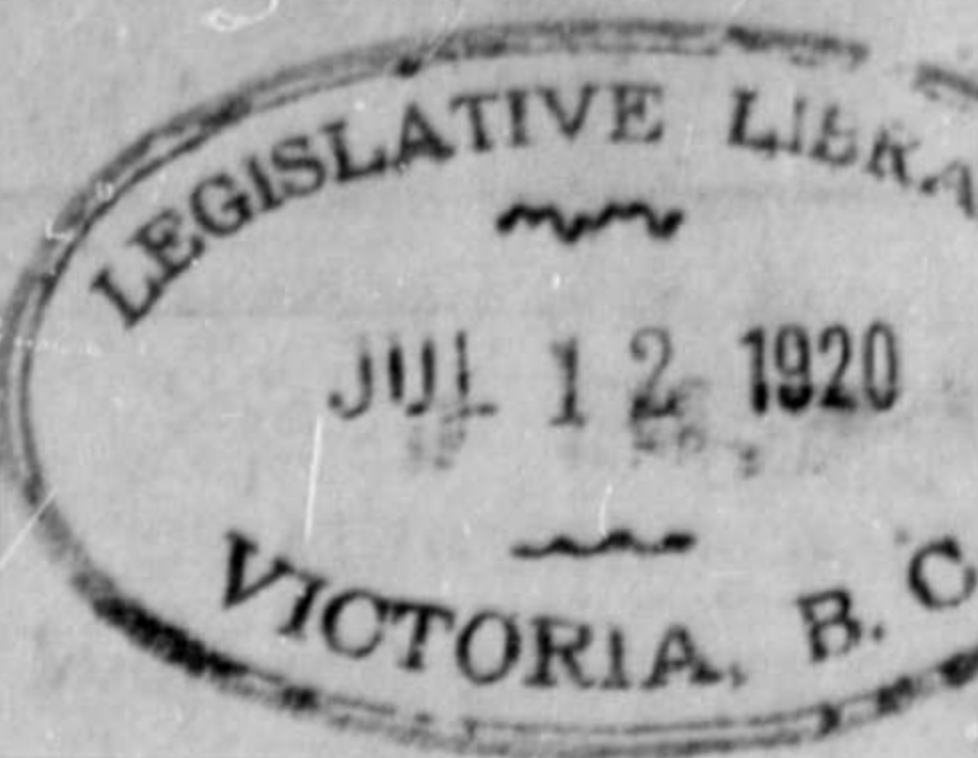

Meighen Probably Dominion Premier

DEMOCRATS HAVE CHOSEN CANDIDATE FOR THE SECOND HIGHEST OFFICE

Sir Thomas White Cannot Become Prime Minister

Makes a definite Statement in Reply to Suggestions at Toronto--Meighen said to be the man

Believed That White Was Borden's Choice

Selection of New Premier is duty of the Governor-General in Behalf of King--may call for Retiring Premier's Advice

TORONTO, July 7.—Sir Thomas White, late minister of finance, definitely states that he would be unable to accept the Dominion premiership in place of Sir Robert Borden even if it were offered him.

The name of Sir Thomas and Arthur Meighen have been prominently mentioned for the premier's place ever since the announcement of Sir Robert's resignation. It is felt in authoritative circles that Arthur Meighen will be the next in line. He is the general favorite although, it is believed, Sir Robert favored Sir Thomas White.

Duty of Sovereign.

The selection of the new premier rests with the Governor-General, and the retiring premier has nothing to do with the selection except as the Governor may see fit to consult with him when his capacity would be as a private councillor who has gained a wide knowledge of public affairs.

Report Meighen Asked.

OTTAWA, July 7.—It is unofficially reported that Hon. Arthur Meighen has been asked to become Premier of Canada and form a government. Sir Robert Borden is said to have made the recommendation.

ROBERT WATSON OF LADYSMITH IS DEAD

Mason of 58 Years Standing, Aged 80, and Pioneer of Coal Mining Town.

LADYSMITH, July 8.—Robert W. Watson, a pioneer of the Masonic Order, having been in that lodge for 58 years, is dead. He was 80 years of age and had spent his latter days with his aged wife on an acreage outside of this city. He lived in Ladysmith for many years and was a familiar and highly respected figure.

STRIKE TIES UP ALL LUMBER SHIPMENTS

Millmen State Their Position and Will Endeavor to Move Their Product to Market Themselves.

In connection with an advertisement appearing in another part of this paper, we, the undersigned manufacturers and shippers of lumber through the port of Prince Rupert, wish to make the following statement of our position with reference to the longshoremen's strike:

For nearly five weeks this has continued and at the present time a deadlock exists, neither the Grand Trunk Pacific nor the longshoremen making any advances or taking any steps towards an adjustment of their differences.

In the meantime our lumber shipments have been held up and our operations seriously hampered thereby. It follows, also, that we are suffering a heavy daily financial loss for every day that the strike continues.

Up until the present time we have remained passive in the matter, hoping that the Grand Trunk and the longshoremen would get together, settle their differences and allow us to peacefully carry on our industry.

We have appealed to the Grand Trunk for relief and have asked them to discharge our lumber from barges to cars so that we could dispose of our product and thus continue the operation of our mills. They answer us that they can do nothing until the men return to work.

We have appealed to the longshoremen and have offered to pay them the rate per hour that they are demanding from the Grand Trunk Pacific. They reply that they cannot move our lumber until their differences with the Grand Trunk are adjusted.

This situation having developed that the Grand Trunk cannot move our lumber and the longshoremen will not move our lumber, only one recourse seems open to us. This is, that if we get our lumber moved—and the necessity is urgent that we move it at once—we must move it ourselves.

We regret very much that we have to take this action, but the necessity for it has been forced upon us, and we wish to say that we shall immediately make an effort along these lines.

ASSAULT CASE WAS MENTIONED AT THE POLICE COMMISSION

Of the 39 cases which came before the police court during the last month, 38 convictions were obtained and one case is pending. The case which has been left over is that charged against J. J. Urtachee for assault, the victim having not yet recovered sufficiently from the effects of the attack to be able to stand examination. In regard to Mayor McElymont's question at the sitting of the commission this morning, Chief Vickers replied that no police constable had gone away to allow the fight to go on. As soon as word reached the station Constable McGilnehy went straight to the scene of the fracas and made the arrest.

QUESTION OF WHAT TO DO WITH DUFF LIQUOR

Police Commission Will Wait Until Right of Claim is Passed.

Considerable discussion was invoked at the regular monthly meeting of the police commission held at the Mayor's office this morning in regard to the liquor from the Duff case which still remains unclaimed in cells of the city jail. The mayor maintained that the stuff was no good if it might as well be thrown into a gutter, thus removing an eye sore. Commissioner Hill considered however that Chief Minty might come over and test it as to whether or not the government might take it. Action was deferred until after a lapse of thirty days when rights to lay claim to the quantity will be lost.

Franklin Roosevelt for Vice-President

Relative of Former President gets Second Democratic Nomination at San Francisco

SAN FRANCISCO, July 7.—Franklin D. Roosevelt, assistant secretary of the navy and a relative of the former president, Theodore Roosevelt, has been nominated as the Democratic candidate for the vice-presidency.

The nomination of the vice-president was done with dispatch and there was practically no competition for the office. Franklin Roosevelt's name had been prominently mentioned since the presidential nominations were concluded and the interest centred about the second nomination.

After a wearisome convention the delegates are now preparing to leave for their homes.

First Act Is Now Over.

The nominations for men to represent the two main political parties of the United States in the presidential elections which take place next November being concluded, political campaigning will now commence in the true sense of the word in all sections of the great republic.

Stage Set For Elections.

The recent primaries have been contested probably more keenly than has been the case for some time. Faced with international problems and questions of more than usual moment—affairs that affect the moulding of the nation's destiny more than any others ever experienced—the parties have necessarily divided themselves into factions and in both the case of the Republicans and Democrats, and more so in the latter, it took more time and much diplomacy to heal these differences.

Must Have Honest Policies.

Whether a Republican or a Democrat goes to the White House in March, 1921, is a question of American domestic politics with which foreigners have no active concern. We shall welcome either as the representative of the American people, and we shall be prepared impartially to discuss with either in the friendliest manner the many questions which we have in common.

May Look for Decreasing Prices.

There is now a more hopeful feeling about prices and the high cost of living. The whole tendency of the chief markets is towards a fall in prices although wheat and sugar are both steady if not rising. There has been a slackening off in business and buyers in many trades are developing cautiousness with a disposition to hold back.

The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps.

The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.

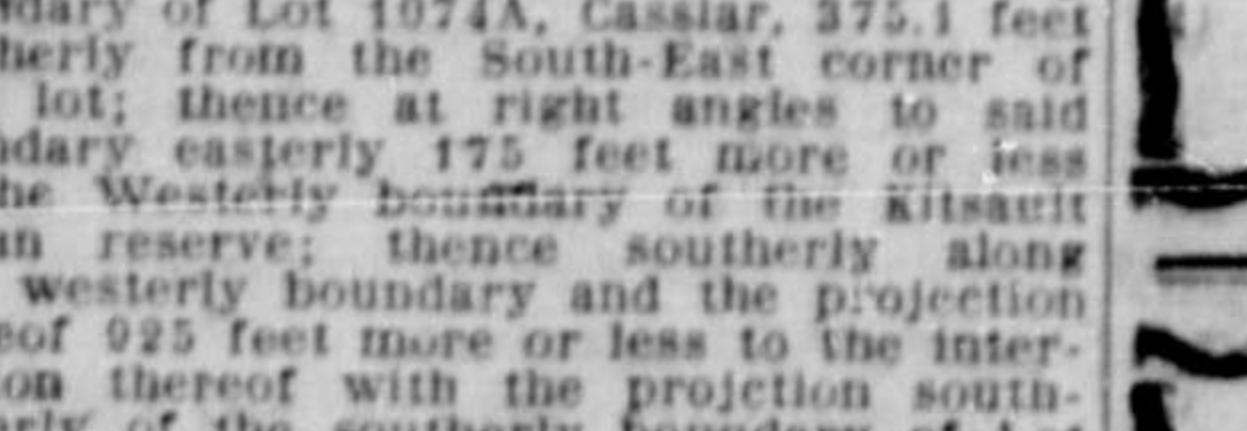

EXTRAORDINARY WATER MONSTER

Fishermen Land Fierce Six-foot Animal on Saanich Farm

VICTORIA, July 6.—The perennial sea-serpent yarn is being revived among local fishermen by the adventure which Isaac Byers, Secretary of the Civic Employees Protective Association, and H. Mitchell went through when fishing on Saanich Arm. These disciples of Walton report that, after a great deal of trouble they captured an animal which appears to be a cross between a fish and an eel with a strain of dog intermingled. The creature is six feet in length, and so far no one has been able to identify it as any known member of any breed of fish.

The monster was seen by the fishermen swimming slowly in about fifteen feet of water just off shore in the Arm when they were trolling a few days ago. At first they thought that it was a big cod and set about trying to hook it. The brute appeared to be about six feet in length and the fishermen realized that they could not hope to land it on their trolling line. They therefore rigged up a huge halibut hook on the end of a stout cord. They lowered the hook down beside the animal and after a few unsuccessful attempts managed to "jig" it into the creature's gill. There followed a fight which lasted for the better part of half an hour. Fortunately there was a sandy beach not far away and the fishermen were able to land their boat there, dragging the struggling "fish" with them. As the beast emerged from the water it struggled furiously and when Mr. Byer attempted to shove it along with an oar it turned about and grasped the blade in its mouth, leaving big teeth marks in the hard wood.

Mr. Byers held the cord while his partner endeavored to kill the fish by hitting it on the head with a club. This was by no means an easy task, for the brute lashed about in all directions. Finally, however, Mr. Mitchell landed a K. O. clear on the back of the head and the "fish" ceased to struggle.

On examining their prize the fishermen found that it was a creature six feet in length with a large dog-like head. Most peculiar was the brute's mouth, which contained two rows of large sharp teeth like those of a dog. Its body tapered from the head, which was about five inches in diameter, to its tail, which was but three inches thick. The body was about eight inches from belly to back and three inches through. The only fins were one stretching along the back from the back of the head to the tail, and the other similarly along the belly. The body was gray in color with black spots an inch in diameter. It weighed about fifty pounds.

The animal was placed in the boat when it seemed dead, but ten hours later a spark of life appeared to remain in it. It was taken ashore to Mr. Byers' landing place and was examined by many fishermen who were on the Arm that day.

No one offered to eat it. Francis Kermode, director of the Provincial Museum, was asked today about the fish. He stated that, from the description given him, the animal appeared to be a "wolf fish," a member of a family which sometimes comes along the island shore to catch shell fish. Expert zoologists who are investigating the fish are satisfied that it belongs to the family of the anarrichthys. There are two classes in this family—one the wolf fish of California, another a voracious creature, with especially powerful teeth adapted for crushing shell fish, which frequents the coasts of Europe and North America, and are commonly known as the "sea wolf" or wolf eel.

AUTOMOBILE STRUCK STEEL BRIDGE POST

Fred Timms dead, James Smith dying and Three Others Were Injured.

EDMONTON, July 6.—Fred Timms is dead and James Smith is dying as a result of injuries sustained when the automobile in which they were driving struck the steel girder of a bridge. H. L. Robertson, John Lucas and Gilbert May were injured.

The minister derived a good deal of satisfaction from the fact that there are an increasing number of settlers from the prairie provinces continually moving into the northern interior. In nearly every case, he says they are farmers of experience and in possession of the necessary capital to undertake development on an extensive scale.

The Vanderhoof Creamery already has commenced operations with the aid of the department which took the shape of the loan of equipment and a puttermaker. The equipment may be utilized by the creamery for one year and at the end of that period the various co-operative associations interested in the enterprise may purchase it from the government. Failing that, the paraphernalia will be transferred for service elsewhere. The puttermaker fills the dual role of churner and district representative, the performance of the latter function comprising a full calendar of educational subjects in agriculture.

The situation results from a flirtation which Lord Algy's brother has been carrying on with a wealthy merchant's wife and Lord Algy is unfortunately suspected. In spite of damning evidence, Lady Algy retains her faith in her husband and saves another family from a compromising situation.

In the Letter Box

Editor Daily News—
I would appreciate the use of your space for a few remarks in regard to the unfortunate trip to Ketchikan on the schooner "Lady Mine."

I assure the public that every effort possible was taken for the securing of a suitable boat for the occasion and without avail. The sum of \$3,500 was offered the C.P.R., G.T.P., Union, S.S. Otter, and the Alaska Steamship Co. but no vessel was to be obtained. Myself and family and party were favored with the use of the captain's cabin on the northbound trip and we returned on the "Regal."

The first knowledge that I had of the accident that led to the death of William McNabb was when someone called in our quarters, "Ben, come quickly, someone is dying in the front hold." I started to put on my shoes and the person said, "Do not stop for your shoes, he is dying." When I arrived in the hold McNabb had been placed on a table and J.S. Pudney, with the assistance of Ernest Watson, was working his arms and rubbing his limbs to restore breathing. I wish to thank Mr. Pudney for the way he worked four hours with the deceased and stayed with him at the Ketchikan Hospital until his death.

The last time I saw McNabb before he was unconscious was with Jack Bishop, when he came aboard the Lady Mine from the Narbethong some time in the night after we had cleared from Prince Rupert. He was ordered out of our quarters when he was insisting on reaching the engine room, where he was seen to handle one of the suitcases which was later seized by the authorities at Ketchikan but which no one would claim.

The inquest over the body of McNabb was held last Sunday and we were very thankful to the authorities for holding it then as it allowed us to return home on Monday. In the testimony at the inquest one of the girls said that McNabb, on returning from the deck, said: "I have just had a big rate of coke." No evidence was, however, forthcoming as to who gave him the same.

The young man was well known by William Brown, the drummer at the Westholme Theatre, before leaving Edmonton and according to Brown's statement was not addicted to the use of drugs before coming to Prince Rupert. I certainly hope that some one, in a way, is responsible for the death in supplying the drug that killed him. I also believe that in the last three years the drug habit has increased 100 per cent in Prince Rupert.

I want to defend the baseball players and those connected with them on the trip. In the games, so far this year, there has been no wrangling or disputing and it was unfortunate that our battery was unable to work in any of the recent games on account of injuries sustained unavoidably. We were glad, indeed, to have the pitcher from Kasaan and the catcher from New Metlakatla assist us at Ketchikan.

I hope that this will clear the minds of any in doubt as to the manner in which the death happened and I also hope that suitable transportation may, in future, be obtained for the excursion.

Mining News

Utica Resumes
Announcing that the famous Utica mine near Nelson will be opened up at once, and that the adjoining Sunset mine, which has not been worked for fifteen years, will also be reopened at once, G. F. Caldwell, vice-president and general manager of the Utica Mines, Limited, has recently given out details of his plans. The old Sunset, under the late George Hughes, shipped over \$500,000 worth of ore, some 2,000 tons which averaged over \$250 per ton at the old price of silver. The property was closed down when Mr. Hughes died. Mr. Caldwell intends to continue the new crosscut until it taps the vein at a new depth. It is hoped to ship by fall.

Dual Silver Price.
There has been some misconception about the prices quoted for silver in New York. Gold and silver is bought and sold in this province on the New York quotation, and some of the producers would not unreasonably like to get the higher price for their output but, unfortunately, the higher price is not for the likes of us. When silver was above the parity value, the United States, under the Pittman Act, melted and sold an enormous quantity of its silver coinage and under the same act is now buying from its citizens silver produced from United States mines by United States smelters at \$1 per ounce of 1,000 fine, or pure, silver. The smelters with 999 pure silver for the higher of the two New York quotations, the lower quotation being foreign silver under which class British Columbia's comes.

Wharf and Road.
The people of Alice Arm are clamoring for a government wharf and a wagon road connecting that wharf with the town. The road, however, would have to be built by the Provincial Government and it is felt that until the Dominion puts in the wharf the province would hardly be justified in road building although the necessity for both is well recognized. The people of the town which is nearly a mile from the present Dolly Varden wharf, the one at the Arm, are not satisfied. Freight coming in on the boats, it is said, is delayed on account of the rush of company business and the only means of transportation besides ore trains is by wagons to a barge on the mud flats which is by no means convenient or economical. The business of the Taylor Mining Co. at their dock fully takes up the quarters and the public business is becoming an unnecessary burden. The condition of affairs is, at the same time, discouraging to the business people and old timers of the silver camp.

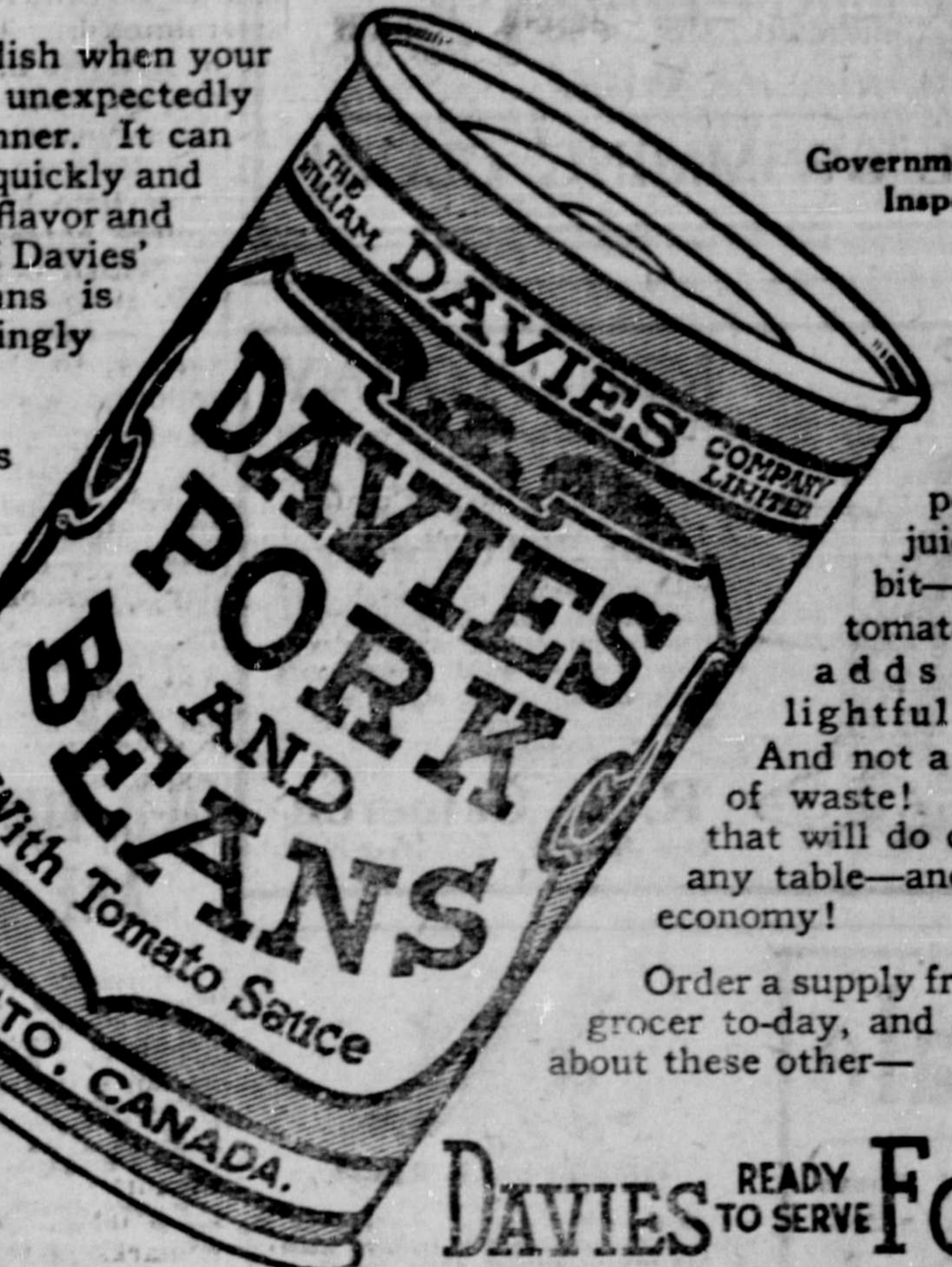
Anox Coke Plant.

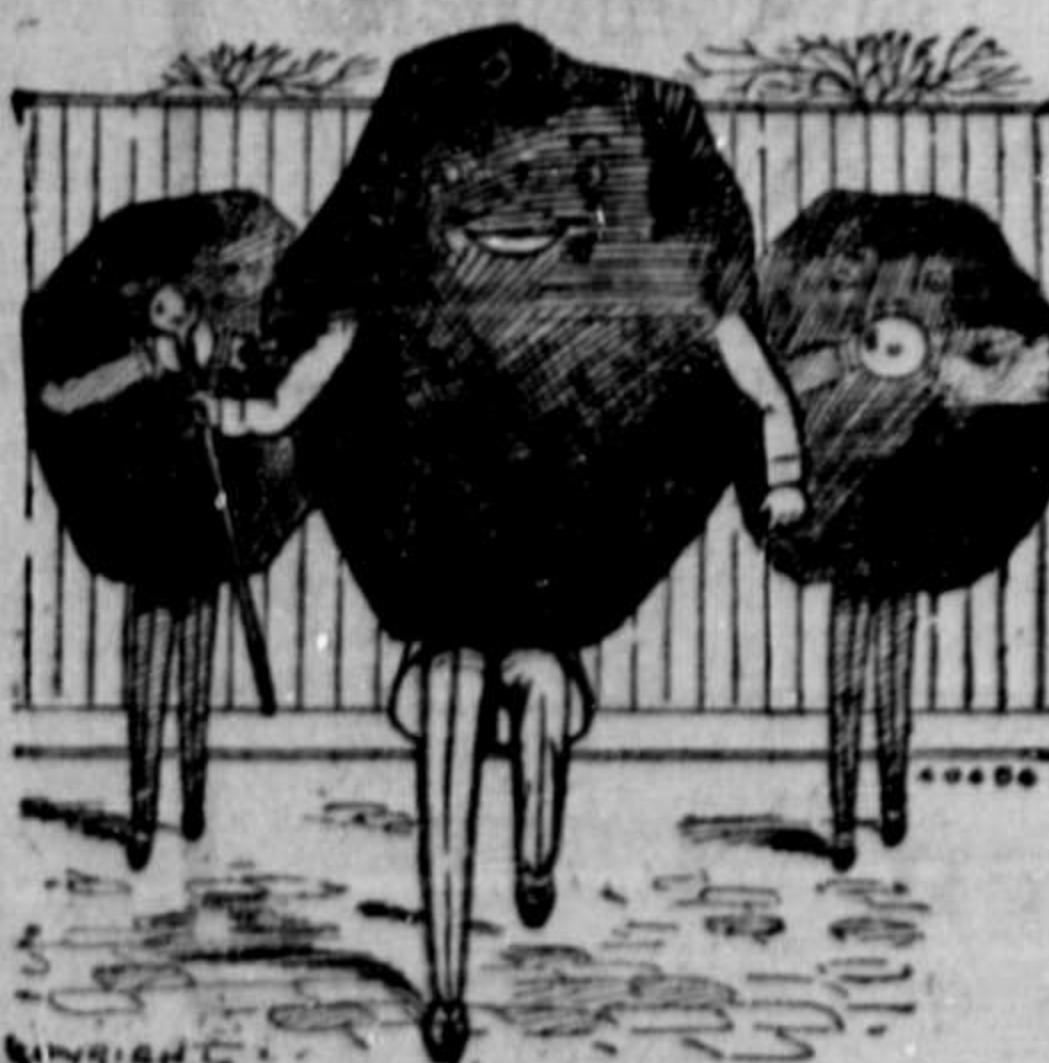
