ERIE, Penn., July 16.—The first plane on the Nome flight made here yesterday afternoon, having experienced good weather in the first flight of 300 miles.

QUOR VOTING OCTOBER NEXT

Section of Importation of Liquor Will be Dealt With by Yukon, Alberta, Manitoba and Saskatchewan.

OTTAWA, July 16.—The Canadian Temperance Act, commonly known as the Scott Act, will be voted on October 25, in the Yukon Territory and the provinces of Alberta, Saskatchewan, Manitoba, Ontario and Nova Scotia, and possibly one or two other provinces. The vote will be on the question whether the Scott Act will be adopted and thus prohibit the importation or conveyance of liquor from other countries or provinces into the provinces adopting the act. It will be definite "yes" or "no" and one question only. Alexander Smith, minister and election authority in this city, points out that the act to be used will be the lists to be prepared under the new minor Election and Franchise Act as this act has repealed the former Times Election Act and other federal laws of unhappy memory.

VANCOUVER, July 16.—The arbitration board here has brought in a majority report against the increase of pay to freight handlers at this port. The longshoremen recently gave notice of strike if increase to Rupert demands was not forthcoming.

HUGHES' CASE BEING HEARD

Bank Official and Secretary to Accused Testify—Prosecution Preparing Case.

VICTORIA, July 16.—On the resumption of the hearing of the police court trial in the Griffith Hughes theft case this morning, the court room was crowded. The charges were read and the accused elected for a jury trial.

F. R. Filligress, the assistant accountant at the Bank of Montreal, produced deposit slips of the David Spencer account for October 27, November 3 and 22, representing cash and checks for \$4,855, \$3,620 and \$1,518. Deposit slips for April 20 to June 12 were also put in.

Mary Price, Hughes' secretary for thirteen years, said she would sometimes add the Spencer ledger in the office at the Times Building. She recorded deposits from slips of paper received from Hughes.

The prosecution is laying the foundation of the case endeavoring to show that the money received on specified days for deposit were defalcations.

Sensational Testimony. W. B. Monteith, an accountant in partnership with Hughes for eleven years, swore that when Hughes bought the Times he retained the Spencer business, he (the accused) doing all the outside business. The first conversation incident to the leading up to the present charges he had had with Hughes had been on June 16, when he had found discrepancies in the accounts. One Monday for an entry of \$25,000 in the cash book only \$24,000 was de-

EVIDENCE IN ASSAULT CASE

Hearing of Urlacher Assault Case Starts in Police Court; Remanded.

In the police court this morning evidence was taken in the case of Rex vs. Urlacher in which the accused has been held on a charge of inflicting serious bodily harm to James Garnett. The case has arisen out of a fight on the night of Sunday, June 27, when Garnett was taken to the hospital in an unconscious state. At the opening all the witnesses were ordered from the court room until called by the court. W. O. Fulton appeared for the accused and City Solicitor Hooper acted for the prosecution.

The first was C. A. Eggert, doctor of the city of Prince Rupert, who had been summoned to the local hospital on the night of the 27th to attend to the wounds of James Garnett. He found the victim in a deeply unconscious state, bleeding at the nose and mouth. The patient had sustained a fracture at the base of the skull and was suffering from paralysis on half of the left side of the body. Garnett had a wide abrasion on the left side of the temple but the physician was not prepared to state how the blow might have been delivered. The patient seemed to be improving but lacked co-ordination, which the doctor went to explain by saying that he could not concentrate for any length of time. The period of convalescence might be a long one but he was not prepared to state for certain.

Constable McGlinchey described having received the phone call to proceed to the scene of the fight, where a man was reported to have been "knocked out." On arrival there he found James Garnett unconscious on the street. He summoned a taxi and Gus Steputis took the helpless man to the hospital. On June 28 he arrested the accused in a shack on Fraser Street and warned him in the usual way. The accused admitted at the time having struck the man but not kicking him.

Gus Steputis was then called and described how he met his partner Garnett at Anyox some months ago. He described how the fight started when an old man pestered him for drinks and he refused to give him any, both at the Royal and the Empress bars. At the Empress, Good told him to quit picking on the old man and this was what brought about the first quarrel. They went around the corner and he gave his coat to James Garnett. He did not see much of the fight between the accused and the man now in the hospital. On cross-examination he told that during the fight someone was on his back and he felt a kick near the shoulder blades. There were many people around before the end of the fight. When asked if he had taken a foul hold he said no but had grabbed him round the waist in a clinch. He admitted that the old man cried out that he did hold him foul. During the course of events he had heard no words between Garnett and the accused.

Fred Williams told of how he had seen the two fights taking place on opposite sides of the street. He did not see the start and was going home when he heard further shouting and returned. The injured man was not on the ground until he was knocked down and he was not close enough to see if the accused did anything after the fall. He

did not know any of the parties and couldn't remember the man with the gold teeth in front who had been fighting with Steputis.

Ernest Unwin told of having seen the fighting but did not recognize the accused. A man was hurt and he helped Fred Williams lay him out on the sidewalk. He noticed his face bleeding, he was breathing heavily and smelt strongly of liquor. It was a haphazard fight and rocks were thrown but he had no idea who the parties might have been.

When called, Leonard Knight told of the way in which the fight started and of its progress. He was watching the first fight and did not see how the other got under way. He had noticed the accused trying to stop the fight between Steputis and Good at the time the latter claimed the foul hold. In the second fight he only saw the accused standing along side the man on the ground.

On account of the wide brimmed hat he thought the accused was a policeman and decided to go away. He thought that Garnett had been under the influence of liquor, and half of those standing around as well. He had not taken any himself. Upon cross-examination he said that it was some other man who kicked Steputis in the back and not Good. He did remember another man having interfered besides the accused. He did not know what had stopped the accused from entering again and stopping the fight.

Following the hearing of the remaining three witnesses, Fritz Schultz, Frank Aldridge and C. H. Good, the magistrate remanded the case until July 23.

JUDGE YOUNG ACCEPTS POST


Hoped that Longshoremen's Conciliation Board May Commence Sitting on July 26.

Canadian Fisheries Increase in Value

Big Advance on previous year---Exports also Show Improvement---Canadians must seek Foreign Markets

OTTAWA, July 16.—The commercial revenue from Canadian fisheries for the fiscal year ending March 31 has just been announced here. The total revenue from the fishing industry was \$60,000,000 for the year which shows an increase of \$25,000,000 over last year's report.

The fish exported is valued at \$40,687,172, one hundred per cent more than 1914 and \$4,000,000 over the previous year. Comparisons show that the exports to the United Kingdom were \$9,815,979, as against \$8,726,389 in 1914. United States got \$17,180,250 worth of Canadian fish in the past year, while her 1914 receipts were only \$5,644,355.

In the six years there has been a 300 per cent advance in the value of dry salted cod, ling and pollock. The Canadian fisheries people are urged to further seek foreign markets.

OTTAWA FAMILY GAVE BIG SUM

Towards Establishment of Tuberculosis Sanatorium in City of Ottawa.

OTTAWA, July 16.—E. C. Whitney and family have given \$100,000 towards the establishment of a tuberculosis sanatorium in this city.

Edward Canfield Whitney, who resides here, is a well known business man and is the brother of the late Sir James Whitney, former premier of Ontario. He has given several large donations to colleges and similar institutions in the past. In 1906 he was appointed governor of the Toronto University, the year before having presented a \$68,000 residence to that institution for men students.

Later he presented a library of valuable Egyptian books and antiquities to the university and in 1911 offered to give \$100,000 towards the building of a new general hospital in Ottawa. Mr. Whitney is president of the St. Anthony Lumber Co., vice-president of the Crow's Nest Pass Coal Co., and was a director of the Bank of Ottawa.

BIG STEEL CONCERN MAKES COLLEGE GIFT

Dalhousie Gets \$250,000 for Nova Scotia Natural Resources Research.

HALIFAX, July 16.—The British Empire Steel Company has donated \$250,000 to the Dalhousie University for research work into the resources of Nova Scotia.

WOMEN FIGHT REDS

Vilna Women Defend Their City Against Advance of the Bolsheviks.

WARSAW, July 16.—A battalion of a thousand women is defending Vilna against the Bolsheviks. The Reds are seriously harassing the city.

LONDON, July 16.—The Bolsheviks have entered Vilna, all opposition being withdrawn. Wrangel, the anti-Bolshevik leader, has refused the British proposal that his forces withdraw from Crimea. This was to be incorporated in an armistice arrangement.

TOM LIPTON NOT PLEASED

Is not Satisfied with Winning Technically—"Not Tom's Way."

NEW YORK, July 16.—After the race yesterday, Sir Thomas Lipton said: "While the Shamrock won technically, I am not satisfied with that kind of victory, it is not Tom Lipton's way."

Lipton's first impulse was not to cross the home line after the Resolute had met with the mishap, but he was persuaded to continue as the construction and sturdiness of his yacht were factors in the winning.

ARE TRYING TO SAVE BUILDING

Creditors are Pressing for Payment of Six-year old Construction Bill on Vancouver Y.M.C.A.

VANCOUVER, July 16.—Revised efforts to save the Y.M.C.A. building are to be made here. Creditors of the Y.M.C.A. for the construction of the Georgia Street building are pressing their six year old claim for payment, and are even threatening to take action against the old building and assets on Hamilton street.

About \$300,000 worth of construction has been put into the Georgia Street building, the progress of which was hindered by the collapse of the realty boom in 1914 and the inability of many of the guarantors to make good on their guarantees. About \$300,000 is needed to complete the building. Two years ago a "drive" was made but failed by \$24,000 to realize enough to complete the building and under the conditions of the "drive" all pledges were released as the total amount required to complete the building had not been obtained.

Several local syndicates are said to have their eyes on the property, as the \$300,000 of construction is now worth very much more than when put into place in 1913 and 1914. Its value as a residential hotel or convention centre has attracted notice. Y.M.C.A. circles are very anxious to renew efforts to have the building completed.

In the very centre of our mind there is a principle of life which inspires our mind and colors all our thoughts. This is the spirit of the mind.

Here is a lad the spirit of whose mind is frivolous. He can think of nothing but play. What are we going to do with a boy like that? Shall we try the external method? Surely this is too superficial. We can do almost anything we like with a child when we awaken in his mind the spirit of interest. If we wish to change this boy's character we must get at the spirit of his mind.

Are Given.

Here is a woman the spirit of whose mind is envious and jealous. This spirit in the very core of her being is poisoning everything she touches. She is constantly running down her neighbors, thinking that in so doing she is running herself up in the estimation of others. What shall we do with a woman like this? Shall we try and improve her social manners? Surely this is too superficial. We must try and get at the spirit of her mind.

Here is a man the spirit of whose mind is distrustful. He not only has no confidence in other people, he has no confidence in himself. If he undertakes a piece of business he is sure that he will not make a success of it, and thinking this, of course, he fails. What shall we do with a man like this? Shall we read him a lecture on the method of success? Surely not. What he needs is the spirit of success. Faith is the victory. We must try and get at the spirit of his mind.

The Mind.

From this psychological approach we can readily see how reasonable it is to assume that if the spirit of our mind can be brought into living contact with the Spirit of Christ and the Mind of God our whole character will be transformed in a most natural manner, just as the plant brought out of the darkness into the sunlight responds and through the renewing of its inner life produces the beautiful flowers.

WHEAT CROPS NEVER BETTER

Edmonton Says as Near Ideal as Could Possibly be—Warm Weather Works Wonders.

EDMONTON, July 16.—The crops in the Edmonton district at the present time are in a condition that is as near ideal as could be desired. Although there has been no rain for the last four or five days the soil has sufficient moisture and the warm weather that has prevailed the past ten days during which the thermometer registered eighty degrees or over has worked wonders with the crops.

AIR ROUTES WILL BECOME VERY ACTIVE

Regular Service from London to
Bombay promised—France Making Strides

PARIS, July 16.—A regular airplane service from London to Bombay is probable by 1922, as a result of a rush order for planes and airdromes by an English-French company. France is excelling England in the development of civil air service, and new air routes for passengers and goods have been opened throughout France. Two of them lie between Lyons and Paris and Nice.

A project is being launched this week for a flyer service from Paris to Constantinople via Prague and Bucharest. Two former captains of the French Air Service are at the head of the first section from Paris to Prague.

Already the operation of a line from London to Paris has been established for some time and a British company is developing a line to Constantinople and Bombay. The through trip from London will take 50 hours flying time, and changes of machines will be made in Paris, Prague and Constantinople. Regular flights are now made between London and the Riviera.

Plays With Danger and Seems to Enjoy It—"Western Blood" Is Thriller.

Tom Mix, the star of the new picture "Western Blood," which is showing at the Westholme Theatre tonight, is the nerviest man on the screen. DESPITE ANTI-OPIUM LAWS, POPPIES ARE GROWN IN QUANTITY

SHANGHAI, July 16.—Opium is being grown extensively in parts of Fukien province despite the law against it, according to a mission worker stationed at Yenping. He writes to the Anti-Opium society:

"At the city of Yenping, the headquarters of the southern forces, I found they were growing opium extensively; even in the grounds of the yamen itself the ground was white with poppy. I was told there were over 100 opium shops in the city licensed for one dollar per night marked 'place for the breaking of the opium habit.'

"The military are forcing the people to plant the drug and no matter what the value of the crop may be, they are to be taxed a definite amount."

LEAGUE HAS A VITAL MEANING

Striking Utterance of General Smuts in Assembly of South Africa—Must have All Nations.

LONDON, July 16.—Those who imagine the League of Nations is destined to fade into a nonentity are invited to study the discussion in the South African House of Assembly and the strikingly pregnant utterance of General Smuts," writes J. L. Garvin in The Observer. "The moral forces of the world are not the loudest," he continues, "but their subordination is only temporary. The League has a vital meaning for the Dominions."

Gaggin points out that even the accession of America to the League wouldn't establish it in functions so long as Germany and Russia are without. It would only be a "League of some Nations." Friends of the League are urged to work early for the admission of Germany and Russia. If they are admitted and America is in, then all excuse for a continuation of the Supreme Council will have disappeared, but "It is well to be reminded," he adds, "that the Dominions aren't resigned to accepting an expedient of the hour in place of a settled policy."







This change has been made in pursuance of the policy of combining the work of the two roads in the interests of economy. Considerable extensions are to be made at the Grand Trunk offices.

COKING OVENS ARE SUCCESSFUL VENTURE

H. S. Munroe, New General Manager of Granby Co., is pleased With Results.

VANCOUVER, July 16.—The establishment of coking ovens at Cassidy, on Vancouver Island, by the Granby Consolidated Mining & Smelting Company is proving a successful venture, according to reports of H. S. Munroe, the new general manager of the company. From 420 tons of coal per day, 300 tons of metallurgical coke are being produced, while the by-products recovered include 5,000 gallons of coal tar, 800 tons of motor fuel, and considerable quantities of ammonium sulphate. The oil is used in Vancouver in the manufacture of creosote, and the sulphate for making fertilizer. These results are considered highly satisfactory.
