Revolting Crime at Prince George

GERMAN REICHSTAG RATIFIES SPA AGREEMENT WITH ALLIES; BIG MAJORITY

German Named Ogle Beats up Pioneer of Prince George

Runs to Woods with Rifles and Ammunition after horribly mutilating man whom he had threatened to injure

PRINCE GEORGE, July 29.—Thomas Dodds, a pioneer resident of this district, was found murdered on the roadside between here and that of Robert Alexander, a neighbor at Mud River, miles from here, yesterday afternoon.

The head of the victim was pounded to pulp and a German named Ogle is the alleged murderer, two boys having allegedly witnessed the deed and identified the man who did it as Ogle.

A neighbor of Dodds', on hearing of the horrible deed, ran to another neighbor, who reported the case to the police in a quick run. In the meantime Ogle had fled, taking with him two rifles and a lot of ammunition, also a revolver.

Kicked Head to Jelly.

According to the story told by the boys Ogle struck the old man several times, knocking him down, and then beat him again. Next went up the road a little way, but came back and kicked the old man's head to jelly. He then went to the shack, took the guns and ammunition and made for the woods.

There seems to have been an old standing quarrel between the two men for Dodds had previously had Ogle bound over to the peace for using threatening language. Ogle had, allegedly, promised Dodds that he would "get him good some time." To trace of Ogle has been found as yet.

RUSSIANS BEING REPORTED TODAY

on Soviet Citizens Being Sent to Their Native Land.

VANCOUVER, July 29.—The immigration department has been advised from Ottawa of an order to deport fifteen Russians now in the Westminister penitentiary. They are destined to sail on the steamer of Russia today.

The men who are being sent to their native land as undesirable aliens took a prominent part in the strike at the Terminal City. They seemed to be imbued with the spirit of their countrymen at the time that the time had arrived for the workmen to rule the city.

P. G. E. CONSTRUCTION IS FORESHADOWED

Additional Loan of \$3,000,000 is Being Asked by Finance Minister.

VICTORIA, July 29.—Further construction of the P. G. E. is being foreshadowed. Hon. John Hart is calling for bids on a \$3,000,000 loan.

It is known that the previous local loans were made to pay up some of the old P. G. E. indebtedness which had been hanging fire for some time. Now the Government is trying to raise money for new construction work which has already been started.

CHAMPIONSHIP GOES TO G.T.P.

Mobley Cup Won by Railwaymen When They Defeated Sons of England Last Evening.

The Grand Trunk football team won the league championship and possession of the Mobley Cup by last night defeating the Sons of England by a score of 3 to 0. There are two postponed games still to be played, Callies vs. Sons, and Callies vs. Trail Club, but these matches will only determine the runners-up.

Playing down hill the railroaders dominated the play in the first half, the Sons being rarely dangerous. The Trunks' forwards played pretty football with good combination which was met by a strong defence. Fortunately for the Sons the shooting of their opponents was rather wild and though corner after corner was conceded it looked like a cross-over without a score, until Sloan, the centre forward for the railroad boys, drove a hard ball at Winsby which the goal-keeper handled but failed to clear.

In the Balance.

With the advantage of the slope the Sons of England had a good deal more of the play and for a period it looked as if an equalizer would come. One high drop from Tinker gave Waldorf enough to do in order to get it cleared. Rallying from the attack the railwaymen again controlled the game and the younger Fanthorpe had a fine effort from the line which was saved by Winsby. A fluky kick by a half back put Sloan in possession and he scored rather easily and not long after added a third.

The winners had a well balanced team in which the two new forwards, Sloan and Kerr, shaped well in the line. Bennett and O'Donnell played an untiring game and Lawson shone at back. The Sons carried one or two passengers and sorely missed their stalwart back, Bert Wearmouth. Lambie and Tinker were aggressive on the forward line with Tabrum playing a hustling game at half. Darton's timely kicking saved many an onrush.

IN NOVA SCOTIA LIBERALS MAKE ONE MORE GAIN

HALIFAX, July 29.—Hon. R. M. McGregor, a Government member who was reported defeated in Pictou county, has been declared elected in the final return, by a majority of 35.

(B) Heavy broken line shows eastern boundaries of Poland before the partition of 1772. It was to bring this territory within the sphere of influence of Warsaw that General Pilsudski undertook the offensive which brought his army, in March, 1920, as far as the line marked X X X X. In connection with the Ukrainians, Kieff was captured, but was afterward abandoned before the Soviet advance.
(C) Thin broken line running through Brody, Brest-Litovsk and Grodno shows eastern boundary proposed by the Peace Conference in December, 1919. It is to this line that Premier Lloyd George suggests the Polish army now retire in order to discuss peace terms with the advancing Soviet armies.

INDICATIONS OF OIL FOUND STIKINE RIVER

Prospector Tells Ketchikan Paper of Outlook in That Region.

That oil indications are noticeable along the Stikine and some of its tributaries and that some excitement in this field may be expected some day is the opinion of E. M. Bryant, a returned Canadian soldier who has been prospecting in that region for several months, says the Ketchikan, Alaska, Chronicle. With others he went up the Stikine early in the summer, having been staked by the British Columbia provincial government. They found conditions such, however, that they could not make much headway with the funds at their disposal and rather than waste them they decided to return to keep their standing with the government good.

"There is no chance to prospect the oil indications now," he said, "as the cost of transportation is prohibitive. If this problem is properly solved some oil excitement may be expected there some day."

Mr. Bryant, who is sixty-one years old, but does not look it, served with the Canadian forces for three years in France. He enlisted when fifty-six but was compelled to stray slightly from the truth to do so. Forty-three was the age limit for admission to the army and he gave that as his age when he enlisted. He is strong in his praise of

the Dominion and provincial governments for their treatment of the returned soldiers, saying that excellent opportunities have been given to the men to better their condition after returning from the front. He fought in a number of the important engagements and escaped without being wounded, except that he was buried once with others of his company, which necessitated a little trip to the hospital.

SOCKEYES FETCH DOLLAR A PIECE AT BELLINGHAM

BELLINGHAM, July 29.—Sockeye salmon are very scarce here this year and the price of fish has soared to a dollar each. This is high compared with from 15c to 25c each a few years ago.

Only six canneries are operating now owing to lack of fish.

AMUNDSEN WILL MAKE A LONG EXPEDITION

Leaves Again for Arctic in Steamer Maude in two Weeks.

NOME, July 29.—Roald Amundsen, the arctic explorer, who arrived here a few days ago, is leaving in two weeks on a further expedition. This time he expects to spend five years in the Arctic and will sail away in the Maude with that purpose.

GIRL MURDERED

QUEBEC, July 29.—Blanche Garneau, 22 years of age, was found dead in the bush near Victoria Park. There are indications of assault and murder.

POLAND WOULD BUY AMERICAN UNIFORMS

Peace Parley Arranged with Allies and Other Countries Represented

LONDON, July 29.—The Allies have agreed with Poland that other states must participate in the Peace parley and that no separate peace shall be made. The United States has not yet been invited, but Poland is asking to be allowed to purchase 200,000 United States uniforms.

AGREE ON OIL

France and Great Britain to Co-operate in Development of Fields.

WASHINGTON, July 29.—The state department has been advised here that Great Britain and France have reached an agreement in regard to oil supplies and the development of oil fields with a view to international co-operation. This action will eliminate friction and unnecessary competition.

FIGHTING FIRES IN KOOTENAY COUNTRY

Supposed That Woods Were Ignited from Lightning.

NELSON, July 29.—Forest rangers are fighting bush fires along the Kootenay River. Much timber is being destroyed. The origin of these fires is attributed here to lightning.

GERMANS AGREE TO ALLIED TERMS

Reichstag Ratifies Spa Agreement By Overwhelming Majority.

BERLIN, July 29.—The Reichstag by an overwhelming majority has approved the agreement made with the Allies at Spa. The agreement has to do, among other things, with the delivery of two million tons of coal a month to the Allies by Germany, and with the demobilization of the German army.

All Interested In Yacht Race.

Everyone seemed interested in the big yacht race between Lipton's Shamrock and the New York Yacht Club's defender, Resolute. The race did not mean much. Sailing is out of date, steam and internal combustion engines having taken the place of wind as a motive force. A sailing race is almost as out of date as a Klotechman's canoe race, yet the whole world was interested in the outcome.

It was not because the event was international that made it of outstanding interest. International sporting events are pulled off regularly. This event, however, had been advertised to such an extent that everyone was looking for it and all were keen to know what was the outcome. Advertising is the secret of the public interest displayed.

Nova Scotia

Election Returns.

Nova Scotia electors have again shown their confidence in the Liberal administration and especially in their premier, Hon. G. H. Murray. For 38 years the Liberals have controlled the destinies of that province and the time now will be extended well beyond forty. It is a wonderful record.

It is common to hear in these post-war days that party politics is at an end and that there will never again be a lining up of the country into two large groups. We have come to a period of group government. To some extent that is true, yet the result in Nova Scotia, at any rate, indicates that the Liberal party is as live and strong as ever. Of course that means that the party has changed a great deal. It has grown with the times and adapted itself to changing circumstances. On the extent to which a party does that depends its hope for the future.

Conservative Party

Seems to be Doomed.

Whether there is something about the word Conservative that jars on the modern ear, or whether the past record of the party is not in accordance with present day demands, does not seem plain. At any rate we find the Conservatives in Nova Scotia left with only one member in the Legislature. In the Dominion we find the Conservative party in power but under a different name, the latest camouflage title chosen being "National Liberal and Conservative Party." In this city a group recently organized for provincial purposes under the name Liberal-Conservative as opposed to the Liberal group. The word Conservative is being subordinated or as in Nova Scotia the party is subordinated.

Support Principles

And Not Party.

To some extent the suggestion that people are breaking away from the old parties is true. Few people vote for a party just because it is that party. The policy is the thing, combined with the integrity of the men who take a leading part in it. Loyalty to a party is humbug. Loyalty to certain principles for which that party stands is quite different and a most admirable thing. The names Liberal, Conservative, Farmer, and Labor do not mean much. It is the principles for which they stand or the men who control their destinies, which means everything. To some extent a farmer or labor candidate is objectionable because the names indicate that they favor class legislation. If given the control of the destinies of the country, however, they find, as Premier Drury of Ontario finds, that all classes have to be treated without special preference if the affairs of state are to be conducted in such a manner as to appeal to the electors.

LENINE POLICY

American Ambassador in London Speaks on Individual Rights.

LONDON, July 29.—The American Ambassador, presiding at a gathering at London University, referring to the strange doctrines in the political and social world which the war had thrown into prominence, said that with all our development in this country of parliamentary government we had never forgotten that the supreme duty of every government was to protect and preserve the individual in his rights of person and property. (Cheers.) We were now invited to believe that the mass was more than the individual, and that any tyranny, however blind, must be submitted to if it was in the name of the common good. The chief protagonist of that gospel now assured us from Moscow that it was folly to talk of democracy achieving its end by means of the vote. These doctrines and others like them this generation must strengthen itself to meet, and if democracy, as we know it, was to survive in the world, it must survive by the spread of intelligence and education among men.

SURRENDERED ZEPPELIN ARRIVES IN LONDON

Carried Out Air Manoeuvres Over City Before Landing.

The utmost secrecy has been observed as to the arrival of the surrendered Zeppelin, and on its appearance, the time of which was only known to responsible officials at Pulham, everybody excepting those in charge of its reception was excluded from the grounds and its precincts, says the London Times. The arrival had been timed to occur at an hour when few of the public would be about, but the well-laid plans went awry. The L.71, on which all identification marks had been obliterated, majestically made its appearance from the clouds at Pulham about six in the morning, but probably owing to the large superfluous quantity of gas in the ship and to the absence of the landing party from Norwich and Bury St. Edmunds, it was thought inadvisable to land at once.

The ship's nose was immediately put into the air and manoeuvres were carried out in the district with a view to getting rid of the gas. Ultimately the ship was turned towards Norwich, and just after 9 o'clock a distant humming sound, such as at one time frequently sent men, women and children scurrying to shelter, was heard in the city, followed a little later by the drone of engines and the appearance of the huge black airship.

Though every outward sign to associate it with the surrendered L.71 had been obliterated, the outlines of a big iron cross on the stern, which had also been blackened over, were visible to the naked eye.

The huge ship remained poised over the centre of Norwich for something like three-quarters of an hour before returning to Pulham. Even then no landing took place for a time, and it was something like three hours after Norwich had been visited that the Zeppelin was brought to earth. Three hundred odd soldiers had been detailed to help to hold her in when a descent was made. A rope fell curling from one of the gondolas to the ground. It was immediately seized, and other ropes being loosened, squads of soldiers quickly had the ship secure and in tow. It was then only a matter of minutes before the surrendered L.71 was lying snug in the place originally prepared for the R.34.

TRIUMPH OF SURGERY

How soldiers who had portions of their nerves blown away had them rejoined by the grafting in of lengths of animals' nerves was told by Sir Charles Ballance in a lecture on "The Healing Process in Nerves," given at the annual conference of the Incorporated Society of Trained Masseuses, at the Royal Society of Arts, says the London Times.

"You get an animal," he said, "whose nerve is the same size as the one you want to heal. An officer was wounded in the arm, and two inches of his ulnar nerve were blown away. I went to my butcher and told him I wanted two inches of a sheep's sciatic nerve. He killed a sheep, and while the nerve was still alive I cut it out and grafted it in immediately. That officer made a complete recovery."

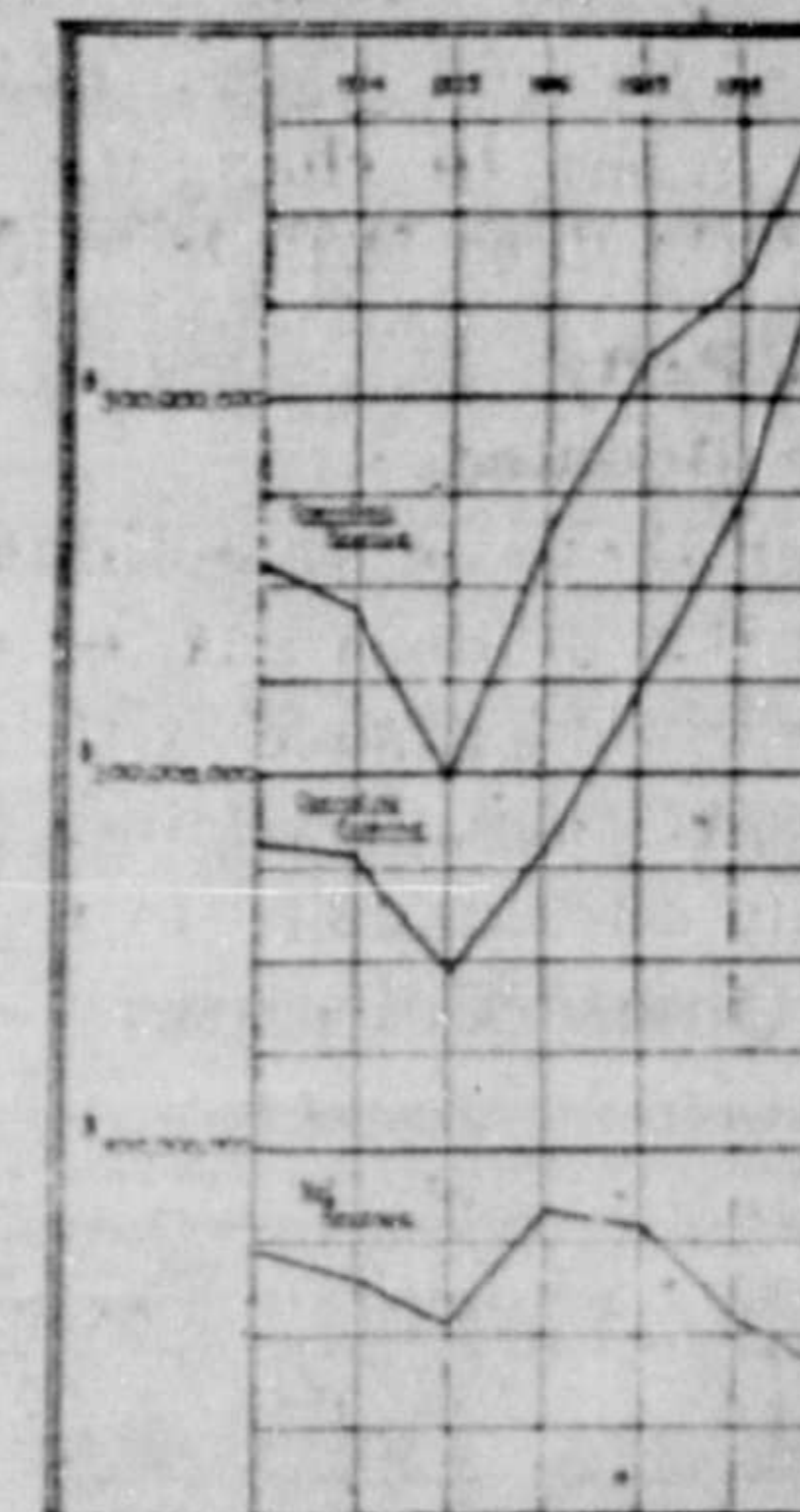

So the pennies accumulated, and already there is a small fortune lying at the bottom of Ramona's well.

Nor is this superstition of the travellers the only evidence in the case. One has only to see the young girls (and some of the old) waiting to catch the bride's bouquet at a wedding in order to be the next bride, to know that they are all ready to test out any husband-getting charm. And one may look in vain for the single girl brave enough to take the "last piece" of cake or candy on the plate, and thus run the risk of being an "old maid."

To the Editor,

In your report of the meeting between Mr. McInnes, civil service commissioner, and the local service workers, Mr. McInnes is quoted as having told the meeting that he interviewed a member of the local school board as to the reason for paying the school teachers fifteen per cent more than the Vancouver schedule and that the member of the board replied it was on account of the scarcity of teachers.

Now, Mr. Editor, I was the member interviewed on the subject and I did not tell Mr. McInnes any such nonsense. I told him it was because we considered the cost of living higher in Prince Rupert and also as an inducement to bring the best teachers here.

I never suggested the scarcity of teachers and, as a matter of fact, there is no scarcity of teachers as our secretary is swamped with applications whenever we advertise for teachers.

I cannot understand why the civil service commissioner should attempt to so distort facts unless it is in order to fit them into an opinion already formed before he came here. No wonder there has been so much objection throughout the province to his methods.

The local civil service, as a whole, is underpaid and every fair-minded man knows it.

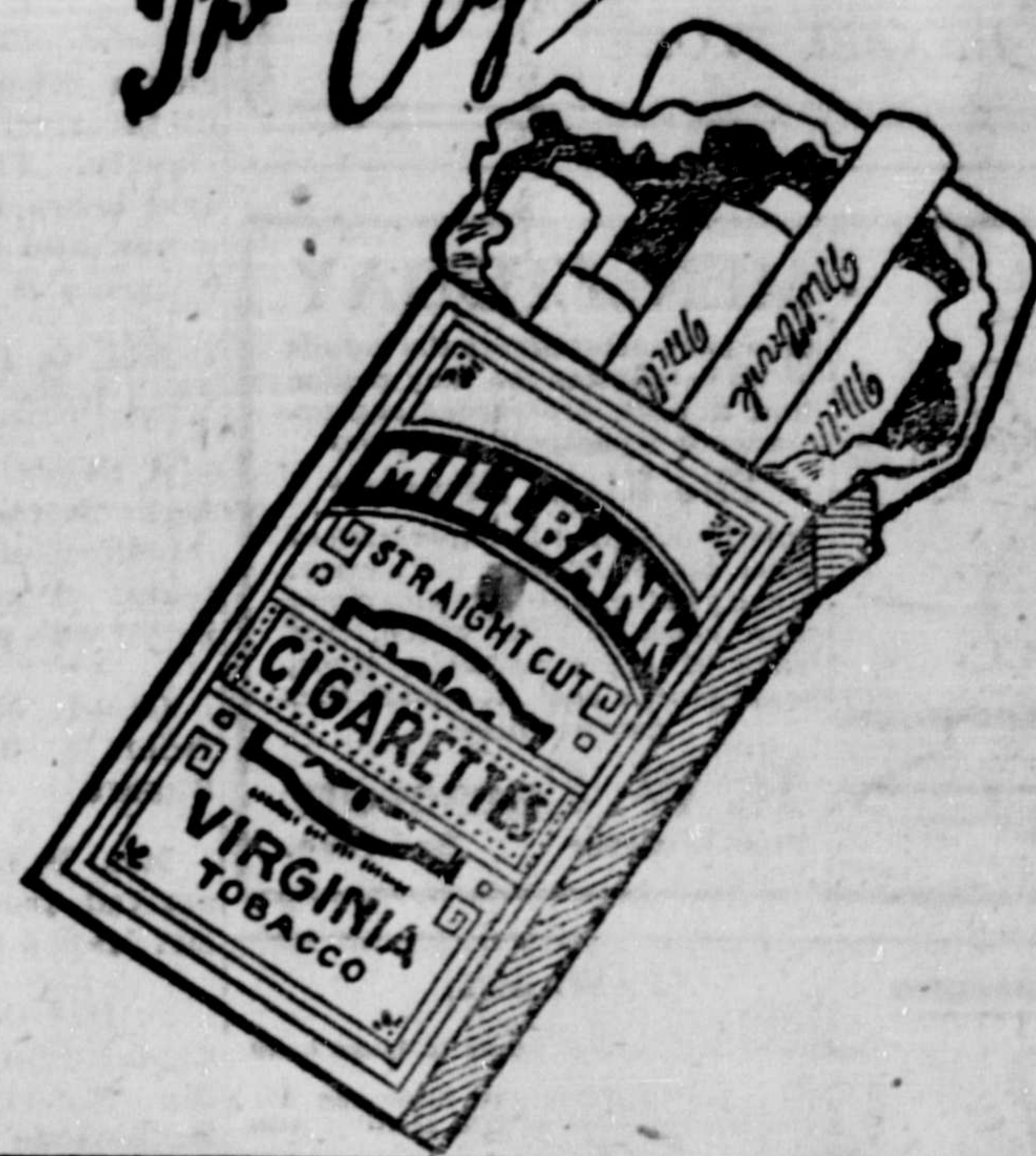

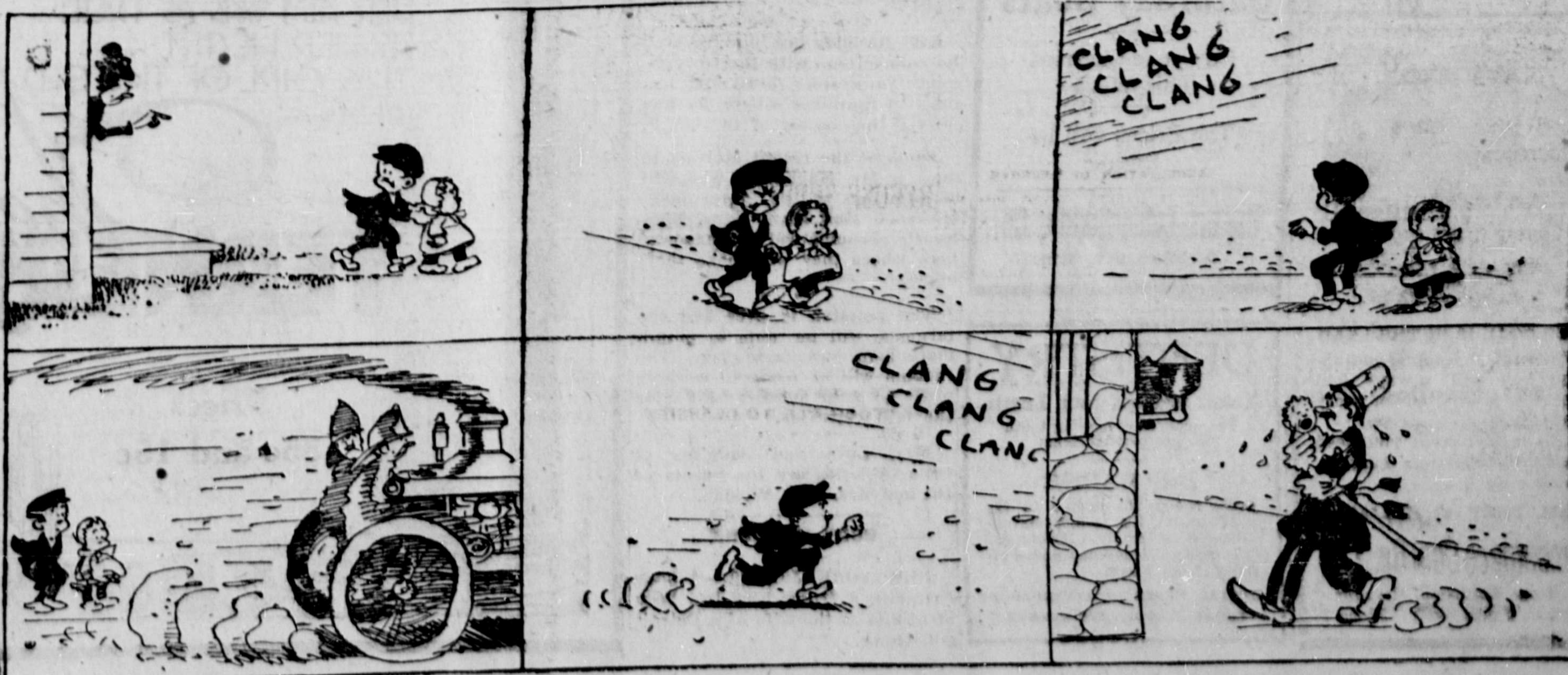

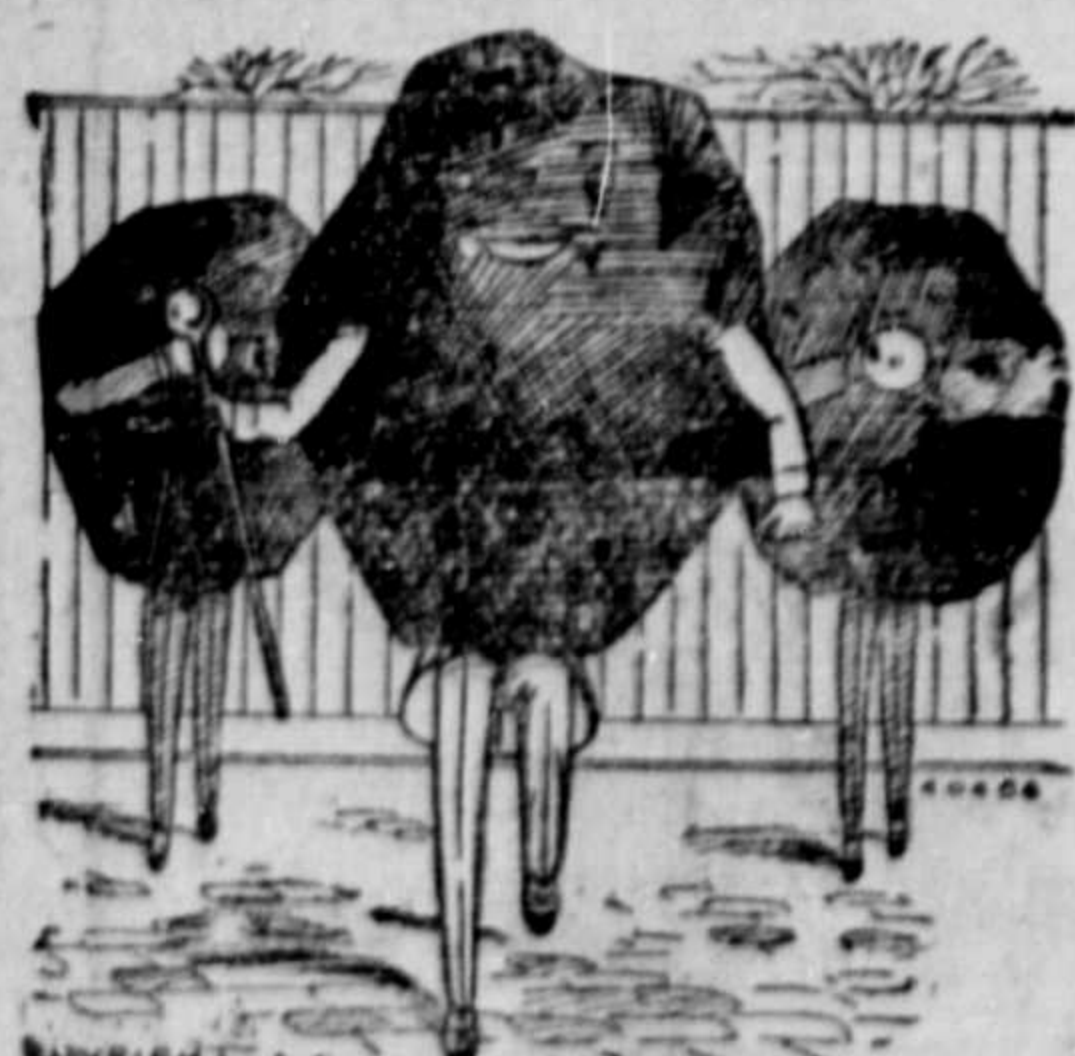
