## Cox Leads Democratic Convention PLATFORM OF RE-VAMPED POLITICAL PARTY AT OTTAWA HAS NOTHING NEW

### Choosing Candidate for the Democrats

Delegates in Compromise Conference This Morning; Platform is an Interesting One

SAN FRANCISCO, July 3.—This morning at 9:40 a compromise conference which had been appointed overnight, went into session. At that time the favorites were McAdoo, Palmer and Cox. Yesterday was a strenuous day and this morning all the delegates were sleepy. A telegram from President Wilson was read in which he declared it "billed" him with perfect confidence in victory for the Democrats that they had stood for the League of Nations until the traditions of the republic had been vindicated.

**Platform.**  
The platform submitted by the committee omits any reference to the liquor question. It endorses the League of Nations, prompt

ratification of the peace treaty without nullifying the reservations, sympathy with the Irish with no reference to recognition of the republic; opposition to acceptance of a mandate for Armenia. The platform is in accord with Wilson's policy.

Borris Jenkins, sponsor for McAdoo, said they might be forced to draft him in his country's service.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 3.—4:40 p. m. In the fifth ballot McAdoo was leading with Cox climbing and Palmer losing.

In the sixth it was Palmer, McAdoo and Cox.  
In the eighth ballot Senator Cox took the lead.

**FLOATS NEEDED FOR FISHERMEN**

Present Accommodation is Not Sufficient, Says Captain Freeman.

At the Board of Trade meeting last night Capt. Freeman drew attention to the fact that the waterfront between the club house Hazelton and the Imperial oil dock was unused and that the fishermen and boat owners required more dockage, and urging that the board call on those in authority to build temporary floats at that place.

G. W. Nickerson drew attention to the original scheme of the Provincial Government to build larger floats at Cow Bay. This would have been done only they could not secure the necessary waterfront property because the city refused to sanction the Cow Bay deal. He did not think any government would build floats on private property.

The matter of the Shawatlans Passage dock was also mentioned.

It was finally decided to refer the matter to the Port Committee.

**EXAMINER FAILS TO REACH THIS CITY**

Toronto Conservatory of Music Advises Students to Continue Studies

Owing to his being unable to secure a reservation, F. A. Oliver, examiner for the Toronto Conservatory of Music, was unable to come here to examine pupils who were offering for the examination in connection with that institution. A telegram was received by the sister superior of St. Joseph's Academy to this effect and another from Dr. A. S. Vogt of the Toronto Conservatory expressing regret and suggesting that students continue their studies in the next grade and be examined in it next year.

**WILL SUPPLY ELECTRICITY FOR ALICE ARM**

Taylor Mining Co. Will Install Power Plant at Clearwater Lake Near Alice Arm.

Plans are being made for the installation of a hydro-electric plant at Clearwater Lake, about 20 miles up the Kilsault River from Alice Arm, to supply the Dolly Varden and Wolf mines and the Alice Arm district with power and light.

The water power of Whitewater Creek, which flows into Clearwater Lake, will be harnessed and the storage dam will be built at the foot of Clearwater Lake. The plant will be installed by the Taylor Mining Co., the operators of the Dolly Varden and Wolf mines.

**ASK PRIVILEGE FOR GAS BOATS**

Board of Trade Would Have Regulations Similar to United States.

That gas boats under 65 feet in length carrying passengers should not be required to carry lifeboats aboard but should be allowed to tow them behind the vessel, and that the services of a certificate of qualification for the captain of such a boat should not be required the same as for steam vessels, was the opinion of the Board of Trade as expressed at a meeting held last night. A resolution was passed by the board asking that a change should be made in the regulations to bring them more closely in conformity with those of the United States.

The matter came up following the reading of a report of the Port Committee.

Capt. Freeman brought the question up for discussion and urged that action be taken. There was considerable discussion during which it was shown that if a vessel was chartered by a group of people, no captain was required, but when carrying passengers in the ordinary course of business a certified captain must be in charge and a lifeboat carried on board.

CAR QUESTION AGAIN TO FORE

Attention Drawn to Inadequacy of Supply of Even Thirty New Ones.

At the meeting of the Board of Trade last night it was decided to again write to the Minister of Railways drawing attention to the fact that the general manager of the G. T. P. had stated on oath that 100 additional refrigerator cars were required to properly care for the fish business at this port and that the Railway Department had authorized the ordering of 30 only, and urging that the full requirements of the port in this respect be met.

FISH SOLD YESTERDAY SHIPPED ON FREIGHT

Quantity of Black Cod Bought in for Cold Storage.

Three car loads of fish were sold at the Fish Exchange yesterday. They were loaded and shipped east on the time freight last night.

The Marguerite, 11,000 lbs., and Dolphin, 16,000 lbs., sold to the Booth Fisheries for 14.6 and 6 cents. The Defence, 11,000 lbs., and Star, 12,000 lbs., to the Pacific Sea Products for 14.5 and 6 cts.

The Kobe, 3,000 lbs., to the Royal Fish Co. at 12.2 and 8 cts. The Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co., Ltd., bought the Mira, 12,000 lbs., and the Johanna, 14,000 lbs., at 14.4 and 6.2 cents, the Adeline, 10,000 lbs., at 11.1 and 6.8 cents, and the Christopher, 8,000 lbs., at 12 and 8 cts.

The Chief Zibassa came in with 9,000 lbs. black cod and 2,000 lbs. halibut and the Sumner with 32,000 lbs. black cod and 2,000 lbs. halibut for the Cold Storage.

ASK FOR ROAD TO SHAWATLANS NARROWS

Proposal that it Would be Built to Accommodate Industries in Neighborhood.

A resolution suggesting to the city the desirability of constructing a wagon road from Eleventh Avenue to accommodate the Seal Cove Marine Ways and such other industries as may be started in that neighborhood, was passed by the Board of Trade at its meeting last night.

There was some suggestion that everyone was kicking about taxes, but it was also pointed out that the suggested road would accommodate the fish dock proposed to be erected by the Government at that place.

SMALL DAMAGES IN VANDERHOOF VS. RIMES

Plaintiff Sued for \$15,000 and was Granted \$31.32; Plaintiff Pays Costs

The editor of the Vanderhoof Chronicle, formerly the Herald, has to pay the sum of \$31.32 to the founder of the town of Vanderhoof, damages in connection with the publication of a newspaper, but the plaintiff has to pay all costs, which will amount to many times that amount. That is the outcome of the case which was recently tried here and excited considerable interest.

The action was tried before Chief Justice Hunter. The dispute was over the newspaper, the Vanderhoof Herald, published at Vanderhoof. The plaintiff claimed against the defendant an injunction, damages for \$15,000.00 for fraud and loss of goodwill of business, claiming that the defendant on the dissolution of the partnership had wrongfully taken over certain assets, and for an accounting.

The Judge handed down a written judgment dismissing all the claims of the plaintiff and ordered an accounting which resulted in the defendant owing the plaintiff \$31.32, but as the defendant had succeeded in the main events of the action he was awarded the general costs against the plaintiff.

L. S. McGill appeared for the plaintiff and A. McB. Young of the firm of Young and Ogston, Prince George, B.C., appeared for the defendant.

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## BIG GAME OF SOUTH AFRICA

Elephants were Afraid, but Some Animals were Not, as Aeroplane Passed

"There were very few insects, except white ants, on the dry desert areas on which we had for the most part descended," said Dr. Chalmers Mitchell, in a lecture to the Zoological Society, telling of his airplane flight through Africa. "The trip was made during the driest season of the year. On many of the aerodromes white ants or termites were present in huge colonies, and the wheels and tail-skid of the aeroplane were kept protected by hands of thick grease. He and his companions were provided with mosquito nets within which they had slept when they camped out. But mosquitos had caused them very little trouble in the open, although they suffered severely from them in many of the "civilized" settlements. He had been bitten by tsetse fly on two occasions and was greatly surprised by the painfulness of the bite. A still more annoying insect was a large tabanid, known as the "hippotamus fly."

**Scared Elephants**  
With regard to larger animals, more had been seen from the aeroplane than he had anticipated, partly because he had asked the pilots to fly near the ground. From Heliopolis to Khartoum no mammals except camels and other domesticated creatures were visible. From Khartoum southward the wild fauna was much more abundant. At Renk, south of Jabelin, they had made a forced landing and had to pass the night. Some elephants came very near, trumpeting loudly, but apparently were scared away by the fire. The first elephants actually seen were in the Sudd, a female and young on a small green island. They seemed frightened by the noise of the plane and plunged or fell into the water. Soon after leaving Mongallo, near Mount Lado, a large herd, known as the Gondokoro herd, was passed. It consisted of nearly 20 animals, some of the elephants being quite young. Between the Victoria Nile and Lake Victoria Nyanza many elephants were seen, including one enormous bull with very large tusks.

**Other Animals.**  
Rhinoceros were seen frequently, generally two or three together. They were always more scared of the aeroplane than were the elephants. Hippopotamuses were seen in large numbers, both in the Nile and the lakes. On several occasions the aeroplane had come down so close to the water that he had seen them opening and shutting their nostrils. The hippos took no notice of the aeroplane. Buffalo and immense herds of buck were passed repeatedly from Khartoum right through to German East Africa. All these animals scattered as soon as the aeroplane came near, apparently being panic-stricken.

**Early Approached.**  
Dr. Chalmers Mitchell, in conclusion, said that aeroplanes might be of great service to game wardens and those to whom it was necessary to locate game for various purposes. So far as the naturalist or sportsman was concerned, one or two aeroplanes could take them and their equipment to suitable camps from which game might be tracked or observed on foot. In the various forced landings that the machine had made, sometimes in places where probably no white man had ever been before, the wild animals were often quite easy to approach, not yet having learned to be shy of man.

## POLICE BOAT WENT TO PORT SIMPSON

Yesterday afternoon the provincial police boat Myfawny left for Port Simpson carrying J. S. McLennan and Constable Wisely. They have gone over to look into a minor civil case. Objection was taken to the Justices of the peace at Port Simpson so word was received at provincial police headquarters here to send a justice of the peace from Prince Rupert. Government Agent McMullin was unable to go so J. S. McLennan was appointed to investigate the affair.

## FOUNDRY SITE

Company Wants Waterfront, but There is None Available Except Held by Government.

A letter read at the Board of Trade meeting last night from the Crucible Steel Works asking if a site could be secured as well as power and light, and suggesting that they would come here with a view to establishing an iron and brass foundry. They wanted a waterfront property 300 feet long with a 50-foot frontage. They will be informed that the only sites suitable are held by the Provincial Government.

## SISTER OF SHERIFF DIES IN MICHIGAN

Mrs. Ira Dellabaugh, an old and highly respected resident of this section of Sanilac county since 1879, passed away at her home in this village on Tuesday afternoon at 4 o'clock after an illness which has confined her to her bed for the past two years, says the Dickerville, Mich., Recorder.

Jane Shirley was born at Smith's Falls, Ont., August 15, 1837, and was married to Ira Dellabaugh in 1866. Seven children were born to them, five of whom survive, with the aged father.
