No Race Today; only Drifting Match SOLDIER SHOT IN CHURCH AT CORK WHEN MAKING SIGN OF THE CROSS

Shamrock Led Off But Wind Failed

Race Declared Off; only Seven Miles in
Two and a Half Hours

SANDY HOOK, July 26.—The yacht race between Lipton's Shamrock and the Resolute was declared off as neither boat sailed within the time limit.
The race started sharp at 12:30, the Shamrock being first off the line. For the first fifteen minutes the wind was brisk and she was leading. Then there was a change.
At 3:20 it was reported that the Resolute was a mile and a half ahead with the wind very light. It was then evident that she could finish within the time limit as they had sailed only seven miles in two and a half hours.
At 4:25 the Resolute was two miles ahead, both yachts searching for a breeze.

QUART LAKE NEW SCHOOL CONTRACT LET

Port Moncrief of Vancouver to
Erect Building at Cost
of \$174,500.

VANCOUVER, July 26.—Robert
Moncrief of Vancouver has been
awarded the contract for the new
school to be erected at the
Indian reserve, Stuart Lake,
on the line of the G. T. P. The
building is to cost \$174,500,
the price to include a chapel and
play ground.

The Fort Fraser school is to be
completed as soon as the new
one is completed, which is ex-
pected to be about the end of the
year.

MEMBER BACK FROM TERRACE

Place is Developing Fast—
Pulp Mill for Kitimaat
Soon.

Mr. T. D. Pattullo returned
yesterday from a visit to Terrace
leaving tomorrow morning
on his way to Kitimaat. He
is going to join the Prince Rupert
Board of Trade.
The minister was well pleased
with the development he saw at
Terrace. He says the people
there are showing commendable
energy in developing the district,
especially in clearing land
for planting fruit and vegetables.
The timber between Terrace
and Kitimaat is held by big cap-
italists who are proposing the
construction of a pulp mill at Kitimaat
in the near future. In fact they
are already working on the plans.
This will necessitate a railway to
Terrace in the near future.

HELD UP TOURISTS

Near Yosemite Park.

The Cold Storage bought the
Bellanca, 19,000, and Flamingo,
19,000, at 12c and 6c; Ringleader,
4,000, at 12.6c and 7.6c, and the
Mareneac, 4,000, at 13c and 6c.

CANNERY IN SOUTH BURNS

British Columbia Packers' Asso-
ciation Lose Ladner Cannery
in \$100,000 Blaze

LADNER, July 26.—Fire on
Saturday morning completely de-
stroyed the Currie & McWilliams
cannery. Included in the loss
was 6,000 cases of sockeye sal-
mon, \$14,000 worth of nets, the
cannery store, manager's resi-
dence and Japanese shacks. The
cannery was the property of the
British Columbia Packers' Asso-
ciation. The \$100,000 damage is
fully covered by insurance.

south.

ford, died here at the end of the
week.

Week End Tragedies Are Numerous at Many Points

Handcuff King drowned at Calgary; several killed at Van-
couver; Train hits Auto which somersaults into river

VANCOUVER, July 26.—A budget of week-end tragedies are
reported in this city from different parts of the west. In Van-
couver, Harold Aldrich, sixteen years of age, was killed between
the wheels of a C. P. R. flat car. He was riding and fell when
the car was moving.

Seaman Aspinall, of the S. S. Exporters, was drowned while
boating, the craft being upset by a squall in the bay. The body
of Fred Cristen was recovered from the inlet.

At Nelson, Steven Deschamps, a lad of seventeen, was drown-
ed when fishing in the creek. He slipped from a log.

At the same city Annie Hill, eleven years of age, was drowned
while swimming in the river, and the body of Donald Kurtz, who
was drowned with his father, was recovered.

Handcuff King.
At Calgary, George Place, a veteran known as the "handcuff
king," was drowned while bathing in the lake.

Roy Tunish of Calgary, a teamster, is dead as the result of
drinking carbolic acid in mistake for brandy.

At Grand Forks, B. C., E. E. Barron, a dairyman, was killed
when his automobile was hit by the Kettle Valley train. It somer-
saulted into the river, with fatal result to the driver.

In South Vancouver, A. Livingstone was found dead in his
bed following a drinking bout.

RAILWAY TO PEACE RIVER GOES TO C. P. R.

Alberta Premier Announces Lease
of Line for Five Years.

EDMONTON, July 26.—Premier
Stewart announces that the C. P.
R. is to control and operate the
Edmonton, Dunvegan and British
Columbia Railway under an op-
tion to purchase. The big cor-
poration is to spend a million
dollars on the line in return for
the five year lease. J. A. Mac-
Gregor is manager of the line.

The probability of finding oil
in the Peace River country and
the agricultural and other de-
velopments proceeding there have
been the chief factors in inducing
the C. P. R. to take over the rail-
way.

the result of a week-end electri-
cal storm, the severest in this
district in eighteen years. The
tempest swept everything before
it. Trees and power lines went
down like grass before a mower.

Burning and Killing in Ireland Still Continues

Sergeant Mulhern shot by Sinn Feiners as he was making
the Sign of the Cross in Church at Cork

DUBLIN, July 26.—Disturbances in different parts of Ireland
continue, outrages of various kinds being common. Three Coast
Guards officers were killed at Bearhaven; at Newport, Tipperary,
the home of one of the leading Sinn Feiners was burned after the
daughters had had their hair sheared off for keeping company
with a policeman.

Cork, July 26.—Sergeant Mulhern was shot at the church
door while making the sign of the cross. The perpetrators of
the foul deed were Sinn Feiners who had hidden themselves in
the porch before mass.

Belfast, July 26.—The death list to date in the recent clash
between Unionists and Sinn Feiners is 17. Sunday was quiet.
In order to protect St. Matthews Church which is right in the
storm centre, it was surrounded with barbed wire and soldiers
were on guard outside.

TWO ROBBERIES EARLY SUNDAY COLONEL PECK MAY RUN FOR LEGISLATURE

Cash Register Smashed and
Change Taken from Rupert
Supply Store
ATTEMPT MADE AT
RUPERT POOL ROOM
Suggestion That He Will Leave
Federal Politics and Enter
Provincial Arena.

Early Sunday morning two
robberies took place in the city.
The store of the Rupert Table
Supply was broken into and also
the Prince Rupert Pool Room.
From the former \$35.55 was taken
from the cash register and from
the latter cigars, cigarettes and
\$66.40 were removed. The police
are busy on every possible clue.

At 3 a. m. on Sunday morning
J. C. Gavigan had inspected the
change in the tills and at that
time everything was secure. It
was not until the owner returned
at eleven o'clock Sunday that the
loss was noticed. Entrance was
made through the cellar window
and the trap door forced from
below. The big cash register had
been forced by an axe but the
small one had opened by hand. A
possible clue was offered in the
finding of a felt hat in the store
but this was later accounted for.

At the Prince Rupert pool room
the glass from the back door was
carefully removed and the pilfer-
er had apparently worked for
some time as considerable small
articles were removed from the
show cases. The cash register
had been opened but no money
had been left there over night.
An attempt was also made upon
the safe for the knobs of the
hinges were removed but appar-
ently the thief had been distur-
bed at his work for he left a cold
chisel which is now in the hands
of the police. Warden Bailey of
the police department is at work
on the cases this morning and
from his finger print studies some
sensational arrests may be made
soon.

In the Police Court this morn-
ing J. J. Uppacher was committed
for trial before Magistrate Mc-
Mordie in the assault case in
which James Garnett was the
victim. J. S. McKenzie was also
sent up for trial in connection
with the removal of a barrel of
herring from the cargo of the
Tillamook. They will come up
for election for trial before
Judge Young.

George E. Darby, M.D., of Riv-
ers Inlet, has been appointed a
stipendiary magistrate, according
to the current issue of the B. C.
Gazette.

Yesterday morning the steamer
Prince George was docked and an
examination made of the damage
to her stem. It was found, as
previously reported, that the stem
was twisted and a number of the
plates badly damaged.
Work was at once commenced
and most of the rivets were taken
out in readiness for the new
plates. Early this morning the
work was stopped and the vessel
surveyed by Capt. Logan, the rep-
resentative of the underwriters,
who arrived on the steamer Prin-
cess Mary.

Up to the time of going to press
the work had not recommenced.

One Price System
Of Doing Business.

There is only one system of doing business that is worth considering and that is the one price system. Getting as much as possible out of customers without regard to cost and percentage of profit is not only immoral business, but it is not good business. Every person in business should have a certain set price for its product and that is the price it should exact from all.

There are of course difficulties in carrying out this one price system. In this paper for instance we sell advertising. It is the one thing of value the paper has to sell. There is a scale of charges for advertising space which is printed in card form and this is the scale on which the advertising is sold. Anyone can secure one of the price lists on application and can purchase advertising space on the terms thereon set out. There is a graduated scale of prices, but the same price for anyone wishing the same class of publicity.

Price Based on
Cost of Operating.

The price asked for advertising in the Daily News is based on the cost of making the paper. Of late years the cost of making a paper has increased enormously. The increases have often come so thick and fast that money has been lost owing to inability to bring the income up to the necessary expenditures. The cost of making a paper today is many times that of a few years ago. As a result, advertising rates have to be higher.

The Daily News has tried to meet the extra costs of space, by increasing the circulation of the paper, and the result is that today practically everyone in Prince Rupert is reading the paper. At any rate anyone whose business is worth anything to advertisers is a reader and subscriber.

It has cost a lot of effort and some money to attain this position in the local field. We have tried to put out a paper that will provide the news for readers and will be a credit to the community. Comparison with papers in towns of similar size to this will, we think, show that we are giving greater value than elsewhere.

There is a tendency in a place like Prince Rupert, shut in as it is from other communities, to belittle local effort. There is a tendency to speak slightly of everything that is done, whether it be the making of the newspaper or anything else. In spite of this tendency, however, there are many here who recognize that they are getting good value in their daily paper here.

Increase Price
Absolutely Necessary.

In order to keep up the present standard of the paper, it is necessary that the price be increased. We have delayed doing this as long as possible but now it becomes necessary. Prince Rupert people do not want something that is cheap. They want the best possible newspaper. We feel sure of that. Other papers have advanced their prices. At Ketchikan the Chronicle charges \$1.25. The Victoria newspapers are charging a dollar a month and many papers on the prairies are now charging a dollar. The Daily News will also be sold at a dollar a month to regular subscribers on and after August 1.

When two years ago it became necessary to advance the price of the paper, one subscriber was lost. We do not anticipate losing many on this occasion. There may be some who do not feel that they can pay the increase, and in that case we shall expect to lose them, but the increase is necessary and the people of the city will, we are sure, realize the fact and continue their support.

A party of Shriners arrived from the south on the Princess Royal yesterday on the way to Dawson and were given a welcome here. Following a tour about the city they were taken to the Prince Rupert Club where they obtained a splendid view of the harbor.

SAWS ENGLAND IS NOT
AWAKE POSSIBILITIESCanadian Senator Says England
Does Not Appreciate Canada's
Natural Resources

LONDON, July 25.—Senator Frederick Nichols, who is now in London, says that Canada as compared with most other countries occupies an exceptionally prominent position. The reason for this, he says, is found in the fact that the Canadian people subscribed to domestic loans so that borrowings abroad was unnecessary, therefore no gold is going abroad for interest.

Senator Nichols finds no adequate appreciation here of Canada's natural resources. He hopes that the time is not far distant when this country will wake up to Canada's vast possibilities and save her resources from being developed by Americans. If people took a greater interest the game would be worth the candle, he holds.

OPPOSED TO GENERAL
INCREASE IN RATESVancouver Board of Trade will
Protest to Railway Board

VANCOUVER, July 26.—At a special meeting of the transportation of the Board of Trade a strong resolution of protest was passed against the proposed application of the railway companies to the board of railway commissioners to raise the present freight rates 30 per cent. This resolution will be brought up at the next meeting of the full board and then forwarded to the railway commissioners.

The resolution is: "While not being opposed to an increase of freight rates where justifiable we protest against the general increase on the ground that British Columbia is at present paying more, pro rata than any other province; and that we are entitled to an equalization between the prairie basis and the basis on which British Columbia rates are made; and we further protest against the present discrimination against British Columbia in the matter of the difference in the rates between east-bound and west-bound rates and request the board of railway commissioners, before deciding on any change in the rates, to take this discrimination into account."

BEAR OR PORCUPINE

Wonderful Trophy Taken at Alaska
Town by Steamship
Officers.

On the last trip to Skagway a party of officers of the Princess Mary went on an expedition up town and soon in their travels they landed in the woods near by. Their only weapon of defence was a fishing rod. According to their story upon their return they had encountered a bear and had quite a struggle before killing it. Some of their friends on board were a little dubious and on the way south to Prince Rupert invited a connoisseur of skins to go down and have a look at the pelt. POPULARITY OF KNITTED GOODS

Present Rage for Sports Clothes is Boon for Britain's Hosiery Business

At no time in its history has the British hosiery trade occupied such a world-wide pre-eminence as it does today. This is due to a variety of causes, but more especially to three. Stated in order of importance, they are (1) the trend of fashion; (2) the increasing purchasing power of the public in almost every civilized country; and (3) the temporary elimination of German competition. Of these the most potent is unquestionably the first.

Sports Clothes
 For several years before the war a steady increase was observable in the use of all knitted and woven fabrics—a tendency which has been enormously accentuated since. The growing partiality of women for outdoor amusements, such as golf, hockey, and tennis, has created a veritable rage for sports coats, knitted jerseys, leather tweed mixtures in hose, tams, ties, scarves, sweaters, and other wearing apparel of the same kind. The movement, at first confined to Britain, has now spread not only to the United States and the Dominions, but to other countries as well, until orders for this class of goods are pouring in from every quarter of the globe. It is significant that where anything needed for sport is concerned all nations turn to Great Britain, whose products dominate this realm as decisively as Paris does that of dress. Time was, and that not so long ago, when the term "hosiery" connoted little besides underwear, socks and stockings, whereas today it covers a multitude of articles undreamt of until quite recent years.

British manufacturers have not been slow to realize what a magnificent field this healthy desire offers for their enterprise, states the Times, and to improve upon their earlier efforts. The more or less unsightly jersey has been supplemented by charming designs in every conceivable variety of shape and shade, which impart to garments fashioned out of wool the smartness and even the grace of much daintier materials. Now that people have more money to spend, Great Britain's established reputation for quality is enabling her to reap a wonderful harvest. Her past policy of free imports, disastrous as it has been in many respects, has compelled her manufacturers to produce hosiery which appealed on other grounds than that of mere cheapness, and today the foreign buyer knows that, to satisfy the demands of his customers, who are everywhere clamoring for goods of a finer quality than they have been accustomed to, he must look to England.

Competitors Suffer.
 This universal rise in the standard of taste, which is showing such manifest advantage on Britain's own commerce, is reacting to the disadvantage of our competitors. There is no lack of war-time American hosiery in Holland to be had cheap, but the Dutch refuse to buy it. The Japanese, too, are scattering the products of their low-paid labor broadcast, but the countries of northern Europe, the Colonies, and South America want something better nowadays, and insist upon having British goods. The British agents in every country report that the demand for more expensive qualities of all kinds of hosiery appears to be hardening. This applies both to women's and men's wear. There is plenty of lower grade stuff on the market, and of men's half hose, more especially, there is quite a fair supply of medium class goods to be had, but scarcely anyone wants them, and manufacturers in Leicester are concentrating more and more on producing hosiery of a finer quality which, incidentally, yields them a better return.

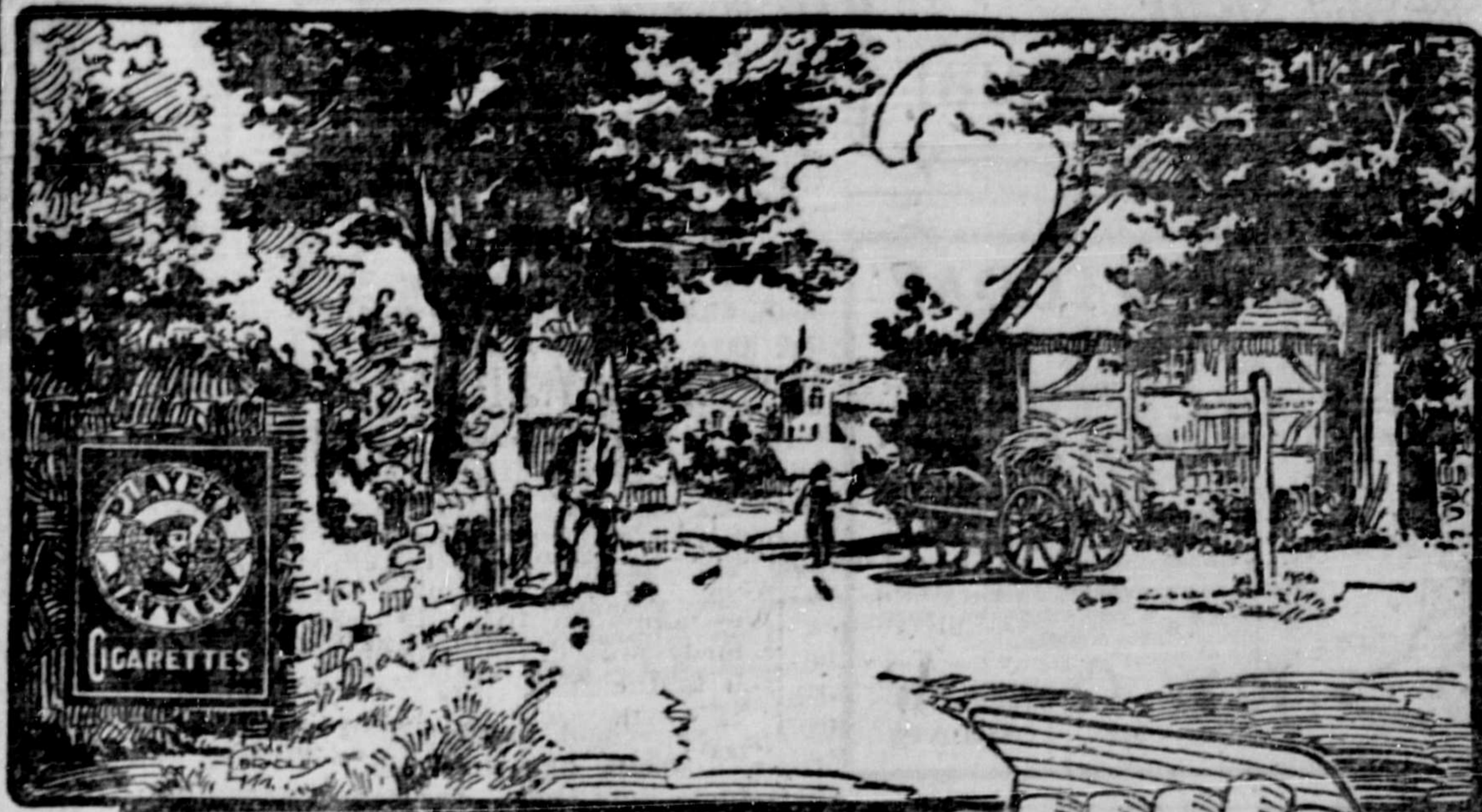

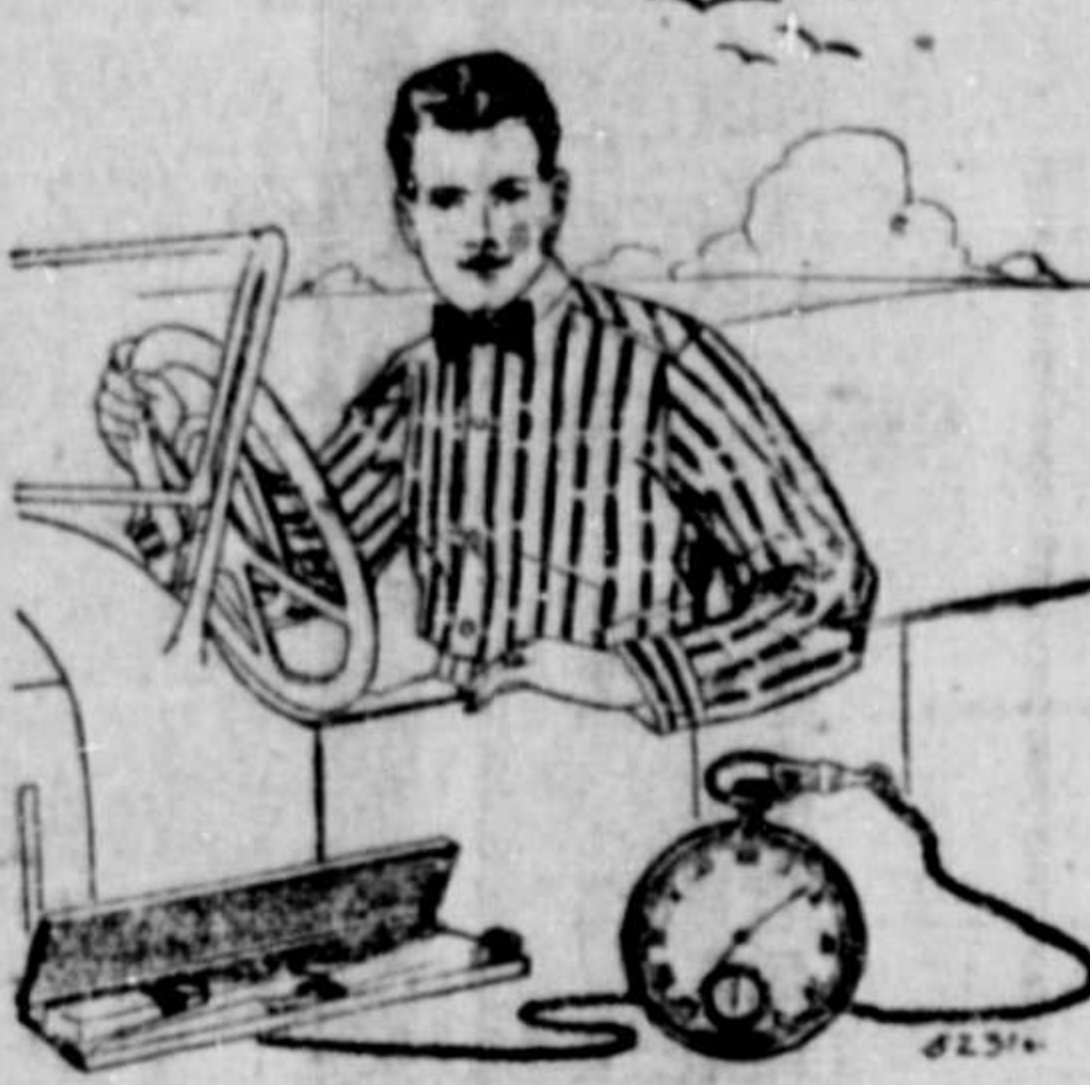

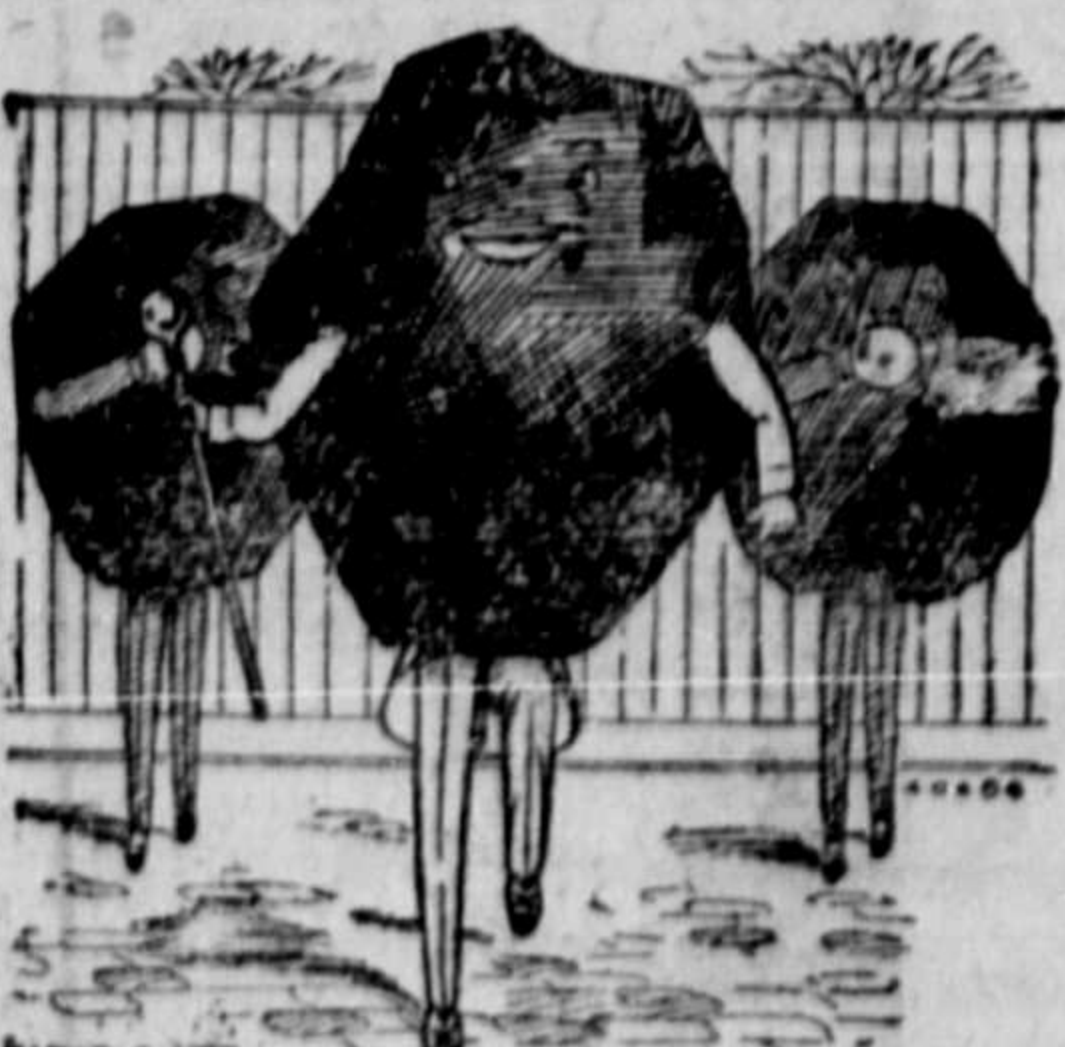

Synopsis of

Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$4 an acre; second-class to \$2.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 1 year, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$100 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$10 per acre, including 40 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption. If he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Min. factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to the site of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Armies, or dependants, acquired direct or indirectly, remitted from settlement to March 31, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING.

Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner.

Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged; priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.
