## Nova Scotia Member New Minister

### GRAND TRUNK NAMES DELEGATE FOR STRIKE CONCILIATION PROCEEDINGS

#### New Dominion Cabinet Has Been Selected by Premier

Fleming Blanchard McCurdy, of Shelburne and Queens, is sworn in the new administration---Appointment Expected

#### Had Former Experience in Work of the Cabinet

Mr. McCurdy, Loughheed, Guthrie, Calder, Sifton, Reid, Robertson and Drayton are old ones staying on

OTTAWA, July 13.—F. B. McCurdy, M. P. Shelburne and Queens, Nova Scotia, has been sworn in as a new member of the new cabinet. The following old members also enter the new administration: Sir George Foster, Sir James Loughheed, Hon. Hugh Guthrie, J. A. Calder, A. L. Sifton, Dr. Reid, Senator Robertson and Sir Henry Drayton.

Fleming Blanchard McCurdy has been prominently mentioned some time as a cabinet possibility and his appointment creates no surprise. Cabinet representation was due the Maritime provinces where there has been no active cabinet representation since the resignation of Hon. A. K. MacLean early in the year. Mr. McCurdy has had some cabinet experience as parliamentary secretary for the Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment Board, which position he resigned over a year ago because of dissatisfaction over conditions under which he was working. He is a native of Nova Scotia, a life long Conservative and is 45 years of age.

#### UNITED STATES WAR BOATS IN PRINCE RUPERT HARBOR

Destroyer Swallow and Submarine Chaser 306 Visitor Here for the Night—Going to Sitka.

#### SECRETARY DANIELS AND ADMIRAL RODMAN HERE

At 6:30 last evening the water-plant was visited by two strangers in the form of the United States destroyer Swallow and the submarine chaser 306, both spending the night here in the course of a cruise in northern waters with Sitka as the objective. They pulled out this morning at break to finish the northward journey. During the stay of the vessels the "gobs" were all given shore leave and their presence on the street was quite noticeable. These boats belong to a second squadron of a United States flotilla that is visiting Alaska on a summer cruise. The second squadron consisting of seven destroyers is already at Sitka and toward it is Secretary of the Navy Daniels and Admiral Rodman. On their return south a call may be made at Prince Rupert, but this is considered doubtful at the present time. During the stay of the war ships the United States Consul A. E. Wheeler was received on board. Lieut. H. L. Arnold, in command of the Swallow, and Lieut. Gove, of the 306, the Swallow saw service in the recent war and have been back from the other side for five months.

#### SURF INLET MAN DROWNS

Ed. Jensen Meets Fate When Small Motor Boat Capsizes.

This morning at ten o'clock the launch Full Moon arrived at the Prince Rupert Boat House having on board the body of Ed. Jensen who was drowned at Surf Inlet on Sunday morning. The man is middle-aged and according to his friends is married and has a wife in Silverton, B. C., although Government Agent McMullin found nothing among his papers which might establish this. The first launch left the camp yesterday afternoon at 1 o'clock. The body is now at the chapel of the B. C. undertakers, but final arrangements for the burial have not yet been completed. The fatality occurred within easy distance of shore, but all efforts were fruitless in recovering the body soon enough from the water to bring back life. Along with another man, Jensen went out in a small open motor boat and for some reason or other it capsized. Jensen was no swimmer and immediately disappeared from sight. The partner in the tragedy had the presence of mind to get a hold on the upturned craft and remained safe until help arrived. There were many boats around and plenty of help as the accident happened only a short distance from shore. However, the victim never appeared at the surface of the water following the plunge and when the body was recovered a short time after life was extinct.

#### COUNCIL FAVORS THEIR REQUEST

Final Transfer of Third Avenue Property to G. W. V. A. will Have to be Ratified by People, However.

As a result of further consideration at last night's council meeting it was decided that the request of the Great War Veterans Association for the exchange of the Fulton Street lots for the lot and building on Third Avenue now occupied by them be granted. The council's recommendation will, however, have to be ratified by the electorate at the next election. This action is merely an assurance to the association that they will again be disturbed in their present quarters until the people rule otherwise by voting. It is understood that the association intends to make considerable improvements and alterations on the present quarters.

Considerable discussion took place over the question, the most of it being in regard to the technicalities of the case and the legal rights of the city council in making such grants. Aid Rochester also explained that his remarks of last Monday were not a criticism against the association. He had subsequently met a delegation of the returned men and the air had been cleared to everybody's satisfaction.

#### CONSTABLE BRINGS LIQUOR FROM NAAS

Japanese Ordered it, but Failed to Call for it under Circumstances

Constable Ackroyd returned from Somerville Cannery on the Naas River last evening having in his possession a large quantity of unclaimed whiskey. A short time ago the cases of glass arrived at the cannery consigned to one of the Japanese employees. The manager seized the boxes and held them for the owner to reveal his identity and claim the goods held. However the party who owned the wet stuff fully realized the penalty of illegal possession and never put in an appearance. So the cases of whiskey were brought to this city last evening, where they are still unclaimed.

#### PLANES COMING FOR THE FAIR

Contract is Being Signed Today by Agricultural Association and Aerial Company.

At last night's meeting of the Agricultural Association it was finally decided to bring as an added attraction a seaplane to this city during the week of the carnival. The progressiveness of the committee in taking this venture, which is costing no little figure, it is hoped will be rewarded by added crowds that no doubt will visit here to see the first flying machine that has ever come this far north. According to the contract entered into by the Agricultural Association and the Vancouver Island Aerial Service of Victoria, who are sending the plane, two flights will be made each carnival day and three on each of the fair days, making a total of fifteen flights. A special flight will be made over the neighboring villages when advertising matter will be dropped. These arrangements will, of course, be all governed by the weather conditions prevailing. At the meeting last night the matter of having Indian bands was also assured. Arrangements were also gone into for the establishing of a ladies' auxiliary to the association.

#### GOVERNMENT OF B.C. ENCOURAGES INDUSTRY

Making Industrial Loans to Manufacturers from Raw Materials of the Province.

VICTORIA, July 13.—The cabinet has approved industrial loans of \$30,000 to be made to mills manufacturing blankets and tweeds from home grown wool. The tobacco trade in the Okanagan is being encouraged by \$25,000 to the Stellar Cigar Co. who are manufacturing from tobacco grown in that section.

#### City Will Offer More Bonds for Local Sale

First Experiment has been Very Successful—\$15,000 sold with little effort—Interest to be Increased

Owing to the success of the sale of municipal bonds locally, the city has decided to offer the \$12,000 issue for the Morse Creek bridge on the local market and also to increase the rate of interest on all bonds sold and to be sold from 6 1/2% as at present, to 7%. This action was adopted at last night's council meeting on the recommendation of the finance committee. Of the \$34,250 already offered over \$15,000 has already been sold and this without employing canvassers, the only publicity being small advertisements in the newspapers. In speaking on the recommendation last night, Alderman Rochester stated that this was a very satisfactory result to his mind. The city could not have a better advertisement than already by the people did not cover the bridge construction then another bylaw would have to be put. In the meantime such money as was voted should be raised and the bridge proceeded with as far as possible. Aldermen Casey and Murray spoke in favor of speedy commencement of the Section 2 bridge the latter urging repairs on the present bridge until the new one was built.

#### LARGE CHARGE IS NOW LAID

J. A. Spencer Swears Out Charge Alleging Theft of \$28,095 by Griffith Hughes.

VICTORIA, July 13.—When his case was called today it was decided that Griffith Hughes would come up for hearing on Friday morning. While in court Hughes sat between R. T. Elliott, K.C., and H. A. MacLean, both of whom are appearing as counsel in his behalf. Three more informations have been laid besides the original one of \$600.25. They are all sworn by J. A. Spencer. The first charge that he did unlawfully steal between April and June, 1920, \$28,095 from D. Spencer, and also \$500 each on October 31 and November 30. Counsel has difficulty in arranging for the hearing on Friday which was followed by a telephone message to the attorney-general's department which demanded that the case proceed at once. The prosecution counsel said that the witness would be called on Friday and "the evidence will be very short I assure you."

#### NO CARS ARE IN SIGHT AT EXCHANGE

The Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co., Ltd., was the heavy buyer at the Fish Exchange this morning. No cars are coming tonight and none are reported so that the bidding was rather low.

The Atlin Fisheries bought the Sunrise, 5,000 lbs.; M. & L., 6,500 lbs., and Kimmount, 2,000 lbs., at 12.1c and 6.6c per pound.

#### Company Choice to Board Fred Dawson

Advice to this effect received here this morning; will meet W. E. Thompson to choose chairman

Fred G. Dawson has been named as the Grand Trunk Pacific Steamship Company's delegate to the conciliation board between the Longshoremen's Union and that company on the present strike situation. This word was officially conveyed to Mayor McClymont by Superintendent A. Kilpatrick this morning on advice from Winnipeg.

Mr. Dawson has been in Prince George for the past week and will be back in town tonight on the special North Dakota farmers' excursion train. As soon as possible after his return a meeting will be arranged between he and W. E. Thompson, the longshoremen's delegate, with a view to appointing a chairman for the board. Until the board is thus complete the longshoremen will not return to work.

#### PREMIER MEIGHEN TO PAY PRINCE RUPERT A VISIT

So says Colonel Peck who has just returned from Ottawa; Mackenzie King has also promised to come

Asked by the News this morning as to the report of his becoming a member of the Dominion cabinet, Colonel Cyrus W. Peck, V. C., M. P., replied that he felt much as the man must have done who when asked to change the \$20 bill said that he could not do so but he was, just the same, highly honored by the compliment. As far as he was concerned he had heard nothing about his becoming a cabinet minister and he would not think anything of it unless the approach came from the Government itself.

"In the appointment of Hon. Arthur Meighen as Premier, the governor-general has appointed an able young man," said Colonel Peck. "With him will rest the decision as to an election. He can hold off for two years if he likes or can have one now."

Colonel Peck stated that Premier Meighen, Hon. Dr. Reid, Hon. C. C. Ballantyne and Hon. Dr. S. F. Tolmie had all stated to him that they would visit Prince Rupert and the Pacific coast this summer. Besides them Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, leader of the opposition, has also promised to come. "The only way that we can get what we want is to have them come out and see the country and learn conditions as they exist," said the colonel.

#### CLOUDBURST IN FRASER VALLEY

Sweeps Cache Creek Village and Wipes Out Farms, Making People Homeless.

ASHCROFT, July 13.—A cloudburst struck Cache Creek on the Cariboo Road here yesterday at 2 in the afternoon. The wall of water swept the village and demolished the post office, Indian rancherie and homes. These, together with barns and possibly cattle, were swept into the Thompson River and ten people are homeless.

Another Chance To Register.

The Provincial Government has now advanced the date for the registration of voters to August 1 to further assure that all possessing the privilege of the franchise may avail themselves of the opportunity to register and qualify themselves as voters in the various districts of the province.

Home Canning Is the Solution.

The high prices of fruits and sugar will no doubt deter many housewives from doing home canning this year. It is quite possible, however, that a serious blunder would be made by cutting down the preserving of fruits and vegetables.

The United States department of agriculture, in a bulletin just issued, gives many reasons why it would be a mistake to neglect the preserving kettle, despite unfavorable prices and the difficulty encountered in obtaining sugar.

Canned goods are likely to cost more next winter. National canning organizations have frankly declared that the greater costs of products on the farms, transportation delays and expense, higher wages to factory workers, and the increased prices of cans and other materials make it impossible to keep prices down to present levels—already too high from the consumers' viewpoint.

Question of Banking Hours.

From time to time agitations arise in various parts of the country to have the banks keep their offices open on Saturday night. The argument advanced is that it would give the working classes better opportunity to do their banking and would also encourage banking among these classes.

## HAS GENIUS IN TREATY MAKING

### Colonel Wardrop is Attracting Attention of Bolshevik in Central Asia.

BOMBAY, July 13.—Merchants and others arriving from Persia are full of stories of an aged Englishman who suddenly appeared on the horizon in mid-Asia, and is credited with being the author of the various anti-Bolshevik treaties recently made amongst the Caucasian states.

By means which the Persians consider miraculous this officer induced the Georgians, Tartars, Armenians and Persians to put aside their differences in order to combine against a common enemy. He has even, it is asserted, been responsible for starting among the Kurds some kind of movement which will enable them to act, if necessary, in concert with the Armenians.

This last is considered the most extraordinary feat of all, for the antagonism of the Kurds and Armenians has existed almost since the dawn of history.

### Has Gift of Tongues

The Persians say of the English officer that God has given him the greatest gift of tongues, so that no matter in what language he is addressed he can reply to it, and that is one of the chief reasons why he is able to sway the medley of tongues and races that inhabit the Caucasus and the regions below.

The Persians call this Englishman "Colonel Wardrop," and assert that he arrived at Tiflis about two years ago with instructions and authority from the War Office. There is no Colonel Wardrop in the Army List.

The mysterious diplomat is known as the Hakim Siasi, which means Political Officer, and in the Persian view all political officers are colonels. There was, however, some years ago, in the British Consular Service a certain Wardrop, who had spent his time in Petrograd, Moscow and Roumania, and who, about 20 years ago, wrote a book on the Georgian Highland.

This man retired in 1910, and, because of a remarkable aptitude for languages, was appointed an educational adviser to the City of London College.

When war broke out he was employed, because of his knowledge of Russian, in the Foreign Office, and it is known that he was sent to Moscow in 1917. He may be the man.

If so, an unknown man, who 11 years ago considered his life work done, is now displaying a genius and a resource which, England hears, are likely to place him in the front rank of Empire builders.

## COUNCIL DOES NOT SUPPORT CASEY MOTION

Recommendation for Release of Winnipeg Strikers Will Not Go From the City of Prince Rupert.

The resolution of Ald. Casey and Kerr recommending to the Minister of Justice that the Winnipeg strike leaders be released from prison was lost at last night's council meeting when only Aldermen Casey and Kerr voted for the recommendation, while Aldermen Perry, McLennan and Rochester voted against it, Alderman Murray not voting.

"I do not think the council is justified in passing such a resolution," said Alderman Rochester. "Here in Prince Rupert we are a long way from the scene of action and all we have obtained on the situation is from meagre reports. The courts have heard the cases and have decided and it would be rather harsh for this city council to pass a resolution against them. We must depend on our courts and if we go contrary to them, then it is indeed a poor country. Before we pass any such resolution we should go very carefully into the matter. As a member of this board I do not want to go against the law. The judges have spoken so I cannot support this resolution."

Casey's Stand. "The matter is not one beyond the jurisdiction of the city council," said Ald. Casey. "Alderman Rochester is quite logical in his position on the question owing to his manner of obtaining a livelihood. Our views are at different angles for he belongs to the class of the oppressor while I, the class of the oppressed. We could never agree from two such widely separated viewpoints.

"The law of the land was never threatened from Winnipeg conditions. Those men who are now in prison were no more offenders than I am. There was not one thing they participated in that I do not participate in. If they are in the penitentiary so should I be. It is an attempt of the ruling class to put fear into the hearts of the worker and instead of being prosecution is persecution. In passing this resolution we would merely be showing a spirit of conciliation and mercy and would not be belittling the country's laws. I do not think that the four hundred voters who supported Alderman Rochester at the last election would support his attitude in this."

Was Out of Order. Alderman McLennan expressed his regret that such a question had ever been brought into the council chamber. He departed from the Canadian question and mentioned Russia and the soviet system to which Alderman Casey rose to a point of order which was sustained by the mayor as not being pertinent to the situation. Alderman McLennan summed up his remarks by stating that the people in this country believed not in revolution but in evolution and some of the Winnipeg strike leaders had undoubtedly talked revolution. "There was no room for such talk in Canada."

## Mining News

### Stampede in Ontario.

Quite a rush of prospectors is taking place from Haliburton, Ontario, to some place in the north of the province, the exact place being shrouded in mystery. Prospectors are vanishing as if by magic, leaving nothing to indicate where they are headed for and with the bare information to their intimate friends that they are on the track of a new silver discovery. The situation has created an atmosphere similar to that in the early days of mining in Ontario when so-called mysterious rushes were of the quite frequent occurrence. It will not be until claims are recorded that information will be available as to the location of the latest rush. In the meantime prospectors who are still unable to get a "tip" as to the location of "the end of the rainbow" are going to be more and more uneasy—eager to be on the trail.

### Alberta Oil.

An Edmonton dispatch states that twenty million cubic feet of gas every twenty-four hours from the San Joaquin well on the Peace River is the news that H. L. Williams brings from the north. The flow was struck while Mr. Williams was at the well and, since his return, telegraphic advices have been to the effect that it is keeping up with undiminished force and volume. It is now being capped and the drilling operations will then be continued in a further search for oil. The San Joaquin well is about twelve miles down from Peace River town and the present strike is, by all odds, the most promising development that has been made there. Tests of the gas are being made with a view to ascertaining the feasibility of extracting gasoline from it by either the absorption or composition methods.

### Will Take Long Time.

The work of putting in the concentrator at the Premier mine at Stewart will take the best part of the summer and those who are in a position to know state that a very satisfactory achievement will have been made if the new plant for the reducing of the gold ore is in operation by the end of this season. Much big machinery has to be put together, a dam must be built and a power house put in operation. This is only part of the work that will have to be done and it, in itself, is no mean task. Once it is completed though the Premier will be in a position to ship its ore economically, sending out only the values and extracting the lower metals pretty well. This method of treating ore is considered by some mining authorities to be far more economical than the process of railway building and shipping all the rock as is the case at Alice Arm. When the ore is milled at the mine high values can be sent out with very little waste material.

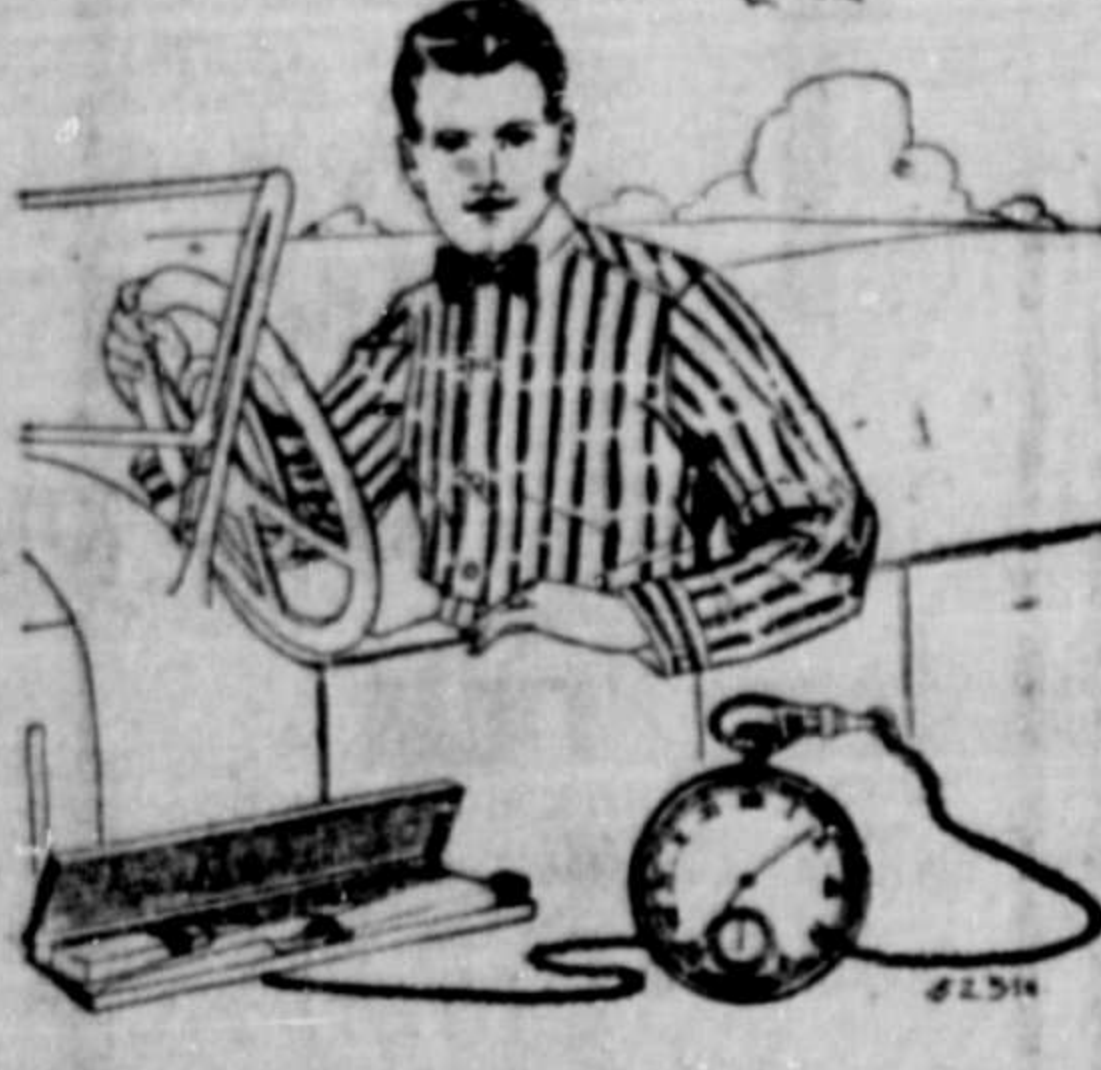

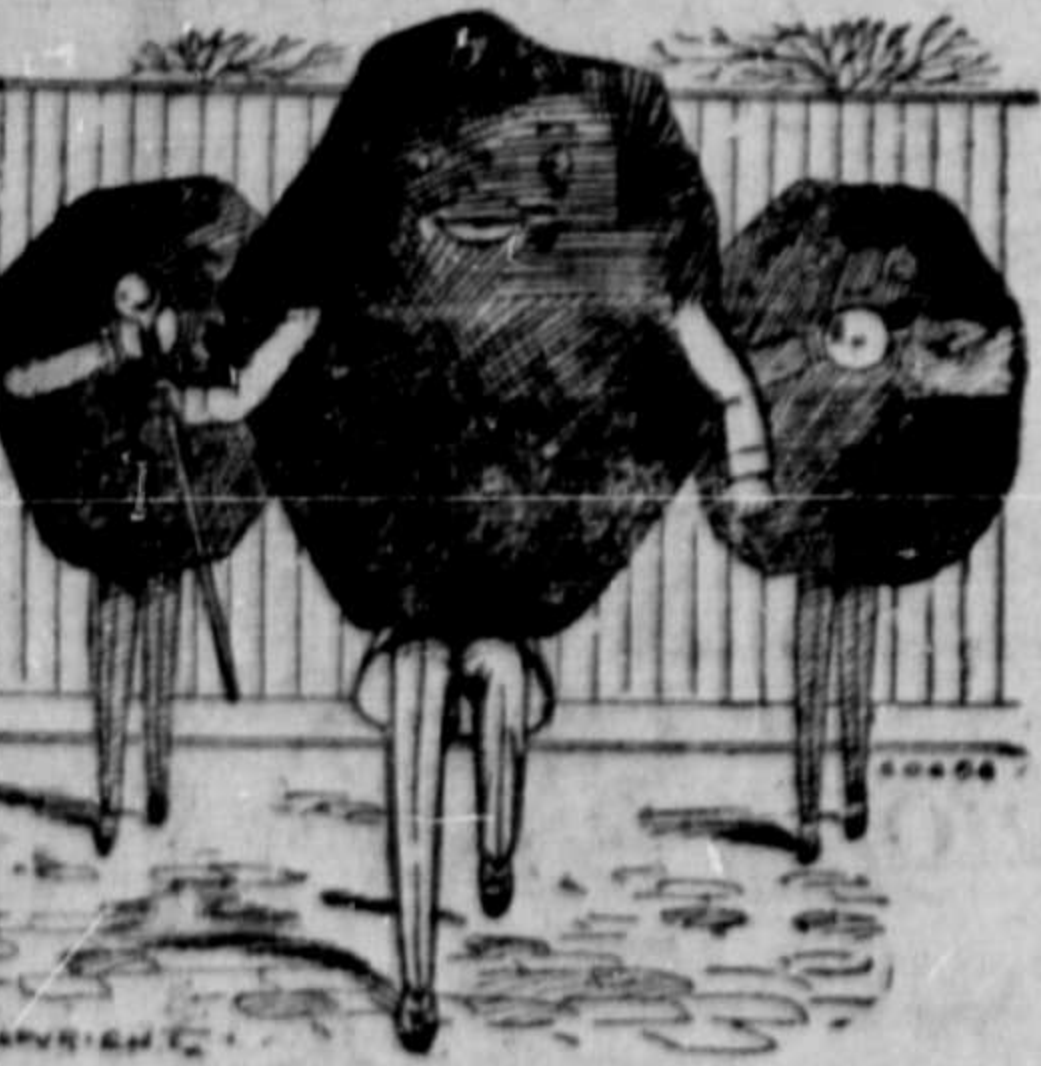

## Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$2.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may apply for adjacent pre-emption with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 1 acre, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 1 year, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$500 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or to record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$100 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 60 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.  
The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emption recorded after June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, reduced from enlistment to March 21, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.  
Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING.  
Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner.

Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged; priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.
