Sensational Arrest Made Last Night

BRITISH COLUMBIA BONDS BRING HIGH RATE WHEN SOLD IN THE PROVINCE

Owner of Victoria Paper Faces a Charge of Theft

Griffith R. Hughes, prominent citizen of Capital City, placed under Arrest last night at his own Residence.

Spent Night in Cells; Got Bail This Morning

Legged Theft from firm of David Spencer; was closely connected with Financial Affairs of the Company

VICTORIA, July 9.—Griffith R. Hughes, a prominent business man of this city and owner of the Victoria Daily Times, was arrested here last night, the affair causing one of the biggest sensations in the history of the city. The arrest was made at Hughes' residence on information laid by W. J. Spencer of this city, one of the partners in David Spencer, Limited, charging him with the theft of \$600.25 from the firm. Bail at that time was refused by Magistrate Jay because of the large amount allegedly involved.

It is understood that the Spencer firm is claiming a sum going well into six figures from Hughes. It is also understood that Hughes has vested in G. G. McGear, M.P.P., the lawyer for Spencers', a great amount of his Victoria property, including The Times newspaper, pending an adjustment. Joseph Martin, K. C., has been retained as special adviser to Spencers' while R. T. Elliott, K. C., is acting for Hughes.

Is Wealthy Man.

Hughes joined Spencer's staff fifteen years ago as bookkeeper and later was made auditor. He acted as financial adviser to the late David Spencer.

It is understood that trustees in the meantime are in possession of the Daily Times, which was bought for \$225,000, a double Hill farm, \$75,000, and cash and bonds of over \$100,000.

Hughes is 58 years of age and was born in Wales. He was school mate of Lloyd George and is a life long friend of the British Premier's.

Is Given Bail.

VICTORIA, July 9.—Hughes appeared in the police court this morning and has been remanded until Tuesday bail being fixed at \$20,000. Griffiths spent all night in the cells and at 9:45 this morning was brought into the office of the chief of police to meet friends. After being photographed and having his finger prints taken he went into court where he sat alongside his counsel, A. McLean, K. C.

When the charge was read his counsel pleaded not guilty. As a "prominent Victorian" bail was sought but was opposed by Deputy Attorney Johnson who said "Certain other information was received last night." The magistrate then stated that two other informations had already been laid. Mr. Johnson asked that the magistrate hear him within closed doors on the bail question stating that he had good reasons for an investigation that could not be finished in a week.

VICTORIA, July 9.—(Later.)—Hughes has elected for trial by jury. Counsel was closeted for twenty minutes in the magistrate's room before bail was granted.

BOARD IS NOW BEING NAMED

Progress in Conciliation Between G. T. P. and Longshoremen.

This morning the following telegram was received by Mayor McGlynn from the Department of Labor:

"Your lettergram seventh received and noted. Minister is today formally establishing conciliation board. Members will be appointed soon as recommendations are received behalf respective parties and if these members do not secure chairman by joint agreement minister will appoint without delay but please note that board will be instructed not to commence inquiry until men have resumed work. Minister trusts workmen will therefore resume work without delay and is confident your influence will be exerted to that end. Minister will look to you to secure nomination for board members to represent workmen. Following message is being sent to company. Message begins: 'Your message seventh received.' Minister's decision is indicated in the following message addressed to Mayor McGlynn, here follows message to yourself. Minister asks your company will name personnel for appointment to board. Statute allows five days for this purpose and dispute having been in progress for some time before municipality required conciliation board, minister trusts company will nominate forthwith. As you will be aware statute requires appointment to be made by minister if recommendation not received." Message ends."

F. A. ALCAND.

Immediately the longshoremen got together and decided upon nominations for members to the conciliation board. It is now understood that W. E. Thompson will appear for the workmen.

PECK'S NAME IS MENTIONED

Possibility of Prince Rupert's Member Now Getting a Cabinet Position.

OTTAWA, July 9.—Speculation is rife here regarding the two new members of the cabinet to be appointed to take the places of Messrs. Rowell and Burrell, who are retiring. There are persistent rumors that Colonel G. Peck, V. C., D. S. O., member for Skeena, is likely to be appointed to one of the vacancies.

GAS WORKERS HAVE THREATENED STRIKE

Vancouver Employees Say They Will Walk out Unless Demands Acceded to.

VANCOUVER, July 9.—The gas plant workers of this city have threatened to walk out unless they are given their wage demands.

Sir Robert Borden and Retiring Ministers



HON. MARTIN BURRELL

Who retires from the Federal cabinet to become librarian of the Dominion Parliament. Hon. Martin Burrell is sixty-two years of age and was born and educated in England. He started farming in Ontario in 1886 and came to British Columbia in 1900. He has extensive orchards around the city of Grand Forks and was mayor of that town in 1903. He first became a member of parliament in 1908 and in 1911 became minister of agriculture with the original Borden cabinet. He left that post on the formation of the coalition government and was succeeded by Hon. T. A. Crerar. Latterly he was in charge of the departments of archives, mines, public printing and stationery as well as being secretary of state.

Retired Premier of Canada who is now sixty-six years of age.



HON. N. W. ROWELL

Came into the Dominion cabinet as a Liberal on the formation of the coalition in 1917. Before that time he was leader of the opposition in the Ontario legislature and the head of a well known Toronto law firm. He is a native son of Ontario, having been born in London 53 years ago. He was called to the Ontario bar in 1891 and afterward became king's counsel during the early stages of the Great War he took an active part in all forms of patriotic work and visited Great Britain and France to study war conditions. Latterly he has been in charge of the Department of North West Mounted Police, was president of the Privy Council and vice-chairman of the war committee of the cabinet.

ASSAULT CASE IS INTERESTING

Many Citizens Follow Case of J. J. Uriacher in Police Court

This morning in the Police Court before Magistrate McMordie the case of assault against J. J. Uriacher again came up for hearing, but had to be adjourned. The victim of the attack is still in the hospital suffering from the effects of the injuries received. For some days the man, James Garnett, has been lapsing into long periods of unconsciousness. Now, however, he is able to be around, though still very feeble.

This case has aroused considerable interest locally and the outcome is being watched by many. At the sitting of the police commission on Wednesday the mayor asked Chief Vickers if it was true that the officer called to stop the fight had allowed the men to finish it out themselves. This the chief flatly denied.

TASCHEREAU MAY SUCCEED GOBIN

Is Considered Likely Man in Quebec Political Circles—Is Now Minister of Public Works.

QUEBEC, July 9.—Hon. L. A. Taschereau is considered in political circles as the likely successor to Sir Lomer Gouin as premier of the Province of Quebec.

Hon. Louis Alexander Taschereau is at present minister of public works and labor in the Quebec legislature. He was born in 1867 in Quebec City and is a prominent advocate of that city, having commenced his legal career as a partner with Sir Chas. Fitzpatrick, Chief Justice of Canada. He has served as alderman on the Quebec city council and has represented the Montmorency constituency in the legislature since 1900 becoming minister of public works and labor in 1907.

Officially Confirmed.

MONTREAL, July 9.—L. A. Taschereau, formerly attorney-general and minister of labor and public works, was sworn in as premier this morning. Sir Lomer Gouin left the Liberal government since 1905.

Provincial Bonds Are Sold Locally

British Columbia Financial Corporations take \$1,500,000, competing successfully with Eastern Houses

VICTORIA, July 9.—Negotiations have just been closed by Hon. John Hart, Minister of Finance for the province of British Columbia for the sale of \$1,500,000 worth of provincial bonds at the highly satisfactory rate of 99.88 and accrued interest. The deal has been made through British Columbia financial corporations and marks the first time that they have been able to successfully compete with the eastern houses.

It was only Wednesday morning when T. W. Falconer was in this city en route north after paying the last visit to his sister, having been called three weeks ago to the bedside. Miss Falconer visited Alice Arm in the summer of 1918.

OFFICIAL'S SON SERIOUSLY HURT

Was Shot Accidentally While Examining Gun at Summer Hotel.

CALGARY, July 9.—W. Wanklin, son of the Canadian Pacific Railway executive agent here, was accidentally shot and seriously wounded while examining a gun at the Banff Hotel this morning, fractured his skull and is also dead.

DOUBLE TRAGEDY AT YOSEMITE PARK BEACH

Man Killed When Attempting to Rescue Drowning Girl.

YOSEMITE, Calif., July 9.—Gertrude Kistler, daughter of a Democratic delegate to the San Francisco convention, was drowned here while bathing yesterday afternoon. H. J. Pink, who attempted to rescue the drowning girl, slipped from a rock and fractured his skull and is also dead.

And the Costs
Keep Piling Up.

From New York to Victoria and from practically every point of publication in between, come reports of increases in the price of subscriptions to newspapers. In the City of New York all the evening papers with but one exception have raised the price from two cents to three on account of the increased price of publication. And when it is remembered that a newspaper depends upon its circulation, which this increase might be supposed to affect adversely, to maintain its advertising rates, the public must realize that the publishing business is "up against it." And it is, too, hard. Last month newsprint jumped 60 per cent in price and even higher rates are quoted this month and at that supplies are uncertain. On this coast the oil scarcity threatened to close the mills down and does not add to the brightness of the prospect. Practically every classification of advertising has been increased in price the continent over, and yet there is no diminution in its volume. Publicity, in the form of newspaper advertising, is properly regarded as a legitimate charge against every business, even as rent and taxes. So, too, is the newspaper accepted by the average individual as mental pabulum, equally necessary as physical. Visitors to Alaska used to regard ten cents a copy or \$1 a month for the newspapers there as something out of the usual, but now the Victoria papers are compelled to charge \$1 a month. And in the newspaper world there is every indication that the costs of publication for the latter half of this year will be even greater than in the months just past.

Grow Small
Fruits at Home.

In the process of getting the most out of the backyard garden many amateur gardeners have overlooked the cultivation of small fruits.

Fresh fruit on the table has almost become a luxury. The high prices which these fruits are commanding and their growing scarcity on the market are due largely to lack of help and the enhanced cost of picking and transportation.

The growing of raspberries, currants and gooseberries is very simple, and their value both for use as fresh fruit and for baking and preserving purposes, should make their cultivation much more extensive. There are no fruits that respond more quickly to good treatment, but they will also stand a considerable amount of neglect. Large fruits and productive bushes, however, can only be expected when they are given proper attention.

Should Have
Some Education.

The educational problem is the same in Prince Rupert as it is in all other cities of Canada. The great majority of children leave school half educated and that condition has been more common since war times revolutionized the employment market and high prices were offered even the most unskilled of labor. During war days it was almost necessary for young people to leave school and produce, but now that labor conditions—at least as far as demand and supply is concerned—are quickly becoming normal, the excuse for the young person leaving school for that reason has almost entirely disappeared. Unless he shows conclusively through his unconscious acts that he has a natural bent towards such lines as mechanics or practical engineering attendance at least to the end of high school work should be insisted upon. There also is a good deal in the argument that the elementary school course should be complete in itself and less a preliminary to something else as it is today.

LIFE STORY OF ROBERT BORDEN

Broke with Liberals on Reciprocity in 1891 and Has Since Been Conservative.

Sir Robert Borden entered Canadian public life in a year when the power of the Conservative party was shattered. It was in 1896 that he was first elected to the House of Commons for Halifax, and it was in 1896 that the Conservative Government was defeated and the Liberals, under Wilfrid Laurier, assumed office. For fifteen years Sir Robert remained in opposition. During that period he had all the ups and downs which generally befal politicians. He tasted personal defeat, but a seat was found for him.

At the general election of 1900 he was re-elected for Halifax, and the following year was elected Leader of the Conservative Opposition, succeeding Sir Charles Tupper. In 1904 at a general election the Liberals again swept the country, and Sir Robert was defeated in Halifax when Nova Scotia returned a solid Liberal force of eighteen members.

Edward Kidd resigned the Conservative stronghold of Carleton county and Sir Robert was elected by acclamation for that riding in 1905.

No better success greeted the party at the general election in 1908, although Sir Robert was elected in his home riding in Halifax, and also in his adopted riding at Carleton. Sir Robert chose to sit for Halifax.

After many lean years Sir Robert and his party won in 1911. That election is too recent to require much explanation. Reciprocity was the issue. Reciprocity plays rather an important part in Sir Robert's life. He was born in 1854—a reciprocity year. He broke with Liberals on that issue in 1891 and he went into power on that issue in 1911. He was called upon by Earl Grey, after the Conservative party success, to form a government.

The next big political step was the formation of Union Government in 1917, which Sir Robert headed, and has continued to do until the present. Union Government was returned by the people by a large majority. In history Sir Robert will be best remembered as the Prime Minister of Canada during the great war.

During the war period Sir Robert was frequently in Great Britain consulting with the British Government regarding the war policy and effort of the Empire. He went first in 1915. In 1917 he again went overseas for the purpose of attending the Imperial War Cabinet, the first Cabinet ever summoned to represent the whole British Commonwealth.

In 1918 he again attended the meeting of the Imperial War Cabinet, and also attended sessions of the Supreme War Council at Versailles.

In the latter part of 1918 he visited Great Britain to attend the sessions of the War Cabinet consequent upon the armistice. In 1919 he attended the Peace Conference as Canadian Plenipotentiary and member of the British Empire delegation. He was appointed as chief British Empire representative on the Inter-allied Commission of the Peace Conference on the Greek question, and the Inter-allied Commission of the Peace Conference in the Russian question.

Sir Robert, like so many of the Canadian politicians in the past and present, is a lawyer, and was born right in the heart of that land of Acadian romance in Nova Scotia, at Grand Pre. For a short time, too, he was a professor in a college in New Jersey. He has been honored by degrees from many great universities. Because of ill-health Sir Robert has frequently intimated during the past year and a half that he would resign. He was abroad during most of the recent session of the House, although he was still Premier.

J. C. Brady has been elected to the Executive Committee of the B.C. Federation of Teachers to represent Prince Rupert and northern British Columbia.

Chief of Police W. H. Vickers accompanied by Mrs. Vickers and daughter were among the south-bound passengers on the Prince Rupert last evening.

SUSTAINS JUDGMENT IN NAT BELL CASE

EDMONTON, Alta. July 9.—The judgment of Magistrate George B. 
