The appealing feature, however, was that every person received a souvenir can of salmon which they had seen in the process of preparation. Mr. Lett thanked the officials at the cannery and J. F. Strang replied in a very suitable manner. All was now settled for the last hour's run into the terminus.

This morning the excursionists were the guests of the Grand Trunk Pacific Steamship Company on the Prince Albert. Leaving the Grand Trunk dock at 9 o'clock they were taken about the harbor and over to Georgetown. On their return they were shown through the dry dock to see the ship building operations, many of them have never witnessed such before indeed, some of them had never seen an ocean vessel. This afternoon as guests of the Board of Trade, they are visiting the Prince Rupert Lumber Company's mill and the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Company's plant. Tonight a dance is being given in their honor at St. Andrew's Hall.

LONDON, July 14.—The Trades Congress have passed a vote threatening to lay down their tools in an effort to force the Imperial Government to withdraw the troops from Ireland and grant that country an independent Irish parliament.

MOROCCO BECOMES MORE VALUABLE

PARIS, July 14.—Discovery of large deposits of phosphate in the Moroccan hinterland may soon make France the great phosphate producing country of the world. The Moroccan deposits are reported by Professor Louis Gentil, of the Sorbonne, as being almost inexhaustible. One hundred miles inland from Casablanca there is a mountain plateau forty miles long and twenty-five miles wide which is a veritable storehouse of phosphate. A railway is to be built to this mountain and a monopoly has been given to the Moroccan Government for the sale of the phosphate. France already has huge deposits in Alsace.

TWO MILLION POUNDS WAS LANDED HERE

Halibut Totals Last Month Were
Back to Normal, Exceeding
Figures for Some Time.

With a fair supply of fish regenerator cars throughout the month of June, the fish business passing through local concerns during the month just passed reached normal again when the net total of halibut passing over the local wharves reached 2,291,000 pounds. The figure is the largest recorded in one month for some time and is the source of gratification to those connected with the fish business in the city. It exceeds the total for the month of May which was 1,963,000 lbs., and also that of June, 1919, which was a landslide month both from a fishing standpoint and also on account of market conditions, that month being characterized by a severe car shortage when only 581,500 pounds were landed here and 748,500 sought market at other points. This June only 86,000 pounds went south for sale.

During the past month of June the weather was not exactly satisfactory, but nevertheless good catches were made with satisfactory results. The highest price paid during the month was 17.2c and 13.2c, the lowest 10c and 6c., as compared with 10.8c and 5c and 9c and 5c for June, 1919. Besides the halibut landed there was also 18,000 pounds of salmon sold over the local exchange and 200,000 pounds of black cod brought in by the Cold Storage trollers.

Train Men for Municipal Government.

One of the reasons given for the appointment of Sir Arthur Currie to the principalship of McGill University is that he will be able to reorganize this great institution to better serve the needs of the day. If such is the case there never was a better opportunity for Sir Arthur to serve the present generation than to work for the establishment of a municipal department through which young men can be specially trained for the government of our cities. In the United States many of the universities and the state institutions in particular have such departments given wholly or in part to the study of municipal government, in which they have been remarkably successful. In Canada, on the other hand, education in local government has never been taken up seriously with the result that many of the principal executive positions have to be filled by outsiders, because on account of the growth of our cities such executive positions can only be satisfactorily filled by men with special knowledge. Moreover, there is a fast-growing tendency throughout the Dominion towards the commission and manager form of municipal government, which means that more trained men will soon be required for administration of Canada's municipalities. Should the whole of Canada's 891 urban communities adopt the new form of government it would fail, because there would be insufficient qualified men. The Canadian Municipal Journal seems to have a good deal of well based reasons for the encouragement of a new department in the educational institutions of our country.

Soapy Smith Rule on Law and Order.

Citizens of Smithers who were enjoying the calm and cool of Sunday evening were forced to witness exhibitions of drunkenness and profanity that would have done credit to the best efforts of the bar-room's balmiest days. Ladies on the way home from church were in several cases forced to walk on the road to evade the reeling, bleary-eyed rats who again were victims of the greed that has taken possession of would-be reputable citizens, who vie with each other in their efforts and boasts of establishing the rule of Soapy Smith. When men can peddle rotten liquor and boast of the slowness of Canadian officials it is about time that Canadians stepped in and demonstrated that there is a difference between forbearance and fear, and that they must not confuse our tolerance of their methods to a degree with slowness. Decent people have a right to the free use of our sidewalks without being subject to the indignity of the leers of a gang of slobbering bohunks ginned up by a lot of yellow skunks behind skirts and other frailties and calling themselves "slick."—Interior News.

NORTH DAKOTA BEAT HAGWILGET IN BASE BALL GAME MONDAY

On July 12 in the famous Bulkley Valley, there took place on the ball park in Hagwilget Canyon a baseball match of unusual interest between a team representing North Dakota called the Waughollers and a team of Hagwilget Indians, the Indians badly outclassing the North Dakotans, the final score being 14 to 1 in favor of the red men.

The following are the names of those participating in the fracas: Hagwilget Indians—Kitsequela Tim C., Moccasin Joe P., Metlakatla Charlie 1b., Charlie Fatfish 2b., Aleck Joe ss., Prince Albert 3b., Haida Pete cf., Kitselas Dave lf., Kitwanoof Henry rf.
Waughollers—F. Gibson c., Wolfe and Taylor p., Tetrault 1b., Hall 2b., Bryant ss., Bailey 3b., Brisbane cf., C. Gibson lf., Elliott rf.

A great deal of dissatisfaction was expressed by both sides at the various decisions rendered by the umpires, several of which had to be substituted. The first unsatisfactory umpire was Meamskinist Westcott, chief of the Hairy Indian tribe. His decisions were so raw in favor of his redskin brethren that, to avert a riot, they took him out and substituted another cohort, Leatherneck Bill. Leatherneck did well for one inning, when his Indian friends came to the conclusion that he had been "fixed" by the palefaces and demanded his scalp, as well as that of "One More River to Cross" Gringan, whom they accused of doing the "fixing." Finally peace was restored by substituting Square-deal Blasky, a paleface umpire of note, who gave general satisfaction for the other inning that was played.

At the conclusion of the game another dispute arose between the captain of the Indian team and the official scorekeeper, Kitsumkalam Munro—the latter being accused of "jipping" the score and holding out on the Indians. The affair was finally settled to the satisfaction of all parties by a board of arbitration consisting of Kitimat Dawson, Kitkatla Riddell, Skidegate Dobbs and the Big White Chief Smaglooalum Lett.

After three rousing cheers the party dispersed.

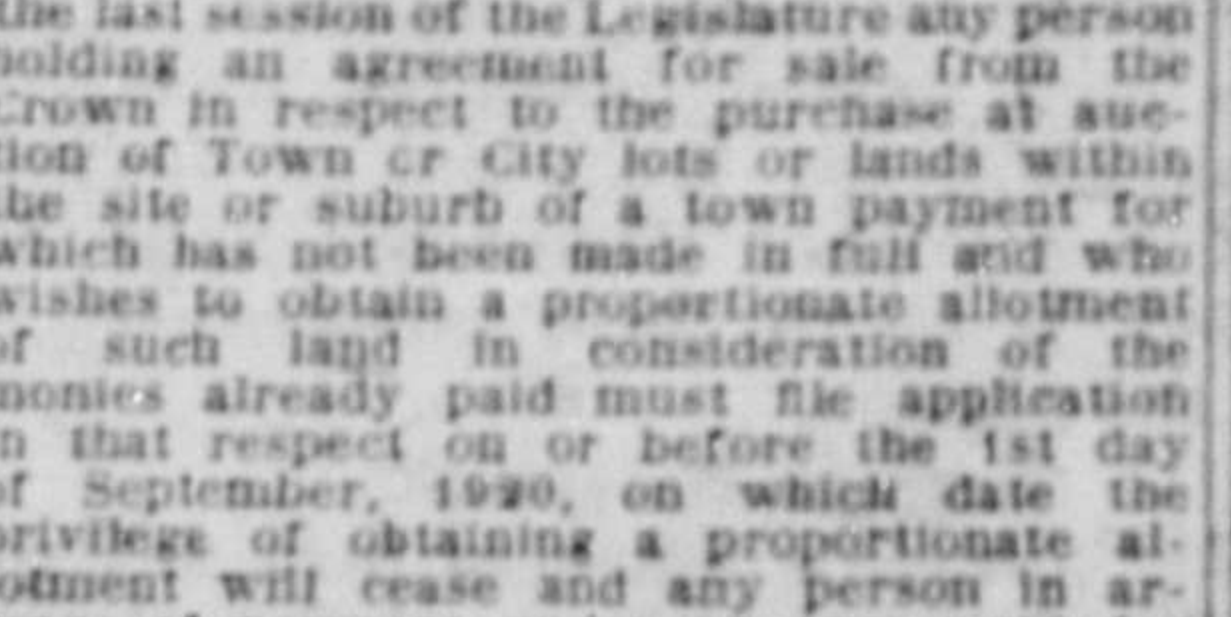

PROPAGATE ALASKAN REINDEER

U. S. Federal Government Interested in Increasing Production of Meat from New Herds.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 14.—An investigation of the conditions of the reindeer in Alaska and the introduction of new blood into the herds, which are of great economic importance to the natives of the Territory, are to be undertaken by the biological survey, United States department of agriculture, in accord with recent legislation. The work will be carried on in co-operation with the bureau of education, department of the interior, which has been closely identified with the reindeer industry in Alaska since 1892. In that year the bureau introduced 143 animals, which have increased until today they number approximately 150,000. In addition, it is estimated that the natives have killed 100,000 for food and skins.

Excellent as have been the results so far, there are great opportunities for improving the industry, thus developing an important meat supply not only for Alaska but for other parts of the United States. A vast region, including the base of the Alaska peninsula and immense areas farther north, is adapted to raising these animals. Several million reindeer could be supported on these tracts, according to estimates. The introduction of new breeding stock will be one of the immediate tasks to be undertaken by the federal authorities.

A letter recently received here from Plymouth, England, tells how the English received Mary Pickford and her husband, Douglas Fairbanks, when they arrived at the old English sea port on their recent tour. Aeroplanes were sent out to meet the incoming steamer on which the movie favorites were travelling and huge bouquets of flowers were dropped to her decks. The mayor of Plymouth went out on a tug to meet the world famous couple and accord them a welcome to England.

In the first game of the league they played to a 2 to 2 draw. They then downed all opponents and it was decided to meet on Dominion Day for the special cup. Here again they played to a tie, so tonight's game will be the concluding game of the series. In the meantime the Grand Trunk have got a little edge of their opponents by beating them in a 1 to 0 game last Monday, which was the first fixture of the second half of the league matches.

George Russell will be the referee and his skill at keeping the game clean adds greatly to the pleasure of the spectators desiring to see good football.

The Calties team will be made up as follows—Goal, W. R. Martin; backs, Harry Menzie and Jack Stewart; halves, Jas. Currie, W. Murray and A. Matthews; forwards, White, J. Boote, T. Black, R. Wiggins and George Sellers.

DISAPPEARANCE OF PILCHARDS CAUSE OF SPECULATION

The reported mysterious disappearance of pilchards (known farther south as sardines) from the waters of Vancouver Island is causing a good deal of interest and some anxiety among fishermen and cannery men just now, says the Pacific Fisherman. No pilchards have been caught since last fall by the fishermen operating along some portions of the island coast, and it is stated by parties who have investigated the matter that large quantities of dead pilchards have been found in the bays and harbors to the south of Nootka Sound. This has given rise to the theory that a disease has killed off the fish wholesale. On the other hand, officials of the Fisheries Department state, a similar emigration of pilchards has occurred along the California coast, and it is thought that the disappearance may be only temporary and due to the little known spawning habits of the fish. Their return is awaited by a number of canneries, one of which, in fact, planned to commence canning them some time ago.

Vancouver Island cannery men and fishermen are particularly interested in the pilchard because nearly the whole catch of last summer—valued at more than half a million dollars—was taken in Vancouver Island waters. The pilchard only became commercially important in the fishing industry of the province three or four years ago, the canning of pilchards resulting from the food scarcity of the war. In 1917 the first big run of pilchards was seen in the straits of Juan de Fuca and they were first canned in that year at Nootka. In the following year huge schools appeared along the coasts of south and southwestern Vancouver Island and they were canned at many canneries along the coast in considerable quantities. Little is known of the habits and life history of the fish, but many fishermen declare that the future of the pilchard industry in British Columbia is very important, though many problems connected with the taking, preserving and marketing of the fish will have to be solved.

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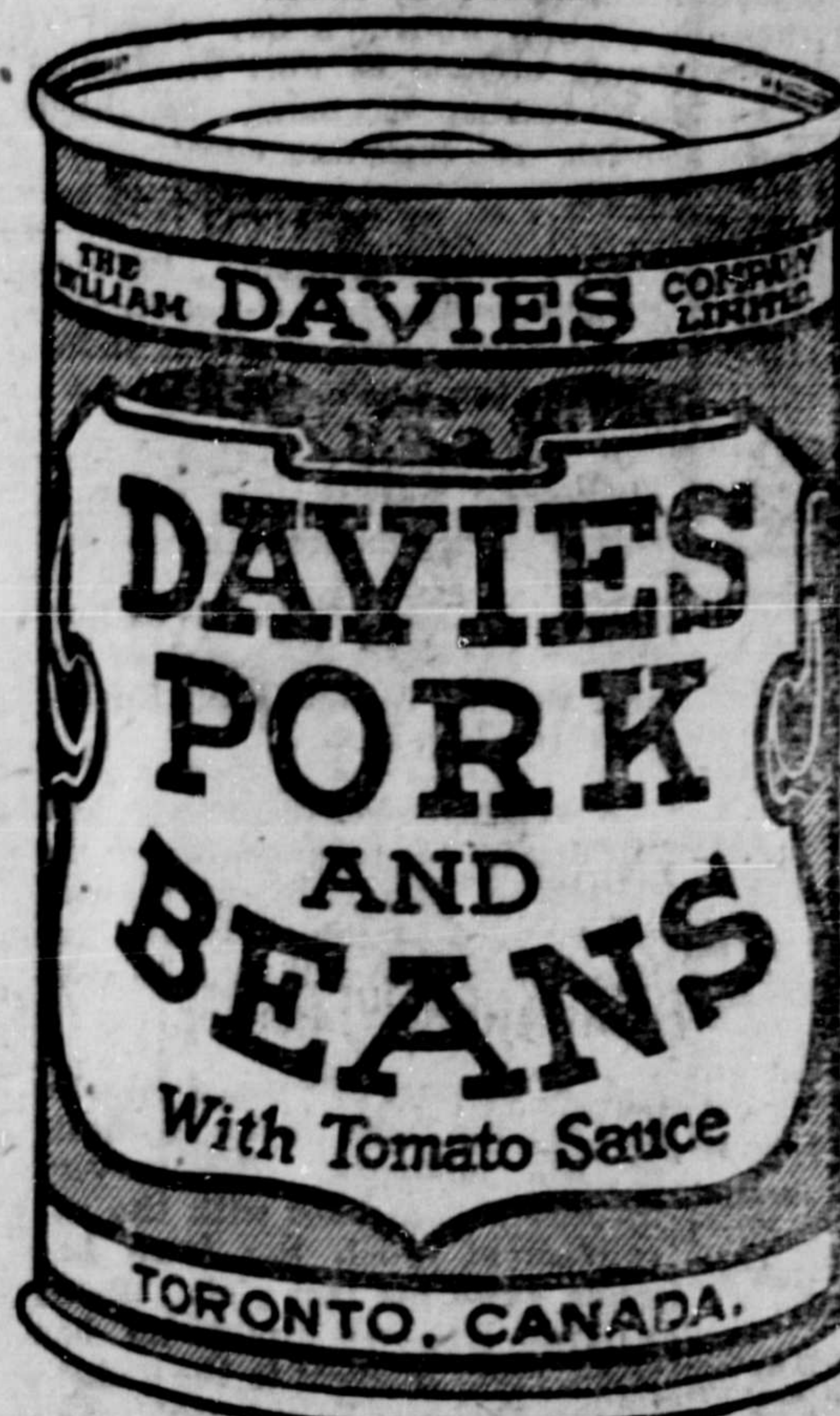

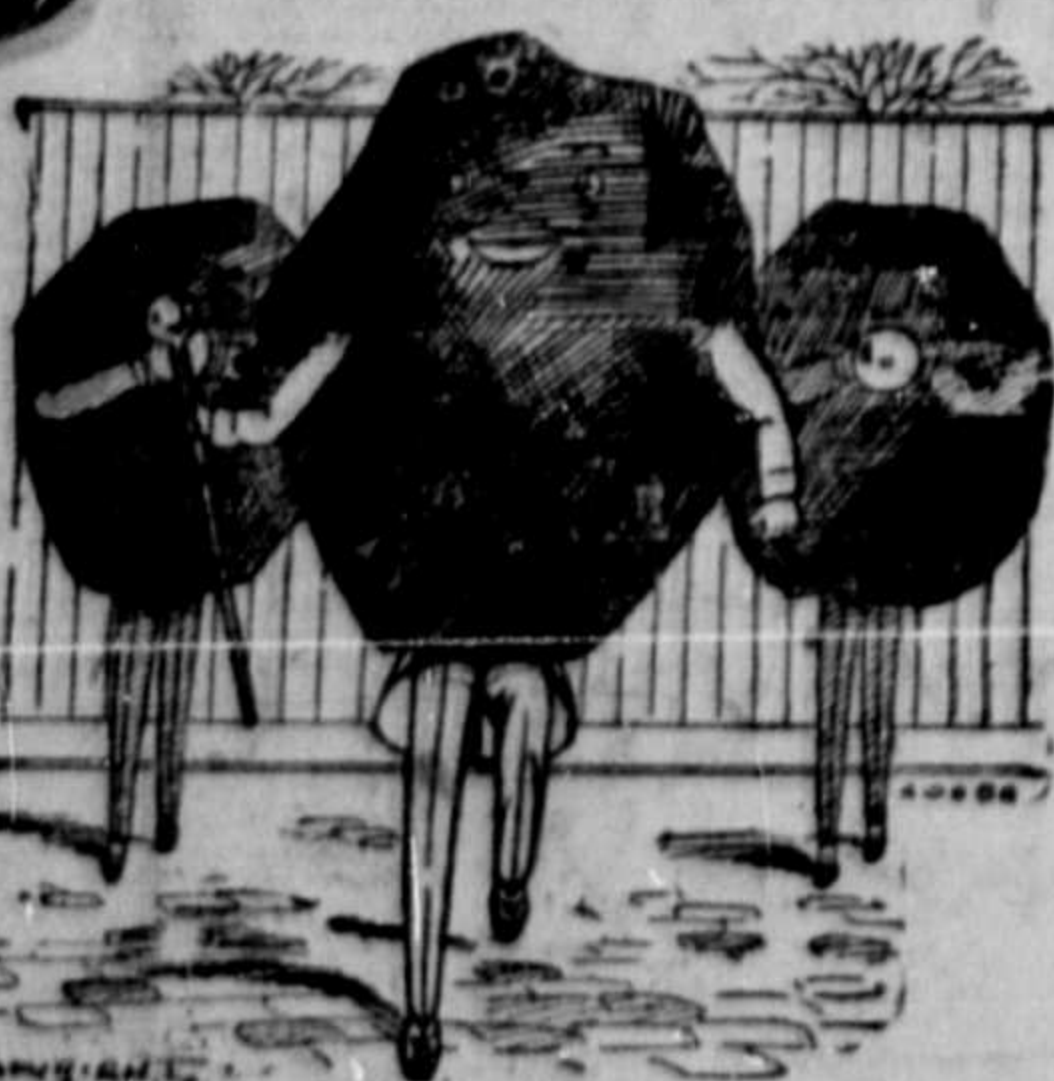

MALE BIRDS ARE OF NO USE NOW

Farmers and Others Selling Eggs
Should Now Remove Them
From Their Flocks.

The presence of male birds in the flock during the summer months has a decidedly detrimental effect upon the quality of eggs and poultry producers lose many thousands of dollars annually through the presence of partially incubated and bad eggs in the produce they market. Reports are now being received from all parts of the country of the number of partially incubated eggs appearing in current receipts. Producers do not realize that it is unnecessary for a fertile egg to be placed under a broody hen to cause the germ to grow; a temperature of seventy degrees is sufficient to start incubation. If the heat is constant the development of the chick will continue, but if it ceases or is intermittent, putrefaction at once sets in and the egg becomes bad. Such eggs have no place or value in shipments, and should they get to the consumer the consumptive demand immediately falls off.

The male bird is not essential in egg production, his usefulness is over when the supply of fertile eggs for the season has been secured. The hens will lay just as many eggs when the male bird has been removed and the eggs will be more suitable for consumption, packing or storing. Further, there is a distinct financial gain to the producer who markets infertile eggs, because the best trade in many cities offers a premium of from one to five cents a dozen for infertile eggs.

Then there is the question of feed. It costs money to feed poultry, and with feed at its present value, the consumption of feed by males kept for no particular purpose is a serious economic waste. The reason for this is that the best prices for live and dressed fowl prevail in the spring and early summer. During the summer the price declines, and by the
