Democrat Nominations are Concluded

LONDON CITY PRESENTS JEWELLED SWORD TO HEAD OF AMERICAN ARMY

Governor Cox of Ohio New Democrat Leader

Convention at San Francisco finished at 1.40 this morning on the Fortieth Ballot

Palmer First to Quit; McAdoo Forces Concede

Personal History of Nominee for President similar to that of Senator Harding; Farmer, Printer, Editor and Owner

SAN FRANCISCO, July 6.—James M. Cox, governor of Ohio, has been nominated as the Democratic candidate for the Presidency of the United States. The nominations concluded at 1:40 this morning with the fortieth ballot after Cox had steadily beaten down the opposing forces of William G. McAdoo, the son-in-law of Woodrow Wilson. The Cox stampede started last evening when Georgia moved to the Cox column and 25 others flopped two. At that time there were three candidates in the running but Palmer dropped and his delegates were released. On the thirty-eighth ballot when Cox was in close reach of the necessary number of votes the nomination was made unanimous with McAdoo dropping from the race.

Governor Cox was born in Jacksonburg, Ohio, on March 31, 1870, so is now fifty years of age. He was raised on the farm, which he left for the printshop. He taught school, was a reporter in Cincinnati and later became a newspaper owner, now owning three papers in Ohio, one of the in Dayton and another one in Cincinnati.

The coincidence is noted that both Republican and Democratic nominees are from the State of Ohio and have both been governors of that state. Both were raised on a farm and both became "printer's devils" and later school teachers before taking up reportorial life. Now both are candidates for the highest office that can be the privilege of an American.

ROYAL TRAIN WAS DERAILED

Two Cars of Prince of Wales' Special Left Track in Australia.

BRIDGETOWN, West Australia, July 6.—Two of the coaches of the Prince of Wales' royal train were derailed here yesterday, but nobody was injured.

NEW YORK, July 6.—The War Department announced that the first planes for the transcontinental flight will leave for Nome on July 15 from Mitchell Field. It is proposed to photograph un-mapped areas and do general exploration. The stations on the route are Grand Rapids, Mich.; Jasper, Alta.; Prince George, Hazelton, Dawson, Fairbanks, Ruby and Nome.

TORONTO, July 6.—Charles Stephens has arrived from Bristol to make an attempt to go over Niagara Falls in a barrel. R. F. Carter, a river captain, when asked to manage the affair, refused, stating that he would not be a "party to a suicide."

FAMOUS AMERICAN DOCTOR IS DEAD

General Gorgas successfully Combatting Panama Malarial Germ.

LONDON, July 6.—Gen. Gorgas, former surgeon-general of the American army, is dead. General Gorgas was largely responsible for the successful completion of the Panama Canal in combatting the malaria fever germs.

SITUATION IS BAD AS EVER

Longshoremen's Strike is Still Deadlocked—Men will not have Conciliation Board.

MAYOR McCLOYMONT HAS WIRED OTTAWA AGAIN

In answer to a question of Ald. Kerr as to the condition of the longshoremen's strike, Mayor McCloymont stated at last night's council meeting that he had again wired to the Minister of Labor telling him that the strike situation in the city was even worse than it had been. Yesterday he had had a conference with the longshoremen and the business men but no progress towards settlement had been made.

The mayor stated that the men refused to go back to work and would not have anything to do with a conciliation board, having withdrawn their previous statements with a view to settlement.

FIGHTING AROUND TURKISH CAPITAL

Fighting in the City While Grand Fleet Bombarbs Turks—Turkish Rebels Also Near.

LONDON, July 6.—The Turkish rebels are near Constantinople just across the Bosphorus. The British and Greek troops have been fighting the Nationalists in the city and the British fleet has been bombarding the Turks.

REPORT TELLS OF BOLSHEVIK LOSSES

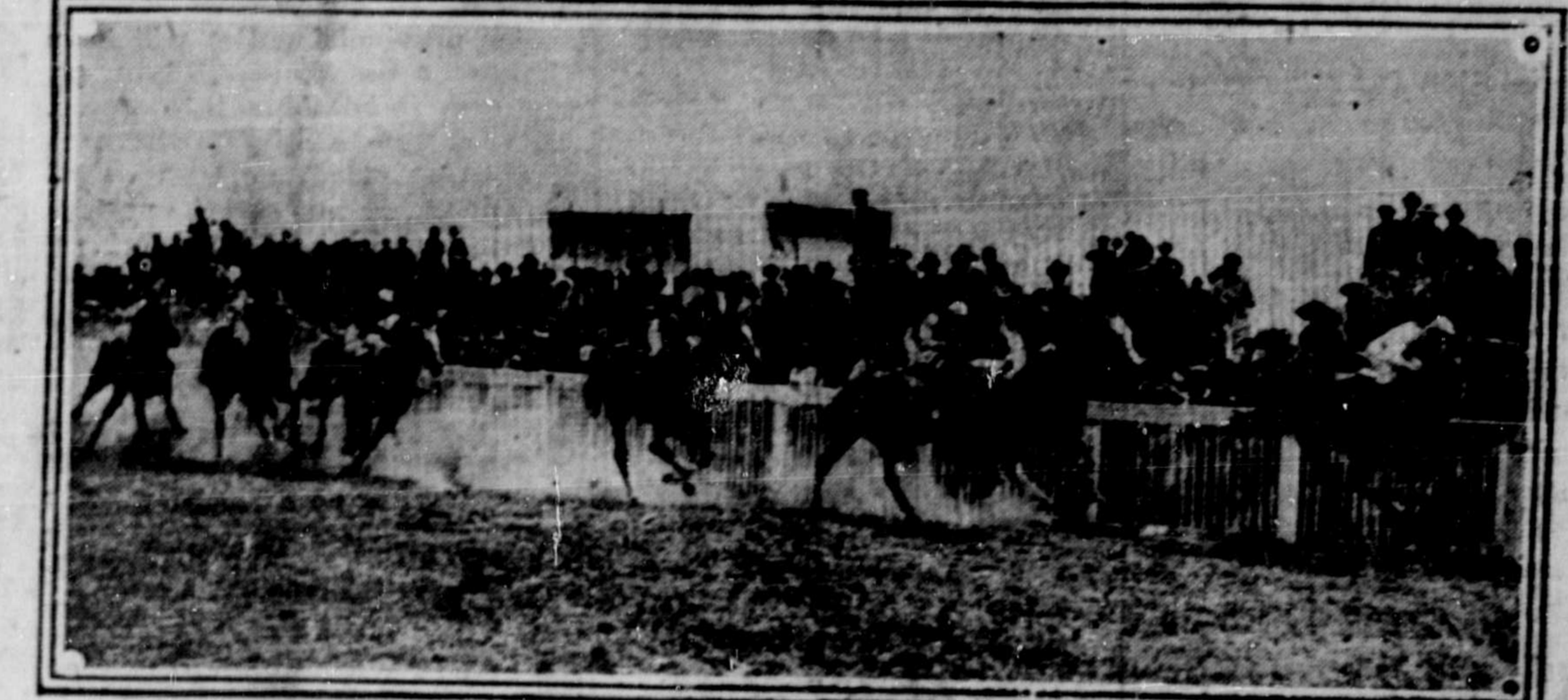
State that Eighteen Battalions Wiped out and 1,000 Prisoners and Guns.

REGISTRATION IS GOING SLOW

Government is Considering Availability of Extending Time in Certain Districts.

While, as now established, registration of electors desirous of getting on the voters' list being compiled under the provisions of the new Provincial Elections Act will terminate on July 15, it is possible that there will be an extension, if not throughout the province generally, at least in some of the outlying places. So far no notification of a decision has been received here but the matter is under consideration at Victoria.

In the meantime the closing late is July 15, and registration is dragging along slowly, the total up to today in this city being but 1,320 names. The total for the whole of Skeena District so far registered is 2,402 while there were 5,000 names on the list last year. There must be the proverbial eleventh hour rush if all the qualified electors in the city and district are to be registered by the required date.

WAR VETERANS DESIRE TITLE

Would Exchange Memorial Site on Fulton St. for Ownership Present Club Quarters.

The application of the G. W. V. A. to make an exchange of the lots granted them on Fulton St. for memorial purposes for the title to the present quarters on Third Ave. was received last night at the council meeting and was laid over for a week. It was the general opinion around the council board that the property on Third Avenue could not be granted without the ratepayers giving sanction by the vote.

It is the proposition of the Association to abandon the proposed ambitious plans for a memorial building on Fulton St. and, instead, renovate their present quarters and erect a tablet. The city councillors gave different views on the matter and showed sympathy with the desire for a memorial, the mayor favoring one that would be a memory to the fallen heroes but would, at the same time, be useful for the ones who had returned.

There is no doubt but that he was receiving much punishment and was only recently recovering from an operation. McIntosh was a much larger man than Neff and necessarily received many body blows. There were two preliminaries in which Ketchikan men took part.

IMPORTER FINISHING FIRST ROUND TRIP

Gives Charlie White the First Knockout He Ever Received—Ended Ninth Round.

BRENTON HARBOR, B.C., July 6.—Bennie Leonard, the light-weight champion of the world, defeated Charlie White, of Chicago, by knocking him out in the ninth round. This is the first knockout that the challenger ever received.

Several Boats Were in for Sale; Six Cars Leaving Tomorrow Morning.

Selling was rather brisk at the Fish Exchange this morning as six cars are due in on the freight train from the east tomorrow morning.

Mayflower, 8,000, Molly May, 3,000, and Crescent, 9,000, sold to the Pacific Sea Products at 13.8c and 6.9c. The Kouyaku, 3,500, sold to the Royal Fish Co. at 13.9c and 7c.

BOAT FOUND; MAN MISSING

Got a Boat in Threatening Manner when Under Influence of Liquor—Hat Only Clue.

VANCOUVER, July 6.—A search is being made of English Bay for trace of an intoxicated man who secured a row boat under threats this morning. The unoccupied boat has been found but no trace of the man except a hat initialled "E. F. H.". He had a bottle of whiskey. An oar was missing from the boat.

VANCOUVER, July 6.—E. F. Hill, a longshoreman, is now believed to be the victim of the drowning in English Bay.

PREMIER MINE GOING STRONG

Upwards of a Million Dollars' Worth of Ore Extracted During Winter.

STEWART, July 6.—Operations on the Premier Mine, Salmon River, during the past winter have disclosed that the Premier is everything its wonderful first development has promised. Information in regard to it is meagre but the facts publicly known prove that it is already one of the greatest mines on the continent, both in the extent of its ore bodies and in the value of their metal content.

During the past winter the Premier ore shipments totalled 1,500 tons, averaging \$300 a ton. Besides these shipments of high-grade a great deal of milling ore has been mined and is on the dump. Including the shipments of high-grade, probably a million dollars' worth of ore has been extracted from the Premier during the past winter. The value of the new ore developed can only be guessed at.

It is said when the results of the diamond drilling are known they will startle the mining world. The high-grade has been, it is reported, cut by the drill at a great depth and in bigger body than has yet been found in the upper workings.

The first unit of a thousand ton concentrator is rapidly nearing completion and it is expected the first run will be made some time in August. About 70 men are now employed at the Premier.

CANNOT PARK THIRD AVENUE

Police Will Enforce Traffic Rules; Will Affect Several Taxi Owners.

The police will now enforce rules in regard to the parking of taxicabs on Third Avenue. Such automobiles for hire will not be allowed to stand on Third Avenue at all. Parking space will be limited on Sixth Street to that section between the lane which runs behind the Royal Hotel and Fraser Street. No definite rulings have been laid down in regard to the other streets but the officials are confident that the same conditions will soon apply on a number of the other streets.

FLOODS IN VALLEY OF FRASER RIVER

Within Two Feet of Flood Height of 1917—Some Land Under Nineteen Feet.

SUMAS, July 6.—The Fraser River is within two feet of the flood height of 1917 when so much damage was caused. Lowlands around Mission are flooded to a depth of 19 feet.

TO FREE STRIKE LEADERS IS AIM

Alderman Casey Would Have City Council Pass Resolution With Such Recommendation to Minister of Justice.

Moved by Alderman Casey and seconded by Alderman Kerr, the following motion is to be brought up at next week's council meeting:— "Whereas democracy has been the slogan of all governing bodies in the Dominion of Canada and, whereas, democracy has vindicated the strike leaders in the Winnipeg strike through the decision of the electors in the recent election in that province, and, therefore be it resolved by this body, the Prince Rupert City Council, that in the name of the spirit of democracy we respectfully request the Honorable Minister of Justice, Charles E. Doherty, to restore to their liberty, home and duties the following named strike victims: Ivens, Queen, Armstrong, Johns, Russell, Pritchard, Farnell and Bray."

In speaking on the resolution last night, Alderman Casey stated that as a result of the recent provincial election in Manitoba, Gideon Robertson and Arthur Meighen should now feel indeed small. To have an outside body like the city council pass such a resolution would be a great stimulant. Attention was drawn to the report that the New Westminster Ministerial Association had adopted a similar resolution.

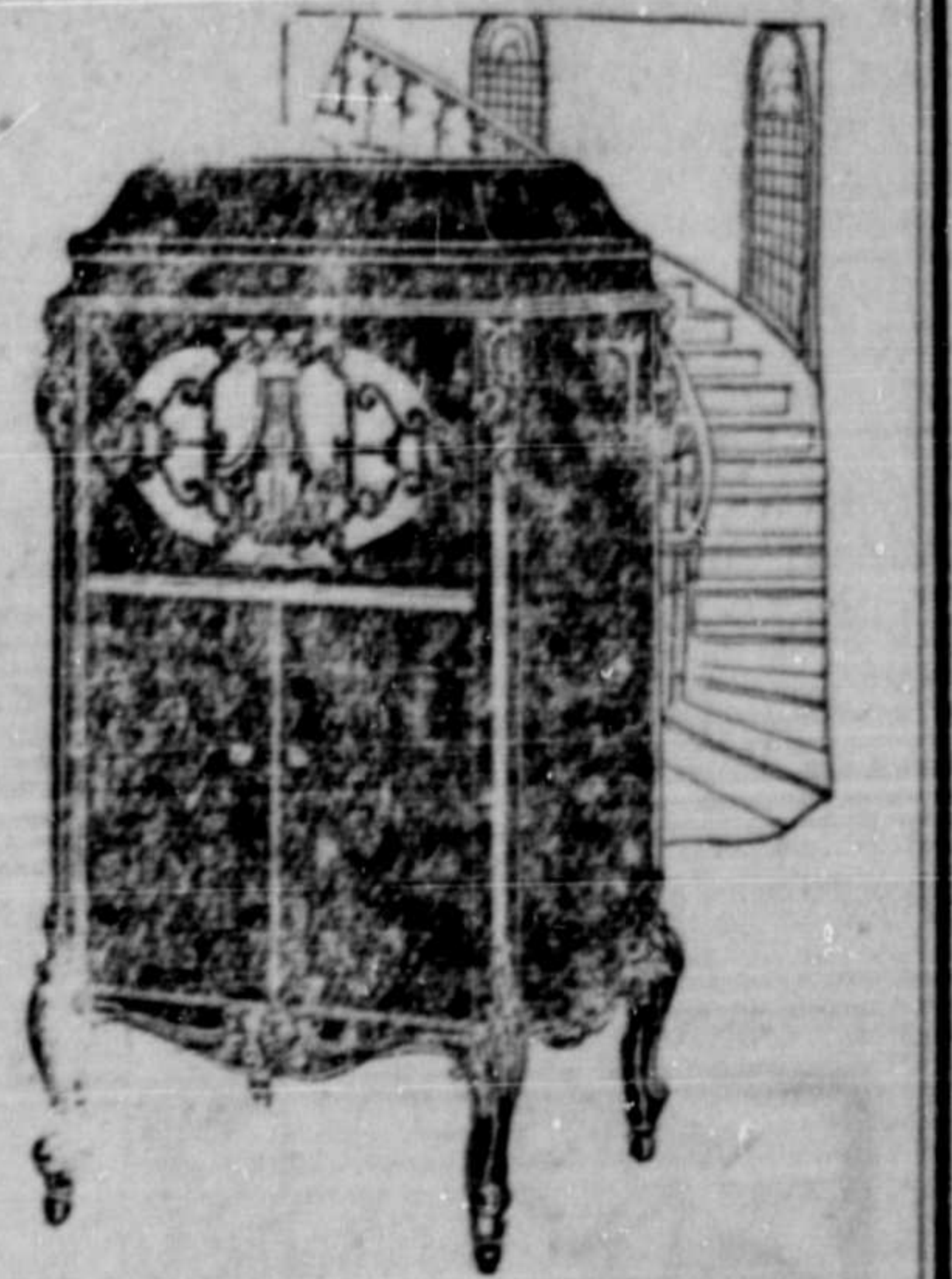

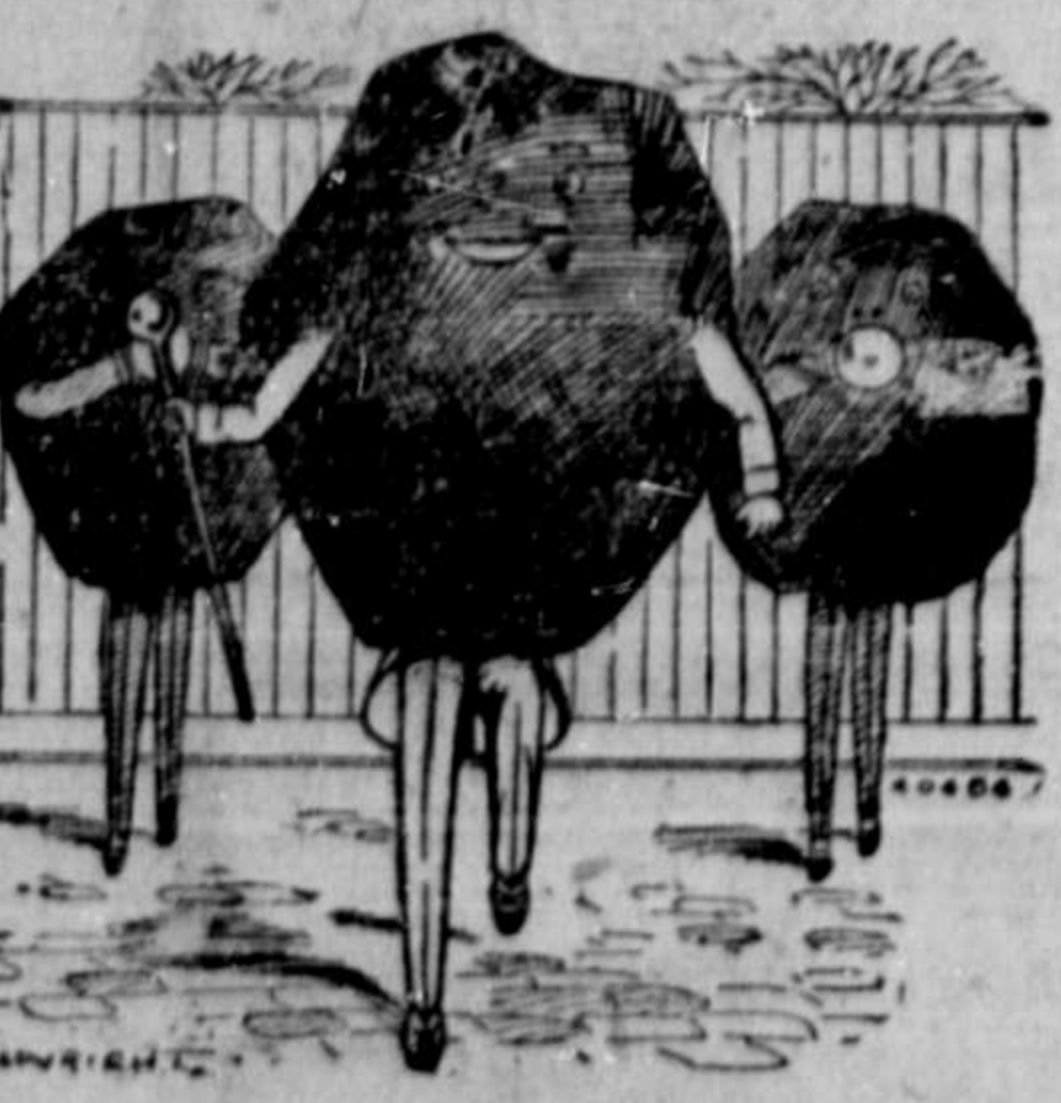

Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$10 an acre.
Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.
Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.
Records of pre-emption abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.
Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving a license.
Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 2 years, and has made progressive improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.
Records of permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$100 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture of claim.
Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.
Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.
For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.
Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased, conditions include payment of stumpage.
Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebat of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.
PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.
The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The benefit of which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from four years from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.
No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.
Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.
Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enlistment to March 31, 1920.
SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.
Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfilment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.
GRAZING.
Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged; priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.
