People To Run Anyox Amusements

MEN OF NEWINGTON WALK OUT DEMANDING ASSURANCE OF MORE WAGES

Lighthouse Tender Crew Left Ship

Firemen and Deckhands of Newington walk out and vessel is lying at Digby Island in charge of Officers

The government light house tender Newington is lying at the wharf of the Marine Station at Digby Island tied up on account of the deckhands and firemen having walked out. The walkout was the result of demands that the crew have been making for some time on the Ottawa authorities for definite assurance of increase in wages which, so far, the government has not seen fit to grant. In the meantime the vessel remains tied up, manned only by her engine room and navigation officers who are standing by.

The Estevan is still in operation and at present is on a cruise to Lucy Island and other points doing repair work. W. L. Stamford, the inspector of buoys and lights, is aboard her on his regular duties of inspection. The Estevan will be back at Digby on Monday and on Wednesday will sail for the south, not returning here. On the way south she will call at Triangle Island to pick up the wrecking crew who have been dismantling the light house there. They are not yet finished but by the time the Estevan reaches there the crew will be ready to leave.

GERMANY HAS GIVEN POINT

Attempt to Evade Disarmament Demands Proves Completely Futile—Agreement Now Signed

THE SPA, July 10.—Germany has signed the disarmament conditions as demanded by Premier Lloyd George of England. The French people desired that no economic talk be entered into with the Germans until the Germans had agreed to disarm. Herr Gessler, Minister of Defence, in an effort to evade the disarmament issue did not attend the Spa Conference and had to be sent for, the Allies showing that they were not to be tricked.

TEACHERS' SUMMER SCHOOL IS OPENED

Eighty in Attendance at Special Courses at University of B.C.—Two Eastern Professors

VANCOUVER, July 10.—There are eighty in attendance at the summer school for teachers which has just opened at the University of British Columbia. Besides some of the members of the regular University faculty the services of two additional professors from Eastern Canada, who will teach vocational courses, have been secured. They are Dr. W. Packenham, of Toronto, and Dr. S. Silcox, principal of the Normal School, at Stratford, Ontario.

PREPARE TO MOVE THEIR HEAD CITY

Poles Cannot Resist Bolshevik Advance and May Move from Warsaw

WARSAW, July 10.—The Poles have been unable to stop the onward drive of the Bolsheviks and are preparing to remove the capital from Warsaw.

NEW BYLAW IS A DRASIC ONE

Retailer of Beverages Must Advertise and Apply Police—Council Will Decide.

At the special meeting of the City Council last evening the bylaw known as the "Retail of Beverages Licenses" was finally adopted and numbered 356 and will go into effect July 16th. Under the new conditions before any person can secure a license he or she must advertise in one of the local papers for two issues on forms specially provided by the chief of police or city clerk. Four days after the last insertion of the announcement the party may make application to the chief of police for the granting of a license. The final granting of the license will be determined by the City Council. Present retailers must apply not later than July 24.

On July 26 the council shall decide upon the applications sent in up to that time. As the bylaw goes into effect on the 16th this gives very little time and the present vendors of liquors made from hops or malt of not more than 2½ per cent proof spirits can continue to sell without having taken out a license but after the night of the 26th all licenses must have been taken out under the new bylaw.

There are two kinds of license under the new bylaw, one to be known as the "retailer of beverages" and the other as a "shop license." Under the former the beer may be bought and consumed on the premises and the fees for such license will be \$100 for six months. With the shop license beverages may be bought but cannot be consumed at the place of sale. In this latter case the license is not transferable, but in the case of the retailer of beverages license interests may be exchanged only once during the validity of that license.

No person who obtains a retailer's license will be able to employ any woman for the dispensing of the liquors. The council has the right to refuse a license to any person and no reason may be given. The clause providing that a woman shall not be granted a license, as originally intended, was struck out last night on reconsideration.

The retailer of beverages will not be allowed within 300 feet of any church, public school, high school, college, university or any other public educational institution. Neither will there be any sale of beverages between the hours of 12 o'clock on Saturday night and 6 o'clock on Monday morning. These new licenses will be in addition to any license that any merchant may carry at the present time. A new license must be taken out in order to permit of the selling of beverages.

OTTAWA, July 9.—Up till the end of June the Soldiers' Settlement Board of Canada has passed seventy million dollars in loans for the assistance of settlers. The number who have received the benefits is placed at 17,872.

COAL MINERS MAY STRIKE

English Miners Threaten to Go Out unless Munition Shipping to Ireland Stopped

LONDON, July 9.—A miners' conference has threatened a widespread strike unless the shipping of munitions to suppress the Irish disturbances is discontinued.

The Union steamship Venture arrived in port this morning after a trip to the canneries. A considerable quantity of freight was taken on board here for distribution to points on the way south.

NURSE REPORTS ABOUT HOSPITAL

Says Military Institution at Guelph Is Badly Equipped—She and Other Nursing Sisters Dismissed.

TORONTO, July 9.—Nursing Sister Mary Pollock, who was dismissed recently from Speedwell Military Hospital, Guelph, Ont., for refusal to serve in the diet kitchen, and whose dismissal resulted in 18 other nursing sisters in sympathy with Miss Pollock being also cashiered because they had also refused to work in the diet kitchen, in an interview with a representative of The Toronto Daily Star at her home in Chesley, Ont., said she had found the conditions so bad at Speedwell that she felt like resigning just after having gone there.

The rooms were not proper rooms for the tubercular patients, Miss Pollock said. There was no proper method of heating the small narrow cells for the purpose of bathing the patients. In the winter, she said, the ink in the nurses' pens would freeze before they could record the patients' temperatures, and the patients lay under 14 heavy army blankets. There was no justification for such management.

Company Delegate Is Not Yet Named

Longshoremen have not returned to Work--Vancouver Men are about to go out demanding same as Rupert

The longshoremen's strike situation remains unchanged today. No word has yet been received as to the action the Grand Trunk Pacific Steamship company is taking in connection with the appointment of a delegate to the conciliation board. Until the board is formed the local longshoremen will not return to work, according to a statement given out at their headquarters this morning. The appointment of W. E. Thompson to represent the longshoremen on the conciliation board is officially confirmed.

Superintendent Reginald Beaumont, of the Grand Trunk Pacific Coast Steamship Company, had received no information this afternoon as to the appointment of the company's delegate. It is understood that this appointment will be made from the Winnipeg office.

Vancouver Threatens.

Reports brought to the city of the Prince George this morning intimate that the Vancouver longshoremen have served notice that they will go out if not given the same rates as the Prince Rupert men are demanding.

AERONAUTICAL FEDERATION IS NOW ORGANIZED

Representatives of Aero Clubs of Dominion of Canada Form New Association.

WINNIPEG, July 9.—The Aeronautical Federation of Canada was formed at the convention held here recently of representatives of clubs throughout the Dominion. This federation will comprise aero clubs throughout Canada and any club, association or organization which approves of the objects of the federation. The newly created body will hold its first annual convention in October at Camp Borden, and at this meeting all suggestions made at today's meeting will be submitted for ratification.

Considerable discussion arose as to the exclusion of civilians from membership, and it was ultimately resolved to admit to membership any body that approved of the objects of the federation.

The Dominion command will comprise the chairman of the air board, as honorary president, the patrons, His Excellency, the Governor-General and the Lieutenant Governor of each province and the vice-presidents of the aero clubs throughout the country.

The executive committee of the Dominion command will consist of seven members; and this will be the governing body of the council, the members of which will be chosen at the October convention.

In answer to the question, what has become of the nickel novel, somebody has remarked that today it is written by the "best authors" and sells for a dollar and a half. In which statement there is a good deal of truth, for the generation that grows up on Dead Eye Dick and his friends still loves to follow the heroes of E. Phillips Oppenheim, Louis Tracy or Rex Beach. The late Sir Richard Cartwright confessed that a school boy's thriller gave him more recreation than a best seller, and there is many another staid citizen who could confess the same liking in age for the reading matter of his youth.

Colonel Peck For Cabinet.

Three new members are to be appointed to the Dominion cabinet at Ottawa in the course of the next few days it is expected. It is generally accepted that one of these ministers will come from British Columbia and it seems that Prince Rupert's member, Colonel G. W. Peck, V. C., D. S. O., would be a natural and sensible choice. Colonel Peck has only attended two sessions at the House of Commons but during those two sessions he has become well known. It is doubtful if any other member of the Government party, outside of the cabinet ministers themselves, has become so prominent as Colonel Peck. He has a record that cannot be excelled by any other member of that party—a record that needs no further mention. There are three openings and this northern part of the province has sorely needed cabinet representation in these later years.

Practical Training in Agricultural Centres.

The importance of practical education in farming centres is fast being realized by pedagogical authorities. In certain Canadian high schools agricultural and household science courses are being established. In developments such as these lies the hope for the improvement of modern agriculture through the rank and file of the rural population, to whom the centralized college of agriculture is not available. The present day need is that it should be made easy for country boys and girls to secure an educational training of such a character as will fit them for country life and rural pursuits. Colleges of Agriculture and Veterinary Colleges have not, however, been overlooked; they also are given liberal assistance by the Government. Following the close of the war, the attendance at these institutions shows a marked and gratifying increase, and their influence in promoting the advancement of Canada's leading basic industry, agriculture, will continue to make itself felt.

This is the off season for shell fish and fresh rabbits and neither will arrive in quantities until about the first of September.







DAMAGE SUIT FILED RESULT JUNEAU SLIDE

Alaska Juneau Mining Co. Sued on Grounds that it was Responsible.

JUNEAU, July 10.—As a result of a slide which tore down Mount Roberts, back of the city of Juneau last fall, damage suits against the Alaska Juneau Mining company will be heard at Juneau. The total amount asked is \$35,290. John Rustgard is the attorney for the plaintiffs.

The plaintiffs claim the slide was due to an overflow of water from a flume owned by the defendant company.

Amanda Ratti, niece and executrix of the estate of Lowrie Makei who was killed by the slide, is asking \$10,000 for the death of her uncle, claiming that he was the sole support of a widowed mother. She also asks \$175 for personal property belonging to him which she claims was lost in the slide.

Mrs. Mary Koski, wife of Peter Koski, who died eight days after the slide from injuries received, is asking \$10,000 for the loss of her husband and \$8,000 for the loss of her house and personal property. The house was wrecked and carried down the hillside.

John Larson, owner of what was known as the Larson House, is suing for \$3,800 for the loss of his house and for \$3,020 for the loss of personal property contained in the house.

BRITISH MEMBER IN FINANCIAL TROUBLE

LONDON, July 10.—A bankruptcy petition has been filed against Lawrence Lyon, M.P. for Hastings, who came here some years ago from Toronto.
