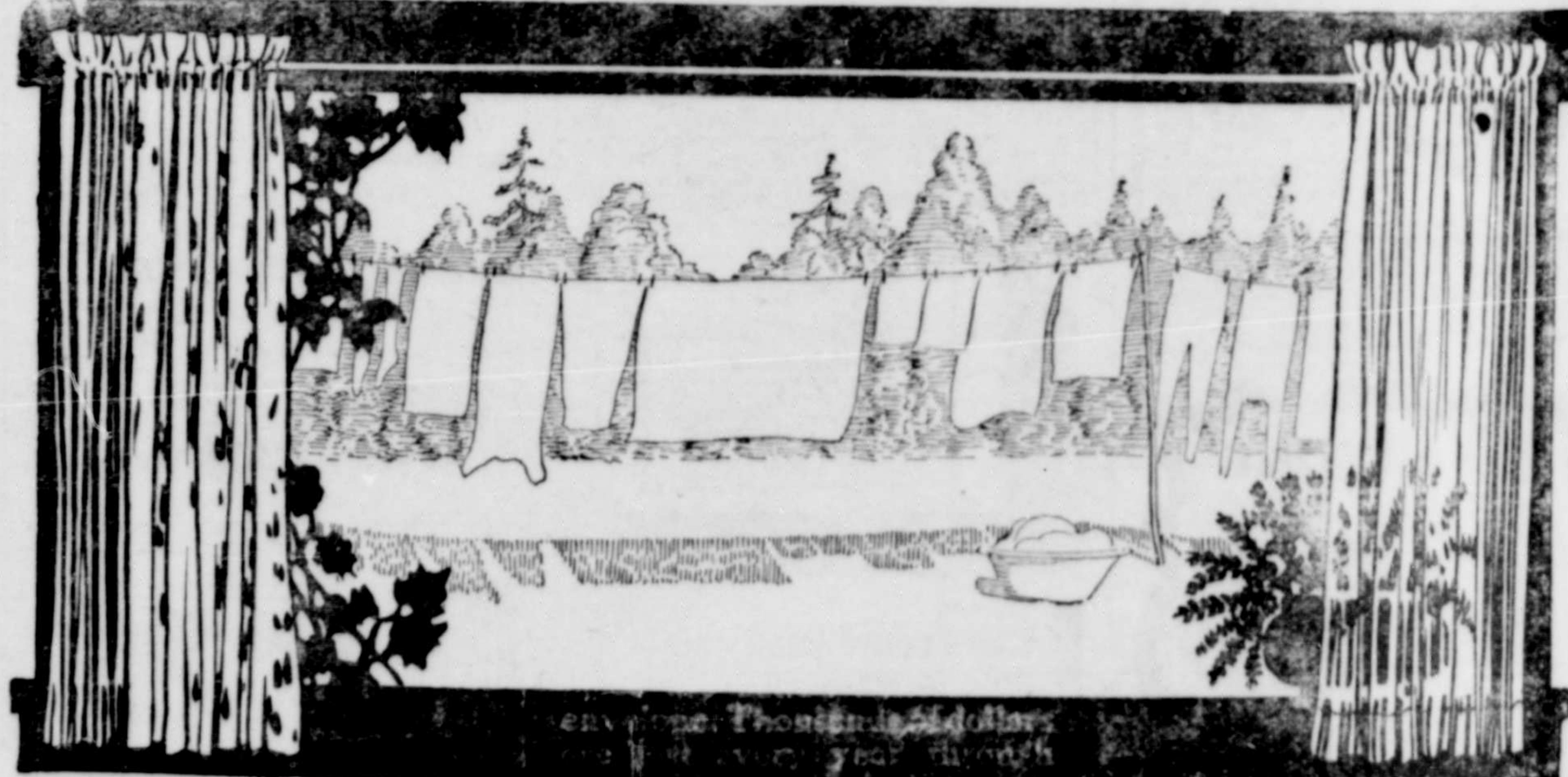
