RUSSIA HAS POWERFUL MUNITIONS BOARD

RUSSIA DEFEAT DUE TO MUNITIONS SHORTAGE—AMERICAN SCHOONER SEIZED

RUSSIA FORMS MUNITIONS BOARD WITH UNLIMITED POWER

RUSSIAN REPULSES IN GALICIA WERE DUE TO AMMUNITION SHORTAGE—BERLIN PROHIBITS THE MANUFACTURE OF COTTON GOODS—TWO NORWEGIAN SHIPS SUNK.

(Special to The Daily News)
London, June 30.—Russia's repulse to the series of Austro-German victories in Galicia is to form a board of munitions empowered to spend unlimited money, having restricted power over all private industries. This is an indication that the repulse suffered by the Russian troops were largely due to munition shortage.

Berlin Saving Cotton.

Berlin, June 30.—The military

authorities have prohibited the manufacture of cotton fabrics after August 1. The presumption is that Germany needs all available cotton for explosives.

Norwegian Ship Sunk.

The Norwegian ship Cambuskenhets, with a cargo of wheat, and the Norwegian steamer Gjøa were both submerged. The crews were landed, except a number of German sailors, who were taken by the submarines.

AMERICAN SCHOONER SEIZED BY CUSTOMS

(Special to The Daily News.)

Hoquiam, Wash., June 30.—The schooner Annie Larson was seized by customs officials on her arrival here, short of provisions and water. She left San Diego with a cargo of 4,000 rifles and over a million cartridges for Mexico. Her captain claims that he was unable to locate the steamer Maverick, to which he was to transfer his cargo, and was driven by head winds to the north.

It is believed that the cargo was destined for a new German naval base off the coast of Mexico. The Maverick is suspected to be under charter by German agents.

CO-OPERATION.

When the suggestion was made that a citizens' committee be appointed to enquire into the city's finances and City Hall Staff, some humorist suggested that the Daughters of the Empire should be called into consultation. Judging by the results obtained by the by the Ladies' Auxiliary of the hospital on Monday night, and the recent efforts of the ladies of the city in aid of the Red Cross, and patriotic funds generally, there is no denying the fact that the ladies of Prince Rupert have shown wonderful organizing ability. The secret of their success is co-operation.

It was an inspiring sight to see, on Monday night, men, of all shades of political opinion, and of various professions and lines of business, come out of their shells and appear before the public as men, imbued with one ambition—the amusement of the public. The aim may not have been a very high one, but the purpose behind it was good.

It would produce wonderful results, if the same solidarity of purpose could be brought to bear on the affairs of the city; of the province, and of the country. If the same hearty, co-operative spirit could get to work for the general welfare of the city, and of the province, the word "crisis" would soon be forgotten.

OFFICIALDOM.

The Journal is to be congratulated on its editorial of yesterday, dealing with the delay, on the part of the postal department at Ottawa, in arranging for a mail service to meet the altered boat and train schedule. The conclusion of the article follows so closely the lines of recent Liberal criticism that we quote it: "Evidently officialdom will have to be respected. Some day there will be a general rising on the

part of the long-suffering citizens in this country, which will result in the throwing off of the serfdom, which they have had to pay to officials who are becoming more plentiful than the sands of the sea, and whose efficiency becomes less with the multiplicity in numbers."

The multiplicity of officials has been one of the expensive hobbies of the Borden government, and it is refreshing indeed to find the Conservative organ comparing them to the sands of the sea. Some day soon, we hope, a strong flood tide of Liberalism will do some sand shifting, which will save the country enough money per annum to buy a submarine or two every year, even at McBride prices.

Delay in transacting the country's business is one of the comparatively small evils resulting from the job-creating system of the Borden government. One of the worst features is, that it is simply a despicable scheme of buying party support with public funds; in other words, misappropriation of the people's money, and in plain unvarnished English—thieving.

In Britain, civil service appointments are made by calling upon all applicants to sit in competitive examinations at various centres. The papers are sent to judges in London, who are ignorant of even the names of the competitors. The moment a man becomes a civil servant, he ceases to have any politics, and is deprived of all voting power in parliamentary elections. The system has certain disadvantages, but it most effectively does away with the political job-hunter, and that is one of the greatest evils in Canada today.

It only remains for some of the halo-painting journalists to inform a not disinterested public whether A. De Witt Foster, ex-M. P., is still buying "horses" for the Militia Department in the same old way.—Edmonton Bulletin.

AUSTRIA AND GERMANY ARE BOTH BANKRUPT

London, June 30.—A well informed neutral banker, who returned recently from Vienna, gave the following account of the financial position of Austria-Hungary and Germany:

"Money is plentiful in Austria—that is to say, paper money and silver and nickel coins. More than \$1,500,000,000 of paper money has been issued in the dual monarchy since the beginning of the war. The gold covering for paper circulation has decreased during the same time from nearly \$350,000,000 to \$150,000,000 but gold is needed only for purchases of food and war materials from abroad and these are restricted to a minimum.

"If hostilities were to cease and peace were to be signed tomorrow, Austria-Hungary would immediately become bankrupt. She might be able to pay a dividend of 11 per cent to her creditors, but not more.

"Germany also would be bankrupt, though in her case the gold might be as high as 15 or 16 per cent.

"Austrian and German financiers are buoyed up by the belief that a huge war indemnity will

be secured and that the enemy will have to pay for all her expenditures."

El Paso, Texas, June 29.—General Huerta protests his innocence of fomenting trouble, and says he came to the United States because he is sick of revolutionary warfare and is seeking peace.

RECRUITS WANTED FOR 62nd OVERSEAS BATTALION, CANADIAN EXPEDITIONARY FORCE.

RECRUITING OFFICE AT PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT OFFICE NOW OPEN.

In view of the recruiting which is in progress at present throughout the Province, it is apropos to answer a few of the questions which are considered by those who contemplate entering the Service. The following is a list of pertinent queries, together with the information which each elicit

QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

- 1.—How long am I to serve? Until the end of the war and six months after if required.
- 2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.
- 3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.
- 4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.
- 5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.
