Convention at San Francisco finished at 1.40 this morning on the Fortieth Ballot

## Palmer First to Quit; McAdoo Forces Concede

Personal History of Novince for President similar to Longshoremen's Strike is Still that of Senator Harding; Farmer, Printer, Editor and Owner

SAN FRANCISCO, July 6. James M. Cox, governor of Ohio, has been nominated as the Democratic candidate for the Presidency of the United States. The nominations concluded at 1:40 this morning with the fortieth ballot after Cox had steadily beaten down the opposing forces of William G. McAdoo, the son-in-law of Woodrow Wilson. The Cox stampede started last evening when Georgia moved to the Cox column and 25 others flopped twos. At that time there were three candidates in the running but Palmer dropped and his delegates were released. On the thirty-eighth ballot when Cox was in close reach of the necessary number of votes the nomination was made unanimous with longshoremen and the Business McAdoo dropping from the race.

Governor Cox was born in Jacksonburg, Ohio, on March 31, 1870, so is now fifty years of age. He was raised on the farm, which he left for the printshop. He tzught school, was a reporter in Cincinnati and later became a newspaper owner, now owning three papers in Ohio, one of the in Dayton and another one in Cincinnati.

The coincidence is noted that both Republican and Democratic nominees are from the State of Ohio and have both been governors of that state. Both were raised on a farm and both became 'printer's devils" and later school teachers before taking up reportorial life. Now both are candidates for the highest office that can be the privilege of an American.



Upwards of a Million Dollars' Worth of Cre Extracted During Winter.

STEWART, July 6 .- Operations on the Premies Mine, Salmon River, during the past winter have disclosed that the Premier is everything its wonderful first development has promised. Information in regard to it is meagre but the facts publicly known prove that it is already one of the greatest mines on the continent, both in the extent of its ore bodies and in the value of their metal content.

During the past winter the Premier ore shipments totalled 1,500 tons, averaging \$300 a ton. Besides these shipments of highgrade a great deal of milling ore has been mined and is on the of high-grade, probably a million dollars' worth of ore has been extracted from the Premier during the past winter. The value of the new ore developed can only

be guessed at. than has yet been found in the upper workings.

The first unit of a thousand ton concentrator is rapidly nearing completion and it is expected the first run will be made some time in August. About 70 men are now employed at the Premier.

#### Synopsis of . e Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$2.50 an acre. Pre-emption new confined to sur-

veyed lands only. Records will be granted covering only land suitable for arricultural purposes and which is non-timber land. Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may

with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective Pre-emptors must occupy claims for

five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clear-ing and cultivation of at least 5 acres. before receiving Crown Grant. Where pre-empter in occupation pot less than 3 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of im-

provement and transfer his claim. Records without permanent residence may be iscued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Fallure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required. Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, pro-

vided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesites; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions. For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company. Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include

payment of stumpage. Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchar price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from for one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made re-

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years. Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions. Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from en-listment to March 21, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on ful-filment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. 5. The inculcation of true temperance principles consistent with personal liberty.

6. The elimination of the causes of the deplorable loss of respect for the laws of the land engendered by the Prohibition Act.

The voters lists close on the 15th inst. If you have not registered by that date you will not be able to vote on the referendum or at the Dominion or Provincial Elections. Remember the old voters' lists have been cancelled.
