New Political Party to be Formed

FATAL DROWNING ACCIDENT AT SHAWATLANS LAKE WHEN CANOE UPSETS

Premier Borden Announces Decision to Retire at once

No Announcement of Successor but Hon. Arthur Meighan suggested; New Party to be Formed

OTTAWA, July 2.—In the Government caucus yesterday Premier R. L. Borden announced his final decision to retire. This decision was regretfully accepted, but no announcement of a successor was made.

It was decided to discard the old name "Unionist" and form a new party under the name of National Liberal and Conservative party.

It is understood that the caucus was in favor of Hon. Arthur Meighan for leader of the new party.

Sir Thomas White is possibly the second choice to Meighan for the premiership. Rowell is unable to support the new party but Calder will. The political retirements expected are Foster, Sifton and Burrell. The entire cabinet resigns in order to give the new premier a free hand. The Liberal Unionists have decided to support the new party.

VINDICATION OF PREMIER

Verdict Against R. T. Elliott in Libel Case with Nominal Damages.

VICTORIA, July 2.—After being out from 1:20 to 5 p. m. on Wednesday, the jury in the Oliver-Elliott libel case exonerated the Premier by bringing in a verdict against Elliott with the nominal damage of 25c.

In charging the jury, Mr. Justice McDonald said the publication of a telegram sent to the legislature was privileged. It was for the jury to determine if there was malice. If the reports heard by Elliott at the hotel were exaggerated he would lose his privilege.

After hearing the verdict, Premier Oliver said he accepted it as a vindication of his character. Elliott said it was satisfactory to him as exemplary damages had been asked and refused.

BOY'S HAND INJURED BY EXPLODING EMBER

Oke Jackson in Hospital as Result of Fireworks.

Last night a large crowd of interested spectators both old and young gathered at Market Place to watch the setting off of the fireworks. An unfortunate accident happened as the result of the celebration when Oke Jackson had the first, second and third fingers of his right hand blown off when he picked up a smouldering ember which had fallen from the sky. In spite of the warning shouts the boy seemed to be entranced with the blazing material in his grasp. His parents were summoned from their home at 349 9th Ave. W., and Dr. W. T. Kergin called.

George Tite took the wounded lad to the hospital where his hand was dressed to stop the profuse bleeding.

YOUNG MAN DROWNED IN SHAWATLANS LAKE

Jack Dalziel victim of tragic canoe accident—Young Man with fine War Record

A sad accident marred the holiday proceedings yesterday when a young returned soldier, John B. G. Dalziel, was drowned at Shawatlans Lake. He and Ripley Boyd were out in a canoe on Shawatlans Lake and there was a little wave running. In turning, the canoe began to fill and the boys decided to swim for shore. Dalziel taking off his rubber boots but Boyd not freeing himself until he was in the water and they struck out for shore.

Apparently Dalziel must have been taken with cramp when a few feet from safety in the cold waters of the lake, for he went down and his body was found near where the canoe upset.

At 2:30 Chief Minly of the provincial police had a call from Shawatlans by telephone saying that two men had been drowned. He sent the police boat Myfaway at once with Constables Alex Sault and Wesley and they found Dalziel had been drowned but Boyd had reached shore safely although much exhausted. The canoe had upset about 200 feet from shore at the far end of the lake.

On the arrival of the police on the scene dragging with a makeshift outfit for the body of the drowned man was commenced. On the third drop of the hooks it was recovered and brought to town in the evening.

Mr. Dalziel was a returned man who served overseas as sergeant with the 13th Battalion. Leaving with the first contingent, he saw a good deal of fighting but escaped without wounds, although

MEN MUST GO BACK TO WORK

Says if Men Apply Consideration Will at Once Be Given.

The following telegram was received by Mayor McClymont from the Deputy Minister of Labor at Ottawa:

Information reaching minister regarding longshoremen's strike suggests situation has improved since your wire was sent and that community is not put to any serious inconvenience because of delay in handling freight. Minister's view is that his right to establish board under section 63 A should be used but sparingly and particularly so when dispute has developed into a strike which is contrary to laws.

Should men return to work and apply for board, application will receive immediate consideration and procedure preceding board inquiry might be conducted by wire.

DUNSMUIR LEFT TEN MILLIONS

Province Will Receive Over Million in Inheritance Tax.

VICTORIA, July 2.—A preliminary statement of the Dunsmuir will filed here shows an estate of \$10,000,000 which figure will probably be increased on revaluation. It is expected that the province will receive from one to two million dollars in inheritance tax.

**PROFESSIONAL MEN
 OPERATE STEAMER**

**Volunteer Crew Take Place of the
 Strikers and did Good Work**

NEW YORK, July 2—More than 150 Danish bankers, doctors, lawyers, teachers and professional farmers were enrolled among the engine and deck crews of the Scandinavian-American steamship Frederik VIII, which arrived from the strike-bound port of Copenhagen, the first vessel of the line to reach the United States in three months. The departure of the Frederik VIII was made possible, it was said, only through the services of her volunteer "millionaire crew," the members of which belong to the "Government Help League," organized to bring order out of the chaos created by the strike. Officers of the ship kept the identity of the volunteer members of the crew secret, but were loud in praise of their work. This praise was shared by the 700 passengers on board the liner, who joined in a signed testimonial to them. Indicating the make-up of the crew, it was said that in the "black gang," as the engine crew is termed, there was a wealthy banker, a professor of mathematics and an engineer who is head of a well known Danish technical institute.



SHOULD BE UNION OF CHURCHES SOON

The Editor of Christian Guardian Says There is Resentment at Presbyterian Delay.

Rev. Dr. W. B. Creighton, the editor of the Christian Guardian, returned yesterday from his annual tour of the Western Methodist Conferences.

In answer to a question regarding the churches in the West, Dr. Creighton stated that the local union churches were increasing rapidly, and that there was a feeling of impatience and resentment at the Presbyterian General Assembly not taking action toward the consummation of union this year.

"If there is any delay on the part of the Presbyterian Church officially at the next Assembly, the Western churches intend to go ahead with a union of their own, and there will be one Church west of the Great Lakes," said Dr. Creighton.

The doctor stated that the union churches in the West were organizing, and that they would hold their first annual council or conference in Regina next week. Rev. Dr. Chown is going west to attend this meeting, along with representatives of the other negotiating churches.

When Ketchikan's lead of two was evened up by Vic Menzies' hit which brought in two runs a real thrill of delight waved through the ranks on the benches. It was the end of the ninth with a tie score and too dark to continue playing.

 - That the Excise taxes as imposed by the preceding resolutions shall be paid by the purchaser to the vendor at the time of sale and delivery for consumption or use; or on importation for consumption or use, other than for re-sale, on the duty-paid value, in addition to the duties of customs already imposed, and by the vendor to His Majesty in accordance with such regulations as may be prescribed.
 - That the following Excise taxes be imposed, levied and collected on the articles hereinafter specified, namely:
 - A Tax of Three Per Cent. on**
 - Chewing gum or substitutes therefor.
 - A Tax of Five Per Cent. on**
 - Pianos, not exceeding \$450.00 each, and organs not exceeding \$150.00 each (other than pianos and organs for religious and educational purposes).
 - A Tax of Ten Per Cent. on**
 - Boats, yachts, canoes and motor boats, provided that on satisfactory proof being furnished, that these articles will be used for trading or commercial purposes, the said tax shall not be collected.
 - Cameras weighing not more than 100 pounds.
 - Confectionery, which may be classed as candy or a substitute for candy (this item not to include goods packed ready for sale in cartons or other packages bearing thereon the name of the manufacturer, selling by retail at ten cents or less per carton; or to candy known as "cross goods," selling by retail at one cent each).
 - Firearms, shells and cartridges for use other than for militia purposes.
 - Pianos exceeding \$450.00 each, and organs exceeding \$150.00 each (other than pianos and organs for religious or educational purposes).

 - A Tax of Twenty Per Cent. on**

 - A Tax on Playing Cards**
 - For every fifty-four cards, or fraction of fifty-four in each package, when selling at \$24.00 (or less) per gross package—fifteen cents per package.
 - When selling in excess of \$24.00 per gross packages, but not in excess of thirty-six dollars (\$36) per gross packages, twenty-five cents per package.
 - When selling in excess of \$36.00 per gross packages, fifty cents (\$50) per package.
 - A Tax of Two Dollars Per Gallon on**
 - Rum, whiskey, brandy, gin, wines, containing more than forty per cent. proof spirit; cordials, liqueurs and spirituous alcoholic liquors, not otherwise provided for in this resolution, suitable for beverage purposes (not including alcohol used in the process of manufacturing articles of commerce, in which the alcohol is destroyed, and from the resultant products of which it cannot be recovered).
 - A Tax of Thirty Cents Per Gallon on**
 - Beer, porter and stout, wines of all kinds (except sparkling wines) containing not more than forty per cent. proof spirit.
 - A Tax of Three Dollars Per Gallon on**
 - Champagne and all other sparkling wines.
 - That the excises as imposed by the preceding resolutions shall be payable on the duty-paid value in addition to the present duties of excise and customs at the time of sale by the Canadian manufacturer or when imported or when taken out of customs or excise bond, but shall not apply to such articles when exported and shall be accounted for to His Majesty in accordance with such regulations as may be prescribed.
 - That the following Excise taxes be imposed, levied and collected at the time of importation or when taken out of customs warehouse for consumption, on the duty-paid value of the articles hereinafter specified, namely:
 - A Tax of Twenty Per Cent. on**
 - Medical or unadorned wines, vermouth and ginger wines, and patent and proprietary medicines containing alcohol, but not more than forty per cent. of proof spirit.
 - A Tax of Two Dollars Per Gallon on**
 - Lime juice or fruit juices, fortified with or containing more than 15 per cent. of proof spirit. On spirits and strong waters of any kind, mixed with any ingredient or ingredients as being or known or designated as Anodynes, Elixirs, Essences, Extracts, Lotions, Tinctures or Medicines or Etherial and Spirituous Fruit Essences, not otherwise provided for in this resolution.
 - On alcoholic perfumes and perfumed spirits, bay rum, cologne and lavender waters, hair, tooth and skin washes and waters; hair, tooth and other toilet preparations containing spirits of any kind.
 - A Tax of Fifty Cents Per Gallon on**
 - Lime juices and fruit juices, fortified with or containing more than 25 per cent. of proof spirit, not otherwise provided for in this resolution.
 - That every person selling or dealing in the articles upon which taxes are imposed as prescribed by the foregoing resolutions, may be required by the Minister to take out an annual license therefor, for which license a fee not exceeding \$2.00 shall be paid.
 - That in addition to the present duty of excise and customs, a tax of one per cent. shall be imposed, levied and collected on sales and deliveries by manufacturers and wholesalers or jobbers and on the duty-paid value of importations.

That in respect of sales by manufacturers to retailers or consumers, or on importations by retailers or consumers, the tax payable shall be two per cent. That the purchaser shall be furnished with a written invoice for any sale, which invoice shall state separately the amount of such tax to at least the extent of one per cent.; THAT such tax must not be included in the manufacturer's or wholesaler's costs, on which profit is calculated.

The Tax Shall Be Paid By the Purchaser

to the wholesaler or manufacturer, at the time of such sale, and by the wholesaler or manufacturer to His Majesty in accordance with such regulations as may be prescribed, and such wholesaler or manufacturer shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding \$500.00, if such payments are not made, and in addition shall be liable to a penalty equal to double the amount of the excise duty unpaid.

(b) THAT the Minister may require every manufacturer and wholesaler to take out an annual license for the purpose aforesaid, and may prescribe a fee therefor, not exceeding \$5.00, and the penalty for neglect or refusal shall be a sum not exceeding \$1000.00.

(c) THAT any such tax, cost or penalties may at the option of the Minister be recovered and imposed in the exchequer court of Canada, or in any other court of competent jurisdiction, in the name of His Majesty.

(d) THAT this tax on sales shall not apply to sales or importations of animals (living), poultry, fresh, salted, pickled, smoked or canned-meat, canned poultry, soups of all kinds; milk, cream, butter, cheese, buttermilk, condensed milk, condensed coffee (with milk), milk powder, milk powder and similar products of milk, oleomargarine, butterine, or any other substitutes for butter; lard, lard-compound and similar substances; Cottage cheese, eggs, chicken (new or green); kiln-dried, roasted or ground-coffee (green, roasted or ground); tea, hops, rice (cleaned or uncleaned), rice-flour, sago-flour, tapioca-flour, rice-meal, corn-starch, potato-starch, potato-flour, vegetables, fruits, grains and seeds in their natural state, buckwheat-meal or flour, pot, pearl, rolled, roasted or ground barley; corn-meal, corn-flour, oat-meal or rolled oats, rye-flour, sago and tapioca; macaroni and vermicelli, cattle foods, hay and straw; nursery stock, vegetables (canned, dried or desiccated), fruits (canned, dried, desiccated or evaporated); honey (fresh) and products thereof; sugar, molasses, maple, corn and sugar-cane syrups and all imitations thereof; ice, newspapers and quarterly, monthly and semi-monthly magazines and weekly literary papers unbound; gold and silver ingots, blocks, bars, drops, sheets, plates, unmanufactured; gold and silver sweepings; British and Canadian coin and foreign gold coin; materials for use only in the construction of ships; anthracite and bituminous coal and coal-dust; lignite, briquettes made from anthracite or bituminous coal or lignite; coke, charcoal, peat-wood for fuel purposes; electricity, calcium-carbide, gas (manufactured from coal); calcium carbide or oil for illuminating or heating purposes; fibre, for use only in manufacture of binder-twine; ships licensed to engage in the Canadian coasting trade; artificial limbs and parts thereof; donations of clothing and books for charitable purposes; settlers' effects; articles enumerated in schedule "C" of the West India agreement or to articles purchased for use of the Dominion Government or any of the Departments thereof, or by or for the Senate or House of Commons.

A drawback may be granted of the tax paid on goods exported or on materials used, wrought into or attached to articles exported.

9. THAT a stamp tax of two cents be imposed, levied and collected on promissory notes and bills of exchange and advances made by a bank by way of overdraft, of the value of one hundred dollars or less; and THAT a tax of two cents additional be imposed on every one hundred dollars or fraction part thereof, in excess of one hundred dollars.

10. THAT a stamp tax of two cents be imposed, levied and collected on each \$100.00 of face value or fraction thereof, of stock transferred.

11. THAT the provisions of the said act relating to moving picture films, and all the other provisions of the said act, inconsistent with these resolutions, BE REPEALED.

12. THAT the foregoing provisions of these resolutions shall be held to have come into force on the 15th day of May, in the present year, one thousand nine hundred and twenty, and to apply and to have applied to all goods, imported or taken out of warehouse for consumption on or after the said day.

Provided THAT in the case of goods which were imported or taken out of warehouse for consumption and on which duty was paid on or after the nineteenth day of May, one thousand nine hundred and twenty, in accordance with the rate of duty set forth as payable on such goods in the resolutions respecting the duties of Excise introduced in the House of Commons on the eighteenth day of the said month, or in any amended resolution subsequently introduced in the said house, the duty so paid shall not be affected, nor shall the person paying it be entitled to any refund or be liable to any further payment of duty by reason of such rate of duty being altered before the date of the passing of these resolutions.

INSTRUCTIONS:

- LUXURY TAX (see resolutions 1 and 2) is payable on the first and fifteenth day of every month for the preceding period.
- MANUFACTURERS' TAX (see sections 4 and 5). SALES TAX (see section 8) are payable for the preceding month on the first of every month.
- ENTRIES for Luxury Tax must be sworn to, and shall be accompanied by—
 - Duplicate sales slips or invoices to which the entry refers.
 - An accepted cheque, or cash, for the full amount of the tax.
- ENTRIES for Manufacturers' Tax and for Sales Tax must be sworn to and shall be accompanied by—
 - A sworn statement of the manufacturer or wholesaler as to the total amount of the sales shown on his sales records, and the total amount of tax due on the same; or a certified statement of the Chartered Accountant in the employ of the manufacturer or wholesaler to a like effect and amount of tax.
 - Cash or an accepted cheque for the full amount of tax.
- ALL ENTRIES are to be filled out in duplicate, by the persons remitting the tax.
- MANUFACTURERS paying both Sales and Luxury Taxes shall make two returns (each in duplicate) one covering sales, and one covering Luxury Taxes.
- THE SWORN DECLARATIONS called for by these instructions may be made before any Inland Revenue Officer (including temporary officers), Customs Officers, Commissioner of the High Court of Justice or Justice of the Peace.
- CHEQUES are to be made payable to the "Receiver-General of Canada"; must be certified by the bank on which drawn, and be payable at bank in Vancouver, B. C.
- PAYMENTS OR REMITTANCES are to be made to the Collector of Inland Revenue, Vancouver, B. C., or to the nearest Inland Revenue Office in the Province.

FLITCH OF BACON FOR LIVING HAPPILY

Curious Ceremony at Ilford Recently in Annual Event.

LONDON, July 2.—The concluding scene of a carnival held at Ilford, one of the Essex municipalities of London, would have amazed anyone who came upon it by chance. A man and a woman, seated in a big, old-fashioned chair, and bashfully smiling, were being carried shoulder high, preceded by a brass band and attended by an enormous crowd, cheering and laughing. What would have puzzled the chance spectator most was the huge side of bacon, decorated with ribbons, which hung suspended above the chair. Ilford, in fact, was reviving the ancient custom so long associated with Dunmow of awarding a flitch of bacon to the happiest married couple that could be found locally.

The ceremony of "chaining" was preceded by a court, held in the military hall of the Gordon Club grounds, for the trial of the claimants and an audience of well over a thousand people extracted a good deal of amusement from the consideration of the question—"Is marriage a failure?" The most conspicuous object in the court was the flitch of bacon, which was to be given to the couple who could prove that they had lived together for a year and a day without any quarrel and without wishing themselves unwed.

Tried by Jury

The married couples who claimed the flitch were three in number, the husbands being school teacher, police constable and sign-writer, and the ages between 30 and 40. They sat together in a box to the left of the judge, and gave no sign whatever that, in the language of the old police court reporter, they felt their position acutely. Opposite to them were the jury—six maidens and six youths—who were to decide which of them deserved the bacon. The judge on the bench wore the wig, scarlet and ermine of the High Court of Justice. In the well of the court were the opposing counsel, for the claimants and the flitch, two for each male and female, the men in recognized professional garb and the girls in scarlet gowns and caps.

COUGHLANS LAUNCH ANOTHER VESSEL

Indus Takes Water for Swedish Interests—Seventeenth Vessel.

VANCOUVER, July 2.—The 8,800-ton steel steamer Indus was launched from the Coughlan yards today. This is the seventeenth vessel built at the big yards and is for Swedish interests.
