Elliott To Pay Costs in Famous Suit TIME WORN PUNISHMENT RESORTED TO BY ALASKAN PIONEERS AT HYDER

Premier Oliver Wins Decision as to Costs

Libellous Lawyer will find himself faced with Big Court Bill, it is reported

Six of Eight Jurors Were in Favor of Larger Award

Interesting Classification of Libel Suit Awards--present case was either vindictive or contemptuous.

VICTORIA, July 8.—R. T. Elliott must pay all the costs in the recent libel suit which was won by Premier Oliver when twenty-five cents' damages was awarded to the plaintiff by Judge MacDonald. The costs, it is stated, will be very heavy.

During the argument to settle the damages it was made public that six of the eight jurymen favored the award of \$1,000 to the premier, while the others were in favor of a small amount. The jury eventually settled on twenty-five cents.

In libel suits of this nature decisions may be given in favor of the plaintiff in four classes: general, special, vindictive and contemptuous, the sums awarded largely being indicative of the class. In the contemptuous class damages may be paid by either the plaintiff or the defendant while in the vindictive class damages are, invariably, paid by the defendant. The premier's counsel take their case as being found in the vindictive class.

LABOR ORGANIZER WAS TARRED AND FEATHERED

Jack Sutherland said to have violated
"Code of the North" besides failing
to account for funds collected

STEWART, B. C., July 8.—Jack Sutherland, organizer for the Alaska Labor Union, was tarred and feathered at Hyder yesterday morning by the pioneers of Alaska who allege that Sutherland had not only failed to account for charity funds and other moneys collected but had been an offender against the "code of the North" for years in different places as well as being active in labor disturbances.

BRIGHT NEWS AT VANCOUVER

Dominion Trust Will Pay Dividend of ten per cent in September.

VANCOUVER, July 8.—The brightest news since the famous Dominion Trust Co. closed its doors in October, 1911, spelling ruin to thousands, was received in this city yesterday. A telegram from Ottawa states that the private bill, empowering the payment of the initial dividend to depositors in September, has become law. This first payment will probably provide for a ten per cent allotment.

CHICAGO, July 8.—Senator LaFollette who was one of the principals in the filibuster movement of the spring of 1917 when efforts were being made to keep the United States out of the war, is a likely candidate for a third party in the presidential race.

IF BOARD NAMED WILL GO TO WORK

At a conference with Mayor McClymont yesterday afternoon, the local longshoremen decided that they would return to work immediately on the appointment of a conciliation board by the Department of Labor to adjust their differences with the Grand Trunk Pacific Co. Accordingly the mayor has wired to Ottawa asking that the Grand Trunk be instructed to name their member for such a board to meet with the longshoremen's delegate.

LATE JOHN DALZIEL IS LAID TO REST

Many attend Last Rites over Body of Young Man who was Drowned a Week Ago Today

This afternoon at 2 o'clock the last rites were performed over the body of John (J. B. Dalziel at the parlors of the B. C. Undertakers with Rev. Canon Rix officiating. Sid Thompson assisted at the organ. The pall-bearers were chosen from the office staffs of the G.T.P. and from the G.W.V.A. They were J. H. Kelly, D. S. Cameron, Jack Edwards, J. Woods, Ripley Boyd and H. Mannel. Many friends of the deceased accompanied the cortege to the grave side at Fairview Cemetery.

Among the floral offerings were wreaths sent by the Grand Trunk Office Boys, the Canadian Brotherhood of Railway Employees, Prince Rupert Dramatic Club, Mr. and Mrs. C. F. Kemp, Mr. and Mrs. Jarvis McLeod, St. Andrew's Society and the Great War Veterans Association.

The body was laid to rest in the St. Andrew's Society plot and Capt. McGregor was present as representative of the society during the ceremony. The Last Post was sounded over the grave by Bugler Fred Hardy.

His father, A. B. Dalziel, who was present at the ceremony, having arrived in the city by Tuesday night's train, was for 20 years a service man with the Imperial forces. He also served in the Great War. Mr. Dalziel returns to his home in Cranbrook by Saturday morning's train.

GIVES BIRTH TO TWIN WHEN UNDER DEATH SENTENCE

QUEBEC, July 7.—Mary Gagnon under sentence of death for the murder of her step daughter has given birth to twins in jail here. The father is serving a life sentence in another penitentiary for being implicated in the same crime.

MANSON MAKES STRONG POINT

Magistrate McMordie, However, Convicts Violet Pittentry on Disturbance Charge.

In the police court before Magistrate McMordie this morning, Violet Pittentry was convicted on a charge of disturbing the peace but it is understood that an appeal will be entered. Before making the decision, A. M. Manson, M.L.A., who appeared for the accused made out a strong point in regard to the law and the taking of the evidence. The magistrate considered, however, that it was the duty of the police court to administer justice and not to wrangle over mere technicalities. "But, your lordship," said Mr. Manson, "surely you are not going to distinguish between British law and justice."

City Solicitor Hooper suggested that although samples of the obscene language had not been used it was only in deference to the ears of the court. The witnesses could be called again quite easily. The magistrate maintained that owing to the number of convictions already entered against this woman and from the evidence to hand he could do none else than enter a conviction.

DAWSON FEELS DISTURBANCE

Was Distinct at Stewart; Centred in Central or South America.

DAWSON, July 8.—An earthquake shock was distinctly felt at Stewart city, Carmack and Selkirk yesterday. The disturbance was of unusual distinctness at Stewart City.

WASHINGTON, July 8.—The Georgetown Observatory calculates that the centre of yesterday's earth disturbance was in Central or South America.

Vessel Left Unguided When Python Got Loose

Crew of Steamer Felton Castle, outbound from Singapore, became panic stricken when monster appeared in pilot house

VICTORIA, B. C., July 8.—The British steamer Belton Castle shortly after leaving Singapore en route for this coast sailed aimlessly in circles for a period of time when a thirty-foot python destined for a New York menagerie broke its cage and suddenly put its head through the pilot-house door.

The crew became panic stricken on sight of the monster and fled in dismay, leaving the vessel to sail unguided. Later the python slid overboard into the waters of the China Sea.

SIR LOMER GOUIN

Who has just resigned the premiership of the province of Quebec.

HAS RESIGNED PREMIERSHIP

After Fifteen Years in that Capacity, Sir Lomer Gouin, of Quebec, Leaves Office.

VANCOUVER, July 8.—Premier Sir Lomer Gouin has resigned after fifteen years as prime minister. Rumors of this action have been going the rounds and the news was not unexpected in official circles. Sir Lomer Gouin has been an active figure in legal and financial circles in this province for many years. He was called to the Quebec bar in 1884 and held one of the most successful practices in Montreal before entering public life. He was first elected to the legislature in 1897. He was knighted at the Tercentenary Celebration at Quebec in 1908.

BIRTH

There was born to Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Macdeekin of 734 Fifth Avenue West, at the General Hospital this morning, twin sons.

First Premier West of the Great Lakes

Hon. Arthur Meighen officially named; except for Martin Burrell and N. W. Rowell Cabinet will be same

OTTAWA, July 8.—It is officially announced here that Sir Robert Borden, for nine years prime minister of Canada, has resigned and that Hon. Arthur Meighen, the new premier, has undertaken to form a new government. Hon. N. W. Rowell and Hon. Martin Burrell, member for Yale Cariboo, will retire from the cabinet, the latter to become the librarian of the Federal Parliament. The remainder of the cabinet will stay with the new leader.

First Western Premier.

The selection of Hon. Arthur Meighen marks the first appointment of a Canadian Prime Minister from west of the Great Lakes. Mr. Meighen in civil life is a resident of Portage la Prairie where he has established an enviable practice as a criminal lawyer. He is of a keen analytical mind, is very courageous in his views and is a forcible debater. He fathered the Military Service Act and was a member of the Imperial War Cabinet.

Yesterday Was Hottest in History of Victoria

Reading here was not unusual at 74 degrees; Weather Up-River reported Excessively Warm

VICTORIA, July 8.—Yesterday was the hottest day in the history of the city. At 4 p. m. the thermometer reading was 91.3 in the shade. The highest previous temperature was 90.1 on July 28, 1899.

Usual Summer Here.

According to F. W. Dowling, the Dominion meteorologist in this city, the present warm weather here is nothing unusual and no records have been broken. Yesterday the local thermometer reading was at its height at 74 degrees.

Reports of excessively warm weather in the Skeena and Bulkley river valleys are being brought to the city.

BURIED TWO MEN WHILE ON TRAIL

Larry O'Keefe, Commercial Agent of Nenana, Finds two Men Dead of Heart Failure.

DAWSON, Y. T., July 8.—Larry O'Keefe, a northern commercial agent of Nenana, has come off the trail reporting the burial of two men whom he found dead. The first, Alphouse Tanguay, a Yukon pioneer, was found dead at his claim on Bedrock Creek, while the other, Albert Leitch, an old time stage man, was found dead at the head of Bonanza Creek. Both men died of heart failure.

FOREST FIRE DANGER OVER ALL PROVINCE

Prince George District is Declared the Only Safe One by Government Reports

VICTORIA, July 8.—The fire situation throughout the province according to the Government reports is a hazardous one. The Prince George district has been declared safe, but outside of that area the greatest care is being taken.

J. Anderson, of Salt Spring Island, is in the city looking after improvements on his buildings at the corner of Sixth Avenue and Hays Cove Circle near the new school building.

HUNS SUBMIT TO DEMANDS

Did Not Want to disarm Now But Allied Demands too Much for Them.

THE SPA, July 8.—Pressed by the demands of the Allies, the German delegation to the Peace Conference has agreed to submit to the plans for disarmament. They had wanted the demobilization delayed.

McClymont Park Is Justified.

The large number of family parties seen in McClymont Park these last few warm days and the evident enjoyment of the many youngsters is in itself justification for any expense incurred in making this spot available for the public. The sylvan beauties of the park are fully appreciated by many mothers and dozens of the little ones enjoy life to the full, paddling in the running water and romping on the sward, free from the fear of any sudden appearing automobile. A kiddies picnic in the park is becoming quite an institution in many families. Easy of access from practically all parts of the city, the park is proving its worth to the little citizens who need it most. There was some talk in the City Council some months ago about having the bed of the stream cleared out. This has yet to be done. And in their consideration for the little ones, the city fathers would do well to put in a load or two of sand—the sand hole is not far away—so that the children's hearts might be fully delighted. As it is, the charm of bare feet in cool running water is somewhat modified by the rough stones which hurt cruelly sometimes the tender skins of the youngsters. And the sand is wanted now, when the weather is warm.

Meighen's Political Advance Has Been Rapid.

Hon. Arthur Meighen, K.C., the newly chosen premier of Canada, is a comparatively young man whose advance in public life has been very rapid. He was first elected to Parliament in 1908 as member for Portage la Prairie, which constituency he has since represented. In 1913 his worth was realized by Sir Robert Borden and from practical political obscurity he was raised to the position of solicitor general. Since that time his responsibilities increased until he was made minister of the interior, the problems of which department he handled with a good deal of decision and determination. His policies have been of a progressive nature and it is hoped that advances in the conduct of Dominion affairs may now follow his appointment to the country's highest political office. The Governor-General has chosen one of the strongest men from the Government ranks in Hon. Arthur Meighen.

New Premier Is Forty Six.

Before his selection to the cabinet, Arthur Meighen was a barrister and solicitor in the city of Portage la Prairie. He was born in Anderson, Perth County, Ontario, on June 16, 1874, the son of Joseph and Mary Jane Meighen. Completing his public school work he went to St. Mary's Collegiate Institute and the University of Toronto, graduating from the latter institution with honors in 1896. He taught high school for a year at Caledonia, Ontario, and in 1898 came to Winnipeg, moving to Portage la Prairie in 1902. He was called to the Manitoba bar in 1903 and became a member of the Provincial Law Society in 1908, and the Upper Canada Law Society in 1914. He was married in 1904 and has two sons and one daughter. His brother, Edward Meighen, lived in Prince Rupert prior to the war. In religion, Hon. Arthur Meighen is a Presbyterian.

Crop Outlook Very Favorable.

There is no room for pessimism in Canada, says the Guelph Herald. Reports from all over the Dominion indicate first-rate and in most instances a record crop outlook. The estimates so far would go to show as much, if not more, of grain, vegetables and fruits than was harvested last year. Let Canadians rejoice and be glad. With another good crop there is bound to be a continuance of plenty of ready cash and big business. If extravagance is avoided there is every reason for feeling that the good times of the past few years will be more than maintained. That means something for everybody, and we ought to be grateful for the fact that our lot is cast in a place so full of promise.

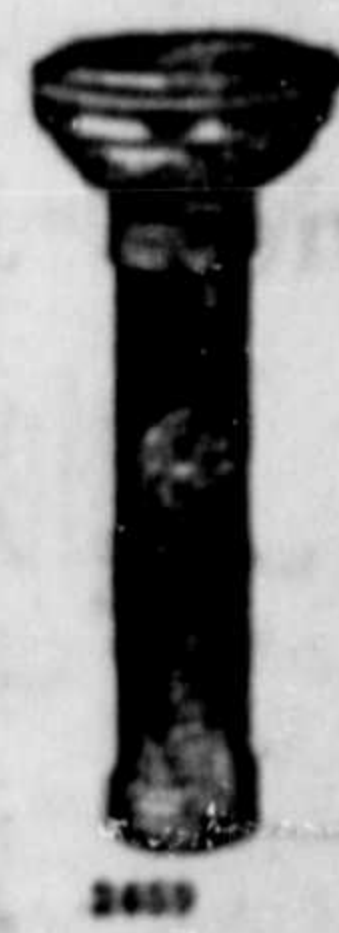

INCREASED RATES FOR ADVERTISING

The continuous increase in the costs of production, both in wages and material, has made it necessary for the advertising rates charged by the Daily News to be revised, and the new rates will take effect after this issue. AMENDMENTS

To the Special War Revenue Act, 1915

The amendments to the above mentioned Act were assented to on the first day of July, 1920, from which date the provisions of Sections Nine (9) and Ten (10) become effective.

(9)—That a stamp tax of two cents be imposed, levied and collected on promissory notes and bills of exchange and advances made by a bank by way of overdraft of the value of one hundred dollars or less, and that a tax of two cents additional be imposed on every one hundred dollars or fractional part thereof in excess of one hundred dollars.

(10)—That a stamp tax of two cents be imposed, levied and collected on each one hundred dollars of face value or fraction thereof of stock transferred.

Luxury Tax Amendments

The provisions of the above Act have been further amended as follows:

CLOTHING—Consisting of coat, vest and pants, or coat and pants—men's and boys—is subject to a tax of fifteen per cent. on the amount in excess of forty-five dollars (\$45.00), provided that, on clothing covered by this item, made to the order and measure of each individual customer by a merchant tailor, or journeymen tailors in his employ, the tax shall be payable on the amount in excess of sixty dollars. This amendment takes effect in respect of clothing delivered on or after the 17th of June, but the tax already paid on such clothing is not subject to adjustment by refund, if such clothing has been fully paid for.

PIPES—The tax on pipes sold in excess of (\$2.50) two dollars and fifty cents each by jewellers operating under special jewellers' licence is twenty per cent.

PRINCE RUPERT HAD COLLISION

Struck a Line of Cannery Boats Off Skeena—Fortunately Damage was Slight.

Yesterday morning passengers aboard the Prince Rupert had the opportunity of seeing a unique collision happen a short time before the big three-master came into the harbor. Proceeding through the fog rather slowly a string of cannery boats in tow of a tug suddenly loomed up just a short distance ahead. Hitting the boats was inevitable and the Jap fishermen in the smaller boats became very excited and emitted great cries for assistance. The stem of the big ship cut into the string of fishing craft and nosed through, dragging a few along on each side with a towing line round the prow. Eventually the rope between the boats was loosened and they were left behind wallowing in the troughs of the swells from the monster which had come upon them so suddenly. Except for the snapping of a few masts very little damage was done. Many of the fishermen got ready to take a plunge into the waters but all the commotion was soon dispelled by cool seamanship.

POLICE BOARD WAS CRITICAL

Will Get After Soft Beer Places, Taxi Drivers and Loafers.

Following the reading of the report of the chief of police at the sitting of the Police Commission yesterday morning much discussion was made concerning the prevalence of drunkenness in the city. The mayor stated that in an interview with some of the hotel keepers their complaint had been that after the men got drunk in other places such as private houses, they were kicked out and then wandered down town and came into the soft drink establishments. Instructions were issued to the effect that in the regular monthly report by the chief there should be a statement as to the condition of these places at the time they were visited. If the police thought that there was whiskey on any establishment all that was necessary to be done was to say that they were making a search under the prohibition act and it was not essential that they should have a search warrant or that the owner be present.

Another matter of considerable importance which was taken up had to do with the renewal of taxi licenses. The commissioners felt that on account of the class of men who seemed to be taking over this business that it might be well for car owners to give a list of the names of their drivers and then it would be decided as to whether or not they could be granted a city license. The drivers' licenses were issued by the provincial government but it was felt that the city ought to have some check on the matter.

Mayor McGlymont was very emphatic at the session in regard to making a few arrests for spitting on the sidewalks and obstructing traffic. Men congregated around certain corners down town in a manner which would disgrace any city. Women have to step off the streets to get by. If examples were made of a few the thing might be readily remedied.

WILL DISTRIBUTE BACK PAY CHEQUES WITHIN TWO WEEKS

OTTAWA, July 8.—The Dominion civil servants' back pay cheques are to be distributed within two weeks' time. These cheques are now due under the departmental re-classification.

EX-SOLDIERS TO SUE GOVERNMENT

LONDON, July 7.—It is reported that 20,000 ex-soldiers in Britain will sue the Canadian Government on a charge of breach of contract. They allege that arrears are due from the army pay due to exchange rate prevailing at time which was not taken into consequence.

The latter is vice-president of the Provincial University Y. M. C. A. for the next term.

The two young men who arrived yesterday were particularly pleased with the trip north. The inside waterways route appealed to them and they were eagerly looking forward to the trip up the Skeena River. They will proceed as far as Edmonton and will then go south to Calgary where they will join a larger party. The events of the conference last for almost two weeks and the whole time is occupied by studies of modern day student problems and missionary activities. Much of the morning hours will be devoted to athletics.

GEOLOGICAL SURVEY AT FRANCOIS LAKE

Head of Department of Science, University of B. C., Takes Party into Interior.

R. W. Brock, dean of the University of British Columbia, arrived from the south on the Prince Rupert yesterday morning. He is taking a geological party into the Francois Lake country and will remain there for two and a half months. This distinguished geologist has a long list of achievements to his credit with the survey of Canada and was director-general for this branch of development of the Dominion for a number of years. Later he joined the staff of the University in the south and since returning from overseas has been head of the science faculty.

Among others of the party was G. C. Nelson, son of John Nelson, editor and publisher of the Vancouver Daily World. While here "Lefty," as he is more familiarly known to his friends in the south, had the opportunity to visit his uncle, O. H. Nelson. He graduated with his B.A. degree at the examinations held in April.
