Longshoremen Resume Work Today

LIPTON'S SHAMROCK IV. WINS IN FIRST RACE OF THE AMERICA CUP SERIES

GREAT TRANSCONTINENTAL FLIGHT COMMENCED TODAY

Four Machines leave Mitchell Field Today at Noon; Perfect Weather between New York and Nome reported

MINEOLA, N. Y., July 15.—Arrangements for today's 9,000 mile transcontinental flight from here to Nome are now complete. The first 1850 miles of the itinerary is from Mitchell Field to Saskatoon in 300 mile stages, to Edmonton, 300 miles, Jasper 200 miles, Prince George 200 miles, Hazelton 220 miles, Wrangell 210 miles, Whitehorse 300 miles, Dawson 250 miles, Fairbanks 275 miles, Ruby 240 miles, Nome 300 miles. Reports from Dawson tell that the flying weather is now perfect from here to Nome.

MINEOLA, July 15.—Four planes left here at 12:33 this afternoon in the Alaska and return flying expedition.

RECORD TIME RUN TO NORTH

U. S. Destroyer Made Run From Seattle to Ketchikan in 30 Hours

WASHINGTON, July 15.—With Admiral Rodman, commander in chief of the United States Pacific coast fleet, acting as pilot one of the destroyers of the fleet now making the summer cruise to Alaska established a new record for the run from Seattle to Ketchikan on Sunday.

The time was 36 hours, which reduces the old record by five hours.

ESTEVEAN HITS FISH SCHOONER

Speculator Seriously Damaged and Supplies Lost—Constitution Suffers Slightly.

While landing at the government wharf this morning the lighthouse tender Estevan jammed the fishing schooner Speculator against the Constitution, another fishing boat. No persons were hurt but the Speculator was seriously damaged. All her cargo of ice, bait and provisions was destroyed. The Speculator did not sink as all damage was above water line. The Constitution was also slightly damaged.

VALERA IS GIVEN UNIVERSITY POST

"President of Irish Republic" Gets Professorship of Mathematics in Maynooth.

NEW YORK, July 15.—Appointment of Eamonn De Valera, "President of the Irish Republic," to the chair of high mathematics at Maynooth College, Ireland, by the Most Rev. Daniel Mannix, archbishop of Melbourne, was announced here last week. Archbishop Mannix will be the guest of honor at a public reception at Madison Square Gardens Sunday evening, July 18, at which Archbishop Hayes of New York will preside.

GOVERNOR COX FAVORS LEAGUE

Believes that Treaty of Versailles Should be Ratified by United States, with two Reservations.

DAYTON, Ohio, July 15.—Governor James M. Cox, Democratic nominee for the United States presidency, is in favor of ratification of the Treaty of Versailles and the League of Nations with two reservations, according to his campaign manager, and they will form the keynote appeal to the people of the United States in his forthcoming campaign.

These proposed reservations of the League would provide as follows:

1.—That the United States signs with the agreement and understanding that all the signatories are bound together for only one reason—to keep the peace of the world.

2.—That without any suggestions that the United States sought to shirk its obligations, the League participants should clearly understand that the war-making power is vested in Congress, and that the United States could not act except in harmony with the constitution in complying with any League decision.

In speaking of the League issue his campaign manager pointed out that in a recent speech Governor Cox declared that the League was imperative and that it was his intention to fight for it "to keep faith with the boys who went overseas."

His advisers say there has been no change in his views.

Their interpretation of the Governor's position was that he would insist in his campaign upon such a ratification of the treaty and League as would not trespass on the principles of the document, and he would fight for Article Ten without weakening reservations.

Governor Cox and Franklin D. Roosevelt, the Democratic standard-bearers, had their first meeting since the San Francisco convention in the executive office at Columbus Monday afternoon.

DYKE BREAKS AT NICOMEN

Island is under Water and the Damage is Placed at \$100,000. Soldiers Lost All.

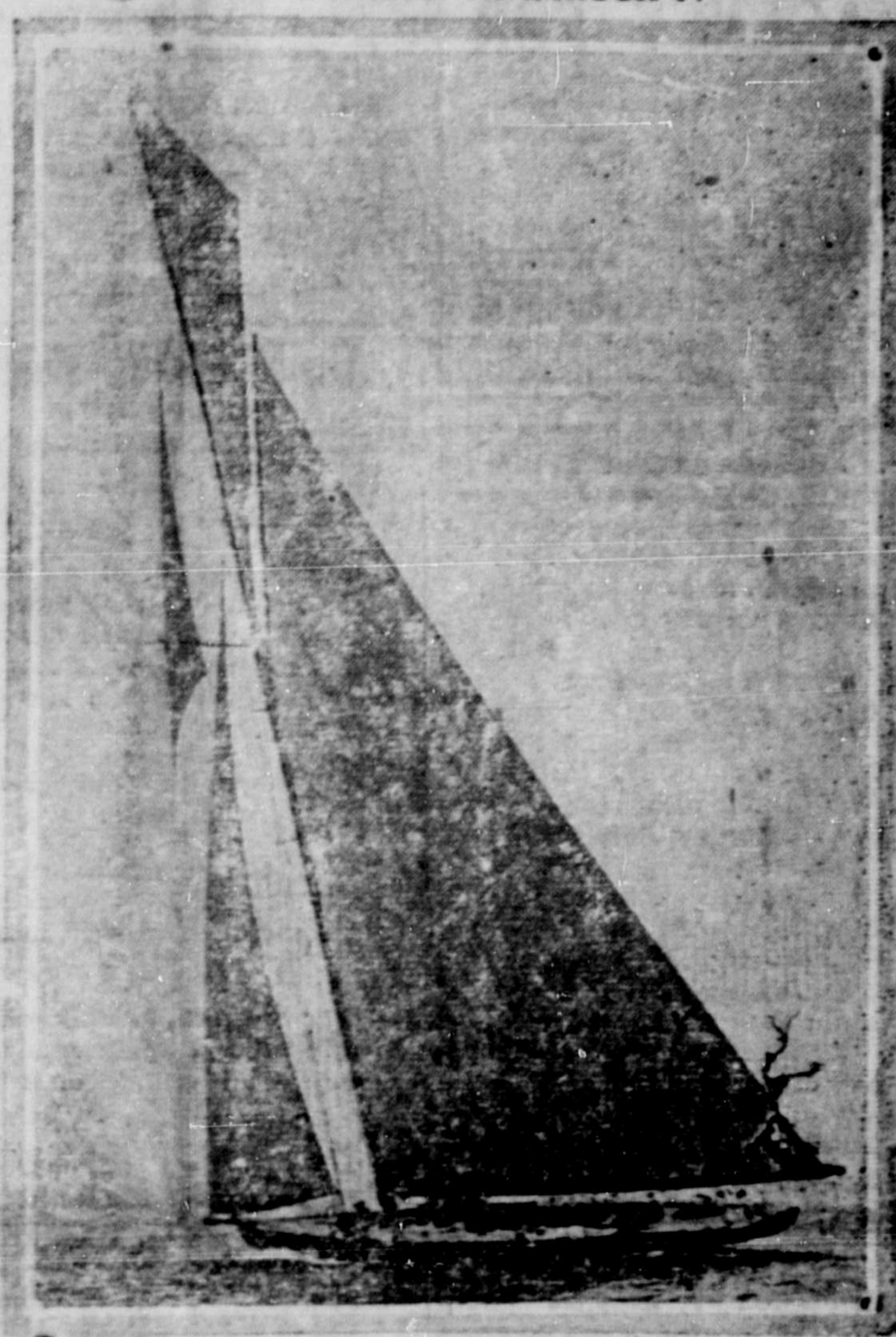
MISSION, July 14.—On account of the bursting of a dyke, Nicomen Island is under water and several soldier settlers have lost all their possessions. Four hundred acres is affected by the deluge and the damage to crops and buildings is estimated in the vicinity of \$100,000.

GERMANY GIVES WAY ONCE MORE

Has Now Complied with Allied Demand for Two Million Tons Coal Monthly.

THE SPA, July 15.—The Germans have finally agreed to the Allied demands for the supply of two million tons of coal monthly. Their first excuse was that it would be impossible to send so much. The presence of military counsel at the conference, it is understood, had a bearing on the German decision.

British Challenger Leads Resolute in

Shamrock makes poor start in slow race; Weather conditions quite adverse; Time 4 hrs. and 20 mins.

NEW YORK, July 15.—(Flash).—Sir Thomas Lipton's "Shamrock IV" won the first race of the America Cup series at Sandy Hook today. The series will be decided by the winning of three races out of five.

Progress of Race.

NEW YORK, July 15.—After the yachts were out two hours the distance made was only ten miles, but the Shamrock was half a mile ahead. The sea was dead calm and the air almost still. The Resolute parted her throat halyard half a mile from the turn but still kept sailing.

NEW YORK, July 15.—The Resolute crossed the starting line at 40 seconds past twelve, while the Shamrock was 58 seconds later in getting under way. The poor start for the Shamrock was due to faulty timing. At 12:10 a rain squall was encountered. Mrs. Burton, the wife of the captain of the Shamrock, who acted as timekeeper, said that the poor time was due to rain and lightning. Six miles out the Resolute was increasing a half mile lead but the Shamrock soon picked up and passed her.

Yachts' Measurements.

NEW YORK, July 15.—The particulars of the yachts participating in today's race follows:

Resolute, owned by the New York Yacht Club, Captain C. F. Adams, 36 men, 106 feet long, 69,000 square feet.

Shamrock IV, owned by Sir Thomas Lipton, 42 men, 112 feet long, 100,500 feet.

The Shamrock was further handicapped by seven minutes' delay owing to greater sail area.

NEW YORK, July 15.—(Later).—It is understood that the Shamrock must complete the course in the six-hour limit to win.

NEW YORK, July 15.—Flash.—The Shamrock finished the course in 4:20, winning the race.

Judge Young Named Chairman of Board

F. G. Dawson and W. E. Thompson had conference this morning and reach decision; Men return to work in meantime

The local longshoremen returned to work at 1 o'clock this afternoon following a conference between F. G. Dawson, representing the Grand Trunk Pacific Steamship Co., and W. E. Thompson, for the longshoremen. These two gentlemen met this morning and decided on Judge F. McB. Young as the chairman of the conciliation board on the strike issue.

Although Judge Young is at present out of town and will not be back until July 24, his acceptance of the chairmanship of the board is taken for granted and pending the board's finding as a result of its deliberations the longshoremen will carry on their usual work which has been suspended for nearly six weeks.

WILL CONTEST NEW CABINET

Does not look like McCurdy, Spinney or Wigmore will be Elected by Acclamation

OTTAWA, July 14.—No date has yet been set for the by-elections which F. B. McCurdy, E. K. Spinney and R. W. Wigmore will have to contest before they take their cabinet seats. It is understood that all three of them will have their return contested.

SCHOOL BOARD HAD MEETING

Two New Teachers Named—Borden Street Repairs and Seal Cove Cinders.

At the meeting of the school board yesterday afternoon a further appointment of two teachers was made to take the place of Miss A. MacKenzie and for a vacancy not yet filled. The two new teachers are Miss May Martin of Ladner and Miss K. Simmonds of Vancouver. Miss MacKenzie was already named for the local staff but owing to being appointed by a school before the local board made her the offer she had to decline the Prince Rupert appointment.

Mitchell & Currie were awarded the contract for repairs to the Borden Street School. The work will be carried out during the summer holidays and the estimated figure is \$480.

A contract was also given to J. Broaden for hauling cinders to the Seal Cove School. There are 100 yards to haul and the tender was 75 cents per yard.

FARMERS FACE LABOR FAMINE

Ontario Authority Asks Toronto People to Spend Vacations Working on Farms.

TORONTO, July 15.—J. A. Miller, superintendent of the Government employment bureau, recently stated that there would be a shortage of farm labor again this season, and asked residents of the city to consider the advisability of spending their vacations on the farm to assist in gathering the crops. Mr. Miller believed that the shortage would become acute toward the middle of next month.

"While farmers are not asking for many men at present because of the light hay crop, much labor is needed to pick the fruit in the Niagara peninsula," said Mr. Miller. "Much of the crop will be a loss if labor cannot be had. One fruit-grower who was in today asked for one hundred men."

Mr. Miller pointed out that the prospects this season were for heavy crops, and that the need for labor would be pressing if the weather were uncertain. He said that wages of farm labor would be \$50 to \$60 a month in Ontario.

LIQUOR VOTE IN NOVEMBER

Postponement of Registration Will Delay Important Referendum.

VICTORIA, July 15.—The postponement of the closing of the registration for the new voters' lists means that no liquor referendum will be taken till early in November.

ROOSEVELT NOT RESIGNING NOW

In Interview at Stockton, Cal., he Puts Rumors as to Immediate Resignation at Rest.

STOCKTON, Cal., July 15.—Franklin D. Roosevelt said here that he will not resign his position as assistant secretary of the navy at once. Since his nomination as vice-presidential candidate it has been persistently rumored that he would resign at once. This will, however, not take place for some weeks.

Acceptance With Protest.

Germany's attitude to most of the demands of the Allies at The Spa conference is mainly one of protest. In the first demand of the Allies for immediate disarmament, the delegates manoeuvred about so that they might possibly evade the issue and in some manner circumvent it. The Allies, however, showed that direct answers to all questions would be demanded and that there could be no trifling, so, after threats of one kind and another—threats that were only vain and could not be in Germany's power to carry out—she reluctantly accepted those terms, under protest of course. Now the questions of paying in the form of export to Allied nations is coming up. Germany yesterday stated that she could not supply 2,000,000 tons of coal monthly to the Allies and it looks like another attempt at trifling. Suggesting that military coercion might be brought to bear on them, the Allies have called in their military advisors. So it is likely that Germany will now accede to the rest of the demands. If she does not, she will be tearing up another "scrap of paper," and the Treaty of Versailles is a scrap of paper that the Allies will defend even more jealously than they did Belgium's treaty. It were better that Germany accept the provisions asked by the Allies—even if their acceptance is with protest. Their usual protest is only in the hope that they will be able to maintain at least a vestige of national independence and respect, anyway.

Fisheries are Stronger than Ever.

According to authoritative reports brought from all sections in the north, from Rivers Inlet to the Naas River, fishing in the vicinity of Prince Rupert this season is a more prosperous industry than ever before. While salmon fishing on the Fraser has been, as yet, far from satisfactory for there have been practically no men out up to date, fishing here is at its height. The catch is most satisfactory and the small boats are doing wonderfully. In fact the business this year promises to exceed the magnitude that has been attained in any other year. Besides the salmon fisheries, reports in the halibut line are also most gratifying and these fishermen are also doing well. Prince Rupert last year led all other Pacific ports in the fish business—there is no doubt that it will maintain its lead this year, the only difference being that the distance between it and its nearest competitor will be the more widened.

Watch Out for The Sharpster.

With the boom that mining has taken in the north during the past year or so, there have come into the country a number of parasites who always come with great booms of any kind. These parasites, disguised under the name of promoters, are nothing more than commercial sharpsters but their disguise is so well sustained that the common person in the city is generally deceived. Their usual line of talk is of an exaggerated nature but their approach is sometimes remarkable. Their stock in trade is nothing more than their imagination and their experience with bona fide mining men. They have capitalized this imagination and experience and use such smoothness in retailing their talk that the city man with savings is often led to invest his all in some "Eldorado" with disastrous results. The people of a mining community knowing these men very well are very seldom tricked but it is the small investor who is generally caught. The only safe policy is to obtain expert and trustworthy advice and beware that you do not buy a picture, a dream or a "line of talk." They are very poor investments, although they are generally costly.

NEW COAL MINE SHIPPING HERE

MacLeod River Hard Coal Mine is Owned by Nick Gurvich—4 Cars a Week

Regular shipments of coal are now being received in the city from the MacLeod River coal mine which is owned and operated by Nick Gurvich, of this city. Recently Mr. Gurvich bought his prospector partners out and so is now sole owner of the property, which now employs thirty men. The MacLeod River mine is located about 800 miles from here on the line of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway near Edson.

This mine was opened up four months ago and its coal has been coming to Prince Rupert for two months. Eight carloads were received here last month and besides this some of the output is being sent to Edmonton. The present production is 4 carloads a week, but in the course of two months' time, when the working crew will be doubled, it is expected to send out from ten to fifteen. Mr. Gurvich is foreman at the mine and Thomas Trotter is local agent at Prince Rupert.

LOWER PRICES WILL INCREASE AIR TRAVEL

PARIS, July 14.—Early announcement is expected of a reduction of passenger rates for air travel between London and Paris, and many are wondering if the day is far distant when it may be cheaper to travel by air than by land and sea. At the beginning of the London-Paris air service last year the price for a one-way ticket on small fast machines was twenty guineas, and fifteen on the larger passenger ships. It is now reported that the fare will soon be reduced to £10 10s.

In one recent week's flying more than 100 passengers were carried in the London-Paris air service, and it is hoped that a reduction in price will increase the number of passengers. There have been ever-increasing numbers of inquiries for the service, but the price has discouraged many prospective passengers.

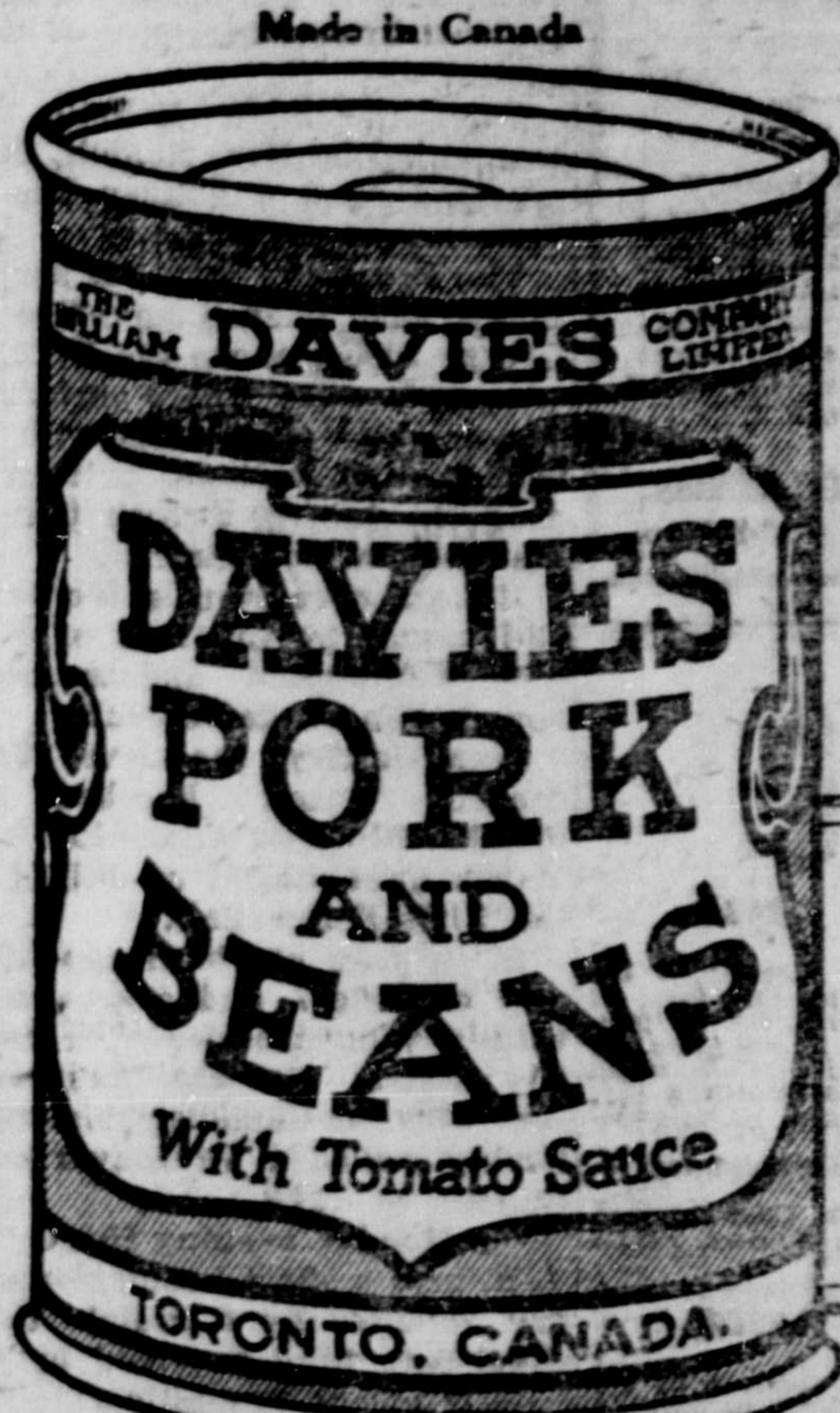

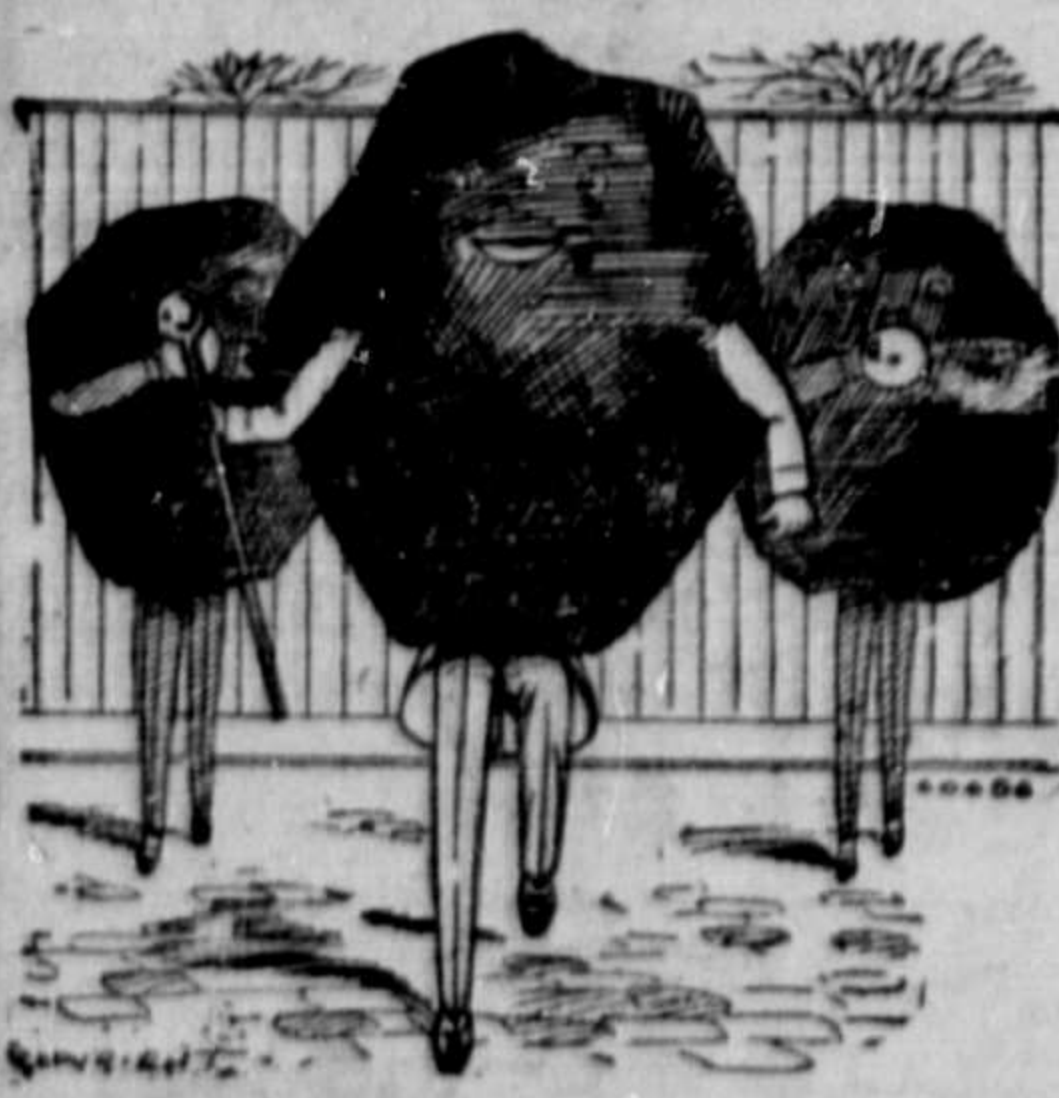
