### TWO MILLION POUNDS WAS LANDED HERE

Halibut Totals Last Month Were Back to Normal, Exceeding Figures for Some Time.

With a fair supply of fish refrigerator cars throughout the month of June, the fish business passing through local concerns during the month just passed reached normal again when the net total of halibut passing over the local wharves reached 2,291,000 pounds. The figure is the largest recorded in one month for some time and is the source of gratification to those connected with the fish business in the city. It exceeds the total for the month of May which was 1,963,000 lbs. and also that of June, 1919, which was a landslide month both from a fishing standpoint and also on account of market conditions, that month being characterized by a severe ear shortage when only 581,500 pounds were landed here and 748,500 sought market at other points. This June only 86,000 pounds went south for sale.

During the past month of June the weather was not exactly satisfactory, but nevertheless good catches were made with satisfactory results. The highest price paid during the month was 17.2c and 13.2c, the lowest 10c and 6c, as compared with 10.8c and 5c and 9c and 5c for June, 1919.

Besides the halibut landed there was also 18,000 pounds of salmon sold over the local exchange and 200,000 pounds of black cod brought in by the Cold Storage trawlers.

### Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land required to be \$1 an acre; second-class to \$1.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Particulars of pre-emption abolished, but parties to whom they may have arranged for adjacent pre-emption with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claim.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before applying for a grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 3 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted his certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$200 per acre for each year in the first year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 3 years, and improvements of \$10 per acre, or more, for 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 3 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may renew another pre-emption, if he requires land in addition to his original farm without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown grant.

Unsurveyed areas not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grants for agricultural purposes areas exceeding 40 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on unsurveyed land not exceeding 40 acres may be leased under similar conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased completely or partially or constructed a road to them. Payment of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price is made.

Land may be leased as homesteads by existing roads may be purchased completely or partially or constructed a road to them. Payment of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price is made.

No fees relating to pre-emption are due or payable by miners on grants issued or registered after June 1st, 1913. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of money advanced due and unpaid since August 1st, 1913, on account of purchase fees.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Armed Forces or dependents, acquired direct or indirectly, remitted from enlisting date until payment of original purchase price and taxes, made directly to the Government.

Sub-purchasers of Crown Lands

Provided for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete necessary improvements or fulfillment of conditions of purchase, or failure to pay taxes.

Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be apportioned proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

### GRAZING ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces.

Time within which to file claims or devices of a deceased pre-emptor, and any title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retrospective.

No fees relating to pre-emption are due or payable by miners on grants issued or registered after June 1st, 1913.

Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of money advanced due and unpaid since August 1st, 1913, on account of purchase fees.

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### GRAZING ACT.

Grazing Act, 1918, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on annual range previously published by the Commissioner of the Stone Lions.



### MALE BIRDS ARE OF NO USE NOW

Farmers and Others Selling Eggs Should Now Remove Them From Their Flocks.

The presence of male birds in the flock during the summer months has a decidedly detrimental effect upon the quality of eggs and poultry producers lose many thousands of dollars annually through the presence of partially incubated and bad eggs in the produce they market. Reports are now being received from all parts of the country of the number of partially incubated eggs appearing in current receipts. Producers do not realize that it is unnecessary for a fertile egg to be placed under a broody hen to cause the germ to grow; a temperature of seventy degrees is sufficient to start incubation. If the heat is constant the development of the chick will continue, but if it ceases or is intermittent, putrefaction at once sets in and the egg becomes bad. Such eggs have no place or value in shipments, and should they get to the consumer the consumptive demand immediately falls off.

The male bird is not essential in egg production, his usefulness is over when the supply of fertile eggs for the season has been secured. The hens will lay just as many eggs when the male bird has been removed and the eggs will be more suitable for consumption, packing or storing. Further, there is a distinct financial gain to the producer who markets infertile eggs, because the best trade in many cities offers a premium of from one to five cents a dozen for infertile eggs.

Then there is the question of feed. It costs money to feed poultry, and with feed at its present value, the consumption of feed by males kept for no particular purpose is a serious economic waste. The reason for this is that the best prices for live and dressed fowl prevail in the spring and early summer. During the summer the price declines, and by the

early fall when many producers decide to market their male birds, a lower price than prevailed in the spring has to be accepted; the producer thus losing the amount per pound the market has declined, plus the value of the feed consumed by the birds during the summer months. This financial loss takes on a more serious aspect when it is coupled with the amount charged back by the wholesaler for the bad and partially incubated eggs that have been marketed.

Farmers and others selling eggs for market should, therefore, need no urging to kill off, dispose of, or at least remove the male birds from the flock after the breeding season.
