Brilliant Woman is Dead in Spain

LIFE SENTENCE SERVERS SAW THROUGH BARS AND GET OUT OF PRISON

Suggested Merger of Pulp Companies

Sir George Bury resigns from Whalen's after most Successful Term as its President---Going to Atlantic

VANCOUVER, July 12.—Sir George Bury has resigned the presidency of the Whalen Mills and is joining a large concern on the Atlantic coast in an advisory capacity.

At the annual meeting of the Whalen company to be held on July 29, it is expected that new interests will join the concern. The new amalgamation will probably control the pulp and paper industry of the entire province and a merger of all the pulp companies is probable.

Under Sir George Bury's control the earnings of the Whalen company have passed the \$1,000,000 mark.

PROPRIETOR OF HALIFAX PAPER DEAD IN BOSTON

Senator Dennis was President of Halifax Herald and the Evening Mail.

HALIFAX, July 12.—Senator William Dennis, a well known newspaper man of this city, is dead at Boston, aged 61.

Senator Dennis was president of the Halifax Herald and the Evening Mail and has lived in Halifax for 45 years, having come to the Herald in 1875 as a reporter. He conducted his papers on an independent Conservative policy and took strong stands on many public questions, opposing the Laurier naval policy. He was summoned to the senate in 1912.

GOVERNMENT CONFIRMS NAMING OF DELEGATE

W. E. Thompson Officially Appointed—G. T. P. Delegates Not Yet Named.

Major McClymont received a wire this morning from the deputy minister of labor confirming the appointment of W. E. Thompson as workmen's representative to the conciliation board in the longshoremen's strike. The lettergram was as follows:

"Your night letter received. Minister has been pleased to confirm nomination and has appointed Mr. Thompson to the conciliation board. Company's nomination not yet received but looked for shortly. Shall wire you on this point as soon as possible and board members will then endeavor to secure chairman by agreement."

Plant was tricked by the secret police whom he took into his basement and to whom, it is alleged, he sold liquor before the raid. The raid was conducted by Inspector Walter Owen and Chief Cruickshanks.

Two Murderers Escape from New Westminster

Van Horst and Montairo, serving life sentences, Sawed Bars and supposed to have made Across the Border

NEW WESTMINSTER, July 12.—Van Horst and Montairo, both serving life sentences at the New Westminster penitentiary for murder, have escaped from the institution. The visits of persons to the prisoners and the death of two bloodhounds is taken as a suggestion of outside complicity. Both were patients at the prison hospital and sawed through the bars of the windows. Dummies were left in the beds to prevent the notice of the attendants. It is considered probable that the convicts crossed the border into the United States.

Both Van Horst and Montairo were admitted to the penitentiary in 1914. Van Horst robbed a man and pitched him out of a boat into Burrard Inlet. Montairo shot a man in a row over a real estate deal. The former is considered a desperate gunman.

DARING FEAT PROVES FATAL

C. G. Stephens Dashed to Pieces in Trying to Descend Niagara in Barrel.

NIAGARA FALLS, July 12.—C. G. Stephens, the Bristol barber, was dashed to pieces in an attempt to go over Niagara Falls in a barrel on Sunday. Twenty minutes after the attempt, the only signs left were the remnants of the barrel.

Before starting on the perilous feat, Stephens was warned by Leach, who already has successfully made the descent, that the barrel was not strong enough. Stephens had a contract with a moving picture concern to perform the stunt.

NOTED EMPRESS DIES AT MADRID

Empress Eugenia was One of the Nineteenth Century's Most Brilliant Characters.

MADRID, July 12.—Empress Eugenie, widow of Napoleon III., Emperor of France, is dead. The deceased who was aged 94 was probably the most brilliant feminine figure of the history of the nineteenth century and displayed great fearlessness during the revolution of 1870. Her only son was killed by a party of Zulus while fighting for Britain in the Zulu war. The Empress made her home in England at Farnborough Hill, Hants.

REGISTRATION TIME PUT ON

Government Agent McMullin has Just Received Word to This Effect from Victoria.

Word has just been received from Victoria by Government Agent J. W. McMullin that the date for the registration of voters on the new provincial voters' lists has been extended from July 15 to July 31 to give all those duly qualified in outside places to get their names on the lists.

Registration here, as elsewhere, has been slow and political societies have not been taking the matter up with their usual interest. It is hoped that the extension of the time will see all voters properly registered.

The Teton, 20,000 lbs., and Doreen, 4,900 lbs., sold to the Royal Fish Company at 14.4c and 6c.

The Adeline, 7,000 lbs., Nornen 8,000 lbs., Agnes B, 8,000 lbs., and Mab 1,000 lbs., sold to the Cold Storage at 14.3c and 6c.

The Ali with 13,000 lbs. sold to the Cold Storage at 14.3c and 6c, as did also the Roald Amundsen at 13c and 6c.

Salmon was in demand and good prices were offered. The Wildwood with 8,000 lbs. red kings, 1,000 lbs. white kings and 250 cohoes, sold to the Cold Storage at 13.9c for reds, 5c for the whites and 50 cents each for the cohoes. The Vesta which carried 4,750 lbs. reds, 800 lbs. whites and 38 cohoes sold to the same company for the same prices.

EFFICIENCY OF PROVINCIAL EMPLOYMENT

British Columbia Labor Bureau has Relatively More Accomplishment to its Credit than any other Province

VICTORIA, July 12.—The energetic manner in which the work of the Public Employment Bureau has been taken up in British Columbia is shown by the fact that, for work accomplished and placements effected, the bureau operated by the Provincial Department of Labor have considerably outdistanced all the other provinces of Canada, with the exception of Ontario. In a relative sense British Columbia is surpassed by none; for Ontario with four or five times the population claims only about double the amount of business done by the British Columbia bureau, while other provinces with equal or greater populations than our own are easily left behind.

A return just issued by the Provincial Department of Labor concerning the first six months of the present year gives some interesting details.

In this half-yearly period the Department effected the placement of 34,646 men and women into employment, a figure which falls little short of the number for the whole of last year, when for twelve months the placements were 35,664. Of the placements made in the last six months, 14,694 were those of returned soldiers. At the beginning of the present year there were 1,658 unplaced applicants whose names were listed with the bureau and at the end of June the number was 1,282; while the number of date was 556 and on the latter date 1,053. In the six months 44,633 applications for work were received, including 15,918 from ex-soldiers; and the vacancies notified by employers were 37,755.

The general labor situation at Prince Rupert is described in government reports as very good, there being openings for loggers, railway construction and shipyard work, and general labor at the mining camps.

JULY TWELFTH; IRELAND QUIET

No Reports of Disorders Yet—Parades in Twelve Cities—Troops Ready.

BELFAST, July 12.—No disturbances have yet been reported in Ulster cities as a result of the anniversary day of the Battle of the Boyne. In twelve of them the day was opened with Orangemen's parades. Troops are held in readiness awaiting an emergency.

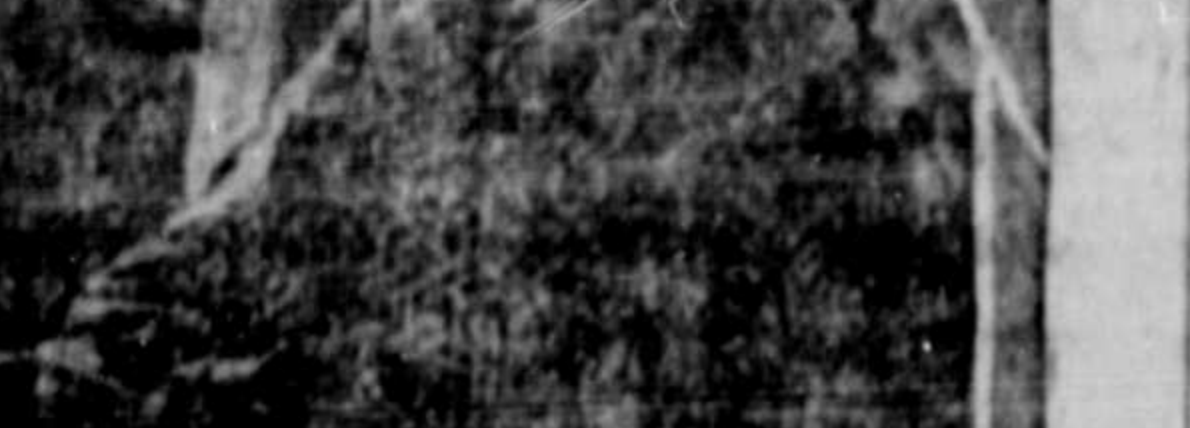

PROVIDE POWER FOR THE CITY

Representative of Prince Rupert Hydro Electric says City Must Make Next Move

Mr. Young, who returned from a few days ago, and who in Prince Rupert last year in connection with the revival of the Prince Rupert Hydro-electric scheme, discussing the matter with a Daily News representative this way south, said that in any further negotiation regarding the subject the city would have to make the first move. The company owned the power sites at the St. Lawrence River, Kitada River and the Skeena River and if the city wished to proceed with these as municipal undertakings the sites would have to be purchased. He is of opinion, however, that the thing the city could do would be to lease its present power plant to the company under a long term and power contract with proper safeguards and guarantees from the company in regard to rates and the right to take it at a specified time. The company could be induced to go ahead with the development of a power scheme for the city, it would mean the bringing in of other industries and the general development of the district. The company would not undertake the work unless they could arrange for the use of power by other industries not now in existence. There is nothing to prevent Prince Rupert now to make a power plant a paying proposal. If other large industries were secured the company could at once foster the new industries and provide for the future power supply of the city of Prince Rupert. The result would be an advantage to everyone.

WAS RADICAL AS EXECUTIVE

Admiral Fisher, Famous Admiral, Just Dead, was Outstanding Figure in Naval Affairs

LONDON, July 12.—Admiral Lord Fisher of Kilverstone, the famous naval officer and First Sea Lord of the British Admiralty at the commencement of the Great War, who passed away on Saturday morning following an operation from which he failed to rally, was one of Britain's foremost admirals. He was born in the year 1841 and served in most posts of honor in connection with the navy and naval administration. Entering the navy in the year 1854 at the age of thirteen he saw service in the China war and the Egyptian rebellion. He inaugurated modern ideas into modern naval fighting and always held advanced and radical ideas. At the beginning of the Great War, as First Sea Lord, he caused a sensation by his policy of bringing British warships from distant ports and scrapping obsolete vessels. His actions were largely responsible for the appointment of Lord Jellicoe to succeed him. Lately he has written strong articles defending his own policies and also warning the British people to prepare in view of the great strides in naval science.

WEDNESDAY WAS BUSY ALONG WATERFRONT

Large and Small Vessels were Busy Loading and Discharging.

Prince Rupert's water front had a very busy appearance on Wednesday with so many shipping activities in evidence. At the government dock the Princess Patricia was loading for the north and the Princess Mary was being loaded at the same wharf while waiting the return of the tourists who had strolled up to see the sights of the city. Later the ship moved to the Allan Fisher wharf to load fish for delivery in Vancouver. At the G. T. P. dock the merchants were busily engaged unloading freight from the Prince George and the passengers on the Prince John from the northern Queen Charlotte Islands were waiting to get their baggage checked as it was being hoisted from the hold. 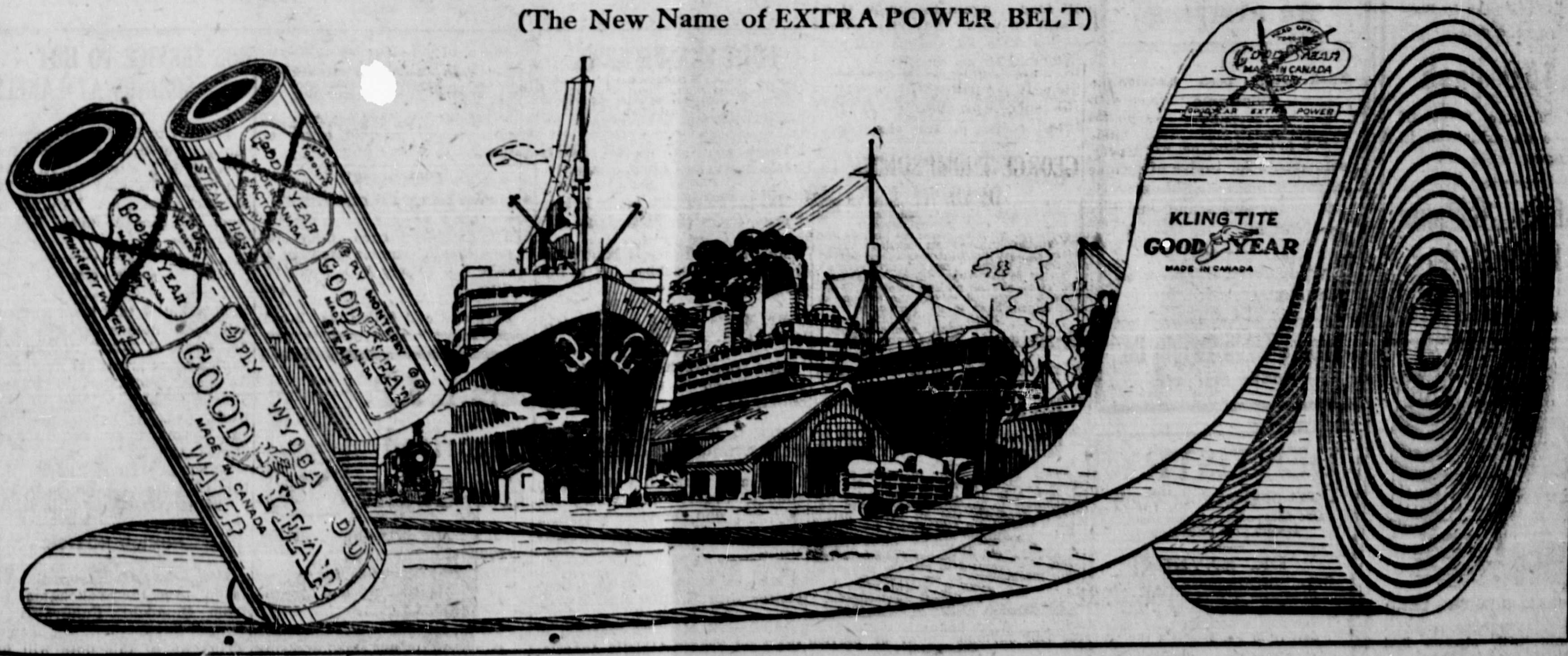
