# Further Fish Wharfage is Provided T. ALICE HOTEL AT HARRISON HOT SPRINGS IS COMPLETELY DESTROYED

## Government Wharf Is to be Extended

Up between Present Ending and Akerberg & Thomson's Machine Shop to be Filled; Estimated Cost \$15,000

Tenders are being called by the Provincial Department of Works for an extension of the present wharf here to the east that is estimated will cost in the neighborhood of \$15,000. It is proposed to extend the wharf filling in the gap between the present limit and Akerberg & Thomson's machine shop. The new work will give accommodation to two or three fishing concerns and the shed is to be extended over the new wharf.

The tenders are to be in the hands of the Department by August 9. The proposed improvement in the main dock cannot be made until the level crossing at Cow Bay has been secured.

## IT IS NOW COMPULSORY

## RUPERT MAN WAS KILLED

Falling Tree Causes Death and Body was Burned in Forest Fire at Terrace

TERRACE, July 19.—The new fisheries inspection Act becomes effective on the Pacific coast on September 1 and on the Atlantic, Sept. 1, 1921. The act makes compulsory catching up mackerel, salmon and other varieties other than wild cured, according to provisions of the Act as to protection of packing, grading and containers. By the general act of 1913 this was made optional.

They have arranged a banquet in St. Andrew's Hall, following which there will be a grand dance in Assembly Hall. On the reception committee are Harry Miller, John Morrison, A. Connon, Humphrey Baynes, Jas. Turnbull and A. Gibson.

## ESTEVAN HAS STRIKE ALSO

Big Lighthouse Tender is Tied up Alongside Newington at Digby Island.

The sailors and firemen of the lighthouse tender Estevan with the exception of three men, drew their time and walked off the vessel at Digby Island at the end of the week and the big steamer is now tied up at the Marine Depot manned only by her officers. The Newington is alongside also held up by a strike.

According to the story of the men of the Estevan on strike, who number eighteen, before leaving Victoria on June 1, the firemen and sailors were assured by Col. Wilby at Victoria that they would be paid according to the prevailing coast schedule. It was with that understanding that they took the vessel out of Victoria, but since they came north they claim they wired to Ottawa to ascertain if they were being paid according to the old scale. The wages being paid, they state, is \$90 per month for firemen and \$75 for sailors, while the new schedule calls for \$100 and \$85 respectively. It was for this reason that they left the vessel. All the strikers are returned soldiers.

### The One Cure For the Sick Man.

For years before his deposition by the Young Turks, Abdul the Damned was frequently spoken of as the "Sick Man of Europe." Physically he was a miserable ailing, fretful individual and his characteristics became those of the Empire he misruled with such success. His nickname became allegorically that of his country. For years his neighbors told old Abdul how a cure might be effected of the ills troubling his people. But instead of taking any one of the medicines, Abdul preferred to mix his drinks and took a little of the proffered cures from each of his obliging neighbors. Needless to say the result of the mixture was satisfactory to no one, it affected Abdul not one whit, left him no worse, but if anything seemed to cause him intense amusement it was listening to the claims of the medicine prescribers, each of whom claimed credit for some invisible improvement in the patient's condition. Inciting the jealousies of the physicians was the favorite occupation of the neurotic Abdul and he became an adept in the gentle art of setting his western neighbors by the ears.

### Now is the Time For Heroic Measures.

Although old Abdul no longer pulls the strings from the Yildiz Kilosh on the beautiful Golden Horn, his successors in Stamboul have been only little less expert than he was in the art of bluff. But now, however, the concert of Europe is reduced to a duet and when the duettists are expert musicians, neither will produce a wrong note to disturb the harmony of their music. France and Britain understand each other and refuse to be pulled off the tune by any discordant note, sounded by the Pashas. The Turks have to swallow some real medicine. They will either have to obey the treaty of Versailles to the letter or they will be thrown out of Europe, bag and baggage. If this takes place there will be few regrets. Heretofore each European country was withheld from direct action against Turkey by the mutual jealousies of the powers. Now when the sole power in Europe is the Supreme Allied Council this sore spot which has been a source of infection for all Europe for generations, ought to have a major operation which is about the only thing from which will result health.

### Rainbow is To be Sold.

It is a pity that the Dominion Government cannot be persuaded to turn over the old cruiser Rainbow for the use of the Boys' Naval Brigade as a training ship, says the Victoria Times. In the meantime there is a possibility of its disposal as junk after the machinery has been dismantled. Canada's merchant marine of necessity must depend upon her ability to provide the men with which to man the national fleet. Ships always can be built in a few months, but it takes a good deal longer to turn out the seamen. Little expense need be involved in the maintenance of the Rainbow for the coming mariners. She would be stationary and her adoption for training purposes would make possible a considerable extension of the Boys' Naval Brigade movement to which this country must look for her sailors in the future.

Little Marguerite Clark Plays the Part of Bachelor Girl in "Widow by Proxy."

Fresh from a daring expedition into the wilds of Dutch Borneo, Frederick Burlingham, director of the Paramount-Burlingham Adventure Pictures, and formerly associated with the Lasky Film Corporation, reached Victoria today aboard the liner Fushimi Maru from the Far East, says the Victoria Times.

The moving picture expedition conducted by Mr. Burlingham penetrated five hundred miles to the upper reaches of the Banito River and into the jungle country of Borneo. He mingled with the head hunters of Borneo and for months dwelt and slept with the native Dyaks. In his wanderings he had the novel distinction of fraternizing with the famous "Wild Men of Borneo."

Early in April of this year, Mr. Burlingham, accompanied by a Dutch guide and two native interpreters, after equipping his expedition at Sourabaya set out to explore the interior fastnesses. The first part of the journey was made by steamer up the Banito River, and after varied experiences the party reached Moeratewe. Nigel Barrie is leading man.

### Met Head Hunters

It was here that Mr. Burlingham saw his first head hunters. Two of the wild men were held in prison at the most advanced Dutch settlement, paying the penalty for a wild orgy in which they had been the principal participants. It appears from the explorer's narrative that the natives had organized a feast, and when the celebration began to flag interest the head hunters came to the conclusion that it was time to introduce some excitement. Accordingly the heads of two of the natives were hacked off, a sort of war dance set in motion, and thereafter developed all the features of a real native carnival.

The head hunters were convicted on the ground of having suggested the beheading ceremony, and were incarcerated in prison at Moeratewe by the Dutch authorities.

### Infested with Crocodiles

In navigating the Banito River the Burlingham expedition came across swarms of crocodiles which infest the inland waters of Borneo. Myriads of monkeys were also seen, including the big red monkey, the grey and black varieties and the "Wan Wau."

After seeing these monkeys in their native haunts," said Mr. Burlingham, "I shall have sympathy for any monkeys that I see in captivity in future."

Mr. Burlingham says that the monkeys are almost human in their habits, and are playful and tame. They were of the most varied types, and chattered incessantly. The crocodiles that infest the Banito River are ferocious, and the natives frequently fall victims to their voracious appetites.

At Moeratewe the Dutch resident official strongly advised Mr. Burlingham against penetrating into the unknown wilds where danger lurked on every side, not only from the wild animals, but also from the wild tribes of the interior.

Mr. Burlingham, however, was not to be balked by any obstacles, and after restocking his expedition he set out to carry on his explorations into the unknown country..

### Animal Life

The dense jungle was infested with wild animal life. Wild boars, panthers, tigers and snakes were in abundance. At night the jungle resounded with the animal noises and the shrieks of wild fowl. Some of the native birds have the most gorgeous plumage that it is possible to conceive.

The natives were very friendly and for weeks Mr. Burlingham mixed on the best of terms with the Dyaks. The houses of the natives are peculiarly constructed, being built of bamboo and perched about fifteen feet in the air on bamboo stilts. Whole families of Dyaks, together with their chickens and other livestock, roost together in these elevated shacks. Mr. Burlingham ate with the natives and slept in their huts. He was never exposed to attack. The Dyaks displayed a great interest in the knives and forks used by the exploring party.

### LOCAL MEN STOPPED VANCOUVER TRAIN

Albert Davidson, formerly G. T. P. ticket agent here and now commercial agent at Vancouver, and L. K. Shane, purchasing agent for the Prince Rupert Dry Dock and Engineering Co., had a narrow escape from death at Vancouver last Thursday. As they were crossing the G. P. R. tracks on Victoria Drive the car which they were driving stalled just as the fierier Trans-Canada was coming around the curve. The men were forced to jump from the car to save their lives and the machine was carried about forty feet by the collision, damaging it beyond repair.

The natives still believe in evil spirits, and at night place food on a pole outside the huts to keep away the objects of their superstition.

While in Borneo Mr. Burlingham took 10,000 feet of film and secured most valuable pictures showing the jungle fastnesses and the native life of Borneo.

Floods forced him out of the country, but he proposes again to visit the interior of Borneo and will return to the Far East this Fall. The movie explorer is now on his way to New York.

### Filmed Vesuvius

Mr. Burlingham is the camera operator who descended 1,200 feet into the mouth of the volcano Vesuvius just before the Great War, the pictures of which created a great sensation in Europe and the United States.





## HIGH WATER IN BEAR RIVER

**Stewart Experiencing Warmest Weather in History—Salmon River Also High.**

STEWART, July 19.—High water in Bear River caused the wagon bridge, a mile above town, to go out Thursday morning. There is danger of the railway bridges going out too, though crews are busy to save them. This district has experienced for the past two weeks the hottest spell on record here, and, added to that, the late season finds much snow on the mountain peaks. Melting snow and glacial ice has made torrents out of all creeks and Bear and Salmon rivers are especially dangerous.

The false work on the bridge at Texas Creek, Salmon River, was carried away Thursday afternoon. Construction of this bridge has been under way for some time and the high water now will delay its completion. It has been decided to put a cable across for prospectors.

The arrival of G. A. Young of Anjex, road superintendent for this district, Thursday morning was opportune. Complaint was made last summer about the danger from Bear River not only to the bridges but to the town as well.

But so long as the railway bridges hold, mining development up Bear River will not be seriously interfered with.

The Canadian Northeastern Railway, personal venture of Sir Donald Mann in 1910, which runs up Bear River valley for fourteen miles, and which resumed operations a few days ago, is doing quite a passenger and freight business. It is a welcome "lift" to prospectors in the valley and a great aid to operators in getting supplies up at a minimum cost.


